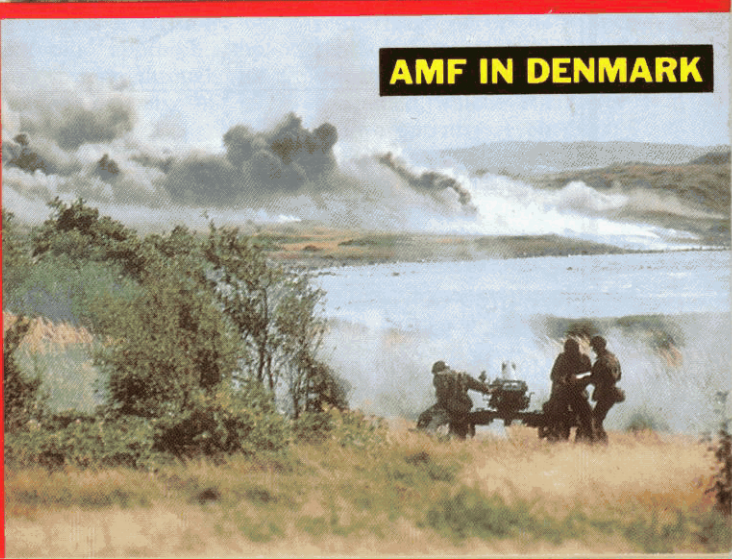

Cheaper mortgages

MORTGAGES at preferential rates will become available to full-time members of the Armed Forces on November 11.

Under the scheme, announced by Armed Forces Minister Archie Hamilton at the end of the defence debate in

the House of Commons, discounts will be honoured for the duration of the mortgage and will not depend on continued employment in the Services.

The preferential scheme will be operated by a leading financial institution, details of

which can be obtained from unit admin offices. Potential borrowers need not give details of their rank to the institution, and will be asked to use a private address if possible.

They can approach the building society through its head office or any of its

branches located throughout Britain.

Any full-time member of the Armed Forces is eligible to apply for a new mortgage or a re-mortgage of up to 95 per cent of the purchase price or valuation of the property concerned, whichever is lower.

Two options are on offer:

- A discount of 0.75 per cent off the society's prevailing private house dwelling rate for the term of the mortgage; or

District revamp begins

REORGANISATION of the British Army's district structure as a result of Options for Change has begun with the amalgamation of North-West and Western Districts.

They are to be joined on November 29 by Wales, creating Wales and Western District under the command of Maj Gen Peter Bonnet and based at Shrewsbury.

Under the shake up, Headquarters North West District at Fulwood Barracks in Preston has been downgraded to 42 (North West) Brigade under the command of Brig Euan Morrison.

Staff from 42 (Infantry) Brigade in Chester Castle have moved to Fulwood Barracks.

Wales and Western District will consist of:

- 42 (North West) Brigade based at Preston.
- 143 (West Midlands) Brigade based at Shrewsbury.
- 160 (Wales) Brigade based at Brecon.

A new Eastern District to replace the existing Eastern and North-East Districts will become effective next April. Announcing the change during the debate on the defence cuts, Armed Forces Minister Archie Hamilton said the new headquarters would be located in York.

He also confirmed that London District will remain unchanged.

Farewell to Soltau

THE BRITISH Army will stop exercising on the Soltau-Luneberg training area by mid-1994.

Under new agreements reached with the German Government, the withdrawal

will begin next year with the exclusion of the military from a major area south west of Luneburg, and a substantial extension of the summer break.

In 1993 the Army will withdraw from east of Bundesautobahn 7 and the extended summer break, designed to protect flora and fauna, will be maintained.

In the final phases of the withdrawal, all military training on the 130-square mile Soltau-Luneberg area will cease by mid-1994. The British Army will be allowed to exercise on German training grounds.

During Exercise Certain Shield, the Commander-in-Chief BAOR, Gen Sir Peter Inge, told SOLDIER that the Army would be happy to give up Soltau if adequate training space could be found elsewhere. He said it was too early to say if extensive exercise areas formerly used by the Soviets in what was East Germany would be made available.

● A discount of 1 per cent off the society's private dwelling house rate for the first three years of the mortgage and a discount of 0.25 per cent for the remainder of the term.

Mortgages under the scheme will not be awarded automatically to Service personnel, but will depend upon the applicant satisfying the society of his credit-worthiness in the normal manner.

Borrowers will be required to open a savings account with the society out of which mortgage repayments must be made. A choice of repayment methods is

available - endowment policy, capital and interest repayment, pension plan or personal equity plan (PEP).

When an application is made, the society will require formal confirmation of details such as earnings and length of service from the applicant's local pay office.

The scheme does not apply to mortgages taken out in Northern Ireland, where a preferential rate is already available.

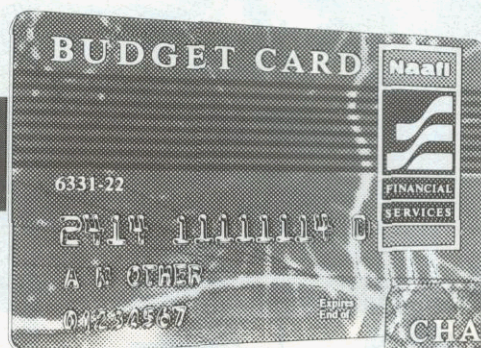
The decision to take out a mortgage under the scheme rests with the individual, as it does with a mortgage taken out

with any other company. The Ministry of Defence has pointed out that it will regard the transaction as a private arrangement between building society and individual and will accept no liability.

The Inland Revenue is considering the tax implications of the lower mortgage rate, but it is thought that because of tax relief and concessions most people would be unaffected if it was decided the preferential rate was a taxable benefit.

Service personnel will usually be allowed to let property mortgaged under the scheme, but need to tell the society.

Yorks make Merlin magic

MILITARY skills of Territorial Army soldiers serving with 15 Infantry Brigade were tested to the full in a two-day competition on Catterick Training Area.

Code-named Martial Merlin, the exercise involved 560 competitors in 44 teams from as far afield as Liverpool, Sheffield and Morpeth. Nearly 400 staff were involved.

Tests included first aid, communications, shooting, field craft, map reading and a tactical water crossing followed by a difficult seven-hour night navigation exercise through 22 check points across the moors.

Final stage was a gruelling early morning 6km speed march.

The Martial Merlin Trophy, donated by Scottish and Newcastle Breweries, was presented by Maj Gen Mike Walker, GOC North East District and 2nd Infantry Division to B Company, 2nd Battalion, Yorkshire Volunteers from Hull.

First three places in the final run were filled by the 4th Battalion, The Parachute Regiment (V), which also claimed second and third places in the overall results.

Newton Aycliffe-based 223 Field Ambulance RAMC (V)

won the medical section of the competition.

The exercise was visited by Gen Sir John Waters, C-in-C UKLF.

Brigade Commander Brig Anthony Leask, said: "As a Regular Commander, it gives me a great deal of satisfaction to know that the TA soldier is every bit as fit for his role in the defence of this country as his Regular Army counterpart.

"Martial Merlin has been a very testing exercise and all the competitors, wherever their placings in the final results, can be proud of their achievements this weekend."

Scots petition House

CAMPAIGNERS petitioning against the amalgamation of Scottish regiments under Options for Change handed in boxes containing more than 800,000 signatures to the House of Commons during the Armed Services debate.

Under the defence cuts four regiments are to be amalgamated and one, the 2nd Battalion, Scots Guards, is to go into suspended animation.

The Keep Our Scottish Battalions campaign is fighting to stop the merger of The Royal Scots with The King's Own Scottish Borderers, and The Queen's Own Highlanders with The Gordon Highlanders.

Trainees create a haven

TRAINEE sappers have completed a two-year landscaping project that has transformed Oakington Barracks in Cambridgeshire.

In Exercise Forest Oak, 230 trainees from the Royal School of Military Engineering, Chatham, moved 120,000 cubic metres of material.

Eventual result will be a lake in pleasant surroundings which, as well as providing a training ground for members of the Royal Engineers, will create leisure facilities and a waterborne training area for the resident 1st Battalion, The Royal Highland Fusiliers.

