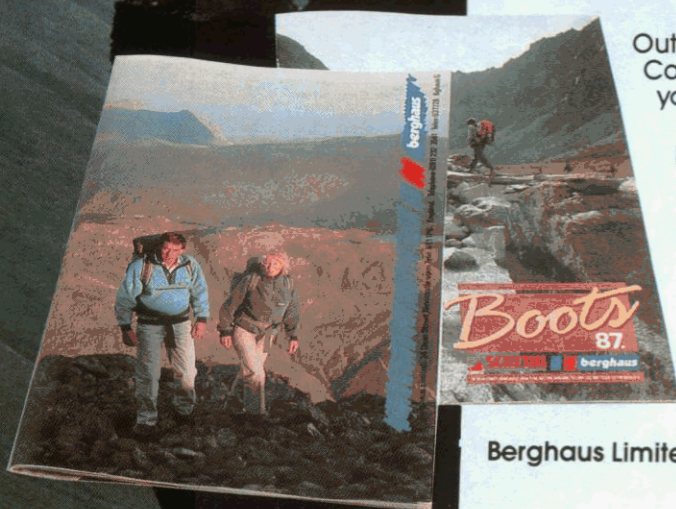

## Author's screw gun unknown to Kipling

The review of Mr Goldstein's book, *Farewell Screw Gun*, (SOLDIER April 20) brings to mind Rudyard Kipling's poem *The Screw Gun*. However, I doubt if he would have recognised the Howitzer 75mm Pack M1 illustrated as his inspiration.

The original screw gun was used in the Afghanistan Expedition in 1879 and known as the RML 2.5 Jointed Gun; subsequent design development resulted in the 3.7 mountain howitzer.

This was the solution to the need for a powerful gun which could be pack transported by mule load — by making it in sections which could be readily assembled.

The notable feature is the

barrel which is in two portions and these were joined together by a junction nut — or screwed together. Hence the name.

The 75mm pack howitzer is American equipment and was adopted in British service in 1944 and used by airborne forces — glider borne at Arnhem and later dropped by parachute in the later 1940s.

Your illustration is relevant though anticipatory, because 85 Field Regiment was reformed post war as 285 Light Regiment RA in the parachute role, using this gun.

Amalgamations subsequently resulted in 285 Parachute Field Regiment forming part of 289 Commando Battery. — C Hampson, 25 Hillside Walk, Brentwood, Essex.

Jump to it! (SOLDIER, March 9) certainly brought back memories of 30 odd years ago, when I was privileged to complete successfully a parachute course at No 1 PTS at Abingdon. As it rightly states, confidence is the keyword, and this was quickly instilled by the RAF staff of PJIs, surely the world's best.

In our first week, after learning the basics, we did two balloon jumps inside an hour, the second week, six aircraft exits, including "sticks" graduating from six to twelve men, and kitbag jumps. Of the six aircraft jumps, four were from the marvellous old workhorse the Dakota, and two from a USAF C-119. Quite an experience this, sticks jumping simultaneous from angled exit doors at the rear of the aircraft, dispatched by a US Army jumpmaster smoking a massive cigar! — Owen A O'Neill, 110 Lingfoot Crescent, Sheffield, Yorks S8 8DB.

## Paras return to Lions Bridge

Memorials to those who lost their lives during two world wars can be found in towns all over Europe, usually honouring men from the area. Now a small town near Hannover, Germany has dedicated a plaque to the memory of 24 British soldiers who died there 42 years ago.

Our picture shows members of the Parachute Regiment Association who attended the dedication of the plaque in memory of men of B Coy the 7th Bn (Light Infantry) The Parachute Regiment who died in April 1945 while trying to capture the Loewenbruecke - Lion's Bridge - which spans the River Leine in Neustadt am Ruebenberge near Hannover.

Six members of B Coy were among the veteran paras who returned as guests of honour to mark an action the town of Neustadt has never forgotten.

## Here's a way to keep York and Lancasters

How sad it was to read in *SOLDIER* about the final demise of the York and Lancaster Regiment.

Am I the only person in this country, apart presumably from those who had the honour to serve in this faithful old regiment, that is upset about this happening? In fact I feel so bad about it that I should like to offer the following options, in my order of preference, to enable the regiment to remain in the Army List.

1 - Disband the Parachute Regt and let the rifle regts - Cameronians (Scottish Rifles), KRRC and Rifle Brigade - take over the role. Then reorganise the Light Division into five one-battalion regts (O and BLI, SCLI, KOYLI, KSLI, and DLI). This leaves one battalion

over which should include the re-raised York and Lancaster Regt. This option I like because it has the added bonus of re-raising several other old regiments.

2 - The regiments of the Kings Division to take turns in running the depot at Strensall. This would allow another battalion to be formed which could be the York and Lancasters. The RAC already use this principle by basing one of their regiments at Catterick; the practice also applied in the infantry in the late 1940s under the group system.

3 - The Green Howards and Duke of Wellington's Regiment to offer the York and Lancasters a company within their Regular battalions. After all, if it had not been for the Y

and L sacrifice in 1968 one of these regiments would have lost their separate identity through amalgamation. They therefore owe the Y and L one.

4 - Now that there is to be a further battalion of Yorkshire Volunteers why cannot one be allocated to each of the three existing Regular regiments with the fourth becoming a TA battalion of the York and Lancaster Regiment?

It will be noted from the above that I would not increase the size of the Army by one man; yet could reform many regiments. I am just a soldier who loves the Army and its old country regiments and who does not want to see them disappear. - Mr M Williams, Albuhera, Egley Road, Woking, Surrey GU22 0AY.

## Royal Sussex last to leave Korea

Reference your article on Korea (*SOLDIER*, March 6), my curiosity was aroused that although mention was made of The Royal Sussex Regiment disembarking, no further information on them was given.

The battalion was in the Commonwealth Division, also attached to the American 24th TARO Division, in 1956. The regiment had the distinction of wearing two divisional flashes at the same time, Commonwealth on the left and TARO on the right arm. The Royal Sussex Regiment finally left Korea in 1957, being the last full British battalion to do so.

## How did fusiliers wear their hackles in 1919?

May I tap the vast pool of military knowledge possessed by *SOLDIER* readers by asking if anyone can please supply at least some of the answers to the following queries. They deal mainly with dress after the 1914-1918 war when, because full dress was not universally restored to the Army, SD uniform had to fill the gap.

● Did fusilier regiments wear their various coloured hackles with the SD cap between 1919 and the introduction of battledress in a similar manner to that presently adopted with the beret?

● At some time in the late 1930s long puttees were dispensed with for ceremonial. Thereafter the SD trousers were allowed to hang straight to

the boot. Can anyone please confirm this and give the date of the change?

● When did swagger-caness (or whips) cease to be carried?

● I possess a (I think) gunner's walking-out whip, one silver ferrule of which bears the inscription: *G & J Zair 1915* plus a broadarrow. I tend to think this was the name of a contractor and not the manu-

facturer. Can anyone therefore shed more light on it? I suspect it traded in the Middle East (perhaps Egypt) rather than India or elsewhere.

● In the more recent past, when was the officers' brown ankle boot (not the field boot) phased out? - R Travers-Bogusz, 77 St Thomas's Road, Hardway, Gosport, Hants PO12 4JU.

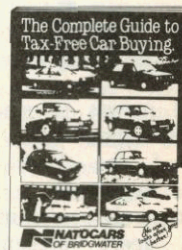

# MICS consigns pilots' paperwork to the bin

THREE HUNDRED pocket-sized computers which will virtually eliminate paperwork and the jotting down of calculations by chinagraph pencil on flying overall leg pads are being issued to Army Air Corps helicopter crews, writes **Graham Smith**.

The sums-within-seconds facility is called MICS - Mission Information Computer System. It comprises a ground station element and a hand-held computer about the size of an office desk top calculator.

This airborne boon has many functions among which will be the storing of comms information, navigation plots, target areas,

frequencies, call signs and BATCOs - Battle Group Codes.

The system has been on trial for two years with BAOR's 1 Regiment, AAC. It was soon found to reduce crew workloads, particularly at night.

It also takes the strain out of map reading. All aircrew need do, basically, is punch in a given grid reference and the response tells the pilot the survey map sheet on which the location can be found.

The software and operational data is held on plug-in memory modules, into which programmes and data are loaded from the ground station at the combat unit's HQ before each mission.

## Palace gets new sentry boxes

NEW reinforced sentry boxes containing undisclosed security equipment have been placed on either side of the main gate at Buckingham Palace. The posts will be manned by policemen in front of the parade ground where Army personnel still draw crowds with the Changing of the Guard ceremony.

## Tactical visit

A SEMINAR on tactics, strategy and foreign affairs at the Royal Hong Kong Jockey Club in Shatin attracted some of the UK's leading experts. Their audience was composed of the young officers of 48 Gurkha Infantry Brigade and the purpose was to bring them up to date with military thinking in the British Army.

## Gurkha change

AFTER a two year tour of duty in the United Kingdom the 2nd Battalion, 2nd King Edward VII's Own Gurkha Rifles (the Sirmoor Rifles) (2/2 GR) has returned to Hong Kong. Almost 130 soldiers of 2/2 GR arrived back in Hong Kong and after a speedy refuel the RAF aircraft embarked a similar number of soldiers of the 6th Queen Elizabeth's Own Gurkha Rifles to take them to their new camp at Church Crookham, near Aldershot.

## Mercian triumph

The 2nd Battalion Mercian Volunteers has won the Western District annual GPMG SF competition for the fourth year running. The event was held under atrocious weather conditions at Sennybridge. Despite the elements 2 Mercian SF team won by a convincing margin.

A few days earlier a part time member of the unit, Cpl James Oldman, had died in a terrorist attack. He was the third soldier to die in the

province this year, and since then another UDR soldier, Pte William Graham, has been shot dead, bringing the total to 549, of whom 162 were UDR soldiers.

Mr Younger was met by the General Officer Commanding, Lt Gen Sir Robert Pascoe, toured HQ at Lisburn and visited the 1st Bn The Green Howards, the resident Londonderry battalion.

## Tank mover makes last lift

BAOR's champion weightlifter of more than a quarter of a century has made its last lift. The Antar Mk 3 tank transporter, a 321 bhp powerhouse, first started moving tanks for the Rhine Army nearly 40 years ago.

Now the Antar is being withdrawn from service and at Paderborn, 15 of them from

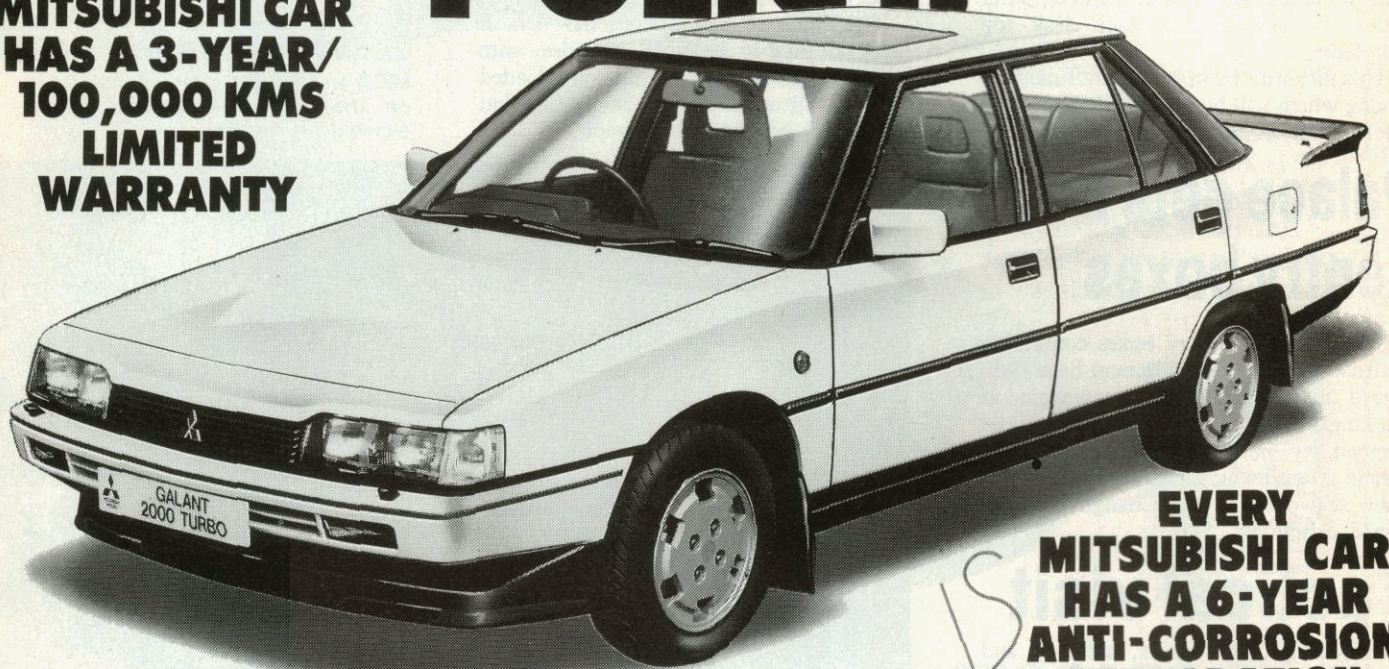
617 Tank Transporter Sqn, Hamm, lifted 14 Chieftains and one ARV of D Sqn, 5th Royal Inniskilling Dragoon Guards for the last time, delivering them from Barker Barracks, to Reinschlen, near Soltau, 230 kms away.

