

## Suez troops deserved a medal

thank you Mister Atkins when the bands begin to play."

I am not saying that later awards were not well deserved, but those who served in the Canal Zone were mostly National Servicemen living in lousy conditions.

Is it not time that the Ministry of Defence took up

## United — by a death's head symbol

THE "death-or-glory" pennon of Portugal's 2nd Cavalry Regiment (SOLDIER, May 14) is not really so much of a surprise.

It was in 1832 that Anthony Bacon was asked by Donna Maria du Gloria, the Queen of Portugal, to raise a regiment of lancers to help put down civil

unrest in her country.

The regiment, numbering about 400 men, was duly raised but Bacon required a symbol to

unite the many nationalities he now had under his command.

He had previously served as a major in the 17th Lancers — so what better symbol than the skull and crossbones of his old regiment? He also used the motto "Death or Glory", translating it into Portuguese as *Morte ou Gloria*.

Bacon, by then a colonel, led his regiment for the next two years, serving the Queen with distinction. He eventually retired as a general and died in 1864 at Crondall, in Hampshire.

The regiment is now a unit of Military Police numbering about 550 men. It is interesting to note that the regiment charged with the lance as recently as 1915 in Angola and was not mechanised until after the Second World War. — WO2 (SSMI) P Breakspear, 17/21 Lancers, RAC Gunnery Wing BAOR, BFPO 30.

## This nickname is not funny

MAY I make a few points about "The Cutting Edge" article (April 30). First, Maj Gen Hobart was irascible and ingenious, but also admired and highly respected. He was never nicknamed "Hobo" and his equipment was nicknamed "Hobart's Funnies" — never "Hobo's Funnies".

Secondly, Armoured engineers were first seen long before 1940. Tanks with fascines and prototype Royal Engineer tanks were first tried out in 1918 (see *Vanguard of Victory*, David Fletcher, HMSO). No mention was made in this work of an assault engineer brigade in Italy. I

would be grateful for more detail, including the title of the brigade and its constituent regiments and squadrons.

Now a plea — where can I get hold of a couple of 79 Div flashes as worn on the battle dress during the war, and is it possible to obtain enamelled lapel badges and/or ties for this division? — F McLellan, 26 Norwich Avenue, Lowton, Warrington.

## Berlin's royal salute

PRINCESS Alexandra took the salute at the annual Queen's Birthday Parade in Berlin on May 19. Held on the Maifeld arena next to the 1936 Olympic Stadium, the occasion drew thousands of spectators from both East and West Berlin.

On parade were members of Berlin Garrison, including three infantry battalions, supporting arms, massed bands and the crews and tanks of the Berlin armoured squadron.

Regiments on parade included the 1st Battalions, The Light Infantry, The Royal Welch Fusiliers and the Irish Guards, and C Squadron, 14th/20th King's Hussars.

1 LI, marching at their traditional 140 paces a minute, Trooped their Colour - a memorable event for the battalion whose Deputy Colonel, Princess Alexandra, had given them the Colour ten years ago.

Crowds were treated to the unusual spectacle of two regimental mascots on parade at the same time - the Irish Wolfhound mascot of 1 IG and the regimental goat of 1 RWF.

## Car bomb rescue pair commended

TWO soldiers who rescued SSgt Andrew Mudd, RMP, from a blazing car after a terrorist attack in Colchester last year have been awarded the Queen's Commendation for Brave Conduct.

Lt Michael Simpson and Sgt Martin Snook, both of 45 Field Regiment RA, were driving in Colchester when they heard an explosion from the direction of the Drury Meadows married quarters and went to investigate.


from the seabed on air-filled bags, then placed by the sappers on a submerged raft of oil drums. The drums were then filled with air and the cannon raised for towing to Akamas. The age and origin of the weapon has not yet been established.

Finding the remains of SSgt Mudd's car, Sgt Snook helped to lead away Mrs Margaret Mudd, the injured and distressed passenger, then returned to help Lt Simpson who was trying to remove SSgt Mudd.

Throughout this time the driver's compartment was burning and flames were rising from the rear of the car. Soon after SSgt Mudd was removed the petrol tank exploded and the car was engulfed in flames.

The citation says that Lt Simpson's resolute leadership and the considerable personal courage he displayed in entering the burning car were instrumental in saving SSgt Mudd's life. Sgt Snook's calmness and presence of mind in applying first aid to the casualties ensured both victims were as well cared for as possible until medical help arrived.

# It pays to be a recruiter

SOLDIERS serving in the 3rd Battalion, The Queen's Regiment, which recruits in south east England, are being given leave and cash for every man they persuade to join the battalion. Already four Queensmen have earned the bonuses.

The scheme was introduced by commanding officer Lt Col Andrew Barrett to encourage a steady influx of recruits. Unlike its 1st and 2nd Battalions, which are both measurably undermanned, 3 Queens is only 30 soldiers below its establishment strength of 630. The battalion has recently completed a two-year tour of duty in Northern Ireland.

Lt Col Barrett explained: "My new scheme is principally a means of concentrating minds on the great importance of recruiting and retention in this battalion."

The battalion also gives extra leave to trained and experienced soldiers who opt to extend their engagements.

After basic training at the regiment's depot at Bassingbourn, Herts, soldiers joining up over the next two years can expect an immediate sunshine posting - 3 Queens is based in Cyprus until 1992.

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


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
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
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# Sappers celebrate town's Freedom

# Broken mast slows British Defender



A BRAVE effort by the crew of Satquote British Defender, the tri-Service entry in the Whitbread Round the World Yacht Race, brightened her passage on the last unlucky leg of the voyage.