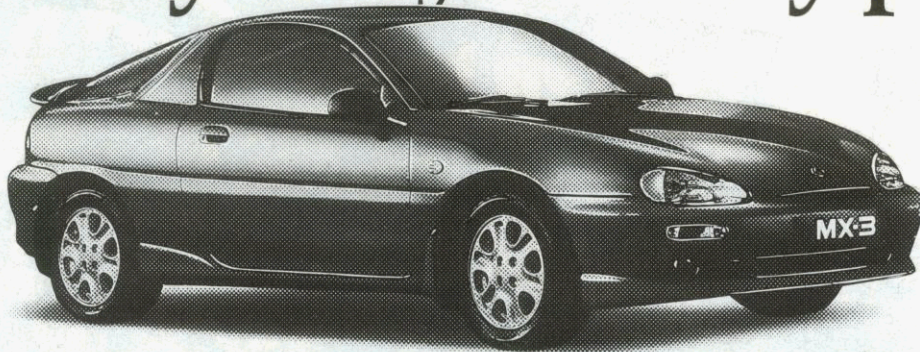
It will also be a haven for wildlife similar to a previous project at Bassingbourn, which has a lake stocked with 5,000 fish and is popular with many wildfowl species.

Gurkha brigade celebrates golden jubilee

MASSED Gurkha Pipes and Drums celebrated the golden jubilee of the Hong Kong-based 48 Gurkha Infantry Brigade by performing in front of a backdrop depicting the brigade's present units and past activities.

The 50th anniversary was

marked at Borneo Lines, Sek Kong, with an elaborate musical pageant which included the bands of the 1st Battalion, The Royal Regiment of Wales, the Brigade of Gurkhas, and the Royal Hong Kong Regiment (The Volunteers), as well as the Pipes and

Drums of four Gurkha units.

The brigade was formed in India in 1941 under Brig Sir John Smyth VC. Soldiers attached to the 48 Brigade won five Victoria Crosses during the Burma campaign. In 1954, after five years' service in the Malaya Emergency, 48 Brigade

moved to its present home at Sek Kong in Hong Kong's New Territories. More than 90 different units from the Royal Armoured Corps, the Royal Artillery, the Infantry and other arms and services have been a part of its order of battle.

Colony workmen unearth muzzle loaders

CONTRACTORS constructing an underground car park on the western fringes of Wan Chai on Hong Kong Island have unearthed a battery of 19th century guns which were once part of the defences of the fledgling colony.

In Hong Kong's early days as a British possession the site, next to the headquarters of the Royal Hong Kong Police, was known as Wellington Battery. It was one of the gun emplacements that flanked the settlement in what are now the Central and Western Districts.

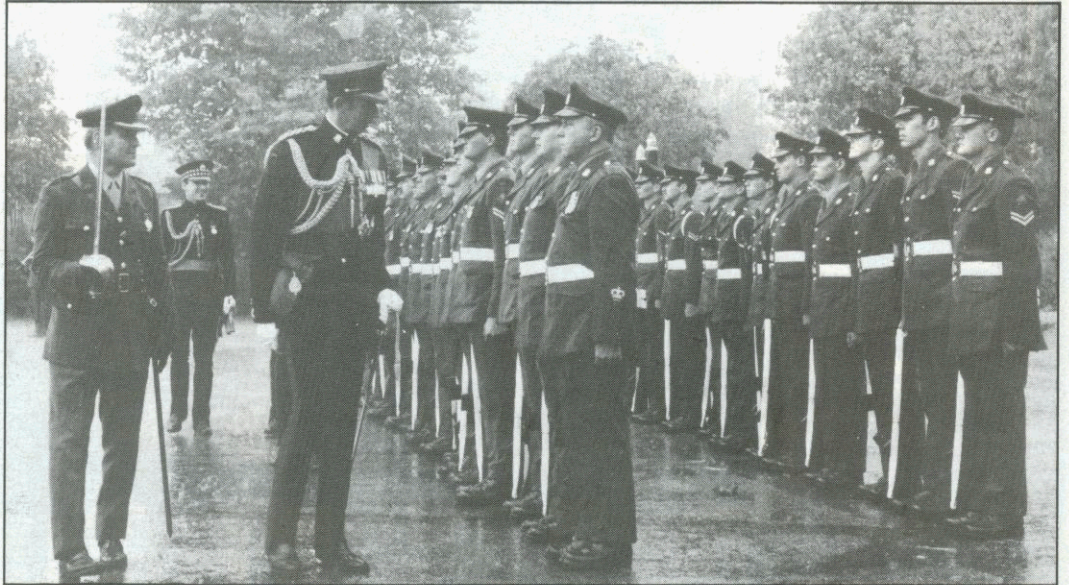
The first gun to be dug up was a 12-ton rifled muzzle-loader with a calibre of nine inches. Lt Col Herbert Abela, one of the few artillery officers at HQ British Forces, said it appeared to be of a type first issued in the late 1860s.

An Army vehicle recovery team from 50 Hong Kong Workshop, REME supervised its loading on to a truck provided by the Queen's Gurkha Engineers.

Soon afterwards, workmen found three more small muzzle-loading guns with a seven inch calibre.

What the guns were doing buried in the ground is a matter of speculation. One theory is that they were dumped as obsolete and used as landfill when the area in front of Wellington Battery was reclaimed from the sea late last century.

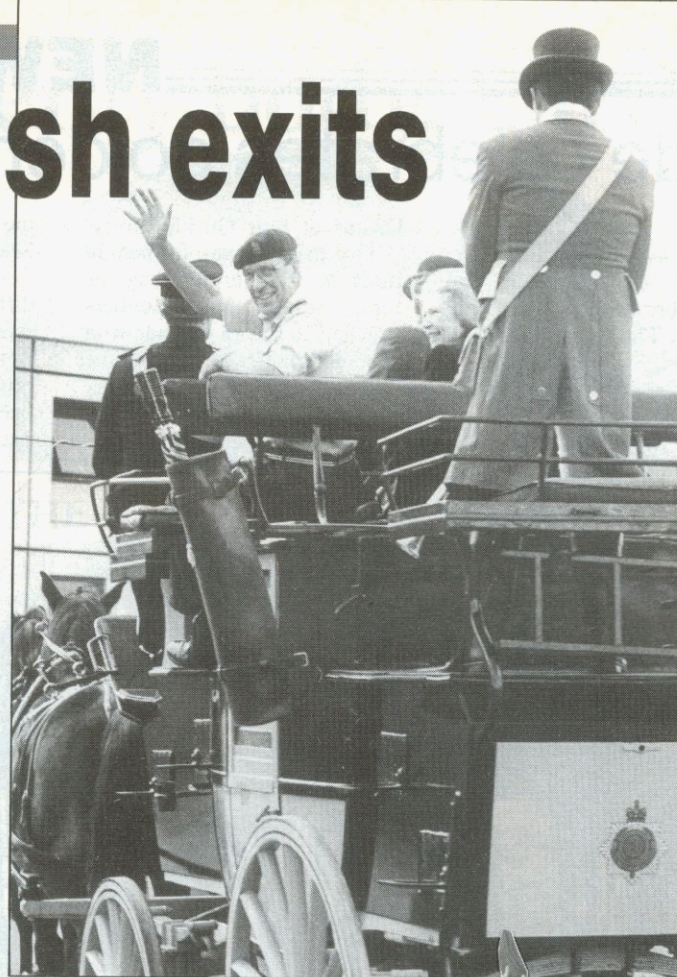
The parade was attended by the Colonel of the Regiment, Lt Gen Sir John Wilsey, currently GOC Northern Ireland, and the new Colours were consecrated by the Rev John Vernon, Senior Chaplain to the Forces, South West District.

And at Shrewsbury, Lt Col **Nick Jenkins** rode out in a 1925 Rolls Royce Silver Phantom at the end of three years in command of the 5th (Shropshire and Hereford) Battalion, The Light Infantry. His next appointment is in HQ Western District.