The 16-gear Antars are being replaced by the new Commander tank transporter.

# Paras' charity tab claimed as a record

EIGHT paratroopers, six of them Falklands veterans, marched into their regimental depot at Browning Barracks in Aldershot after completing a marathon 1,200 mile march from Inverness 27 hours ahead of schedule. They are claiming a record of eight days, 15 hours, 15 minutes and 30 seconds for the gruelling "tab" which took them down the eastern side of

Scotland and England, along the south coast and back to Aldershot.

The NSPCC and the British Heart Foundation will benefit by thousands of pounds.

The marchers carried the standard 35lbs packs used by the paras. They took it in turns to march for two hours at a time. All set a scorching pace and one marcher,

LCpl Jim Laker, averaged the equivalent of a half marathon during his two-hour stints. In the team were Sgt Martin Margerison and the man who saved his life at Goose Green in the Falklands, Cpl Baz Bardsley. When Martin was shot in the mouth and shoulder Cpl Bardsley ran back under fire and carried him to safety. He won the Military Medal.

## They want moor fine weather!

FOUR HUNDRED teams of six walkers were preparing for a tough weekend on the wilds of Dartmoor in the 28th annual Ten Tors expedition as SOLDIER went to press.

Last year the weather was appalling and 2,400 contestants were hoping for finer fare. Only a quarter of the entries finished the course a year ago.

Ten Tors is organised by the Army's SW District HQ, Bulford, with HQ 43 Inf Bde, Exeter and support from TA units and RN, RM and RAF detachments.

## Badge facelift

THE Devon Regiment badge cut into the hillside at Fovant (Wilts) just off the busy A30 has just had a facelift.

Soldiers from the Bulford-based 1st Bn, The Devonshire and Dorset Regt, have spent a week cleaning up the badge etched into the chalk.

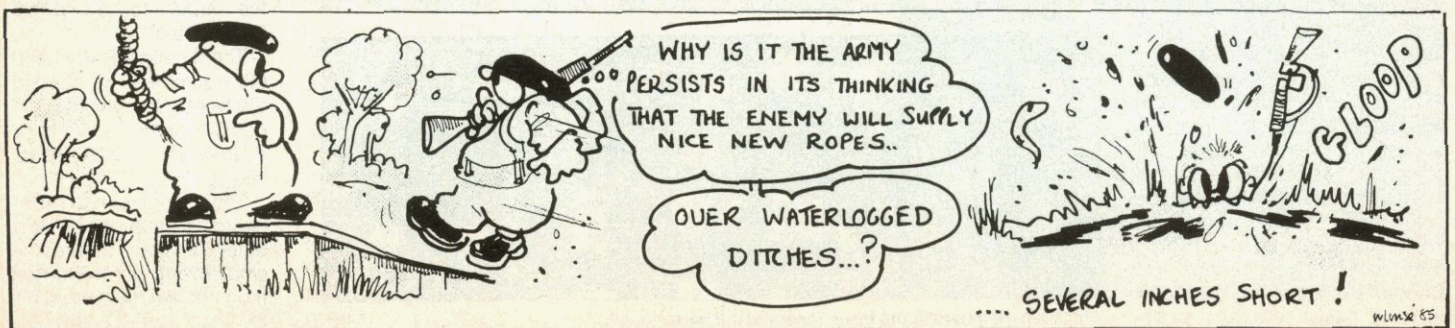

Now C Coy has been absorbed into HQ Coy of the 5th Bn The Royal Green Jackets (but will reappear as part of the new battalion in High Wycombe at the end of this year). To accommodate the larger company and the battalion HQ, the barracks was refurbished and a new block constructed for the TAVRA and 219 General Hospital.

## Pictured history

THE Shropshire Yeomanry was raised in 1795 and until its disbandment in 1969 had 56 commanding officers.

Today the name and history of the regiment is carried on by C (Shropshire Yeomanry) Squadron, The Queen's Own Mercian Yeomanry.

To cement the links between The Shropshire Yeomanry and its name county, the squadron has presented a copy of the regiment's history and a painting depicting its various roles to Telford Corporation Environmental History Centre.

The gifts were received by Mrs Elizabeth Holt whose husband Mr Vesey Holt (left centre), is the great-great-grandson of Lt Col William Cludde who raised the regiment in 1795 and was its first CO. ## Handy Andy gets a leg up!

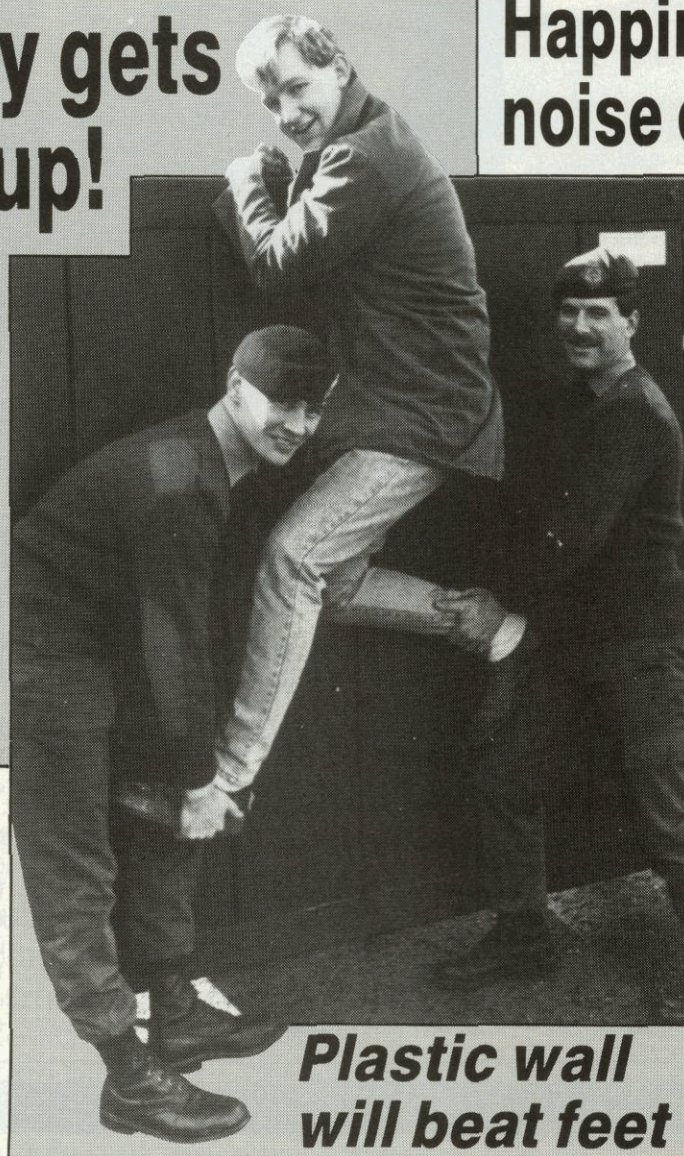
Handy Andy Watson found himself with an unusual job when the King's Division Recruiting Team (KDRT) needed a new wall for its mobile assault course.

FOR the first time in his young life Barry Reynolds can hear the sounds people with normal hearing take for granted.

The 14-year-old son of Cpl Reynolds based at 3 BAD, Bracht, BAOR, Barry has had a hearing disability since birth.

To help him the sergeants' mess at his father's base donated more than DM1,000 which was matched by the fund-raising efforts of SSgt John McRobie of the REME, the LSL estate warden of 3 Royal Anglian Regt, Minden.

John is the founder of the Hearing Aid Appeal in BAOR and, with the help of Sqn Ldr Scase and his wife of RAF Laarbruch, has raised more than DM55,000 to help deaf people.

### FOUNDER

To buy the correct equipment for Barry, Sqn Ldr Scase, accompanied by his wife, went to the UK for suitable equipment - where they purchased a phonic ear.

This comprises a battery powered audio receiver which is worn on the waist belt and vastly increases the input to a normal hearing aid.

The first time Barry used the equipment he startled everyone by saying he could hear a mouse scurrying in the fallen leaves.

The youngster had never heard a mouse or any other animal before. A small event, but to Barry a monumental moment in his life.

Together they make a fine sound and sight.

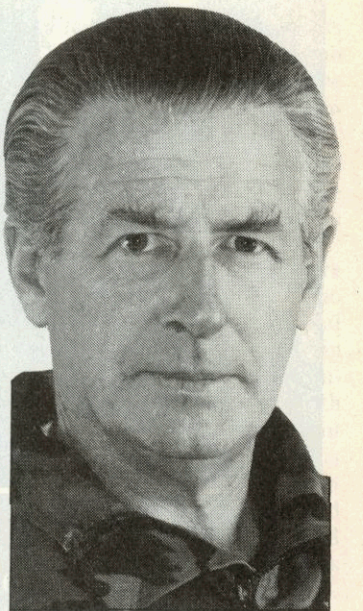
## Furthest posting claim by para ace Phil

Maj Butterworth has since served in, among other places, Ghana, Singapore, Hong Kong and Northern Ireland. Rather than flying



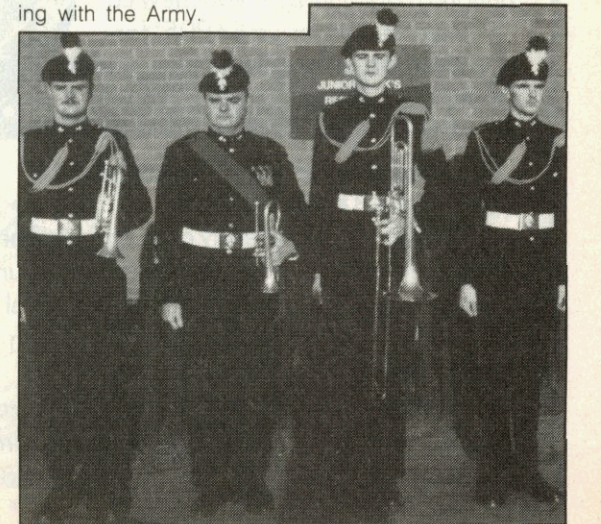
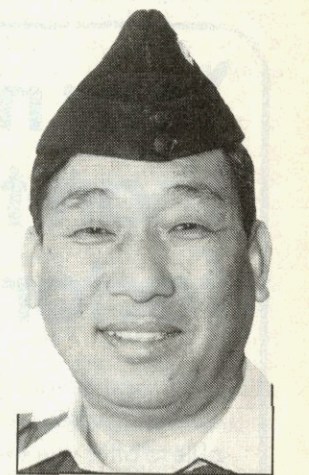
MAJ PHIL BUTTERWORTH: retiring home, he is taking a leisurely drive back through Europe to the UK from Cyprus.

# American invaders will fight each other

Britain will be invaded over the August bank holiday period by hundreds of British, American and French soldiers – all of them from America. They are coming here to fight – each other!

They fought each other before – or rather their forebears did – not in Britain, but in America.

It may sound confusing, but these are 700 soldiers who in ordinary life have a variety of jobs – some are soldiers! – but are bound together by a passionate interest in the period of the American War of Independence. And they dress themselves in authentic military costumes of the day, arm themselves with the appropriate weapons, refight the battles and relive the history.

Most of them visiting Britain to present a series of spectacular events for British Heritage, will be from British Redcoat regiments, some of which are formally linked with British Regular Army units of today – the 10th Foot with the Royal Anglians, the 64th with the Staffordshire Regiment, and the 23rd with the Royal Welch Fusiliers. But three American battalions will be represented, and two French regiments.

And they will even bring their own camp followers with them!

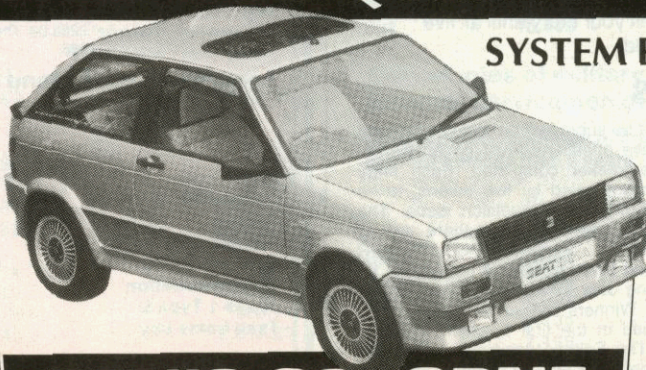

THERE was no "wait for it" disappointment in this year's pay rise for the Forces (except for the generals), a practice the Armed Forces Pay Review Body warned had "detrimental effect".

The Review Body's recommendations of average increases of 5.96 per cent and a range of increases from four to seven per cent costing a total of £200 million, were accepted in full by the government – to be paid from April 1.

"We have reason to know

... that the delay in implementing our recommendations last year was the direct cause of concern in the Armed Forces", said the Review Body's report. "We believe that the detrimental effect of the decision within the Armed Forces was out of proportion to the money saved.

"We have said in previous reports that the salary levels we recommend are intended to provide a fair income for Servicemen and Servicewomen in the 12 months from April 1.

The effect of delaying increases in the military salary is to reduce the disposable income of Service personnel over that period.

"Servicemen and Servicewomen are bound by ties of discipline and loyalty to the Crown. They have no trades unions or staff organisations to represent them and are not free to state their case publicly."

The Review Body says: "We continue to place importance on the principle, which we believe is understood and

supported by Servicemen and Servicewomen, of maintaining military salaries at levels broadly comparable with those enjoyed by people outside the Services doing jobs of similar size or weight.