Hopes had been raised when she came in 6th on the previous leg from Punta del Este, Uruguay, to Fort Lauderdale, Florida, that she would finish in the top six. She was lightened of all surplus sails and rations and was making good time when, with 2,600 miles to go, somewhere near where the Titanic went down, part of the rigging broke and she lost a third of her mast.

This also carried away her radio antennae and little was heard of her for two days.

When contact was made again British Defender was battling on under a jury rig.

Cdr Colin Watkins RN, the skipper,

managed to coax her up to ten knots on occasions but the handicap was too great to overcome completely and she was lying 20th, 500 miles off shore when the winner – the New Zealand entry Steinlager 2 – sailed into Southampton.

A number of yachts reported fractures in the rigging rods (solid stays), but only SBD lost part of her mast.

Her record on the previous legs was Southampton-Punta del Este 9th; Punta – Fremantle (Australia) 11th; Fremantle – Auckland (New Zealand) 8th; Auckland to Punta 11th; Punta to Fort Lauderdale, 6th.

On the last leg Defender was carrying a crew of 15 (including a journalist from The Independent newspaper).

She set sail from Southampton on September 2.

## Man of the mountains

Alpine mountaineer WO2 (RQMS) **Fred Salt** has been nominated for the Embassy award of excellence in his sport.

RQMS of 3 Regiment AAC at Soest, West Germany, Fred has been a major force in mountaineering in BAOR. Although he holds no official position in the Army Mountaineering Association, he has made a huge contribution to its organisation and running.

Since 1988 RQMS Salt has led a number of successful expeditions, including Exercise McKinley Triangle which put six out of eight climbers on the summit of the world's coldest mountain. This autumn he is due to lead Exercise Khumba Triangle.

Although capable of high grade climbing, he always has time for novices and a knack of getting climbers to exceed their own expectations.


## Cheshire chairman

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# Little Ship in the best of spirits

A touching story attaches to the yacht *Windsong* (right), selected to represent BAOR in the convoy that crossed the Channel to commemorate the part played by "the Little Ships" at Dunkirk.

She is said to possess a ghost. Though the ship's bell (the original) will remain silent in the roughest of seas, it has twice rung out clearly, alerting the crew on both occasions to the fact that they were in imminent danger.

Once was during a flat calm. Owner/skipper Col (Retd) Mike Duddridge is confident that with such a benign spirit on board, *Windsong* will be available for the centenary anniversary of Dunkirk.

Of the 170 small craft listed by the Association of Dunkirk Little Ships as seaworthy, only three are sailing yachts – *Windsong*, 36½ft overall, being the smallest of the trio.

Normally she is berthed on the Maas at Roermond, close to Rheindahlen, where the colonel lives with his wife, Maj Daphne Duddridge WRAC, serving at HQ 4 Signal Group.

Built in 1931, *Windsong* is a 13-ton wooden ketch.

She had been laid-up at the

beginning of the Second World War but when he heard of the evacuation her then owner, Gordon Dalton, sailed her from Littlehampton, Sussex, to Dover where he reported on May 31 that she was "ready for sea and able to take 30 passengers."

*Windsong* has in fact six berths. The next day she was operating off the beaches to which she had been towed by a trawler.

Air attacks were so heavy

that for the following four days of the evacuation ship movements were restricted to darkness.

*Windsong* was formally requisitioned by the Royal Navy after the evacuation and patrolled the Thames estuary for the rest of the war.

Her present owner found her neglected and forlorn on the Cledau, in Wales. She was refitted and sailed back to Holland where he has worked on her ever since.

## Larkhill big guns on show

Members of the public will get a rare chance to see the big guns in action when the Royal School of Artillery at Larkhill, Wiltshire opens its doors on June 30 for the first Artillery Open Day for four years.


More than 50 guns will take part in a firepower demonstration during the afternoon, and the other main attraction will be a display by The King's Troop RHA.

There will also be a parachute drop by 7 Para RHA, and a battery of 29 Cdo Regt – the Commando Gunners – will deploy by helicopter. Rapier and Javelin will also be on show. The fun starts at 10am, entry is free, but there are parking charges for cars (£7), minibuses (£30) and coaches (£75).

## SSAFA air spectacular

Service charities will gain from SSAFA's spectacular international air display at RAF Church Fenton, Tadcaster, North Yorkshire, on June 10.

The display will mark the golden jubilee of the Battle of Britain and the formation of The Parachute Regiment and Airborne Forces.



## Defenders of Calais return

The defence of Calais in 1940 by 3,000 British soldiers and 800 French against the 24,000 of the advancing 1st and 10th Panzer Divisions prompted Winston Churchill to say they had "added another page to the glories of the Light Division".

The Germans were impressed, too – the War Diary of 10th Panzers recorded: "The enemy fights with a hitherto unheard of obstinacy. They are English, extremely brave and tenacious. The enemy fights in a most tough and tenacious manner."

Just back from a visit to commemorate the gallant defence 50 years ago by battalions of the King's Royal Rifle Corps, Rifle Brigade, Queen Victoria's Rifles and Royal Tank Regiment are 650 past

and present Green Jackets and their relatives.

They attended a parade and service on the Calais Mole near the Green Jackets War Memorial.

The Duke of Gloucester inspected the parade, in which more than 100 veterans took part. Also present were Lord Arran, Under Secretary of State

for the Armed Forces, Field Marshal Lord Bramall, and the Adjutant General, Gen Sir Robert Pascoe, both former Green Jacket commanding officers. Senior veteran was Maj Gen Alec Williams, who, as adjutant of the 60th – the King's Royal Rifle Corps – was captured but escaped by rowing back across the Channel.