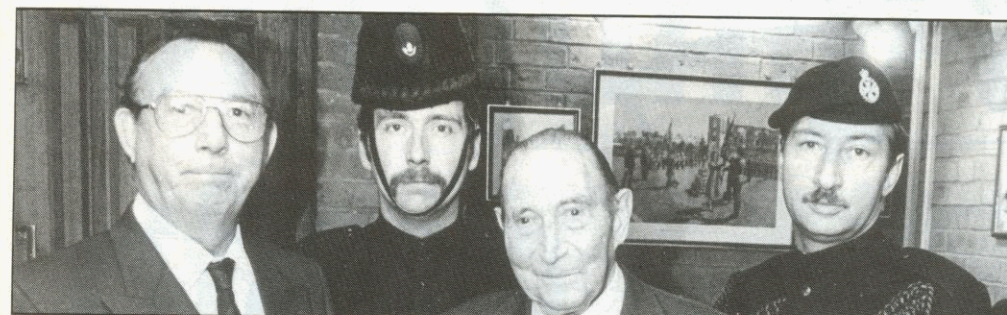


Centenarian Joe's story

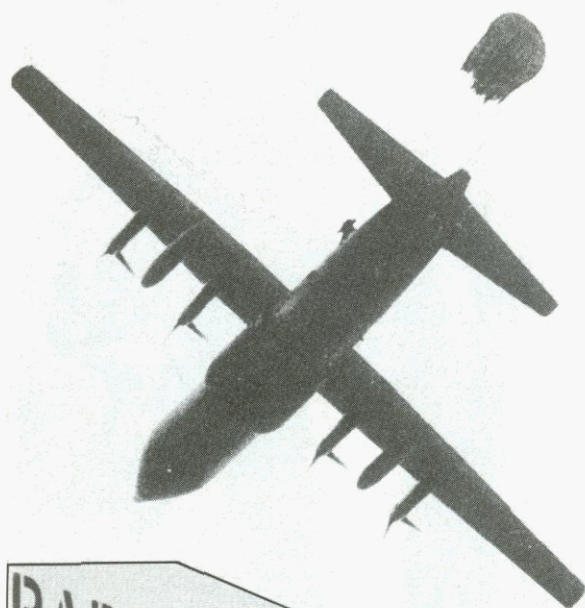

Brize Norton's PCAU aims to keep . . .

One jump ahead of the enemy

IF A parachutist cannot get his act together within minutes of landing in hostile country, he may as well have gone by bus, say the staff of the Parachute Course Administrative Unit (PCAU) at RAF Brize Norton.

The whole purpose of being dropped is surprise and speed, principles which have not changed since the first trainees received their coveted parachute wings at Ringway Airport, Manchester, in 1940.

More than 166,000 trainees have now experienced the stomach-lurching plummet, the bliss of a properly deployed 'chute, and the fierce pride on receiving their wings.

The PCAU is an 11-man detachment from the Parachute Regiment Depot, responsible for liaison between No.1 Parachute Training School and the three Services. On the 1,000th Basic Parachute Course this summer were 13 different cap badges ranging from Royal

Marines and Army Catering Corps to the RAF Regiment.

The unit can accommodate 180 on its courses, which include a two-week adventure training free-fall course, the popular two-day water jump open to any soldier or civil servant, and military high altitude free-fall and steerable courses for recce troops and other specialists.

At Brize Norton the RAF teaches soldiers to parachute and the PCAU teaches them how to apply that skill to the battlefield.

Commanded for the first time by a non-Para, Maj Keith McQuilton, REME, the PCAU works closely with No 1 Parachute Training School, whose RAF Parachute Jump Instructors have a thoroughly professional approach which quickly wins the trainees' approval.

So does their black humour: "If the reserve chute doesn't deploy don't worry, the ground will arrest your fall," is a typical example.

Wings are won only after the student has mastered the more exacting discipline of military parachuting, not just the art of parachuting.

It is not a sport, explained Sgt Bob Ferguson. "It is not fun, and when you have stood there for ages in the heat with all the kit on you can't get out quickly enough."

Dropping from 800ft does not leave much time for reflection. Another 500 parachutists can be in the air about you, and there is no guarantee that the 60ft radius the planners have allocated you will not be invaded by another parachutist.

It is best to avoid him as he

could be carrying up to 120lb of kit. Trainees start with clean fatigue jumping, with no equipment. After three jumps from an aircraft some pieces are strapped to them – like a regular jerrycan filled with stones for weight.

For operations they are so loaded down with three days' worth of kit and ammunition that they can hardly move.

"This is why para selection is so rigorous and why only the toughest soldiers can achieve it," said RSM Barry Norman, a man with long practical experience including Goose Green, where he was with Lt Col H Jones when he was killed.

"Realistically you wouldn't go in with much less, but we are now at the maximum limit. We have had lads taken off parachuting because their own weight combined with their kit was too heavy."

Heavy equipment is no problem for Pte Diane Butler, one of the three red beret drivers on the staff. When she was posted in she had no thoughts of parachuting, but then decided to do the free-fall course.

In bright overalls, trainers and a teeny parachute, she can enjoy the delights of parachuting without all the hassle the men have to go through.

"I did the water jump and loved it, and I want to do it again. You don't need to be able to swim and you don't feel the cold water because you're so hyped up and enjoying it," she said.

"Hanging underneath a parachute is an absolute joy," said Maj McQuilton, "but getting there can be extremely uncomfortable. You can hardly move, your stomach's going because it's low level, and it's hot and stuffy and extremely cramped."

"With a full aircraft load the PJs need more time to get you ready, which means standing up for a long time. Believe me, there are times when you are praying just to get out."

Carrying the kit and jumping is the easy bit. Fighting the battle at the other end is what they have come for.

Dropping zone drills are the most important part of the course, and if the trainees don't get them right on the playing fields of Brize, the mission will fail when it comes to landing in the dark under fire.

LET'S TAKE IT A STEP AT A TIME

AT RAF Brize Norton the operational dimension of parachuting is introduced only after the basics have been learned. All potential trainees must pass the All Arms Pre-Parachute Selection (P Company) at Depot Para in Aldershot to establish their stamina, determination and sense of humour. They will need all three.

The Basic Parachute Course comprises four weeks of ground training in flight, landing and aircraft drills. Some training devices are like fairground thrills – or instruments of torture.

Trainees progress from a mock Hercules fuselage and

ramp to a "wheel trainer" from which they are suspended, swung, then released to perform a controlled or (as it is more realistically termed) "sack of spuds" landing.

Learning how to exit correctly leads to the first proper jump: from a cage suspended 800ft up under a close relative of a Second World War barrage balloon. By now, reactions to the command "GO" are becoming instinctive. If the confidence-building measures have not yet instilled this, or the trainee unwisely looks down, this is when he might decide that jumping is not for him.

He might be convinced of this as he plummets 200ft, the longest three seconds of his life, they say, until a static line opens the parachute and an indescribable sense of relief floods over him. He promptly reviews the situation, and decides to stay for the real thing . . . from an aircraft.

The noise, smell of fuel, smell of mates and the slipstream enter the equation as the queue of students congas to the door.

Sticks of six leaping from one door every second are increased to sticks of nine. Then comes a staggered exit from both sides, followed by the whole "Chalk"

of 90 when training has been completed.

Next on the agenda is the night descent, with its added interest of the jumper being unable to see the ground.

All this is to no avail if, when the troops have landed, they cannot move quickly to their objective. Planning the chalks tactically is essential if all the vital eggs are to go into one basket.

"Up to now it has all been in a nice, clean training environment, with lots of room and lots of time," says Maj McQuilton. "With operational jumping we say what it is really about: a nasty, uncomfortable time."

Kings Own Border on jungle assignment

WHILE the spotlight was on 1 Armoured Division in the Gulf, the 1st Battalion, The King's Own Royal Border Regiment, was preparing under winter conditions for a six-month tour in Belize.

It flew out in April to take over from 1st Battalion, The Gloucestershire Regiment the many patrol, observation post and guard duties that make up the Infantry Battalion's commitment to British Forces Belize.

Priority was to train everyone to survive and fight in the tropics. Two jungle warfare schools were set up and run by a team of officers and NCOs who had attended the Jungle Warfare Instructor's Course in Brunei.

"In many ways the environment is much harsher than in Brunei," said Capt Damian Taylor, who ran Jungle Warfare School North. "The jungle is denser and it is hotter and more humid. At least there are no leeches in Belize."

Soldiers quickly adapted to the conditions, although the first night out under the jungle canopy in a hammock was for many an unnerving experience.

The battalion was split among four locations. Based at Rideau Camp in the south was Headquarters and a rifle company. Another rifle company lived in splendid isolation at Salamanca Camp, an old

loggers camp cut out of the jungle, while Support Company spent the whole tour at Holdfast Camp, in the more open farmland in the centre of Belize.

The other rifle company worked at Airport Camp alongside the rest of British Forces Belize.

A soldier's life in Belize is varied. When not on patrol, he may be guarding Harrier hides, manning a border observation post or adventure training on the Caribbean coast.

There is, though, a requirement to keep a permanent patrol presence on the ground. Section and platoon strength patrols go out on foot, having been dropped by helicopter, or travel in boats or by vehicle for up to a fortnight, visiting villages and checking tracks along the border. This is an excellent opportunity for junior commanders to practise their leadership skills and to carry out realistic training as well as doing their operational tasks.