"Another consideration, indeed it is an over-riding concern, is to ensure that the salaries we recommend should be sufficient to recruit and retain adequate numbers of the right people to do the jobs the Services need to undertake.

"We keep a constant eye on

the manning picture. If we were not to do so, and if retention in particular were affected, we would run the risk that the Services', and therefore the taxpayers' very considerable investment in training men and women, would be wasted. Sudden outflows of skilled people could affect certain defence capabilities and might take some years to remedy. There would also be an increase in training and support costs." The AFPRB has spoken to Service personnel at work and at home about pay and conditions. The general impression gained was that Service people were "broadly

satisfied" with their pay.

But there was some dissatisfaction in some areas, particularly about reimbursement allowances.

The report goes on: "In recent years, we have detected the emergence of a number of particular themes. People serving or liable to serve outside Great Britain, those serving at sea, and those serving in certain types of front-line units have all, to a greater or lesser degree, laid stress on the increasing

turbulence of their lives and the arduous nature of their work.

"In our view, there has been a divergence in recent years between what Service personnel expect in these areas and their experience.

"We believe that there may now be a need to re-examine the extent to which the overall remuneration package — basic pay, additional pay, waivers of charges and reimbursement allowances — properly meets the needs of all Servicemen and Servicewomen."

# Don't be baffled by the rules

**EXPORTS from the UK make money and benefit the country. Many of the items sold abroad are high tech and baffle the uninitiated, just like the odd-sounding, but far from technical, "exportable Unemployment Benefit".**

**This is a scheme which costs money, as it allows people on the dole in the UK to continue drawing benefit when posted abroad.**

**But of course it's far more complicated than that and to help wives on the dole and who are about to be posted with their husbands, the following question and answer list may be of help.**

☐ Do I have to be receiving UB before I go to another EEC state or to a country with a reciprocal agreement with UK?

■ Yes. A person going to another EEC state and wishing to claim exportable UB has to establish title to unemployment benefit in this country before leaving.

☐ What happens if I leave the UK on a Sunday?

● If the day of departure is a Sunday, entitlement has to be established the day before.

☐ When must I sign on in the EEC country?

■ A person is accepted as available for employment on the day of departure if she registers as a person seeking work with the employment services of the member state to which she goes within seven days. The seven days start from the day of signing off in the UK, not from the day of arrival in the next country.

☐ What does "Voluntarily leaving her job without just cause" mean?

■ A wife who gives up her employment in order to accompany her husband abroad on an overseas posting is regarded as having just cause for leaving her employment

and is not subject to disqualification for leaving voluntarily. But if she gives up her employment earlier than is strictly necessary, e.g. for personal or other reasons, she may be subject to disqualification for leaving voluntarily, and if the day of departure falls within the disqualification period, there will be no entitlement to "exportable UB".

☐ What must wives accompanying husbands on postings overseas do to prove their "exportable UB" claim is genuine?

■ A claimant going to another EEC member state must seek employment there as 'exportable UB' is not payable to someone going on holiday to visit a relative or simply to accompany a spouse. But a claimant who accompanies her husband and who immediately looks for a job, is accepted as genuine.

☐ For how long is "exportable UB" paid?

■ If the above conditions are satisfied 'exportable UB' may be paid under EEC rules for up to three months. There is no provision for payment beyond that period.

# Check to save cash

**A staff sergeant from Hampshire writes:**

ONE of the problems facing Servicemen and women abroad is the purchase of a house in the UK. Once bought, the property must either be left empty or lived in, and as many Servicemen have found, letting can be the most cost effective way of reducing the monthly payments on interest.

However, to let a property, "consent to let" must first be given from the building society or bank holding the mortgage.

## Good news for UK home-movers

# SCRAPPED! ★ Limits

**SERVICE families about to move home within the UK can now take just about everything with them except their greenhouses, garden chairs and tables and portable roofed swimming pools!**

Anything else, and that includes collapsible swimming pools and wheelbarrows, can now be moved to a new posting at public expense.

And there are the added bonuses of a no limit cubic capacity – in other words, movers can take as much furniture as they like, and neither do they have to pay the removal contractor and then claim the money

back; nor do they have to submit three tenders of estimated costs.

It's all change for UK home-movers with the introduction of the new Service Contract System (SCS), which the Army has started ahead of the Navy and the RAF.

While the new scheme is as welcome as the flowers in May, it is not mandatory and a Serviceman can, if he wishes, move his furniture under the old

three-tender scheme or by self-drive hire van.

But those opting out of the new SCS scheme should be aware that reimbursement will be limited to the charges that would have occurred under SCS, or the actual costs incurred, whichever are cheaper.

Insurance cover is the responsibility of owners, so look closely at the small print in the contract. Accidents do happen,

even though the removal firm may be covered. Don't leave anything to chance. Moving possessions

from home to storage will continue as before. Three tenders will still be required, but trials are underway to see if SCS can be extended to include this.

A YOUTH Training Scheme for the teenage children of Service families has started in Cyprus following the success of similar schemes in Germany and Hong Kong.

The Cyprus scheme, which involves military establishments at Episkopi, Akrotiri, Dhekelia and Ayios Nikolaos, is similar to a YTS scheme which has been operating in BAOR for some time and a smaller scheme which has been operating in Hong Kong for several months.

The holiday, which is organised by the Service Children's Educational Authority (SCEA) and at no cost to parents, takes place this year from June 19-26 and will be located at St Martin's Plain Camp, near Folkestone in Kent.

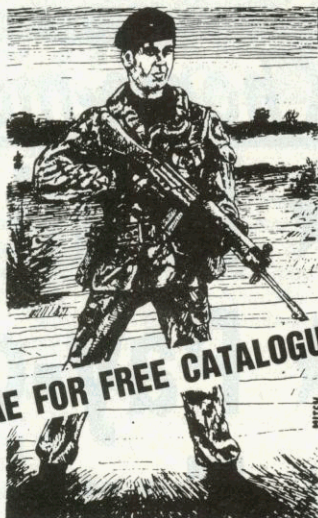

# CYPRUS IN FOCUS

TURKISH script carved boldly on a distant mountainside shimmers through the haze, dominating a plain where battle raged one hot summer's day in 1974.

The tired cough of a tractor breaks the silence hanging heat-heavy across the fields where paratroopers landed that day to mount an attack on Nicosia airport.

Ghost-like and empty the airport now stands idle, its lounges littered with faded brochures and its runway sun-baked and cracked.

Smudges of colour along mile after mile of hilltops and escarpments highlight the positions of the opposing sides, flags fluttering in defiant proclamation of ownership.

This is the buffer zone, a ribbon of land just a street's width in places along which members of the United Nations force keep the peace between Greeks and Turks.

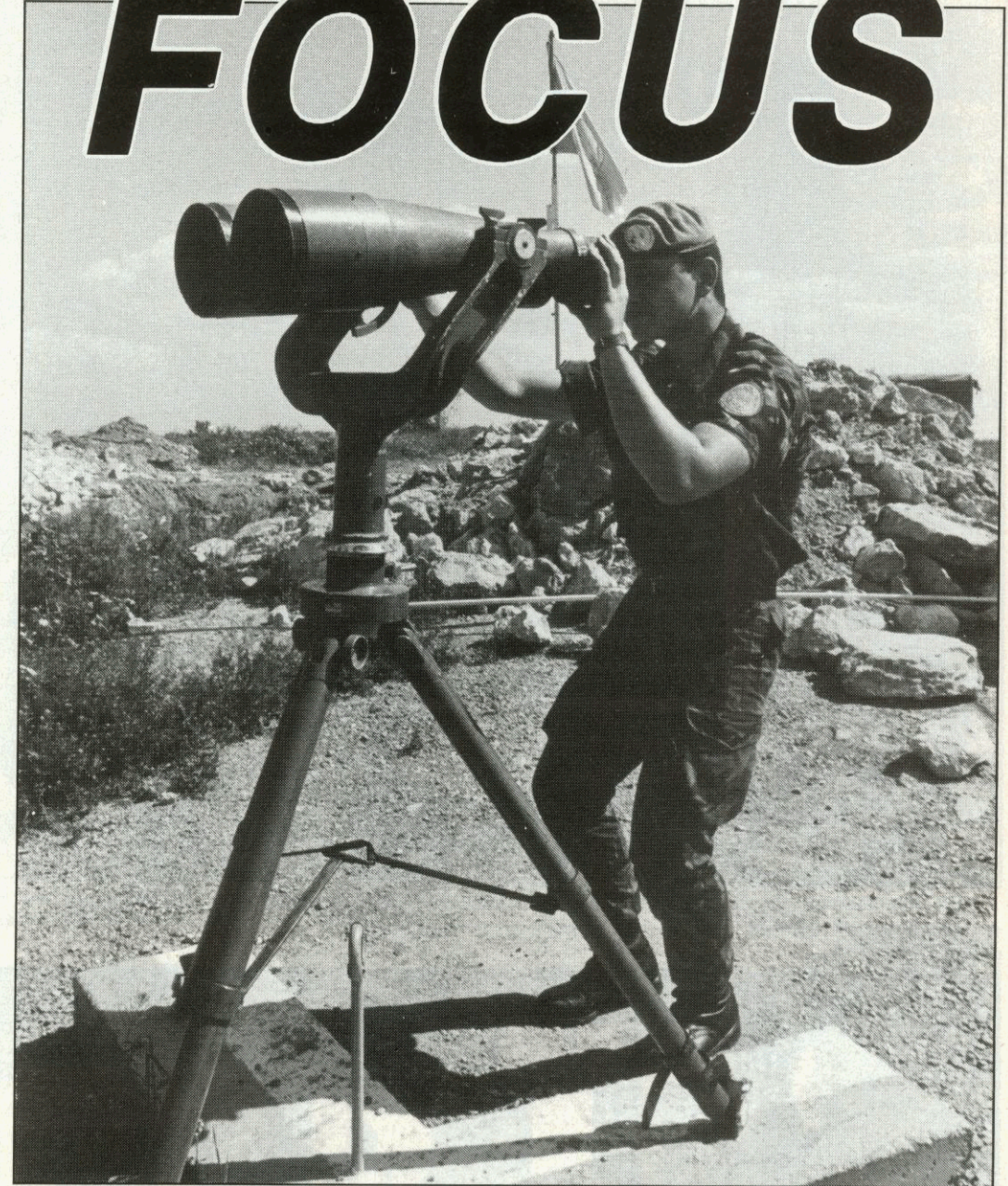
Tasked with maintaining a well-defined status quo, the multi-national UN force ensures that neither side encroaches beyond the ceasefire line and that no improvements are made to their defensive positions.

The ceasefire line zig-zags round houses, sheds and cemeteries and the UN force must know every twist and turn and every peculiarity of the semi-official terms of the status quo.

A Greek Cypriot carpentry shop next to one of the company headquarters in the British controlled sector is allowed to continue operating only if all doors and windows facing the Turkish line are kept open so that the Turks can see what is going on inside.

It is a situation often fraught with tension and the aim of the British contingent, currently the 3rd Battalion, The Royal Regiment of Fusiliers, is to maintain as obvious and tactful a presence as possible while keeping the tinderbox dry.

"We try to keep everything as low key as we can," said A

Coy OC Maj Nick Beswick, "and we always deal with incidents by starting off at a low level of command."

If a patrol from either side strays into the buffer zone, it is up to the NCO at the scene to ask them to return to their patch so that there is no escalation of embarrassment or loss of face.