## Arend collection on show

Visitors to a new museum in southern Belgium are now enjoying the chance to see, for the first time under one roof, a rare collection of Second World War uniforms, weapons and vehicles.

Among the exhibits at the Victory Memorial Museum near Arlon are examples of every kind of motorcycle used by the British, Americans and Germans – including the one

and only Belgian Sarolea 1000, with its tractor sidecar and planet gear.

In all, 150 lovingly-restored vehicles and hundreds of uniforms, items of equipment and other pieces are on display on the magnificent 25-acre site.

The museum is a dream come true for retired Luxembourg businessman Guy Franz Arend, who has spent a lifetime collecting relics of war.

Forty-five years ago Field Marshal Montgomery's 21st Army Group became the British Army of the Rhine. It has been on duty ever since. The present Commander-in-Chief, **Gen Sir Peter Inge**, who was commissioned into the Green Howards in 1956 (and is now their Colonel) has been talking to **SOLDIER**.

# EXPECTING THE UNEXPECTED

THE Commander-in-Chief of the British Army of the Rhine is essentially a realist.

Thirty years ago when he first went to Germany as a young officer there was a formidable Soviet army stationed in East Germany.

Today, despite encouraging developments on the international scene, he never forgets that 380,000 Russian soldiers are still there.

Gen Sir Peter Inge does not doubt that the current Soviet leaders are genuine in their declarations of peaceful intent but says "capabilities take years to build up... intentions can change very quickly".

Gen Inge: "What has happened recently - and remember it is only six months since the Berlin Wall started to come down - is that the goal-posts have been moved.

"We had a very clear threat in the past. Now, as regards intentions, it is not so clear.

"I believe the potential for instability and friction could be considerable, though what form it might take is very difficult to predict. The one certain lesson of 1989 is that you may expect the unexpected."

The British Army of the Rhine had helped Nato win the Cold War without having to fight a battle and anyone who had served in BAOR had the right to "a tremendous feather in their cap".

However, this victory - a tremendous achievement by the Western Alliance in the broader and not just the military sense - made military planning much more difficult than it had been in the past.

"No one knows what is going to happen. To get the 380,000 Soviet troops out of East Germany is going to require tremendously skilful and firm diplomacy. The sheer administrative problem is formidable."

In the C-in-C's view much press speculation had been superficial and inaccurate.

Because the once clear threat had gone

being studied in London and elsewhere.

"I thoroughly agree with the government's line - that before we take up the proposed options for change we have to have a clearer view of the way ahead and the shape any future threat may take.

"I back totally the principles laid down by the Foreign Secretary, for Nato is going to be fundamentally important in Europe to handle any security problems that arise.

It is right to study possible new security structures but I believe that whatever you end up with should remain Nato-shaped."

The fundamental principles are:

- US strategic commitment.
- A sensible balance of conventional and nuclear forces.
- The integrated military command structure.
- Station forces albeit it at a reduced level.
- At least the present membership (of Nato).

The C-in-C had been impressed by the positive reaction of people in BAOR in recognising there were going to be changes.

"Of course people are asking questions and I would be worried if they weren't but I am very encouraged by the positive attitude of the commanders on the ground. One cannot fail to admire the high morale."


The Secretary of State for Defence, Mr Tom King, had said the Army was going to be smaller but better and that was important because it showed he understood there were areas open to improvement. It should not be forgotten that he had also said there should be a military as well as a peace dividend.

## Operational concepts

The C-in-C declared that new technology would in any case have forced changes in operational concepts.

"For example we have precision-guided munitions and the increased range of surface-to-surface guided missiles gives us the ability to hit far deeper into an

aggressor's forces as they advance - what is called the follow-on forces attack battle.

"That plus a greater capability in surveillance and target acquisition means we can fight a deep battle far more effectively than before."

Air mechanised forces would become increasingly important.

"We also have a barrier capability... mines which can switch themselves on and off can be delivered remotely. And there are many other devices."

"In my opinion because we are going to have fewer forces, changes in the concept of operations will accelerate, though a lot of thinking has to be done."

## Adventurous training

The C-in-C is a whole-hearted supporter of the programme of adventurous training promoted by his predecessor, Gen Sir Brian Kenny.

He is convinced he gets value for money in the development of character and team spirit it induces. Last year 13,000 soldiers attended challenge pursuit camps, 5,000 went on expeditions worldwide and 800 within the Federal Republic.

Gen Inge wishes, however, adventurous training to be seen in perspective.

## Pte Inge didn't impress the Board

"IF anyone had told me when I was called up to do my National Service in 1953 that I would become a Regular soldier I'd have laughed them to scorn.

"I actually spent a year as a private soldier in the Royal Warwickshire Regiment as I failed my War Office Selection Board the first time.

"They told me not to bother coming back."

Pte Inge then began to see the spirit that was produced in a barrack room he shared with 28 men and how they pulled together as a team. He asked to be given another chance.

Now, as C-in-C, that private wears two hats. In time of war he would command Northern Army Group which would do the fighting in the theatre, and in peacetime he is responsible for its operational planning with five nations - the British, Belgian, Dutch, a German corps and III US Corps - plus possibly the French First Army.

At Rheindalen his office sits over twin headquarters - a British HQ with a British major general as chief of staff to deal with national business, and a multi-national HQ with a German COS to deal with Army Group Affairs. There is also a political dimension - meetings with ambassadors and dealings with the German Defence Ministry.