"I thoroughly enjoyed the patrols," said Lt Ed Waterhouse of Burma Company. "We plan them ourselves and, with a bit of preparation, we set up our own live firing ranges. There is no chance to do that in the UK."

The Rideau company provided manpower for two observation posts in the south. Cadenas OP is set on an isolated

hill overlooking the Guatemalan border and Hunting Cay is on an idyllic Caribbean island covering the eastern sea approaches – surely the best outpost in the whole British Army.

Lt Col Tim Jarvis-Bicknell, commanding officer, believes Belize is the ideal environment for a man to come to terms with himself and for teaching young, inexperienced commanders what leadership really entails.

"For the battalion, it has provided a unique opportunity for us all to get to grips with hard, rigorous and realistic training, and to appreciate the importance of All Arms and tri-Service co-operation."

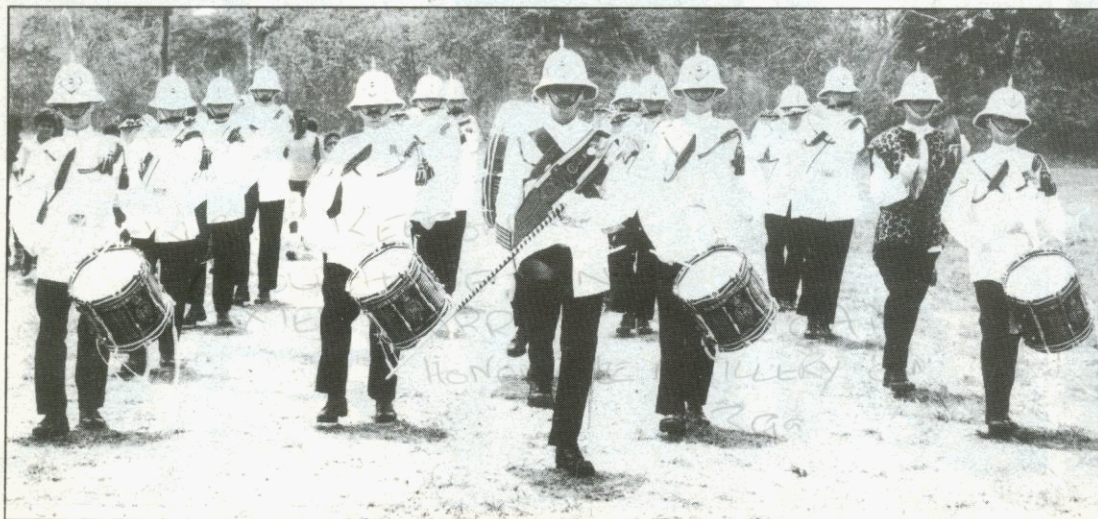
In addition to the main operational tasks, 1 Kings Own Border became closely involved with the civil community. The Regimental Band and the Corps of Drums played at ceremonial occasions and village fairs.

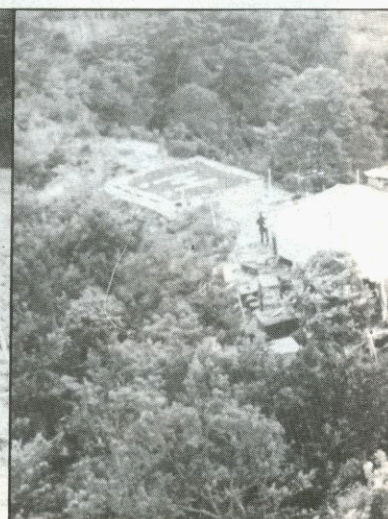
Soldiers enjoyed the facilities provided by the battalion's adventure training centre at

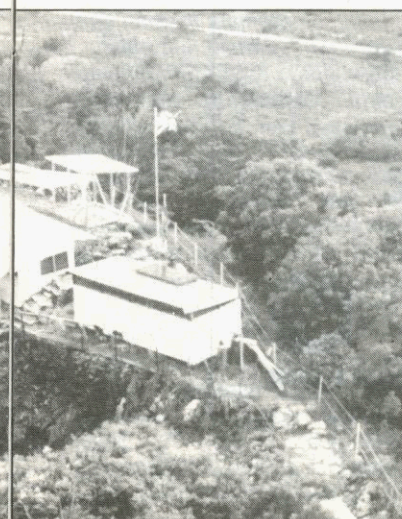
Last month Kings Own Border handed over to 7th Gurkha Rifles. The battalion's next trip abroad is a six-week exercise in Kenya in February.



The regimental corps of Drums performing at the Belizean Agricultural Fair at Belmopan

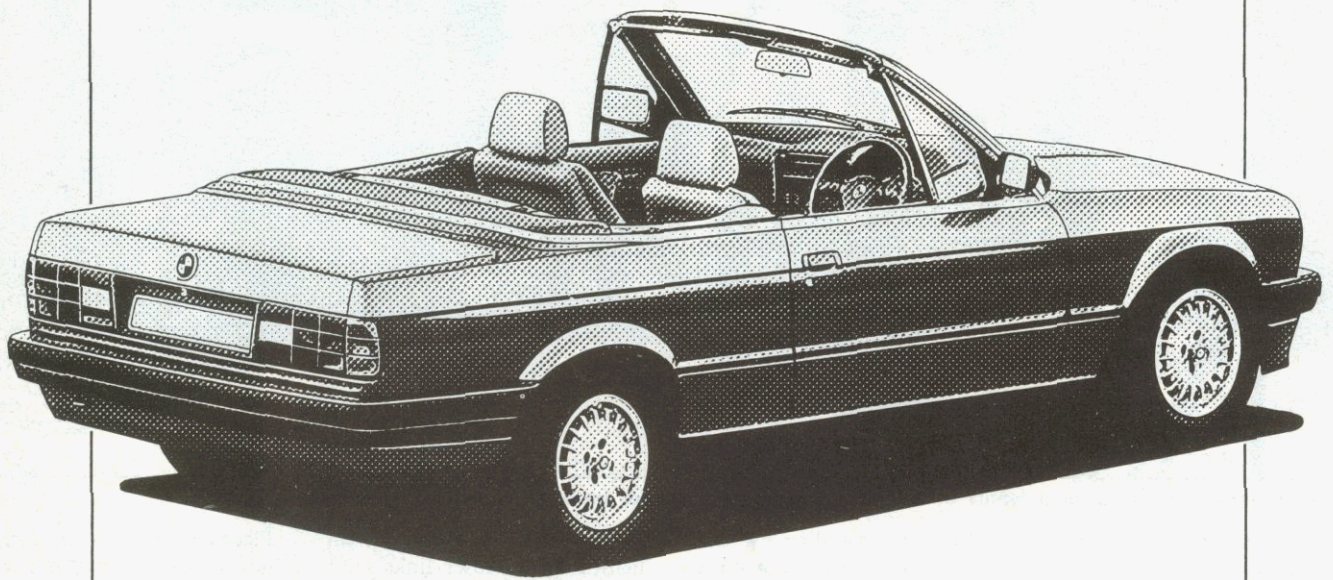

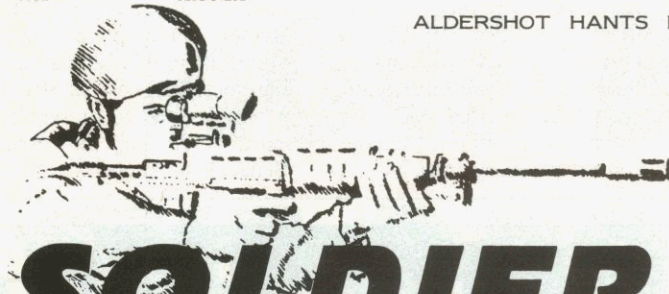

THE TROPHY DRUM

Going for Gold

THE only Territorial Army unit taking part in Exercise Certain Shield was The Royal Yeomanry, whose predecessors have for the past 200 years demonstrated their loyalty to the Crown, writes Laurie Manton.

During that time it has suppressed riots, quelled mutinies and fought with distinction in two world wars. On Certain Shield things were different . . . the regiment found itself under the command of an enemy force.