It is a "corporal's war" and

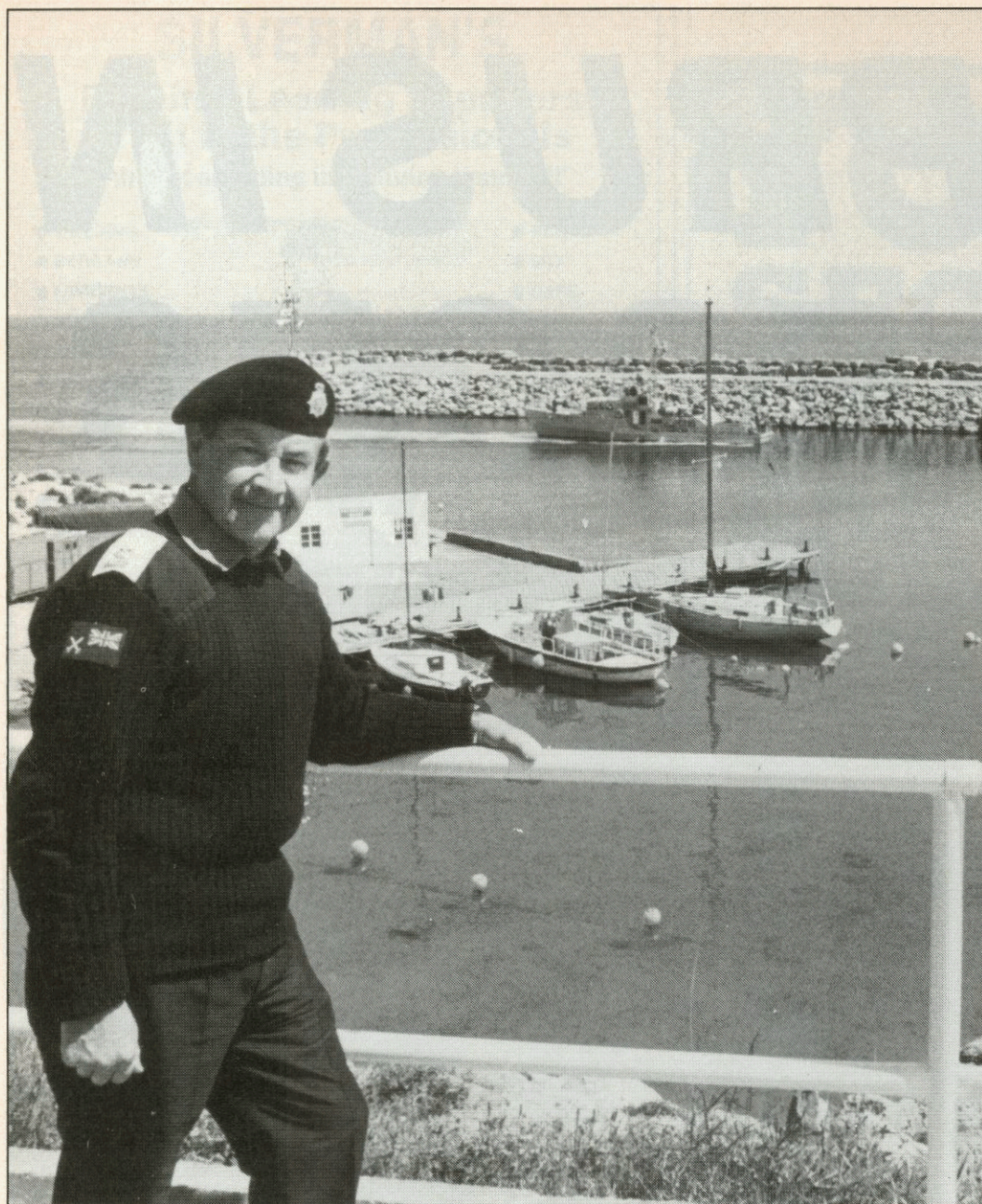
for the greater part relations with both parties are amicable. Lt Tom King told SOLDIER: "Our job is to stop them blowing something petty out of all proportion."

Members of the battalion are designated to the UNFICYP humanitarian and economic staff who are striving to return displaced farmers to their lands. They also visit the enclaves of

Greek and Turkish Cypriots who chose to stay put after the invasion.

The British contingent, and the UN force as a whole, is backed up by the UN Support Regiments who though multi-national are mainly British and include signals and transport squadrons, a helicopter flight, and ordnance squadron and a REME workshop.

# RCT on the hoof

HORSE power still packs a punch when it comes to lugging loads along the dusty tracks and winding valleys of the Cypriot highlands.

Saddle club steeds are earmarked for pack-horse duties and a "detachment" of two or three frequently deploy in the field with units visiting the island on exercise.

Carrying anything from rations and water to tentage and fuel, the horses are looked after by handlers from 58 Squadron

RCT based at Akrotiri.

It's all a far cry from the huge articulated Leyland transports with which the squadron is also equipped and a valuable insight for visiting units into alternative means of replenishment and supply, said OC Maj David Carter.

The reinstatement of a pack-horse detachment means that 58 Squadron has come full circle 86 years after being raised in Aldershot as 58 Horse Transport Company, Army

Service Corps. The squadron is part of 30 Regiment RCT based at Episkopi and, with its sister squadron 10 Port Squadron based at a harbour outside Akrotiri known as The Mole, is involved in moving almost anything and everyone around Cyprus.

Among their taskings is the hire and inspection of 70 local buses which bring civilian employees – both Greek and Turkish Cypriots – into the two British Sovereign Base Areas

centred on Episkopi and Dhekelia.

The regiment provides first and second line transport, including hire vehicles, and also provides servicing and repair facilities. Advice is given to visiting units and UK UNFICYP (United Nations Forces in Cyprus) units on all movement matters.

All sea movements including in-theatre distribution of freight and the handling of British forces cargo through

Limassol are controlled and co-ordinated by the regiment, as are Army unit air movements through RAF Akrotiri and Kingsfield airfield.

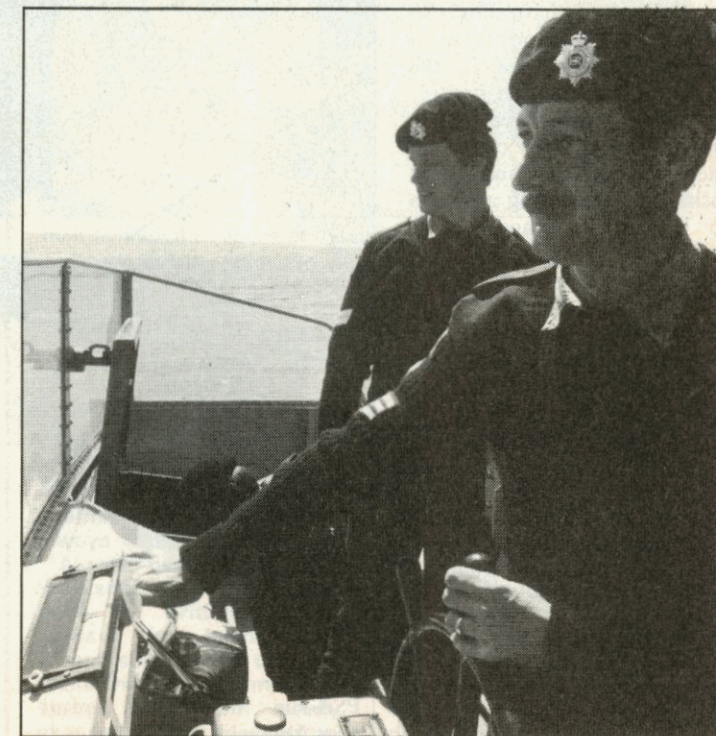
Overseeing maritime operations from his harbour-side perch – "not a bad place for an office really!" – 10 Port Squadron OC Maj Tony Todd controls several vessels including two Ramped Craft Logistic, two Mexeflotes, a Work Boat and a Range Safety Craft.

The maritime approaches to

the Sovereign Base Areas are regularly patrolled by the 24-knot safety craft which is also used for target towing and sea rescue operations and for countering drug smuggling.

Duties outside general support for the Services in Cyprus include fishery protection and anti-pollution sorties.

"No two days are the same," said the aptly-named RCT Cpl James Driver-Williams. "I like going to sea and where better to do it than here?"

# Hot and cold sappers on tap

NO strangers to the extremes of the island's climate, 62 Cyprus Support Squadron RE spend three months each year in the snows of the 6,000 foot Troodos mountains before returning to the searing heat of their coastal base at Dhekelia.

The sappers do a lot of work for the United Nations force, particularly in the Danish stretch of the buffer zone where they help build and maintain tracks through the inhospitable terrain of the mountainous west.

Donning winter woolies and a great deal else, they brave temperatures of minus 30 degrees to keep roads open to the RAF radar sites in the much higher Troodos range.

Back in shirt sleeves a few weeks later they can find themselves on any number of tasks from culverting a stream to building a school soccer pitch.

The squadron was awarded the Wilkinson Sword of Peace in 1981 for a variety of civil projects on the island.

Squadron OC Maj Paul Wallace-Tarry regards community aid as beneficial to both parties. Constructing a soccer pitch is little different from making a temporary airstrip and building a new Scout and Guides hut for the islanders flexes the skills of a number of his tradesmen.

Units on exercise can call on the squadron for engineer assistance, and the squadron is always on hand to help out resident formations.

Several sappers man the

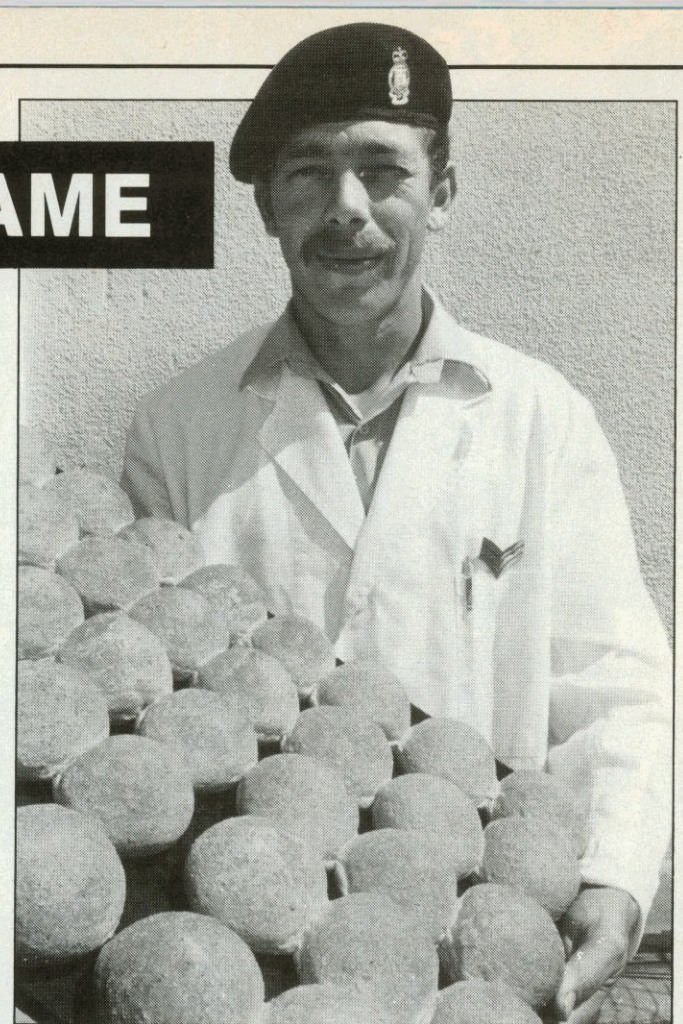
### Heat's on for Tony

A HOT day in Cyprus could play havoc with breadmaking in the RAOC bakery at Dhekelia if a careful watch was not kept on the thermometer.

The warmer it is outside the warmer it is inside and flour and water temperatures have to be spot-on if the dough is to rise successfully.

"There is more to this than meets the eye," chuckled SSgt Dave Inskip who with aptly-named colleague Sgt Tony Baker is responsible for producing 1,500 loaves a day.

Heading a team of 13 locally-employed Cypriots, the two men supply enough bread to meet the demands of all Army and RAF personnel and all cookhouses and Naafis on the island as well as the replenishment requirements of passing naval vessels and British UN units.

## REME digs history!

Archaeological digs are not the kind of place one would normally find a REME crane and crew but in Cyprus, it seems, the unexpected is always to be expected.

Akrotiri-based 48 Cyprus Workshop offers REME support to British Forces across the island but, among some rather unusual tasks, has hauled massive stones from the newly excavated ruins of a century-old Roman temple. The

unit's latest off-beat assignment was easing the 15 ton replica of an ancient Greek merchant ship out of a workshop near Limassol.

Built by the Hellenic Institute for the Preservation of Nautical Tradition, the Kyrenia II mirrors in every detail a ship that once plied the Mediterranean Sea with cargoes of wine and olive oil. Her wreck was discovered offshore at Kyrenia.

# Back on patrol!

QUICK thinking Cpl John Bailey used the horsebox he was towing to soak up the hail of bullets fired at his Land-Rover by Arab gunmen in last month's ambush in Cyprus.

They were on their way from Ayios Nikolaos to pick up a horse from Episkopi saddle club when the attackers struck. Two men in their early 20s have since been detained by police.

The threat of terrorism had been uppermost in people's minds since last year's mortar attack on RAF Akrotiri.

Internal security precautions were stepped up then and the

infantry battalions currently in the hot seat are both, coincidentally, from the same regiment.

The 1st Bn, The Royal Regiment of Fusiliers, arrived from a tour in Northern Ireland last year well versed in the routine of patrols, vehicle check points and stag duties.