Gen Inge took over in BAOR not three weeks after the Berlin Wall was first breached. His comment: "It all adds to the interest of the job."

"There is a danger of people saying that adventurous training can take the place of proper military training.

"An Army will only have high morale if it feels it is well trained and well equipped.

"Our prime role is to make sure that troops are operationally capable of going to war by providing simulation aids, tactical engagement simulation and computer-assisted exercises. And we ensure our equipment is of the highest standard and is robust and reliable.

"No matter what you pay the army, no matter how well you house the troops, unless they feel they are properly trained that army will not have high morale."

# Berlin Guards cast in sapper role

IRISH Guardsmen using a detector to find a mine? A Light Infantryman helping to build a bridge? Whatever would the Royal Engineers say?


Actually, 38 (Berlin) Field Squadron were delighted to see comrades from other arms having a go at tasks more readily associated with sappers.

It was their idea to put on view their talents and facilities so that other units in the Berlin Brigade could learn what they are all about and, when necessary, call on their skills.

A wide range of services were illustrated, ranging from mine-laying and detection to detonation of explosives and the use of a chain-saw.

The squadron, formed in 1861, has served in all major conflicts since. It built the first Bailey bridge - 120 ft long - on mainland Europe at Bagnara, Italy in August 1943.

Permanently posted in BAOR, it moved to Berlin in 1957. "Berlin" was incorpo-



rated into the title in 1962 when the then mayor, Herr Willy Brandt, presented the squadron with a flag depicting its new Berlin Bear emblem, and a commemorative porcelain Berlin Bear for services to the city. The squadron also enjoys the Freedom of Spandau and Tiergarten.

Main role is to provide engineer support - such as bridge demolitions, mine-laying and plant digging - for

Brigade. It is an independent squadron, but instead of the usual complement of 200, has 82 soldiers and five officers.

It is involved in most exercises that take place in Berlin and supports infantry battalions on exercise elsewhere in BAOR.

It has one field troop - the main workforce - and other, smaller departments. These include a plant detachment with 11 machines and four military operators. An engineer park with two SNCOs and 35 civilians provides resources for the British Sector, such as boats, timber and concrete.

The squadron's special skills were in demand for the influx of East Germans. The British

sappers improved an administrative building, and at RAF Gatow put up a new security fence around an area used as temporary accommodation by re-settlers.

They have also done work for the local community, such as levelling ground for sports pitches. After Rudolf Hess's death they removed the roof of Spandau Prison and supervised its secret burial.

Despite their small number, they take part in a full range of sports.


Accommodation is particularly good at Smuts Barracks, where single soldiers have individual rooms in a large, modern block known locally as The Hilton.

Their OC, Maj Allan Dennis, said: "We are spoiled rotten here."

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
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

MEN of the 1st Battalion, Irish Guards, who have had the chance to use the new S 10 respirator in NBC warfare training, are well pleased with its modifications.

Biggest advantage is the addition of a special tube for liquids, which means the wearer doesn't have to remove the mask to drink.

Improved air flow reduces steaming-up, and because it is lighter and more comfortable, it gives soldiers more confidence when they go into the gas chamber.


The battalion is based in Smuts Barracks, Berlin, and a SOLDIER team caught up with it during NBC training, followed by a session on the assault course and training in the Fighting in a Built Up Area (FIBUA) facilities at Ruhleben.

Sgt Billy Halliwell, who was instructing and testing in NBC warfare, said: "The modifications to the respirator are very welcome and have made significant improvements."

It was reflected by the standard of drill inside the gas chamber.

"They did well," he said.



Above - NBC warfare training has become more tolerable, thanks to innovations in the S 10 respirator. This soldier demonstrates how it is possible to drink without removing the mask


Left - It could be a block of flats anywhere - the big difference is that because it is built without one side, there is easy monitoring of Irish Guardsman skills from an adjacent viewing area

Immediately afterwards, seven further Hercules dropped 14 medium-stress platforms carrying vehicles and stores.



The first parachute descent by a British soldier took place on July 13, 1940 and since then The Parachute Regiment has gained a number of battle honours including Bruneval, Pegasus Bridge, Arnhem and Goose Green.

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

# A rattling good workout

ALTHOUGH described as a "bit of a squeeze", Exercise Rattling Halberd managed to fit itself into Soltau and Hohne training area for four days made memorable by glorious weather, writes Bill Moore.

All phases of war were carried out - defence, withdrawal, advance to contact and so on, and battle group drills were practised by 11 Armoured Brigade HQ, commanded by Brig Ian McKay-Dick.

The brigade is preparing for 4 Armd Div's Exercise Quarter Final, due to take place in October.

The main players were 5 Innis DG and 1 A and SH, with the Recce Troop of 4/7 DG, two companies of 2 Queens and elements of 26 Fd Regt RA, 42 Fd Sqn RE and 659 Sqn AAC also taking part.

In all, 63 heavy tracked, 197 light tracked and 231 wheeled vehicles were deployed.

Why "Rattling Halberd"?

Because 11 Armd Bde traces its ancestry back to the famous 78th (Battleaxe) Division - in which there was an 11th Infantry Brigade - of Second World War fame.

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

# Where would we be without the map men?



A GOLDEN rule of modern warfare is that no general lowers himself to fight a battle on ground covered by a single map.

Really clever ones manage to overlap the corners of the four map sheets of an area of operations.

Which is what makes 14 Independent Topographic Squadron Royal Engineers one of the most valuable institutions in BAOR.

They are always willing to meet the insatiable and sometimes almost impossible demands of their "customers".