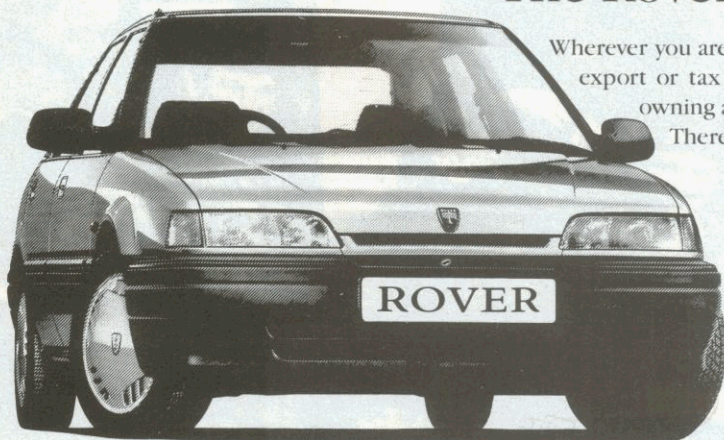

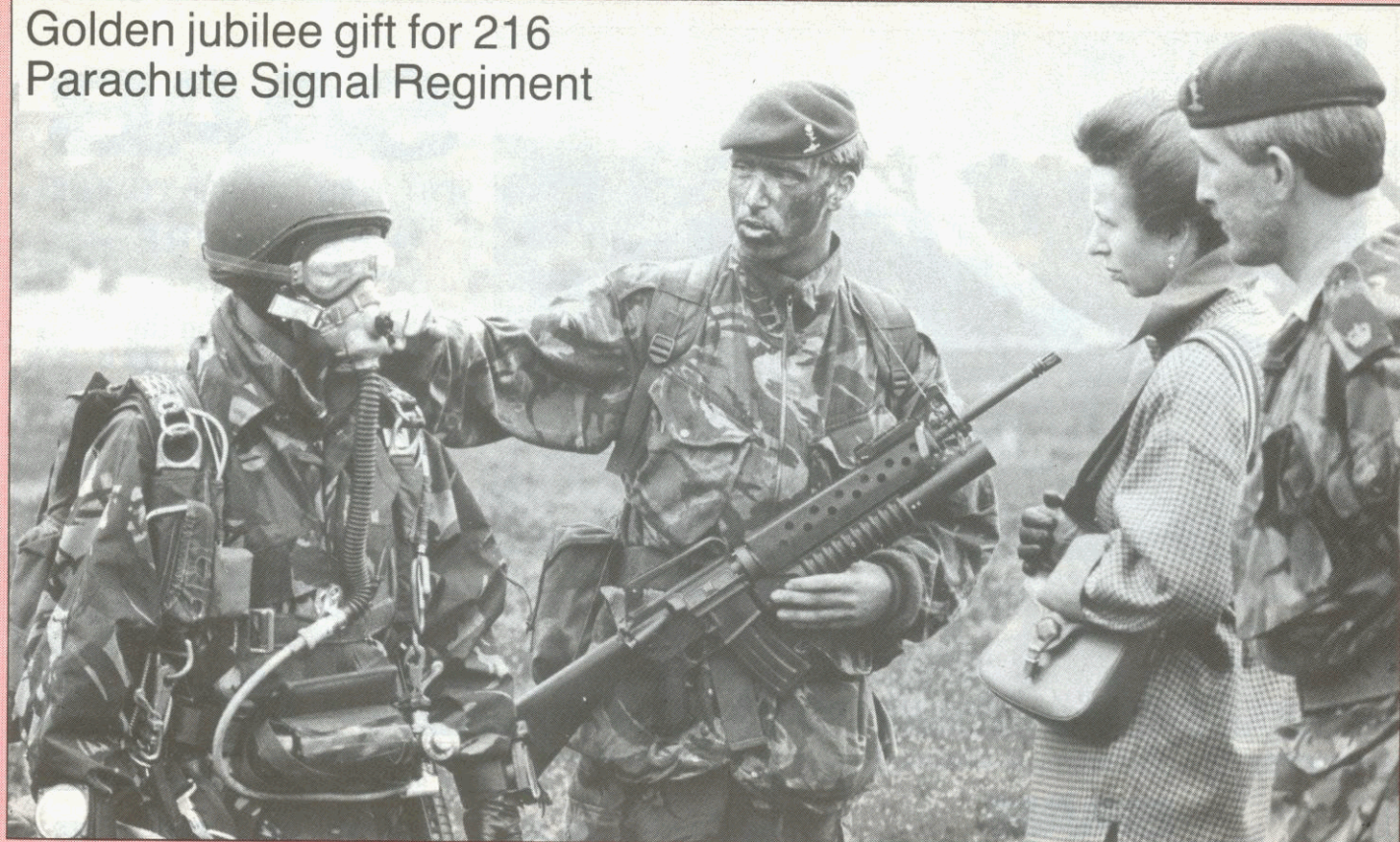

Golden jubilee gift for 216 Parachute Signal Regiment

Airborne signallers get their name back

WHEN the Princess Royal visited 5 Airborne Brigade Headquarters and Signal Squadron at Hankley Common near Aldershot she took a keen interest in the specialised gear worn by LCpl Steve Brown.

His face mask and breathing apparatus marked him as a member of the elite, 31-strong Pathfinders unit, equipped with a high altitude-low opening parachute.

The Pathfinders, drawn from a variety of cap badges, work ahead of 5 Airborne Brigade, marking out dropping zones and carrying out recce tasks. To reduce their chances of alerting the enemy they jump from 25,000 ft, opening their GQ 360 ramair 'chutes just 2,500 ft above the ground.

LCpl Brown's equipment included an M16 rifle, two altimeters, an oxygen mask and bottle containing a ten-minute supply, and a rucksack of

specialised equipment weighing 135lb.

The Princess Royal, who watched a display of airborne communication skills, visited the squadron to mark its 50th anniversary. The squadron was formed in 1941 and is directly descended from the 1st and 6th

Airborne Divisional Signal Regiments.

Subsequently renamed 216 Squadron (the 1 and 6 denoting its origins), the title was suspended on the formation of Field Force Headquarters in 1976. Now, as a 50th birthday present, the Royal Corps of

Signals has granted it permission to call itself 216 Parachute Signal Squadron.

Its full title is 5 Airborne Brigade Headquarters and Signal Squadron (216 Parachute).

The change of name was announced by the Master of Signals, Maj Gen Archie Birtwhistle, at the golden jubilee airborne signals reunion dinner on the evening of the Princess Royal's visit.

The Princess was met at Hankley Common by the Lord Lieutenant of Surrey, senior members of the Royal Corps of Signals, of which she is Colonel-in-Chief, and the squadron OC, Maj Ian Foxley.

She spoke to soldiers taking part in the display and later presented Long Service and Good Conduct Medals to SSgts John Richards and Andy Grattidge, both R Signals, and Sgt Chris Hamill, REME.

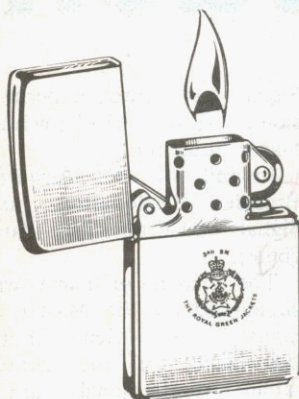

AMF fights on a united front

FLAGS of eight nations flew above the field headquarters of the Allied Command Europe (ACE) Mobile Force during Exercise Action Express 91 in Denmark in an impressive display of Nato solidarity, writes **Capt Chris Robinson**.

The host nation had brought the three-week long exercise package together with the help of Belgium, Canada, Germany, Italy, Luxembourg, the Netherlands, the UK and the USA to test the military and logistic capability of its forces.

A full scale artillery fire-power demonstration, with air support, got things started. Next day Queen Margrethe II visited a gruelling march and shoot competition for the Nato Challenge Cup.

That set the tone for Action Express 91, which became a highly publicised, keenly supported military spectacle for the Danish public.

AMF Commander Maj Gen Peter Carstens of the German Army remarked on the genuine welcome given to the AMF by their Danish hosts. "It is an indication of how firm such

nations stand in the Alliance," he said.

Following a big parade at Vearlose Air Base, near Copenhagen, the AMF moved in a day-long convoy to the southern Danish islands of Falster and Lolland to begin the combat phase.

The 1st Battalion, The Duke of Wellington's Regiment provided the British infantry focus for the land component, AMF(L). Among its exploits as "friendly forces" was digging-in, defending bridges, bringing down mortar fire, carrying out casualty simulation drills to test first aid skills, and continually repelling "enemy" attacks from forces dropped in by helicopter or by amphibious landing on the many beaches in the area.