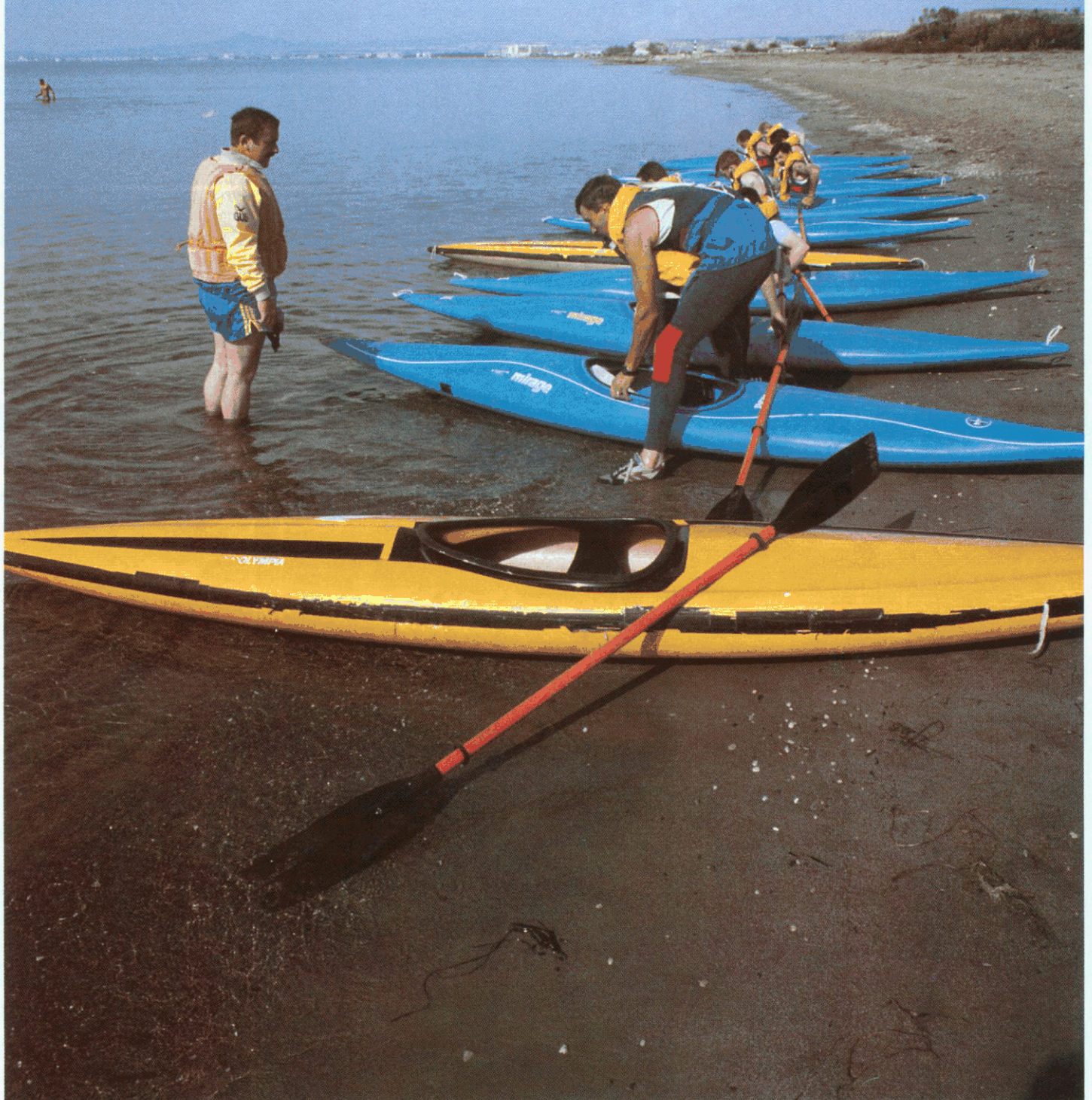
They are on a two year accompanied tour and based at Episkopi garrison in the western Sovereign Base Area.

Detachments are sent to other British military installations and men of 1RRF patrol RAF radar sites in the Troodos mountains and occasionally mount guard at RAF Akrotiri.

The 3rd Bn are serving a six months tour on the island and while two companies are based at Dhekelia garrison protecting the eastern Sovereign Base Area the other two are at Nicosia where they form part of the UN peacekeeping force.

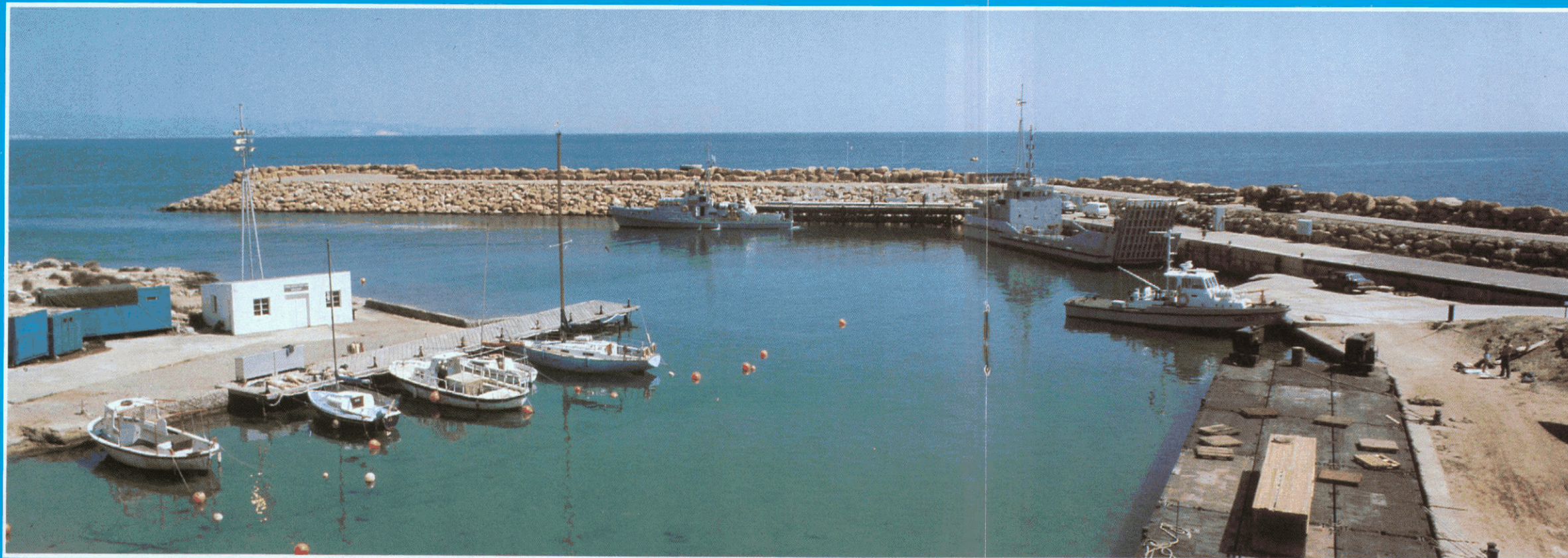

A spot of light relief from internal security duties—men of 3RRF take to the water near Dhekelia



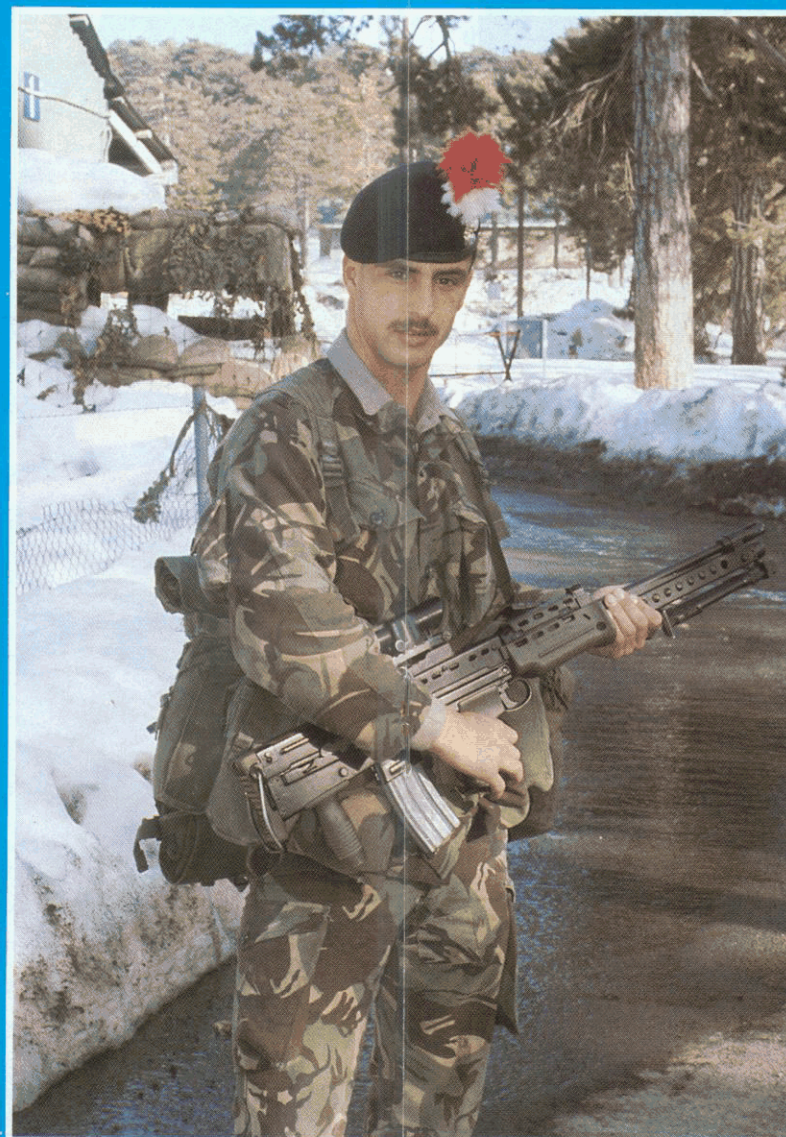

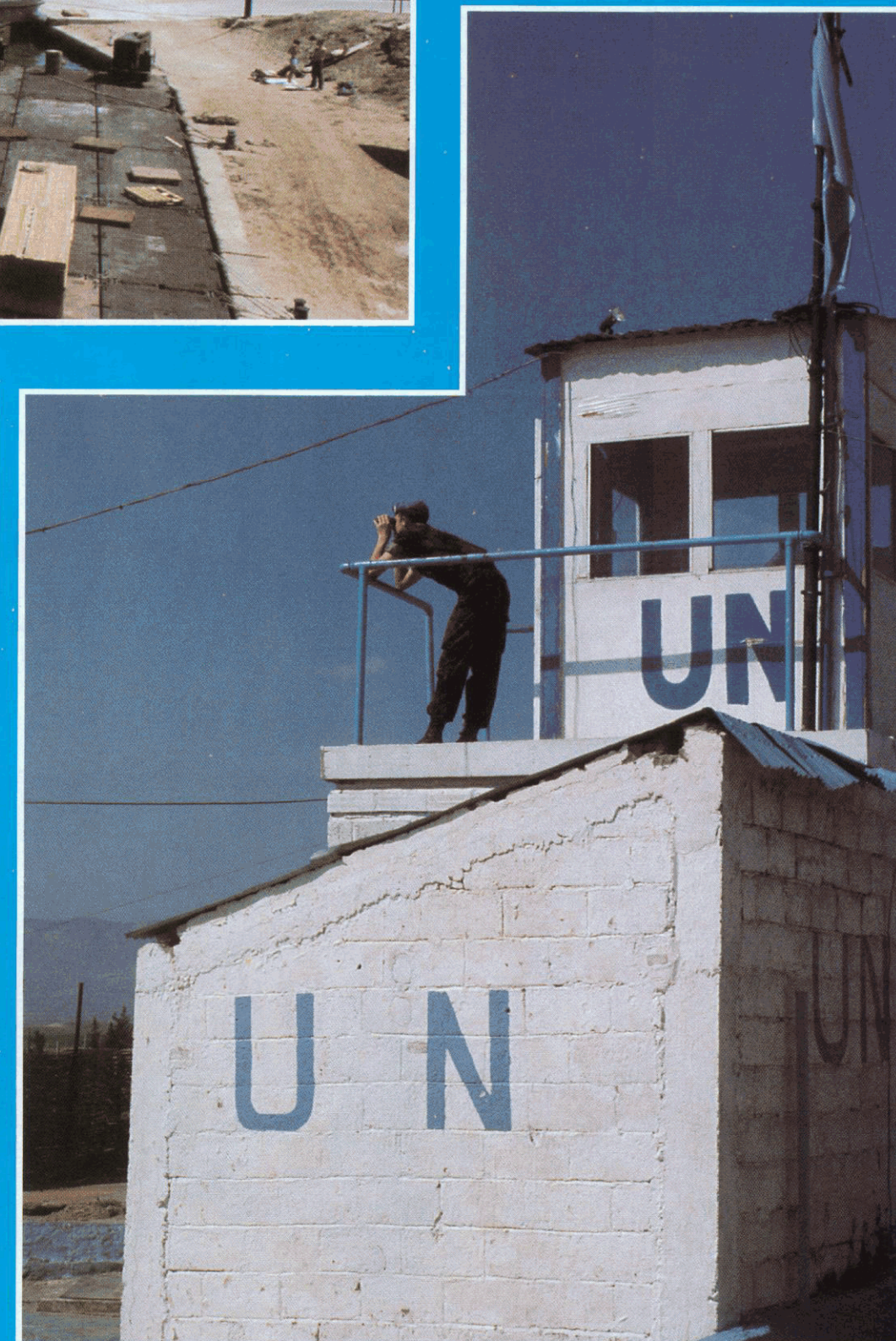

# Lucky Stuart enjoys a life of seabed adventure

A CHANCE encounter with Lady Luck ensured that LCpl Stuart Weaver would enjoy the posting of a lifetime.

On loan from the 1st Battalion, The Royal Regiment of Fusiliers for the duration of their two year tour on the island, LCpl Weaver is a diving instructor at the Pergamos Joint Services Adventure Training Centre.

Yet until his arrival last year 22-year-old LCpl Weaver had never dived into anything deeper than his local swimming pool and had certainly not the faintest idea that he would soon be swimming down to wrecks on the bed of the Mediterranean.

Joining a sub-aqua course during an early spell of adventure training, Stuart

took to the sport like a fish to water and was invited to attend advanced classes and become an instructor at the Pergamos centre.

"I could not believe my luck," he said, "it really was a chance in a million. It is like another world down there and diving on some of these wrecks is the most incredible experience."

Wrecks spanning many centuries litter the coastline. They include ancient Greek and Roman merchant vessels, a First World War British gunboat and, incidentally, a roll-on roll-off car ferry which sank just six years ago outside Larnaca.