The basic maps come from a variety of sources, including their sister unit, the Survey Production Centre RE at Monchengladbach. "Fourteen Topo" overprints them with such information as terrain going, restricted areas and out of bounds areas.

A week before a recent exercise the German authorities declared "no go" for environmental reasons certain areas previously accessible.

In response to an urgent request 14 Topo produced hundreds of maps showing the new out-of-bounds limits and distributed them with time to spare.

The squadron, established for six officers and 86 other ranks, is located at Ratingen on the outskirts of Düsseldorf in Roy Barracks, named after the original "Mr Survey".

As a young man William Roy played a prominent part in mapping the Highlands (two inches to the mile and 34

sheets) after the failure of the Jacobite Rebellion in 1746. Later he saw active service in Germany in the Seven Years War, survived to make important contributions to international survey, and was a major general when he died in 1790.

If the old Red Coat were to visit 14 Topo today he might be surprised by some of the equipment, but one thing he would recognise: even the youngest sappers readily accept heavy responsibility.

The young technicians come from the School of Military Survey at Hermitage, Berkshire, and the Army Apprentice College, Chepstow, equipped with skill and confidence.

Spr Simon Robinson (19) an air survey technician, let SOLDIER peer at an aerial photograph through what looked like opera glasses on

stilts. The three dimensional effect produced enables the trained eye to check old and identify new features on the landscape.

What Spr Robinson locates is transferred to an existing map on his say-so.

"It would be impossible to check everything the lads do," said WO2 Nick Collins, the Squadron Technical Control Warrant Officer, "so they have to be good at their trades."

Though the main task of 14 Topo is to provide geographic support to BAOR and RAF (Germany) in terms of maps, air charts, field survey, terrain analysis and map production, the squadron takes a broad view of its duties.

Maj Nick Rigby RE, the OC, explained: "We are very much into the Northern Army

# They CAN see the trees for the wood!

FOUR troops make up 14 Topo. HQ consists of clerks, MT, REME and cooks, all of whom manage by remarkable means to get into the field whenever they can.

The Map Troop comprises combat surveyors who, in peacetime, issue their products from a huge warehouse. Maps are bulky items – 200 stand an inch high and 1,000 of them weigh 100lb. Fork-lift trucks are much in evidence at Roy Barracks, which issued 4,965,000 maps last year, each one being accounted for.

According to Cpl Scouse Murray, who has been doing the job for five years, "it is mind-blowing at times".

"But that's only because he's an Everton supporter," said Sgt Zip Nolan, the NCO in charge of the War Reserve stocks carefully stacked in their own pen at one end of the main store. Sgt Nolan is a Manchester United fan.

Even more "mind-blowing" was one of the jobs recently carried out by the Survey Troop (which includes field and air surveyors). Using tape measures, SSgt Brian Willis, Cpl Steve Dawson and a team recently recorded the dimensions of 5,000 trees!

Their "Woodland Reconnaissance Report" provides invaluable information about the accessibility of an area – whether the trees are in rows, or undergrowth will hinder movement or stumps will be an obstacle.

Commanders expect a high standard of terrain information on their maps and they get it – down to the depth and width of ditches.

Field surveyors have even carried out tasks underground.

In 1988 14 Topo was asked to chart not only the surface entrenchments and craters preserved on Vimy Ridge (stormed by the Canadians after mining under the enemy defences in 1917) but also the surviving

Group/Nato aspect of things. On our supply side we provide on an exchange basis mapping for Dutch, Belgian, German and US forces.

"We give a lot of support to the RAF and 2nd Allied Tactical Air Force. Whether

our planes are flying in 1 British Corps area or into the airspace of other nations we have a responsibility to 'map them up'.

"Should a large US formation come into the area on exercise we provide maps for them too.


"People in other spheres are

still talking about the need for standardisation . . . whether we should have the same tank, same ammunition supply and so on.


"The mappers of all member countries produce to a Nato standard and we have been down that road for the last 20 years, if not longer."


tunnelling system.

"We knew from historical notes and the original plans that there were charges of approximately four tons of ammonal explosive still down there," said SSgt Willis, "and we discovered one of these.

"We had to survey the position of the charge . . . traverse through the tunnels to the surface, then fix the position above ground to show exactly where the charge was below the surface."

Map Reproduction Troop has a different claim to fame. It has in the past been the terror of the Corps commander and his staff. Hearts used to sink when news arrived that *The Print Train* was on the move.

The Train consisted of seven massive "semi-trailers", though what was "semi" about them has never been explained.

buildings are fitted out as technical working areas.

Rapid response mapping in the field is now done by two men operating from a four-tonne lorry equipped with developing and printing facilities able to produce up to 2,400 maps an hour.

Each armoured division in Germany now has a TACIPRINT (tactical information printing system) lorry which is NBC protected and air-conditioned.

It is remarkable how many senior officers find reasons to be in the TACIPRINT vehicle during NBC play!


Minefields, soft going, formation boundaries, routes, obstacles and all essential tactical information can be overprinted or produced on maps and charts.

Because they are printed on the same plate the margin for error is eliminated – all users work from the same details produced from the same original.

From receipt of a customers' trace a tacimap can be produced within 12 minutes of delivery at TACIPRINT.

And one of the greatest assets available to a commander is the ability of the crew to reproduce a single square taking into account, say, the relevant details of four maps where they join.

One can truly say of 14 Topo – where would we all be without them?




FORTY-FIVE years ago this month, SOLDIER's front page carried the headline "**We're in**" over a picture of the Canadian Composite Battle Pipe Band marching down the Charlottenburger Allee with the 1870 Franco-Prussian Victory Column in the background, **writes Bill Moore**.