Another vital component was provided by 249 Signal Squadron AMF(L). Its role was to supply and maintain Force-level communications to all AMF troops. Clansman radios were used by all, and the squadron's professionalism and reliability were highly praised. They also carried off the Non-Infantry Challenge Cup –

an achievement not lost on the Germans, whose Parachute Battalion teams won both the trophies for best team and overall winners.

One of the most impressive contributions to Action Express 91 was the British-led AMF(L) Logistic Unit from Bulford. It supplied everything from "compo" and fresh rations, equipment spares, ground and aviation fuels, ammunition, and vehicle repairs, to local contract facilities, administration – and even a field bakery.

Master Baker WO2 (SQMS) Peter King commented: "Denmark is a great place to exercise. I've been here a lot and they're very friendly and easy to work with – and fresh bread on exercise makes us very popular!"

Italian trucks were fixed by British and Belgian mechanics; Dutch ammunition technicians serviced American M16 rifles;

and German fuel suppliers poured thousands of litres of gasoline or diesel into a vast array of tracked and wheeled wagons. Co-ordinated by the British, the "loggies" demonstrated integration and interoperability to great advantage.

Two units serving in the Gulf War performed the same kind of function in the green and wet terrain of Denmark as they did in the deserts of northern Saudi Arabia, Iraq and Kuwait. C Squadron of 1st The Queen's Dragoon Guards was the

AMF recce unit, and 42 Squadron RCT was tasked as the Forward Logistic Support Unit (FLSC).

Other British units among the loggies included the Field Cash Office, Forces Post Office, and 16 Field Ambulance. Spiritual support was supplied by AMF's "vicar on a motorbike", Padre Geoff Sussex.

Time of change for the Sussex Gunners

TWO YEARS ago, our visit to the gunners of 26 Field Regiment, Royal Artillery coincided with the fall of the Berlin Wall. At the time the Gutersloh-based unit were looking forward to being the first unit in BAOR to replace its ageing Abbot guns with the new hard-hitting AS 90.

Since then, the Gulf War, the demise of the Warsaw Pact, and Options for Change have led to changes throughout the Royal Regiment of Artillery from which 26 Field is not exempt.

The Sussex Gunners have survived the cutbacks but will undergo a number of changes in the process. They will now be equipped with M109 self-propelled howitzers and are to lose their air defence capability.

Next summer 43 Air Defence Battery (Lloyd's Company) is to be posted back to the United Kingdom. It will re-form within 47 Field Regiment at Thorney

Island. The Hampshire-based regiment is to change to an air defence role in April 1993. BAOR-based 10 Air Defence Battery is also to be transferred to the new regiment.

Since returning from the Gulf, the men of 43 Battery have been kept busy repainting and refitting their Spartan APCs. A substantial number of them had been stripped of

internal Javelin missile storage racking so they could be used as replacement infantry vehicles in the War Maintenance Reserve.

During the war, 43 Battery reinforced 10 Air Defence Battery in 7 Armoured Brigade and 46 AD Battery in 4 Brigade. It also provided men as battle casualty replacements (BCRs) for V Battery, an air

defence BCR battery that was eventually to deploy in its own right.

Equipped with tracked and towed Rapier, and javelin aiming units, it provided air defence cover around the Forward Force Maintenance Area. In the event, V Battery was never called upon. Such was the air supremacy of the Allies that air defence never engaged the enemy.

Of the remaining three field batteries 17 (Corunna) Field Battery was split in half to bring 16 Field Battery (Sandham's Company) and 159 (Colenso) Field Battery up to war establishment.

For the role as the general support regiment, both gun batteries manned six M109 guns and an OP party for flank protection.

After a number of false starts, 26 Field Regiment finally went into action on February 21, bombarding a

variety of Iraqi positions including an infantry platoon, an anti-tank unit and a brigade command post.

The commanding officer, Lt Col Mark Corbet Burcher, described the moment thus: "At exactly 1215, the 12 guns opened up. It was the first time the regiment had fired in anger since the Second World War."

After they returned, 17 (Corunna) Field Battery spent five weeks in Canada with the British Army Training Unit at Suffield where they supported the 5th Royal Inniskilling Dragoon Guards battle group.

Battery commander Maj Charlie Ross said the training they did at BATUS was remarkably similar to how they had operated in the Gulf.

After the war, several members of the regiment received awards and commendations for bravery and meritorious service, including a Queen's Commendation for

Gunner survived direct hit

"I didn't hear the round hit. First I knew of it was when my vehicle commander, Bdr Terry York, tapped me on the shoulder and told me to get out because I was on fire.

"I leapt out of the driver's compartment with the back of my NBC suit ablaze. One of the REME lads extinguished it."

As the two men lay on the sand, another round hit a



Spartan just a short distance away.

"I actually saw it hit home. There was a pink flash and then it just exploded."

Gnr Sydenham continued the war on another vehicle but later went back in search of his possessions.

"The Spartan was wasted. There was a big hole in it as if a giant can-opener had ripped off the side. The roof was caved in and it was burnt out. A friend pulled out the remains of my SMG from the wreckage.

"All of my kit had been destroyed and all I had left was the uniform I was wearing."

Brave Conduct awarded to Bdr Robert Martin.

The citation in the London Gazette for Bdr Martin's gallantry award is the shortest in the list of Gulf awards, simply stating that he risked his life to ensure members of his detachment could escape when fire destroyed his field gun.

Col Corbet Burcher provided fuller details of the episode.

"We were practising night

raids, which was a new technique. It involved filling the whole gun with ammunition and sneaking forward at night to a firing point. Once there, we would blaze away and then scoot out again.

"The guns operated closed down to offer an element of protection, and it was during one such operation that the accident happened. It was the result of British ammunition

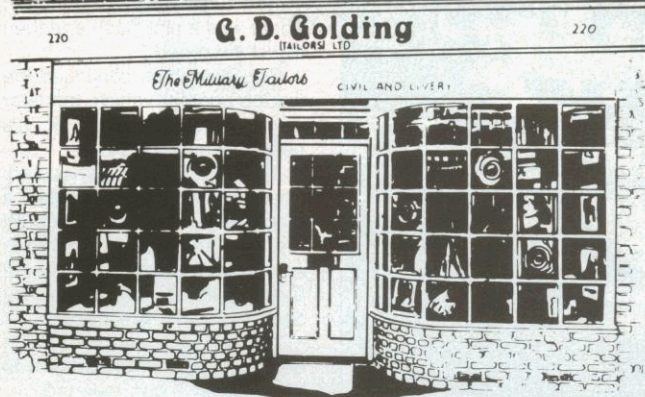
being slightly bigger than the American shells, and when the turret rotated, the pickup scraped over close to the top of the shells which were stacked at the back of the gun. A spark then arced across and ignited a charge bag."

One crewman leapt out of the front as the M109 "brewed up". Two others tried to get out of the rear door but it had

jammed. Bdr Martin could have jumped straight out of his own hatch, but did not.

"He went down and kicked open the door, and all three fell out of the back. In effect, he saved the two men because the turret then became a raging inferno," said Col Corbet Burcher.

The exploits of 26 Field Regiment during Operation Granby could fill a book. Indeed, they have, for the Gutersloh-based gunners have published their own informal diary of the war.

Described by one journalist as "the smallest and busiest British unit in the Gulf", the

regiment was the last to arrive and one of the first into action.

It played a prominent part in the deception plan which led the Iraqis to believe that the coalition forces would attack directly into southern Kuwait.

It was visited by a press party that included Kate Adie of the BBC, and filmed with the sea providing a background to the guns. Iraqi intelligence agents seeing the next day's press coverage would have been misled into believing that the 1 (UK) Armoured Division was massing to attack on the eastern coast near the border with Kuwait.

But the bulk of the Allied armies had moved under radio silence to a concentration area more than 200km to the west, beyond Wadi al Batin, close to the Iraqi border, from where the resulting attack took the Iraqi army by surprise.

Close encounters

THE war diary of 26 Field Regiment RA recounts many a story. One of the more humorous is the tale of a gunner sentry who one night observed what appeared to be a patrol of about 20 men carrying large backpacks, moving slowly and silently towards him.

He called out the password, but there was no reply. Before he could

open fire one of the "patrol" turned slightly, revealing its true shape, before spitting and grunting at the sentry. Another began to eat a set of webbing on the ground.

The camels moved on, but the regimental diarist was moved to log the incident as a close encounter of the herd kind.

How a dead camel left its mark

BRITISH Army formation badges are usually worn with pride and lend dignity to unit transport.

There was a time, however, when such a logo was seen as punishment.

