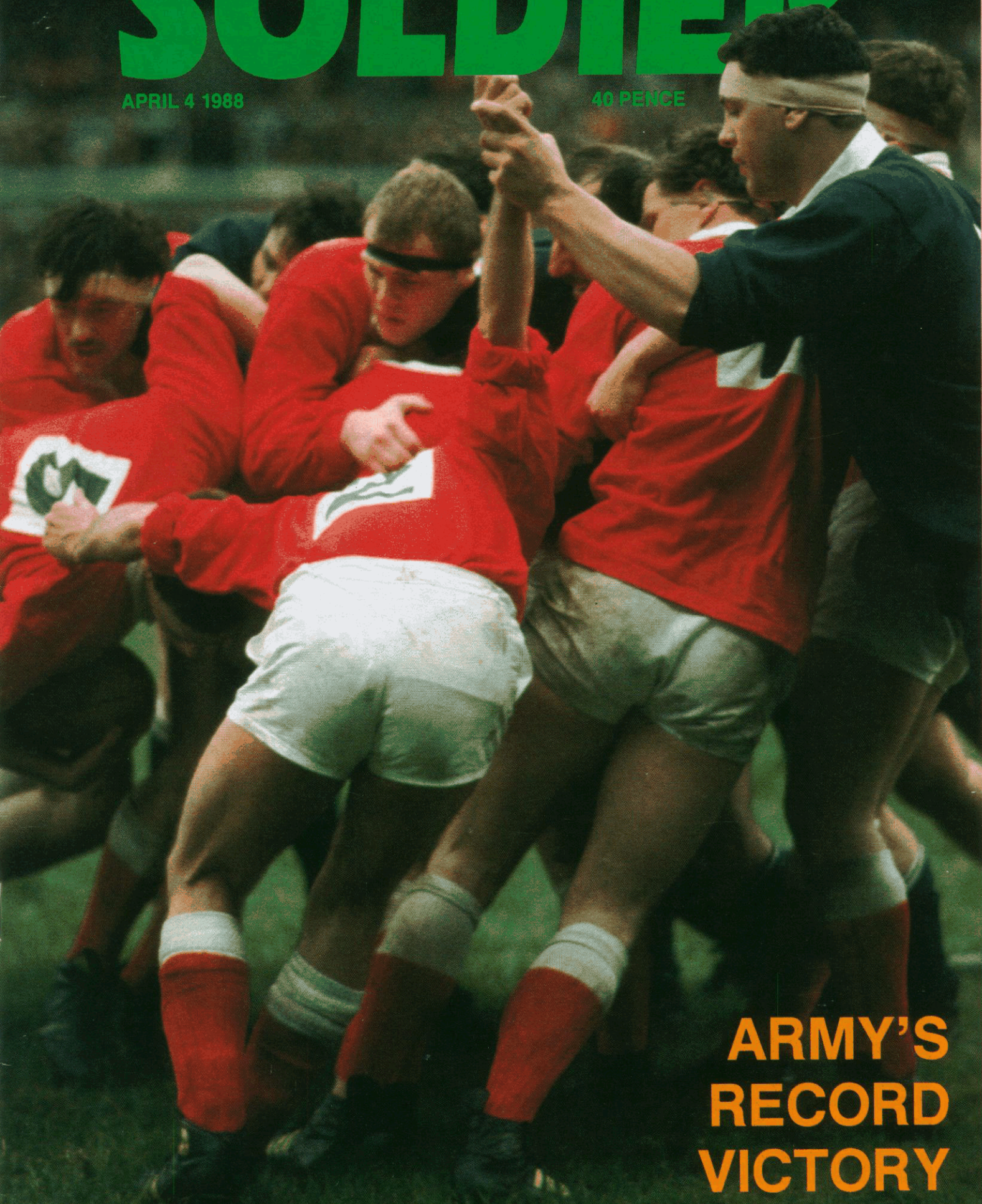

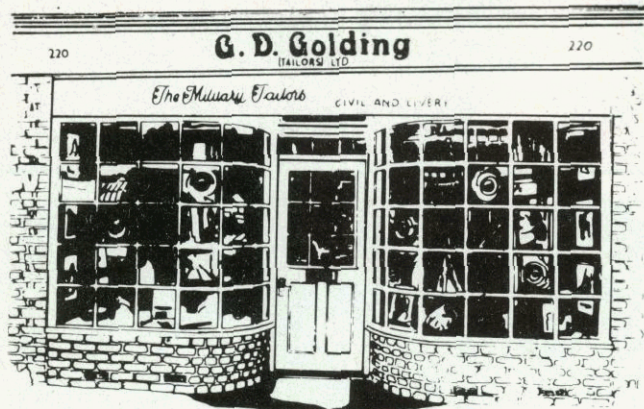

# Retirement at 54 may be unwise

In **SOLDIER** (Jan 25) Anne Armstrong wrote an article on pensions and unemployment benefit which is both inaccurate and misleading. She suggests that soldiers might be better off financially if they retire at age 54 rather than age 55 once new legislation reduces the age at which pensions affect income related benefits to 55.