Field Marshal Montgomery was pictured with the Soviet Marshal Zhukov inspecting a Guard of Honour provided by the Grenadier Guards.

For a period afterwards Berlin was a place for sightseeing, with Hitler's weed-covered bunker as the No 1 attraction.

A year later British bulldozers were ripping stumps out of the Tiergarten so that potatoes could be grown for the hungry population. A rusting 88mm anti-aircraft gun still stood outside the ruins of the Reichstag.

A T-34 on a plinth was the first of the Russian war memorials to be installed.

With so much to see, Berlin was regarded as a plum posting.

"There is no curfew for civilians. Troops are allowed out until midnight without a pass and until two o'clock with one. They must, however, be armed after twelve. Service-women must be escorted, unless they're going to be out for only a few minutes, and after nine at night their escort must be armed."

Allied troops walked at will into the various sectors.

As early as 1946 the warmth generated by victory began to evaporate. The ice of the Cold War was forming in



Berlin and all along the other borders.

A unit described one of its tasks as follows:

"It (the battalion) had the unenviable responsibility of operating the famous Helmstedt checkpoint through which all traffic has to pass into the Russian Zone, on the main route to Berlin.

"This checkpoint was only 50 yards apart from that held by glowering, deeply suspicious and trigger-happy Russians and it required much tact and diplomacy on the part of our duty officers to avoid unfortunate incidents. As it was, the checkpoint could be

guaranteed to produce at least one crisis every week."

It

was a time of strange and bizarre events. In Operation Woodpecker great areas of German forest were cut down and the timber taken to Britain as war reparations.

At the first Torchlight Tattoo held by the British in the Olympic Stadium the Soviet onlookers were mystified by

the means used to drill a squad of 300 men without any commands being given.

"Trummer weg!" said the posters of the day. "Baut wieder auf der FDGB" - "Clear the debris... reconstruct the FDGB."

With the impending unification of the German Democratic Republic and the Federal Republic, final reconstruction looks just about there.

# You mail it, they'll deliver it

WHAT happens when a "postie" gets a hang glider in the incoming mail? Why . . . he or she delivers it, of course!

That's what happened when one arrived at the Command Distribution Office (CDO) in Caernarvon Barracks, Dusseldorf, Germany.

You have to get up very early to catch out the staff of the biggest military central post office in BAOR, which is run by 3 Postal and Courier Depot RE.

In fact there is little point in trying because they work a three-shift system which keeps the Depot open 24 hours a day.

Not a bad achievement when you learn that because the unit is the largest in "Duss" Station it provides a major share of the manpower needed for guards and other duties.

Which is how SOLDIER recognised a familiar face in the guard room. The night before Sgt Graham MacColl, 18 years a "postie", had been stacking mailbags in the depths of a large lorry.

It was all part of the "now you see 'em now you don't" system operated in the CDO by 33 PC Sqn.

"No item is in here longer than eight hours at the most,"

the vehicle departed.

Unofficial record time for loading and unloading is 40 containers in 25 minutes. Speed is considered essential in mail-handling.

Lt Col Bill Butt, CO of 3 PCD, is proud of the service each of his three squadrons (two at Dusseldorf and one, 32, at Rheindahlen) provides.

A fleet of 55 vehicles is run by 30 PC Sqn - with its own very necessary REME LAD. Last year they covered 848,474 miles.

In 33 PC Sqn the troops meet the public across the counter. In Caernarvon Barracks itself Sgt Sue McKay WRAC was running PO Lohausen, named after the suburb of Dusseldorf where the camp is located.

"In the old days you walked miles inside a big vehicle," said Sgt MacColl.

The loading completed and checked, the doors of the carrier lorry were secured and

supplies other field post offices, including a mobile post office which serves Cologne, Coblenze and Bonn, where the Embassy staff are always pleased to see the mail arrive.

In fact, 3 PCD operates about 20 detachments in its area of responsibility.

Apart from some which is delivered direct to, for example, Hanover, all air mail, all mail which comes by sea and all parcels are handled at "Duss" along with newspapers and, of late, loads of direct mail order catalogues.

The Army postal service has profitable contracts with all the big firms in the UK and receives the catalogues in bulk, splits them up and labels them before delivering them.

Second only to Mill Hill, London, in size, 3 PCD serves Servicemen and families throughout North West Europe.

But she also controls and

40 containers are handled every day. TV tapes, magazines, bicycles and car tyres are dealt with . . . as is courier and diplomatic mail.

Nearly 112,000 bags of air mail arrived from the UK in the last 12-month period, while 125,000 went out.

More than 147,000 bags of surface mail were handled and 66,000 went out.

And the trouble they take to get the mail to the troops may be seen in the heart of 33 Sqn.

There sits one of the most patient young ladies in the world, locating people who forget to leave a forwarding address.

From a mass of computer printouts Pte Teri Patchett can locate almost everyone, civilian or military, connected with the Army . . . and re-directs 750 letters and parcels a day.

And she says she enjoys it! Hats off to her . . . and hats off to all of them.



# SOLDIERS AT SEA

"AND how's the British Navy this morning, captain," asked the jolly German pilot as he came aboard at Brunsbuttel.

"I couldn't really say," came the reply, "but the British Army is all right."

Her Majesty's Army Vessel Arakan (captained by Maj Eddie Bell RCT) was about to enter the Kiel Canal.

The pilot, glancing suspiciously at the helmsman, ordered: "Steer Zero Three Six."