Towards the end of 1943 King Farouk returned to Suez after visiting King Ibn Saud, who had given the Egyptian ruler six camels.

While being unloaded by 1003 Docks Company RE one of the camels fell out of the sling and broke its neck.

The CO of the Suez area decided the people concerned should be punished for such negligence and the vehicle plates were painted black with an upside-down camel picked out in yellow.

From then on when sappers congregated, the taunting cry was: "Who killed the camel." — Charles Meacher, Glenrothes, Fife.

No need to reduce regiments

THE furore about the amalgamation of certain regiments need never have arisen. Reducing numbers does not necessarily mean reducing regiments.

During the Second World War, a battalion strength was supposed to be 1,014. That figure was never reached; going into action, a battalion would be most fortunate to have 500 men or even four companies. The norm was for D Company to be the "filler" company and provide reinforcements to C Company.

So why not reduce companies to three, platoons to three, and sections to two. In time of need, reservists could always make up the extra numbers.

Historically British Army divisions have always been larger than those of allies or enemies. — John Clarke, Manchester.

Don't cut RAF Regt

UNDER the heading "Better ways to reduce Army" (September 30), W A West suggested that the RAF Regiment should disband and airfield defence should be taken over by the Infantry.

As a gunner in the RAF Regiment with over 11 years' service, I totally disagree, as I am sure many other gunners do too.

This special RAF trade does not just protect airfields and other installations against ground and low-level air attack. It also trains RAF personnel in ground defence and provides

advisers in a number of specialist fields.

Formed in February 1942, the RAF Regiment is fairly young. It nevertheless has seen active service — more recently in the Falklands in 1982 and in the Gulf this year when it deployed three squadrons for air defence as well as two CVRT squadrons and an element to helicopter support. Part of No 1 Squadron, RAF Regt pushed through into Kuwait with the rest of the Army units.

The RAF Regt provides air defence 365 days a year in the

Falklands as well as in Belize. It also has a squadron carrying out airfield defence in Northern Ireland, so that the Army can carry out IS duties without being too pushed for manpower.

The regiment also includes the Queen's Colour Squadron, one of the finest drill squadrons, and No 2 Squadron (Para), which exists for rapid overseas deployment.

RAF manpower as a whole is already being cut considerably with various flying squadrons already being or about to be disbanded, many of which have also seen active service in the Gulf.

As a result of Options for Change some squadrons of the regiment are to be disbanded as various overseas air bases close.

To disband the regiment altogether would mean that RAF manpower would suffer even more, so that the Army could keep some of its regiments. It would be like asking the Navy to disband the Commandos or the Army to disband the Paras. How would they feel? — Concerned gunner, RAF Brize Norton.

Bound for the archives

Arrival of SOLDIER here is always looked forward to and the magazine devoured with alacrity. I even use the advertisements to mail-order goods from the UK. Also I have resumed the practice I carried on prolifically when I was a teenager, namely cutting out

Good news for dependant employees ... What a bonus!

DEPENDANT employees in Germany are to receive a Christmas bonus this year, delegates at the third annual conference of the Federation of Army Wives (BAOR) at Bielefeld were told.

Mr David Jones, Civil Secretary to BFG, announced three positive steps in the improvement of dependant employment conditions:

- The Christmas bonus which will be three per cent of pay, paid at the end of November to all employees in the job for six months or more;

- With effect from October 1, dependant pay has been increased selectively to bring total earnings closer to Directly Employed Labour (DEL) pay - H Grades to receive up to four per cent more, K Grades up to five per cent more and C Grades up to ten per cent more;

- An end-of-service gratuity scheme will be introduced from January 1 under which dependant employees who have completed two years' service or more will be entitled to a third of a month's pay for each completed year of reckonable service.

Mr Jones said much had been done to bring dependant employees' pay and conditions in line with those offered to DELS.

The policy now was to employ dependants

wherever possible.

Commander Medical BAOR, Maj Gen Brian Mayes, spoke on changes in medical facilities planned for the next few years, including the closures of BMHs Hannover and Iserlohn, and the creation of forward out-patient clinics in outlying areas.

Gen Mayes said the Medical Services were determined to offer a high standard of primary and secondary health care based on the hospitals at Rinteln and Wegberg, the forward out-patient clinics, and local medical centres.

He hoped the shortfall of doctors and dentists would be rectified when the changes had been implemented.

Gen Mayes explained the implications of the Access to Health Records Act to Service families. Details would appear in a Defence Council Instruction.

FAW (BAOR) is hoping the issue to families in the UK of the new Services Personal Medical Record booklet will be extended quickly to those living in Germany.

The booklet, which belongs to the wife and will

travel with her from posting to posting, is intended to build up into a complete dossier of vaccinations, cervical smear tests, operations, X-rays and so on, providing at a glance an invaluable family medical history.

Col James Aldous from HQ UKLF told delegates how his headquarters planned to cope with the return of so many Service families from abroad as the Army is re-structured under Operations for Change.

He spoke at length on the complex problem of housing and stressed that all Service families should be aware that local authority housing was difficult, if not impossible, to obtain.

Councils did not have enough houses and Servicemen often failed to meet the conditions they now set. Col Aldous outlined initiatives being set up in the UK on housing, resettlement and welfare.

The General Secretary of the Royal British Legion, Lt Col Philip Creasy, said the Legion hoped to persuade the Government to fund a number of action support centres in the UK to help Servicemen

affected by redundancy.

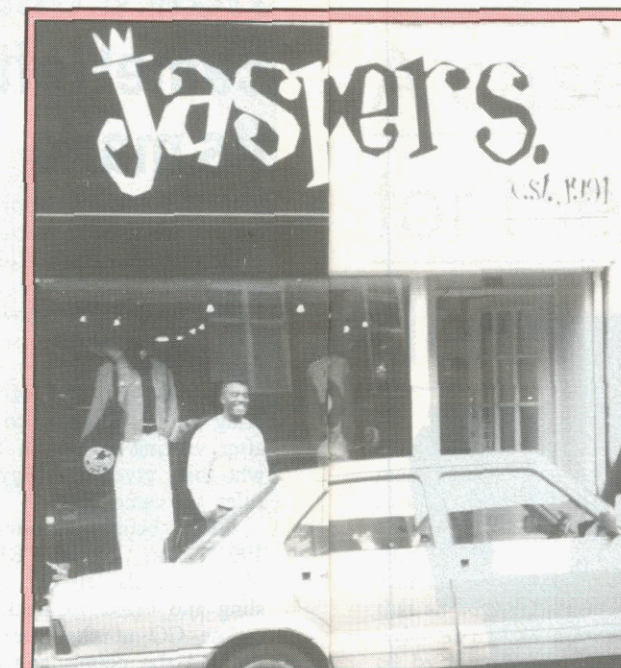
The centres, at strategic locations throughout the country and controlled from London, would put together teams to advise ex-Servicemen on housing, jobs, training and welfare as they readjusted to civilian life.

Delegates were given a clear view of redundancy, the numbers affected and how they will be selected, by the Director General of Army Manning and Recruiting, Maj Gen James Johnston.

He confirmed that terms for Phase One had been officially agreed for Phases Two and Three, and said that 10,000 extra copies of DCI (Army) 79 1991, which details the redundancy situation, had been printed to ensure a wide distribution and readership.

Questions posed by wives revealed that their major concerns are with housing, both in and out of the Army, education, resettlement, and the timescale in which Options is to take place. The Corps Commander, Lt Gen Sir Charles Guthrie, asked Armed Forces Minister Archie Hamilton, who spent the morning at the conference, to convey to London the feelings he had heard expressed.

BAOR, he said, was in need of urgent answers to dispel the uncertainty and anxiety felt by so many.

Jasper plans to stay in business

JASPER Thompson is living proof that there can be life after the Army.

The 33-year-old former Royal Green Jacket left the Army in 1990 after 12 years in uniform to set up his own business in Bristol, and is grateful for the help and advice he received.

When he decided to make the break, Jasper was serving in Gibraltar with the 3rd Battalion, and his intention was to open a clothes shop on the Rock.

After work experience in Gib he took a business course at South London

Poly. After leaving the Army he decided to locate his shop in Bristol following an offer of help from the city's Black Business Association.

"Finance was crucial," said Jasper. "During my 12 years in the Army I had made regular savings, but the bulk of my contribution came from my gratuity."