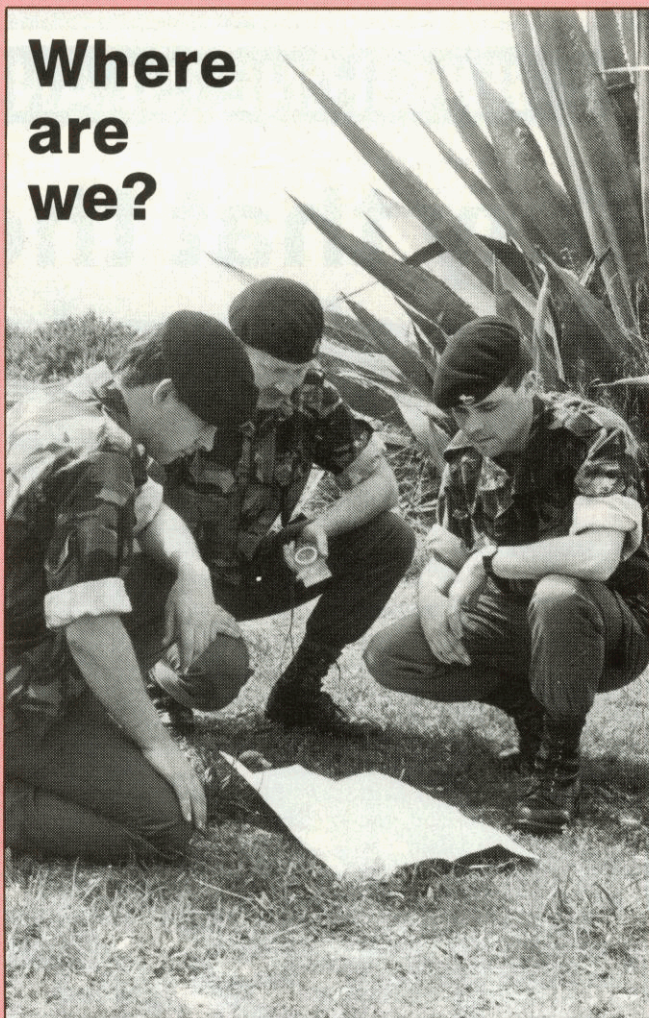
Sub-aqua training, under the direction of WO2 Chris Hilder APTC, is just one of several adventure sports taught at the Pergamos centre, whose commandant is Capt Kelvin Pickering APTC.

The other pursuits, whose chief instructors are SSgt Martin Garrett APTC and Sgt Gary Douglas 2RGJ, are canoeing, ski-ing, parachuting and gliding. About 700 students attend the centre each year.

There are other smaller, self-financing clubs on the island catering for all manner of pastimes from water sports to hang gliding.

SOLDIER caught up with members of Ayios Nikolaos based 9 Signals Regiment during the early stages of a 285 mile trek across Cyprus from Cape Greco in the east to Cape Arnaouti in the west.

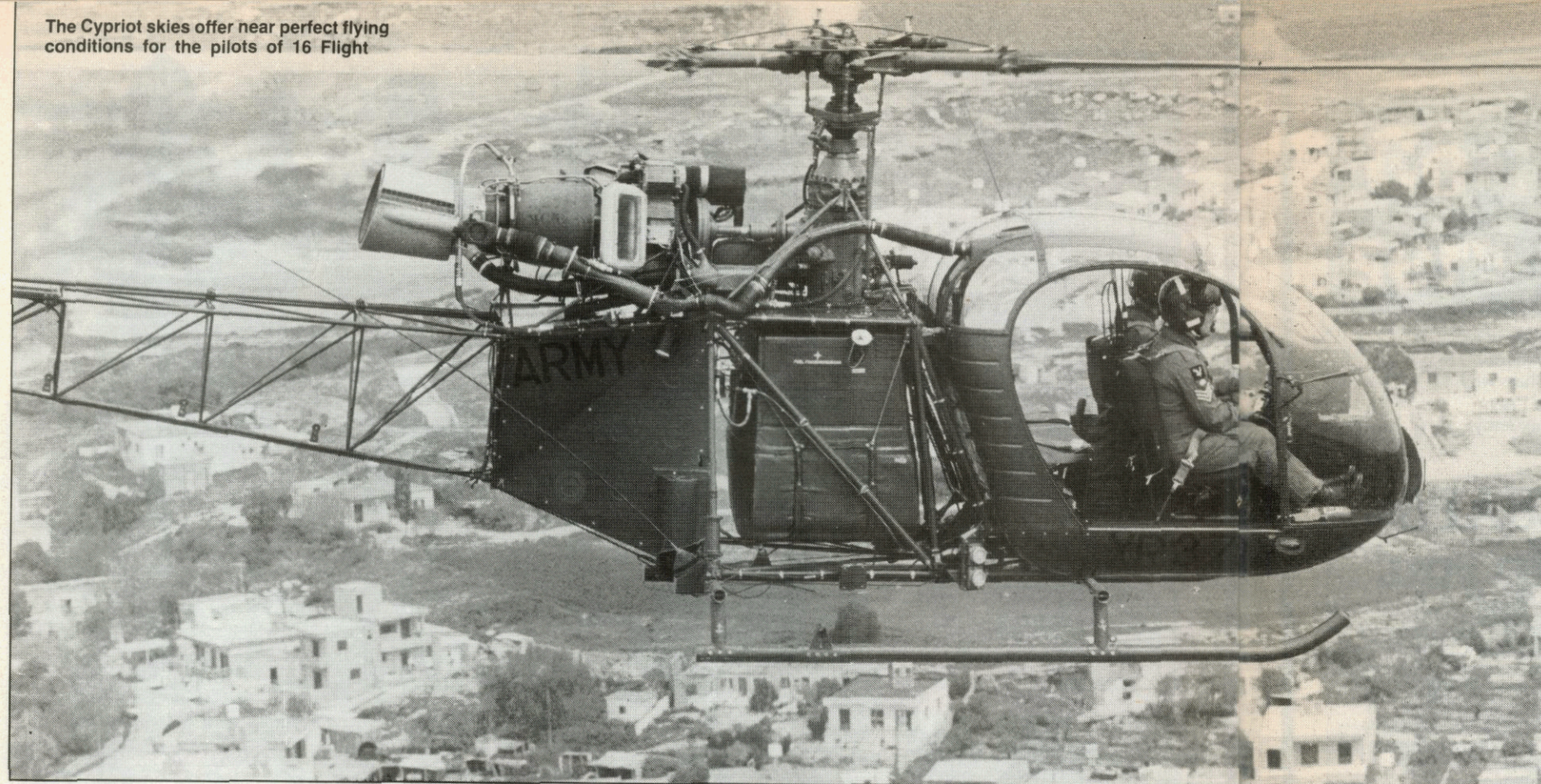

## They get their spares from museum model

OLDER by several years than the men who crew them, the Saladins of the island's armoured reconnaissance squadron soldier on despite an increasing shortage of spare parts.

The shortage of one part was so acute that a mayday call was flashed to the Royal Armoured Corps museum at Bovington where the appropriate item was cannibalised from a display.

Only 12 Saladins remain operational with the British Army and all are on Cyprus, the only sunshine posting left for regiments of the RAC and one currently filled by men of F Squadron 3RTR.

Split into six sabre (recce) troops and an SHQ and admin troop, the squadron – based at

Episkopi – is tasked with a variety of internal security duties and is responsible for the protection of both Sovereign Base Areas.

Lt Simon Allen told SOLDIER: "The men are thoroughly enjoying themselves. Operating Saladins is so completely different from Chieftains, and it is the only break they have outside Germany."

Squadron OC Maj Peter Gilchrist added: "I think the Saladin is a brilliant vehicle for this type of countryside and I know the lads hold it in very great affection."

Now replaced by the FV101 Scorpion in the reconnaissance regiments of the cavalry, the Saladin first went into produc-

tion in late 1958 and many of those still in use with the squadron date from that time.

Attached to the squadron on trickle posting is a 16-strong REME detachment, 15 LAD, whose WO2 Graham Luckham said: "Maintaining them gets more difficult as the years go by and obtaining spare parts is a big problem."

The men of 3RTR return to Germany in March 1988 and will be succeeded by a squadron of the 17th/21st Lancers. Between now and then most will return to the UK for conversion training to Challenger.

In the meantime they are making the most of the blue skies of Cyprus and the novelty of wheels instead of tracks.

## SUNSHINE ISLAND IS LAST REFUGE FOR ARMY'S AGEING ALOUETTES AND SALADINS

### Day that the Russians landed

A BIZARRE case of mistaken identity once led to the arrival of a Russian airliner at the Army Air Corps base outside Dhekelia.

Thinking it had reached Larnaca international airport some miles away, the Antonov An-24 touched down at the base to the amazement of all present.

A barbed wire fence at the end of the short 380 metre strip had to be removed and the airliner made as light as possible before it was able to take off again.

Dhekelia airfield is home to 16 Flight AAC who are still flying the venerable Alouette II more than 25 years after it was brought into service as a stop-gap between the Skeeter and the Scout.

Of the nine Alouettes still on Army strength, eight are based in Cyprus – four with 16 Flight and four with the United Nations (UNFICYP) support flight. The ninth is at

Boscombe Down where it is used for trials work.

Under the command of Maj Leslie Bond RA, 16 Flight undertakes a variety of duties in support of units at both Sovereign Base Areas.

One aircraft is always at an hour's readiness. Medevac, VIP and border patrol flights are a regular feature of the daily log.

Flying space outside the SBAs is restricted to well defined corridors except over exercise areas, and 16 Flight is only permitted to fly as far as the border between the Greek and Turkish zones of administration.

Slower, less sophisticated and each with its own individual traits, the Alouette II is held in much affection by both air and ground maintenance crew as illustrated by the following excerpts from a pilot's light-hearted flight test.

"After-flight servicing consists of generous greasing and

oiling of all moving parts so that vast quantities of lubricant are thrown all over the airframe during the next flight. This is an essential part of the aircraft anti-corrosion programme.

"The intercom system is very efficient and supplies constant background engine noise and gearbox whine to assure all on board that everything is running as it should be. All radio faults can be quickly rectified by unplugging the headset lead, licking it vigorously and replacing it, preferably in another socket."

Each aircraft receives first-line maintenance at Dhekelia but heavy duty servicing is carried out by 48 Cyprus Workshop REME at Akrotiri where they are stripped down completely, treated for corrosion and rebuilt before being returned as good as new.

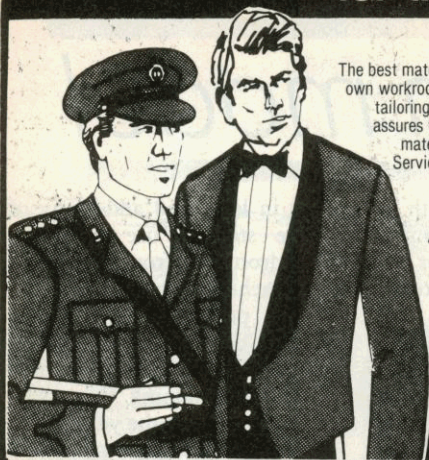
However, their days are numbered and there are plans to replace the veteran Alouette IIs with Gazelles during 1988.

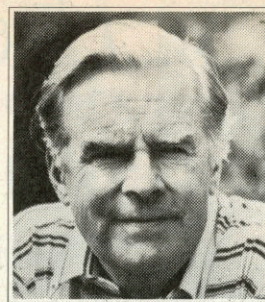

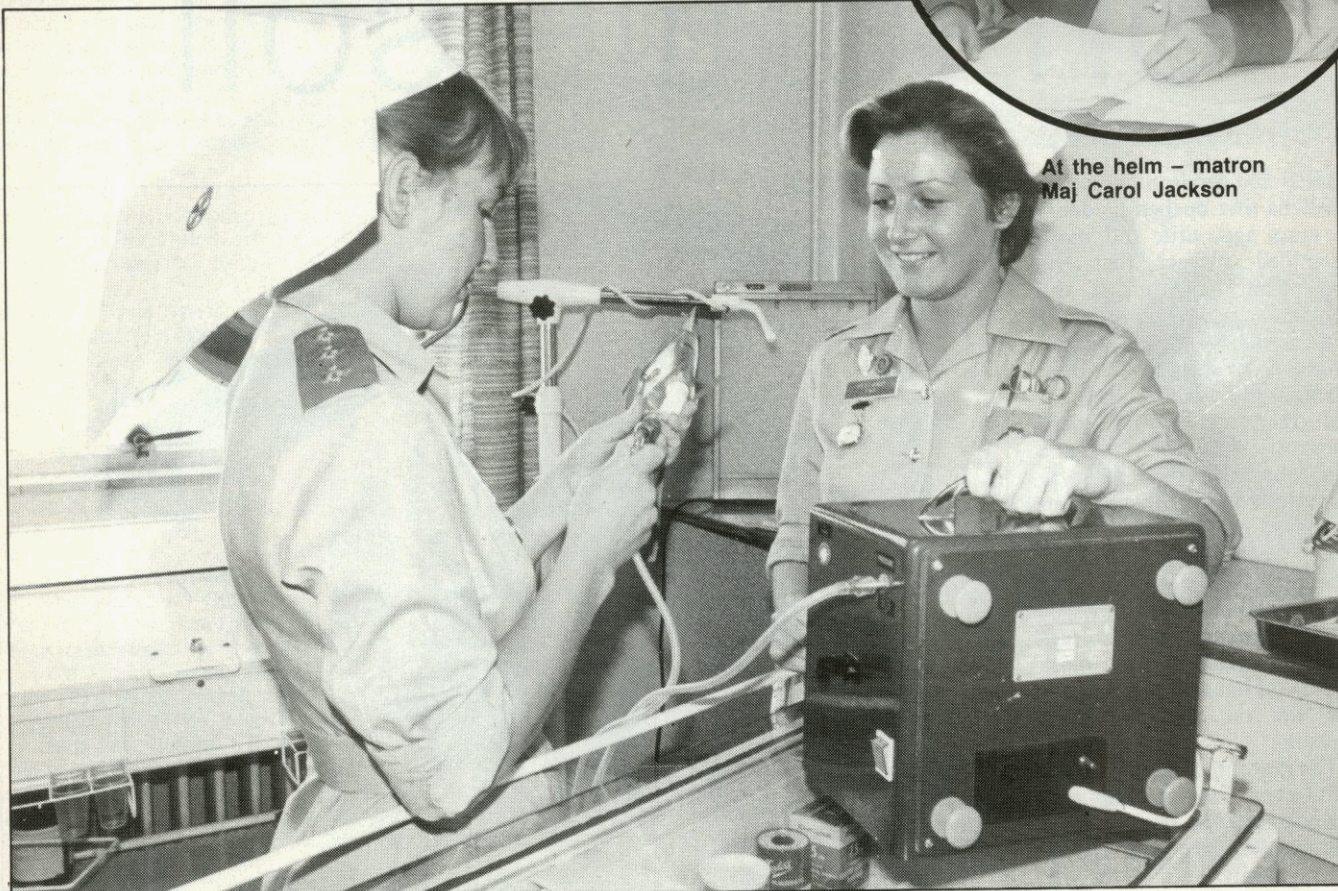

## Oh baby!

BABY care is high on the list of priorities at Dhekelia's medical reception station where the nurses run the only community midwifery service in the British Army.