"Steering Zero Three Six. Wheel on, sir," echoed Cpl Sammie Payne briskly.

Half an hour later the pilot whispered conspiratorially to the SOLDIER scribbler, the only other person on the bridge in "civvies": "Are dem fellers really all soldiers?"

And having been assured they were, said approvingly: "Well they seem to know der job."

A succession of pilots (five in all) boarded Arakan as she chugged sedately along the 59 miles of the great waterway linking the North Sea and the Baltic. To a man, they were surprised to find an all-soldier crew. All were complimentary.

It was 9pm when the last of them made a precarious leap on to the heaving deck of the pilot cutter and Arakan steamed into the darkness with foam cascading over her high blunt bows.

As the Fleet Ensign of the Royal Corps of Transport is a rare sight in the Kiel Canal (one of the busiest in Europe since it was completed in 1897) the German pilots can be excused for not recognising it.

Even some members of their own corps are hardly aware of the existence of RCT squadrons in which each soldier is a sailor and each sailor is a soldier.

The 1,500 ton LCL (landing craft logistic) and her sister ship Ardennes are the biggest vessels in the Army's fleet, which also has nine smaller RCLs (ramped craft logistic) and three RPLs (ramped powered lighters) plus a variety of launches.

Arakan and Ardennes are RCT squadrons in their own right and belong to 17 Port and Maritime Regiment based at Marchwood Military Port on

the Solent along with 51 Vessel, 52 Port and 53 Admin Sqns.

The Lowestoft-built ships were commissioned in 1978 to replace Second World War landing craft and can carry five main battle tanks or 350 tons of cargo. Normally they ferry ammunition, stores and equipment to ranges in the Outer Hebrides and to Continental ports serving BAOR.

Having flat bottoms, they are able "to boldly go" on to beaches where other vessels dare not venture.

This configuration also allows them to move sideways with a speed that startles seamen (and pilots in particular) used to dealing with conventional ships.


Arakan is full of little mannerisms of her own and in heavy seas appears to twist her length and corkscrew through the waves. The Chief Engineer, Capt Kim Dunstan, swears the stern, where his twin diesels are housed, "does a little shimmy – a sort of a waggle" under certain conditions.

So it may, but the SOLDIER team was more concerned about an ominous "bump, rattle and bump" which periodically shook the ship as if she had run over a submerged object.

They weren't the only ones.

Cpl Mark Roy of 2 RTR, travelling as escort to the AFVs, was in the crew's mess watching a video about the Titanic at the time. The SOLDIER snapper, who is supposed to know about things nautical because he used to take pictures for a famous shipyard, likened the noise to the results of driving too fast over a "sleeping policeman".

He wasn't far out, either. Sgt Alan Marchant, clocking-up

"Rest your chin on the chart table and look at the guard rails on the fo'c'sle."






Then there is the navigator (WO1).





DIER team were astonished to see Dvr Colin Jones, the captain's steward, appear on the bridge and take over the engine-room telegraph.

"We use them by the bale to clean oil off the diesel when we're looking for leaks," explained young Dvr Scotty Duncan. Clankies mount the engine-room ladder by a variety of courses, and hope to finish as chiefs.

Though everyone has his specialist trade, most of the crew of the Arakan have at least one other hat. Chief Engineer Kim Dunstan doubles as the paymaster.

When the crew went to "Harbour Stations" the SOL-

First Officer, Lt Andrew Couper, could be seen polishing the woodwork of the wardroom with the best of them; on the bridge the captain was unscrewing brasswork and making it gleam.

And in the alleyway an event some of his peers might emulate took place. Mr 'Jake' Jones, a WO1 with 20 years service, lay in overalls, giving a final coat of paint to a skirting.

Never mind the Soviet warship which shadowed Arakan or the Swedish jet which buzzed overhead. The voyage was worth it for that sight alone.

## Rocks on a raft done to a turn

LANDLUBBERS visiting HMAV Arakan may be puzzled by some of the terms used by old hands at meal times. The following glossary may be of use (in RN ships also):

*Train smash: streaky bacon and tomatoes; cackle berries: fried eggs; Texas strawberries: baked beans; snorters: sausages; baby's head: steak and kidney pudding; and rocks (may vary) on a raft: kidneys on toast.*

The description of the various messes needs a word of explanation. The crews' mess in the stern is the "forard mess" because it was in the fo'c'sle in the old days.

The officers' mess is, RN style, the wardroom, but the WOs' and Sergeants' Mess is . . . the Warrant Officers' and Sergeants' Mess.

All messes on board were served during the voyage by three all-weather jugglers in Army Catering Corps whites. Whatever the conditions, two of them were on duty peeling potatoes by hand (the machine was not satisfactory), produc-





Much of the work was done in bad weather, particularly off Norway earlier this year.



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
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

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
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## More SDA claims likely to succeed

DURING a meeting with Mrs Gillian Shephard, Parliamentary Under Secretary of State for Social Security, I raised a number of issues concerning her Department which affect Service families.

In answer to my concern about the unfairness of the residence condition for Severe Disablement Allowance for Service families abroad – a claimant must have resided in Great Britain for ten of the 20 previous years – Mrs Shephard said:

"In future, more SDA claims by Servicemen's families abroad are likely to succeed because of the Social Security Commissioner's decision in the case of Mrs Lewis that she should not be precluded from receiving SDA by the 'ten in 20 years' residence test.

"In looking at the term 'resident', the Commissioner held that members of the Forces are in a special position and concluded that in the case of Mrs Lewis, her settled home since 1976 had been in GB, despite absence abroad with her husband for about 12 years between November 1973 and April 1987. Mr and Mrs Lewis were buying a house in GB from 1976 onwards.