Help came from the Royal British Legion in the form of a £2,500 loan repayable over five years, and an £80-a fortnight grant under the Government Enterprise Allowance

Scheme. Jasper's local county council provided him with a rent grant and a £1,000 loan, and the Black Business Association granted him a further £1,000.

"Good planning is the essence," he said. "It's very hard work, but if I can get through the recession I should be all right."

"I would encourage anybody thinking of leaving the Army and wanting to set up their own business to go for it. With proper planning anything is possible."

Legal advice caution

THE MoD is advising Service personnel who plan to use the Forces Legal Assistance Group that should proceedings have to be issued, the matter would have to be handed to solicitors.

While a bona fide organisation, the FLAG is not a firm of solicitors, and the Law Society has pointed out that unqualified persons are prevented by the Solicitors Act 1974 from issuing proceedings for third parties for fee, gain or reward.

The Senior Claims Officer in PL(LS) Claims says a claimant using such an organisation would have no legal redress if his case was badly or incorrectly handled and strongly urges Service personnel wishing to pursue a claim against the MoD to seek the advice of a solicitor.

Bulletin expands

TO MAKE Service personnel more aware of other ways to find affordable housing, the blank sheets at the back of the Resettlement Bulletin are to be used to disseminate housing information.

Bulletin No 116 (October 16) started by carrying addresses for self-build, modular homes, the Royal British Legion Housing Association, Haig Homes, the National Federation of Housing Associations and the Housing Corporation.

It is hoped to extend in further issues the information on housing for single and disabled people.

YOUR LETTERS ANSWERED

Dear Anne,

I had a shock when my council said I was not eligible for a council house, even though I was on the list, because I had made myself and my family intentionally homeless by taking Premature Voluntary Retirement.

They might house me after a court order and eviction, but we will go to the back of the queue. I've got a job to go to, but nowhere to live.

Anne writes: Soldiers taking PVR or voluntary redundancy must check

first with the local authority that it will not alter their status on the housing list. Many authorities regard those who PVR as having made themselves intentionally homeless.

Incidentally, a redundancy payment up to £30,000 is tax-free as long as it is not an ex-gratia payment as part of an early pension or retirement scheme. The DoE leaflet PL 808 entitled *Redundancy Payments* explains the position.

Dear Anne,

I've been told I will not be paid redundancy money for

28 days after my discharge date. Is this true and will there be a period of grace between the discharge date and my becoming an irregular occupant and so liable for increased rent charges?

And, if I am made redundant while serving in BAOR, will I be allowed to return to the UK for a month or two to find a house and job?

Anne writes: The MoD hopes to process redundancy monies within three days but advises personnel to allow up to 14 days for payment. It is looking into

the questions of a period of grace in MQs and UK job-seeking time for soldiers serving in BAOR.

Dear Anne,

Is it true that if we move into a married quarter with no telephone we have to pay a deposit of £100?

Anne writes: Happily, the answer is no. The deposit had been a bone of contention for years, but following an MoD agreement with BT, has now been waived.

You have to satisfy BT on three counts:

- Provide proof of Ser-

vice identity;

- Agree to Direct Debit billing;

- Get your commanding officer to countersign the application.

Dear Anne,

I am stationed overseas and do not have access to experts who can provide financial advice on what I should or could do with my gratuity.

I received a letter asking if I would consider voluntary redundancy but I have three major problems - no house; a child aged 13 already at boarding school and one about to go; and a military skill which is not easily transferable into the civilian job market.

My wife should be able to get a job but doing all this long distance is very difficult if not impossible. Can you send me some contacts please?

Anne writes: First check with the DCI entitled *Resettlement, Briefings and Courses Provision*, or with Education Resettlement Officers or with Resettlement Bulletins. The Army agents Holts and Cox's can help with specific financial advice. Ring Mike Alder or Kevin Farmer at Holt's on 0252 521975 or Tim Woodcock at Cox's on 071-389 5238. They can give advice on: financial self-assessment, investment, commutation, taxation, insurances and personal financial planning.

Benefit rules stricter

The Department of Employment's Code 2 Circular 10 dated June 1991 contains the stricter rules on the payment and export of Unemployment Benefit when a claimant has left work to live elsewhere in the European Community.

The guidelines have been issued because Social Security Commissioners ruled that claimants who leave work to accompany their spouses or partners on job moves to other EC members states are unlikely to be allowed to export their Unemployment Benefits. They are also unlikely to be allowed to export Unemployment

Benefit payment under the special rules for people seeking work elsewhere in the Community.

The Commissioners' ruling will apply whatever the occupation of the claimant's spouse or partner, including members of the Armed Forces posted overseas at short notice.

This interpretation of the law will not, however, apply to claimants who are already unemployed and entitled to Unemployment Benefit before the need to move abroad arises and who have not left work to move abroad.

The effect of waiving the four-week rule means that

a claim by a Serviceman's wife must be made at least three days before the date of departure (three working days plus the date of departure), or on "linking" claims on which three working days have been served, at least one day before the date of departure.

Claimants should never anticipate a decision of the adjudicators or predict the outcome of a claim. If the benefit position is undecided no decision about the transfer of benefits can be made until it has been established whether Unemployment Benefit is payable.

Haig:

A case for the defence

IN February we reviewed *Haig's Command: A Reassessment*, in which Denis Winter carried out something of a character assassination of the First World War Field Marshal. It was believed then that an admirer of Haig would welcome the challenge presented by Winter, but it was not known that a book taking a different viewpoint was already in the publishing pipeline.

This new work is *Field Marshal Earl Haig* by Philip Warner, who rightly declares that his subject is probably the most controversial figure in military history. The book is claimed to be neither a eulogy nor a condemnation of Haig, but an attempt to assess his task objectively "and to decide whether he was better or worse at it than he might have been".

In the author's view, "It is Haig's misfortune to be remembered by posterity not for his victories, but for the cost of them. He defeated what was until then the most powerful army in the world. He did so because whatever the circumstances, he never lost his nerve."

Of course, that could have been because Haig was insensitive and aloof. In this regard it is worth recalling a cruel joke that went the rounds about the time of Haig's death on January 29, 1928: "There was once a cavalry officer who was so stupid that his brother officers noticed it."

It is perhaps fortunate that this cavalry officer (Haig's regiment was the 7th Hussars) was dead by the time the "literature of disillusionment" about the Great War generalship started to flood the bookshops.

Haig started the war as commander of I Corps and replaced Sir John French as Commander-in-Chief of the BEF on December 17, 1915.

"The difference between the thinking of the two men was that French was an optimist who believed that victory could be brought immediately by superior numbers who would smash a hole through the enemy defences, whereas Haig had now come to believe that a limited advance, in small stages – which would also be costly in casualties but would at least achieve results – was the only possible formula."

Haig set out his troops like chessmen on a board, and some readers of this book will be unconvinced that this is not how he thought of them.

Of the costly failure of the Battle of Loos, the author has no doubt that French was to blame: "Haig was so confident that the general reserve would be arriving quickly on the scene that he had thrown all his own

reserves into the attack.

"French's view was that he needed time to assess the battle before bringing forward the inexperienced II Corps, which had scarcely been in France a fortnight... Joffre too must be in the dock. This is not only because he withheld vital information on the second day of the battle, but also because his whole concept was based on false hopes."

They were all to blame, it seems, except Haig – who wrote to Kitchener to tell him so! According to the author, Haig was not condemning his C-in-C solely because he wanted his job, "He was condemning Sir John French because he believed he was hopelessly unsuited for the task."

A very subtle difference, one would think!

Much of the responsibility

for the debacle of the Somme is taken off Haig's shoulders. "Undoubtedly, much of the slaughter of the British infantry had been the result of a combination of stupidity and over-confidence at a much lower level than that of the Commander-in-Chief." One wonders how many of the 19,290 killed on the first day alone would agree.

The author takes somewhat less of an advocacy stand when it comes to Passchendaele.

Haig embarked on that battle "without the knowledge that, even if he reached the ridge within the time provisionally allotted, he would soon afterwards be confronted with a battle consuming even more time and manpower."

"In the end he did not reach the ridge in time to press forward before the winter rains set in, so the strength of the Flanders Stellung was never tested."

Field Marshal Earl Haig may not be a eulogy but it does extend justification for most of Haig's actions. – BJ

Heaviest fish, a 16lb 4oz tope, was caught by Holland, and he and WO2 Doug Shepherd (ACIO Ashington) shared the prize for landing the most species.

Group 5 takes in the whole of the north of Britain, from South Humberside to Scotland, and the competition is fished in five rounds at different venues down the coast.

Royal Welch in charge