Of the ten nursing members of the Queen Alexandra's Royal Army Nursing Corps based at Dhekelia MRS, four are qualified midwives.

They look after all military personnel and their families in the Eastern Sovereign Base Area including 9 Signals Regiment at Ayios Nikolaos and those at the adventure training centre in Pergamos. They also provide medical care for some civilian personnel and for sovereign base police and their families.

Ante and post natal care feature prominently in the day to day running of the MRS – described by matron Maj Carol Jackson as “more like a cottage

hospital” – and each of the midwives take it in turns to maintain a community service.

Going on visits and running clinics at the MRS gives the midwives both job satisfaction and stimulation, said Maj Jackson, whose staff also includes six Enrolled Nurses (General), a non-nursing QARANC clerk, a dental nurse and a number of RAMC medics.

There are only 12 beds at the medical station and all major cases are referred to the Princess Marina Hospital at Akrotiri in the Western Sovereign Base Area.

QARANCs on a posting to Dhekelia MRS generally stay for 18 months to two years and among them is SSgt Maralyn Newton, a midwife, who has just been awarded a coveted Association of the Royal Red Cross Medal by the Queen for her services to Army nursing.



# Seed that fell on fertile soil

WHEN the garrison church of Dhekelia first opened its doors 25 years ago, little did those assembled suspect that the large plant pot outside the chaplain's house opposite had until weeks earlier graced the interior of a Famagusta brothel.

Snatched by RMPs during a raid on one of the more colourful of the island's establishments, the pot was presented to the chaplain when he moved into his new home.

To the delight of all concerned the plant thrived for many years in the shadows of its new, more humble surroundings and this most unusual of house-warming gifts still sits on the chaplaincy doorstep.

The graceful garrison church of St George was not without its teething troubles 25 years ago. Celebrants fainted with alarming regularity because of the lack of ventilation and the roof was far from watertight.

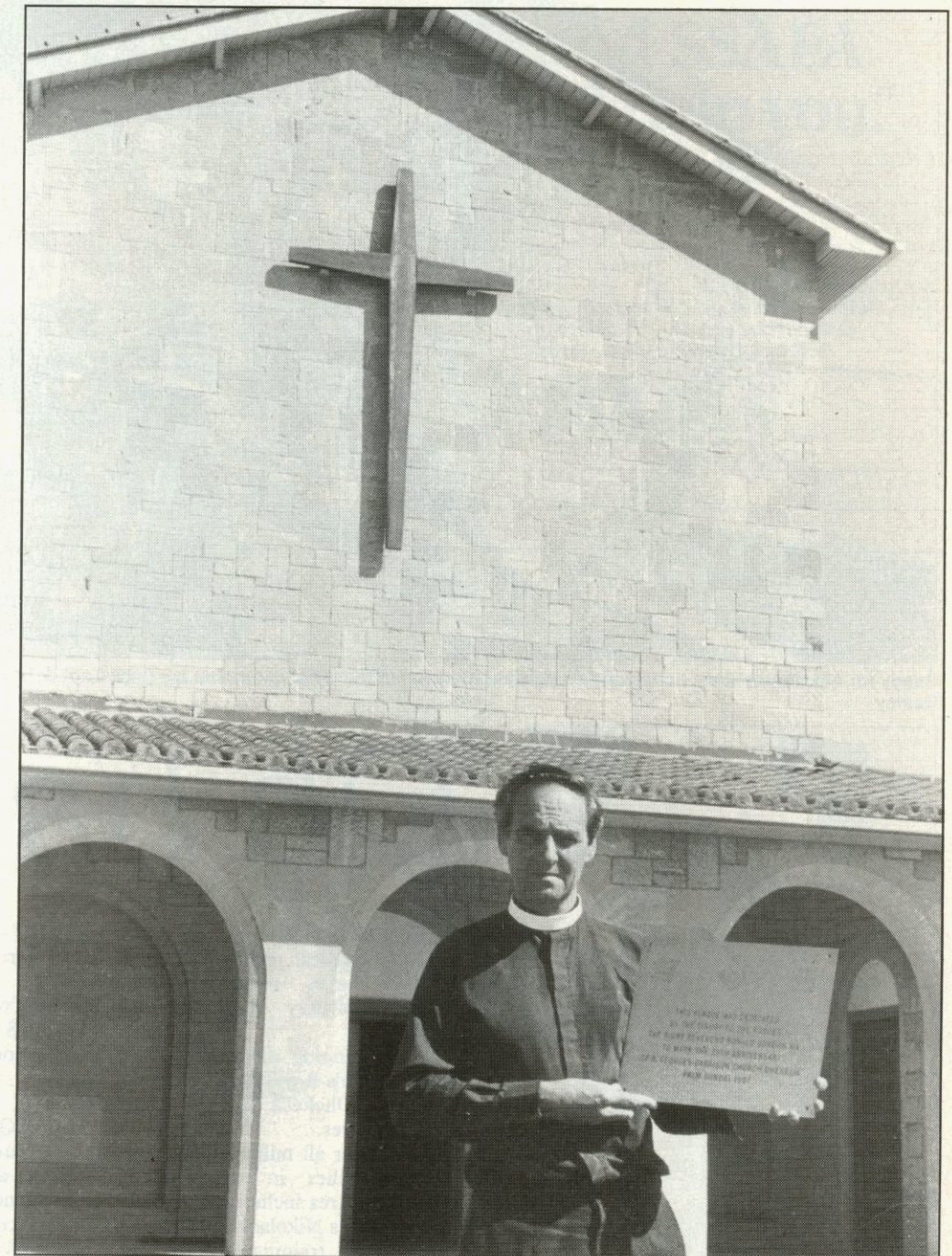
Several features inside the church, including six stained glass lunette windows, were brought from St George's Church at Moascar in Egypt during the evacuation of the Canal Zone.

Visitors during its early days included Archbishop Makarios, the Cypriots' first president after independence in 1960 and leader of the Greek Cypriots until his death in 1977.

St George's, Dhekelia, celebrated its 25th anniversary at Easter with a special service of rededication at which the Right Rev Ronald Gordon, Bishop to the Forces, unveiled a plaque recording the occasion.

At the Western Sovereign Base Area, the Rev Tom Hiney MC – senior chaplain to British Forces on Cyprus – has launched a series of instructional courses designed to give both soldiers and airmen a new Christian perspective on their day to day life and work.

"We are trying to shed a new

light on a whole range of issues," said the Rev Hiney, "including integrity, obedience, morality, relationships

The courses are held at the

Services Training Centre in the Troodos mountains, where the spectacular surroundings lend themselves to such debate.



# BIRTH OF AN AIR FORCE

THE Royal Flying Corps was formed 75 years ago on May 13, 1912 just a month after the granting of a Royal Warrant to the corps on April 13.

Its "birth" followed approval by the Imperial Defence Committee of a scheme prepared by Brig David Henderson, Capt Frederick Sykes, 15th Hussars – who were to become luminaries of the RFC – and Maj D S MacInnes.

A flying badge was designed and the motto *Per Ardua ad Astra* was approved by King George V.

The Central Flying School at Upavon, ten miles from Devizes, held its first course on August 17. It was maintained jointly by the War Office and the Admiralty but administered by the former.

For years no overall authority existed and there were constant differences of opinion between the War Office and the Admiralty.

During August 1912 military aircraft trials started on Salisbury Plain to determine the type of aircraft best suited for the needs of the Army. The choice fell on the BE 2 tractor aircraft.

Pilot training, meanwhile, was gaining pace at Upavon. It lasted 25 hours and the final test involved a 30-mile cross-country leg reaching 3,000 feet. From that height the student had to accomplish a spiral landing with engine off!

In 1912 the corps had just 17 aircraft but by the beginning of 1913 this had swelled to 101. Things were moving fast.

An experimental branch of the military wing was formed to deal with ballooning, kiting, wireless telegraphy, photography, meteorology, bomb dropping, musketry, gunnery and artillery co-operation.

Army estimates for the fateful year of 1914 earmarked £1 million for the RFC. By mid-year, a special camp was set up at Netheravon, Wilts, where RFC squadrons were assembled for trials, experiments, lectures and exercises and to promote inter-Service co-operation.

On July 1, the naval wing of the RFC was reformed as the Royal Naval Air Service. Sadly, four days later the first fatal RFC crash, near Stonehenge, killed a captain and a staff sergeant.

The action moved to England where the first bomb was dropped on Christmas Eve 1914 by a German marauder. By the beginning of 1915 plans were laid for the defence of Britain against German airship attack. Small numbers of RFC aircraft were kept in readiness at airfields round London.

Things were going well across the Channel. On February 5, the

first German aircraft was shot down by the RFC.

Thanks to maps prepared solely from photo-recce missions, an assault was made on March 10 on Neuve Chapelle, eight miles south-west of Arrmentières.

On April 1, 1915, No 9 Sqn, later the RFC School of Wireless, was formed at Brooklands near Weybridge, Surrey.

**Heroism flew boldly into the perspective of aerial war with the award of the first VC – posthumously – to 2nd Lt William Rhodes Moorhouse of 2 Sqn flying a BE 2 against Courtrai station at low level on April 26.**

On October 4, Fd Marshal Sir John French, the C-in-C, issued a special order of the day to all ranks of the RFC, through the

## First drop kept town alive

IT was in Mesopotamia – Iraq – in 1916 that the RFC pioneered the air-dropping of supplies. Beneficiaries were 14,000 British troops of the besieged garrison surrounded by the Turks.

The beleaguered town was 290 miles up the Tigris from Basra and a fortnight-long airlift was managed. Four BE 2Cs, a Voisin, a Henri Farman and four Naval Service

aircraft had to fly 23 miles to Kut from their airfield.

In all, 19,000lbs of food were dropped. Pin-point precision was not possible because Turkish gunfire kept the airlifts at between 5,000 and 7,000 feet.

The garrison actually received 16,800lbs of this aerial manna. But it was not enough and eventually the 10,000 combat troops surrendered.

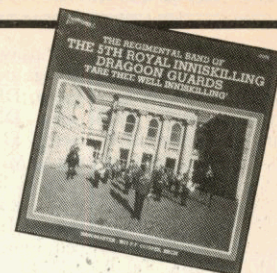

# A bit of studio magic



## FARE THEE WELL INNISKILLING

Band of the 5th Royal Inniskilling Dragoon Guards

Conductor: Bandmaster P F Cooper

ANOTHER cavalry band with a fine tradition of music making shows what can be achieved with depleted numbers. In a recording studio wonders can obviously be worked with only 22 players, though on a draughty barrack square, with two men sick, one on compassionate leave, one at Kneller Hall, and the remainder with frozen fingers it can be a different matter. Numbers are everything to a working band.

Here though, Mr Cooper and his stalwart few do achieve wonders, cutting their cloth according to their fabric, and no one can ask more.

A very effective fanfare *Inniskilling Dragoon* cleverly draws together the musical elements of the original two regiments, the 5th and 6th, followed by *Der Sonder Marsch* dedicated to Pat Reid and his fellow PoWs in Colditz.

Soloists featured are the cornets in *I Know Him So Well*, the piccolo in the *Bourrée* from *Terpsichore*, trombone in the Abba song *I Wonder*, and the clarinets

in the *Clarinet Polka*. Two items on side one celebrate the Irish connection with a little medley *Gaelic Hotpot* and the Celtic tune *When You and I Were Young Maggie*, while the old cavalry element is captured in the German *Kurfürsten Reitermarsch* and the *Regimental Slow and Quick Marches*.

As is usual the band goes fairly pop on side two, which is just one of the consequences of restricted numbers, although I don't suppose the troops mind; the classics are more or less out.

A medley from the *Rocky* films, another of *Barry Manilow's* hits, and yet another from outer space epics in *Where No Man Has Gone Before* may not attract older band buffs but they are played with some degree of restraint compared with the pop world's versions.