"However, the decision in this case might still result in a small number of claims from Servicemen's families failing to satisfy the 'ten in 20' residence test if they did not, like Mrs Lewis, have a family home in GB.

"We are considering their position and will write to you further about this as soon as possible."

\*\*\*\*\*

An update on the long-standing problem facing Service dependants in

their attempts to claim Unemployment Benefit (UB) was given by Mrs Shephard.

"As you know," she said, "the Tribunal of Commissioners found that benefit was not payable in the three 'test' cases involving Servicemen's wives who wished to transfer UB elsewhere in the EC.

"Briefly, this arose because although a Servicemen's wife may demonstrate 'just cause' for leaving her UK employment if it is to accompany her husband on an overseas posting, in giving up her job it becomes extremely hard to demonstrate her availability for work.

"As a person who wishes to transfer UB to another EC country first has to establish entitlement in the UK, these findings alone will make it very difficult for a Service wife to qualify when she has given up a job to accompany her husband on a posting overseas.

"The Commissioners also questioned the ability of women in such circumstances to meet the EC conditions relating to transfer of UB from one Member State to another. The relevant EC provision (Article 69 of Regulation (EEC) 1408/71) covers persons going abroad 'in order to seek employment'.

"The Commissioners commented that they had great difficulty in seeing how someone who has left employment in the United Kingdom to go abroad with a spouse posted overseas

can come within that description.

"In view of this, the independent adjudication authorities advise that those giving up a job to accompany a spouse who has been posted abroad will be regarded as going abroad for that purpose only, even though they may be looking for work on their arrival.

"In other words, those who give up a job in the UK to accompany a spouse posted abroad will not be regarded as going to another EC country 'in order to seek employment' and will be unable to benefit from the special EC arrangements.

"It is accepted that there will be a small minority of cases where the person is already looking for work, prior to an overseas posting for the spouse becoming known.

"It has been agreed that when a person is already looking for work, does not

## Statutory Maternity Pay waits on Bill

I ASKED Mrs Shephard if Statutory Maternity Pay to Servicewomen due to be introduced later this year could be backdated to April 1, 1990, the date for independent taxation for women.

She said: "As I believe you know, the Social Security Bill, which had its Second Reading on January 22, contains the promised provision to extend Statutory Maternity Pay (SMP) to Service-women on the same basis as other women.

"This has been a matter on which you have had discussions in the past and I am pleased that the opportunity has now arisen to enable us to make this welcome change.

"I hope that it will be possible to give effect to the new provision very soon after the Bill gets Royal Assent later this year. The precise date will be the subject of discussion between officials at the Department of Social Security and in the Ministry of Defence."

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
The Government is proposing to introduce two new benefits for disabled people of working age or below.

Although not included in a current Bill, the Disability Allowance and Disability Employment Credit are set out in a Government paper, *The Way Ahead: Benefits for Disabled People*.

Wives and dependants of Service families could be affected if no account is taken of their particular difficulties when overseas.

I asked Mrs Shephard if consideration had been given to Service families.

"Work on these benefits is at an early stage," she said. "In the course of working out our proposals, we shall take account of comments by interested parties."



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
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

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
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
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
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

Stadium and the Army School of Physical Training, the synthetic pitch will cost more than £300,000.


Army Hockey Association secretary Capt Alan Healey described the decision to build the pitch as "great news".

# Sapper swordsman James is Champ-at-Arms

THE Army fencing championships held at APTC Aldershot were organised for the last time by fencing master WO2 (QMSI) Derek Archibald and provided a week of fine swordsmanship in all three weapons.

The junior championships are traditionally dominated by the Royal Engineers, the majority of whom were trained as Junior Leaders by WO1 (Retd) Les Welham. This year the sappers took the first three places in every event, JSpr Paul Bilton winning the epee, and JSpr Darrell Cooper the foil and sabre, and junior Champion-at-Arms award.

The senior championships lasted for four days, one for each individual event and a day of team events. In all cases entries were up on the previous year, notably in the women's

foil, won this year by Pte Grechen of 62 Sqn RCT. As with all the events, successful competitors go forward to the Inter-Service championships at RAF West Drayton on July 6-11.

The men's foil competition ended with a tie and a subsequent knockout barrage for first place. LCpl James Williams finally beat Capt Tony Williams who took second place, with Maj Neil Sutherland third. All three are or were members of 12 Field Squadron RE.

The epee competition was keenly fought. The large entry was increased by a number of pentathletes for whom the epee

is one of their five competitive disciplines. Capt Dominic Mahony of the Life Guards won, displaying some of the ability he exhibited at the Seoul Olympics. Tony Williams and James Williams were second and third.

Sabre competition involves a weapon derived from the cutlass. It is an exciting spectacle because sabre fighting in the Army does not use electrical sensors but relies on accurate judging of point hits, cuts and blows.

The event was won by the adjutant of the PT School, Capt John Larkham APTC, who has fenced for the Army for more than 15 years and is the last

advanced coach in the Services. LCpl Williams was second and so clinched the senior Champion-at-Arms award.

Eight entries for the three-man team event ensured a high standard of fencing. The Royal Military College Shrivenham won with the Royal School of Military Engineering second and 5 Heavy Regiment RA third.

The six-man competition for the magnificent silver Dyer Trophy was won by 25 Engineer Regiment for the fourth successive year from Sandhurst and 3 Bn (RAOC). 16/5 Lancers entered for the first time in 19 years and took a creditable fourth place.