In fact the only little cavil I would have about the programme as a whole is that it is perhaps a bit too laid back.

All Skins should have a copy of this disc, of course, and all comers will find it a good one for the record rack.

# Another silk purse

## THE ROAD TO THE ISLES

KENNETH Alford's old band (he was bandmaster of the Argylls as F J Ricketts before transferring to the Royal Marines) makes a welcome appearance in the recording studio, and I find most of my remarks about the 5th Royal Inniskilling Dragoon Guards apply here. The Argylls make a silk purse out of a sow's ear and nonsense of my remark that the classics are more or less out!

Not only do they give a skilled performance of the whole of Gustav Holst's *Moorside Suite* arranged from the brass band score by Mr Lamb but the Pantomime movement from James Curnow's *Partita* and a saucy version of Bach's *Toccata in D Minor*, the one featured in Walt Disney's *Fantasia*.

All played with verve and a fine sparkle not always encountered from some "better" (bigger, anyway) bands.

The "Scottishry" is not overdone, there being an opening march by Jimmy Howe based on *Road To The Isles*, an

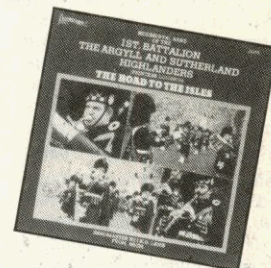
American's *Impressions of a Scottish Air* (Annie Lawrie), *Tartan Tuba* by Duncan Beat, and the *Regimental Slow and Quick Marches*, the latter being Alford's *The Thin Red Line*, and commemorating the part played by some regiment or other in a battle somewhere.

Urbach's great march *Thro' Bolts and Bars* for the Military Provost Staff Corps, a rare soprano saxophone solo in the TV theme *Mistral's Daughter*, a trombone solo *A Nightingale Sang in Berkeley Square*, the Russian folksong *Kalinka*, and two of Ted Huggens's popular pieces make up the programme.

Ray Woodfield's arrangement of *Kalinka* is almost as exciting as my version of it as a xylophone duet, while Ted Huggens (real name Henk van Lyndschuten or something similar) can always be relied upon for quality light music; his pieces are *Pavane in Blue* and a lively *Fascinating Drums* featuring even more than the kitchen sink.

Ten out of ten for all 24 of you.

# In defence of Orde Wingate, target for historians

THE most controversial Allied commander of the Second World War, Major-General Orde Wingate, whose career culminated with the Chindit expeditions into Burma in 1943 and 1944, has attracted, as the author of *Orde Wingate and the Historians* declares, "extremes of admiration and dislike."

Wingate was killed in an air crash on March 24, 1944 and in the absence of any self-defence, Brig Peter Mead's latest book is an objective appraisal of Wingate's Chindit campaign, correcting historians who have "more frequently slandered than praised."

In a foreword, Wing Commander Sir Robert Thompson, who took part in Wingate's Burma campaigns, writes: "What would the effect have been if two days after the D Day landings in Normandy in 1944 two German airborne divisions had landed in central southern England and blocked several of the main roads to the south coast ports?"

"No analogy is exact but that is roughly what Wingate did in North Burma."

It is for this unorthodox military adventure that Wingate is remembered, but there were other campaigns in which he was the leading light: the organisation and leadership of the Anglo-Jewish Special Night Squads in Palestine between 1936 and 1939, and the command of Gideon Force in the 1941 invasion of Ethiopia. Peter Mead gives accounts of these campaigns which undoubtedly did much to mould Wingate's attitudes and personality.

What are the accusations made by historians against Wingate which have prompted the compilation of this defence? To quote the author: "By 1961, it is interesting to note, the precis issued to Staff College students had become distinctly anti-Wingate and contained

some unfounded, but now familiar, charges:

- The idea of strongholds took such a firm hold on Wingate that he more or less abandoned the principle of co-operating with main forces;
- Lightly armed long range penetration columns were in consequence called on to do things for which they were not intended;
- Wingate became obsessed with the capture of Indaw;
- Wingate abandoned his own precepts, not attacking prepared positions and not establishing strongholds in accessible places.

Three appendices are in the form of appreciations by such eminent men as Wavell, Slim and Mountbatten, while the

final appendix is the author's suggestion for a statement from the Government correcting *The History of the Second World War - The War Against Japan - Volume III* in regard to the "treatment of the personal and military reputation of Major-General O C Wingate DSO."

Peter Mead makes a strong case for the vindication of Wingate and if the book does not achieve its objectives of having the official history amended, the accusations and prejudices have at least been countered in a scholarly fashion. - BJ

## How air support was won

BETWEEN the two World Wars the Royal Navy, the Army and the Royal Air Force planned separately to be ready to defend the nation.

The Army knew that HM warships and transports would be available, as always before, to convey their formations across the seas, to protect them en route and to back up their landings.

They expected that the RAF would support them as necessary on land, as their fledgling Royal Flying Corps had done in a minor way in the First World War. It did not work out like that.

The newly matured RAF had expanded dramatically since its formation in 1918 and considered that it had a primary role of its own.

When war came in 1939 the Chief of the Imperial General Staff failed in all his endeavours to acquire full air support and the Army had to make do with insufficient aircraft, mostly obsolescent.

Lack of adequate air support brought reversals and defeats.

By the end of 1942 a new conception, a tactical air force, had been invented, formed, equipped and trained. From that date the Army seldom lost a battle and never a campaign.

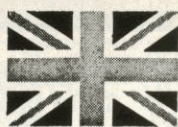
These things came about only through close liaison between the Army and the RAF. Individual Army officers worked alongside and shared the secrets of air staff in operations rooms and made their presence a necessity.

One such was Charles Carrington, who advanced his age to fight in 1918 and found himself over age for an active unit in 1939. He was posted to Bomber Command where he had a desk alone, a wall map, a car and contact with all Army formations.

His experiences and the inner workings of this immense RAF organisation make good reading and provide an insight into a function that has been little recorded. - GRH

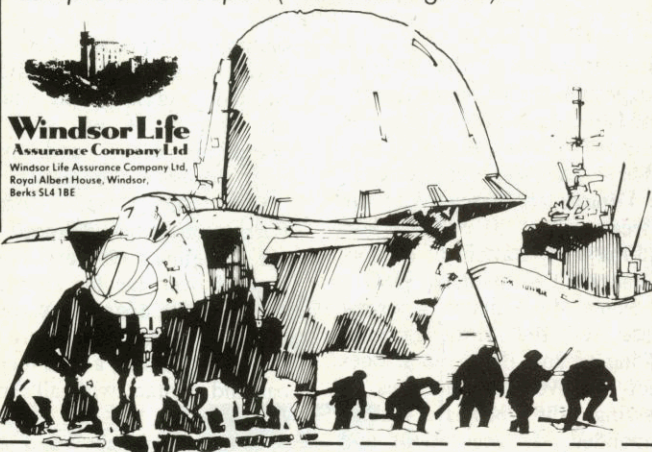

now Brig Gen Trenchard, thanking them for their work in battle.

It went on: "Throughout these operations the RFC have gallantly maintained the splendid record they have achieved since the commencement of the campaign."

At that time there were just a dozen RFC squadrons on active service in France.

In February 1916, DH 2 pusher Scouts of 24 Sqn arrived in St Omer primarily to fight the "Fokker menace" which had emerged the previous summer. They were supplemented by FE 2Bs and French built Nieuports.

Air superiority was regained by May that year. But how it would change!

A decision was made to transfer, by August, fighter aircraft from corps squadrons and to concentrate them under Army wings, thereby causing a distinction between strategic offensive fighting and other RFC tasks.

As the fighting raged on the Somme that July - there were now 27 RFC squadrons in France - a Middle East brigade was formed in Egypt under Brig Gen William Salmond, concentrating units in Macedonia, Mesopotamia, Palestine and East Africa under one command.

During September the first German airship - the Schutte-Lanz 11 - was shot down at Cuffley, near Potters Bar, Herts, by Lt William Leefe-Robinson of No 39 (Home Defence) Sqn. He was awarded a VC.

In February 1917 a depot squadron was established at Rochford, Essex, for the training of night pilots and, subsequently, the first RFC night-bombing squadron, No 100, equipped with FE 2Bs went to France.

It was a bad month for the RFC. 120 aircraft were shot down.

By April, because of the attrition on the Western Front, pilots were being sent to the war zone with just 17 1/2 hours' flying instruction.

A London air defence area under Maj Gen Ashmore was formed with a trio of squadrons comprising Camels and Pups specifically for operation against Gotha daylight raids, but differences in policy still existed.

Prime Minister Lloyd George appointed a special committee to examine the whole position. On the committee was South African statesman, Gen Jan Smuts.

Its recommendation was for the establishment of an Air Ministry which would "control and administer all matters in connection with air warfare of every kind and work out arrangements for the amalgamation of the two air services."

A far-sighted report on

organisation said: "The day may not be far off when aerial operations with their devastation of enemy lands and destruction of industrial and populous centres on a vast scale may become the principal operations of war, to which the older forms of military and naval operations may become secondary and subordinate."

A school of aerial fighting was formed and a "balloon apron" installed round London. Separate zones were allocated for anti-aircraft guns and aircraft operations.

Enemy raids on England were beginning to interrupt munitions production and the 41st Wing, equipped with FE 2Bs, DH 4s and Handley-Page 0/400s under the command of Lt Col C Newall, was formed at Bainville-sur-Madon to bomb industrial targets in Germany.

During October 1917 squadrons were sent to the Italian Front to reinforce Italian forces. It was there that Lt Alan Jerrard, of 66 Sqn, won a VC.

The following month, the Air Force (Constitution) Bill 1917 was put to Parliament and on November 29, King George V gave his assent to the Air Force Bill.

Three days after the start of the Battle of Cambrai RFC aircraft dropped bombs on to anti-tank guns and strongpoints to make way for the advancing British tanks.

The final months of the RFC were drawing to a close.

On January 2, 1918, the Air Ministry was formed. Viscount Rothermere became the first Secretary of State for the Air Force.

In Salonika, the RFC flying SE 5As, Bristol Monoplanes and Camels was beginning to win superiority of the air on that distant front.

On January 28, two 44 Sqn Camels shot down a Gotha in flames. It is regarded as the first unqualified victory at night in combat between aircraft.

King George approved Viscount Rothermere's new designation and on April 1, 1918, the Royal Air Force was formed with the amalgamation of the RFC and the RNAS. On the same day the Women's Royal Air Force was also established.

Thus was formed the third fighting force of the UK.

In six hectic years aircraft numbers had leapt from 150 machines to 22,647.

Fus Danny Coyle (1 RWF) was stopped in the second round of his light-heavyweight bout with PO2 Marlon Simpkins (US Army).

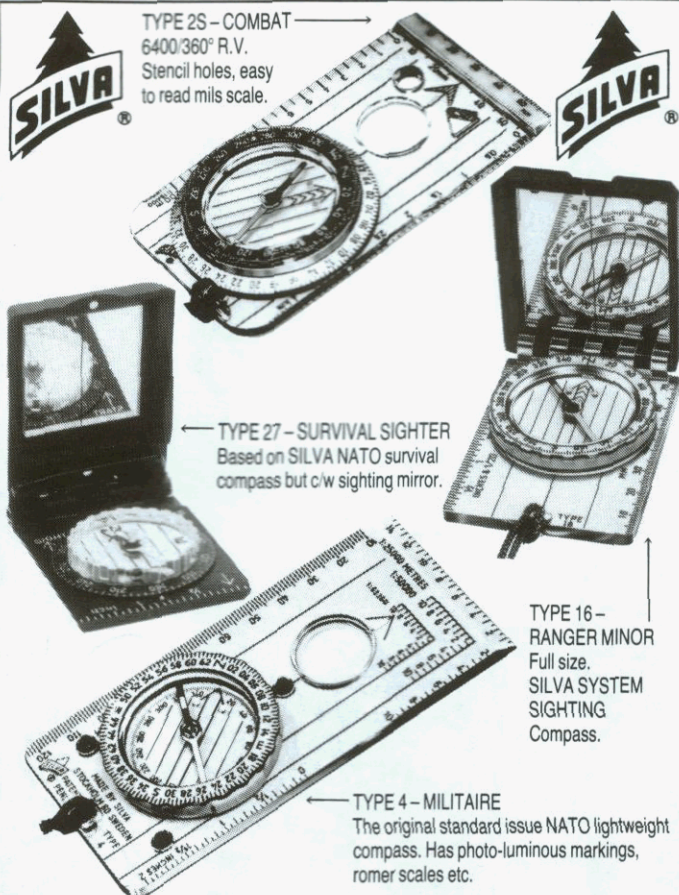

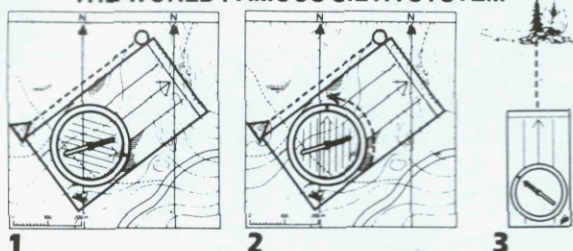

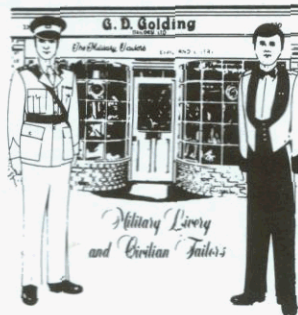