MoD has in the past, and will continue, to press the Government to take into account potential difficulties which might arise because of Service life whenever legislation is proposed which will affect Servicemen.

The Adjutant General and the Secretary of State (Armed Forces) have represented our interests most forcefully on the subject of the change in the age at which a pension will affect

eligibility to unemployment benefit.

It is likely, however, that everyone who retires with a pension at age 55 will lose their entitlement to unemployment benefit. They will **not** lose their entitlement to income related benefits which are generally of more importance to ex Servicemen than unemployment benefit.

Age is not the only factor which may affect eligibility to income related benefits.

There are many other rules some of which are more applicable to ex Servicemen than others. One in particular is the "capital cut off"; under this rule "an applicant must have less than £3,000 in savings to qualify for benefit.

As all Servicemen completing a normal pensionable engagement receive a terminal grant in excess of £3,000 they are therefore excluded from claiming this benefit. (This rises to £6,000 under new legislation.)

Most soldiers who wish to obtain employment do so before leaving the Army: Anne is wrong to suggest that many are unemployed.

Soldiers must be fully aware that if they retire early, they will lose part of their pension for ever.

The most important point that needs to be stressed is that anyone planning to leave the Army should examine their own personal financial situation carefully. Housing, employment and education needs vary enormously - everyone should seek expert financial advice when in doubt!

Essential reading for anyone who thinks they may be unemployed are the DHSS leaflets FB9, NI12 and NI230. - Lt Col M A Hayley, PS4(A) Ministry of Defence, Empress State Building, London SW6 1TR.

# RENT-A-TRUCK ON THE ROAD

A UNIQUE new unit is being formed in BAOR in which all the personnel will be civilian and all the vehicles will be provided and maintained under a seven-year contract between the MoD and an American-based company, Ryders Truck Rentals Ltd.

Ryders are to supply 28 Mercedes Benz 2644S tractors and a similar number of UK-built King trailers with nine Ford Escort support cars.

The new unit, forming at Hamm, was to

be fully operational by April 5.

It will be part of 7 Tank Transporter Regiment RCT and known as 7 Tank Transporter Regiment RCT Civilian Working Group (7 Tk Tpnr Regt RCT CWG).

A total of 62 civilians are being recruited through 4 Pioneer Civil Labour Unit at Hamm.

The requirement stems from the planned increase in BAOR's light Armoured

Fighting Vehicle Fleet.

By 1993 it is estimated that this will result in 4,000 extra movements a year.

With the exception of main battle tanks and their derivatives the new unit will be able to lift the complete range of BAOR AFVs. Apart from reducing the number of expensive rail moves it will provide an environmental advantage by moving tracked vehicles on wheel through built up areas – particularly Dortmund and Paderborn.

## Falklands give Fire Focus hot reception

MEN of 3 Para who fought in the Falklands campaign nearly six years ago have been playing the part of enemy in the islands.

Their opponents were the reinforcements flown in from Britain for Exercise Fire Focus 88. The incoming troops, including a battalion of the Light Infantry, were given a warmer welcome than expected.

Prepared for cold weather they discovered the Falklands was enjoying an unseasonal fine spell.

Playing a major part in the direction of the exercise was Aldershot's tri-Service organisation known as the PPG – Permanent Planning Group. It is made up of representatives of all three Services under an Army chief of staff.

The GOC South East District (Lt Gen Sir Peter de la Billiere) is the PPG's permanent peace-time commander.

Royal Air Force Phantom jets and Royal Navy elements were also taking part in the exercise which was to test the speed at which the Falklands could be reinforced in an emergency.

## Red Devil killed

THE Red Devils freefall parachute team have suffered their first fatal casualty since they were formed more than 20 years ago. LCpl Anthony Stewart (29) was killed after his chute became entangled with another canopy during a training drop in Portugal.

● Sgt Ian Hunter (38) and SSgt Paul Gregg (32) of REME died when a vehicle overturned at Sennybridge, Wales.

## Restraint of murdered NCOs praised

THE TWO corporals murdered during the funeral procession of an IRA sniper in West Belfast have been praised for their restraint in the face of a furious mob. Though both were armed with 9mm Browning pistols for their personal protection only one shot was fired as a warning when the crowd closed in round their car.

Eye witnesses said they seemed reluctant to use their weapons in the midst of men, women and children.

Lt Col Martin Roberts, Commander Communications Northern Ireland and the senior officer of the Royal Corps of Signals in the Province, said the Corps would long honour their memory.

"In particular, we will remember the courage and restraint shown when their vehicle came under attack.

"But for that I believe there might have been even greater carnage.

"I think this will be evident to all those who watched the scenes on television."

He described Cpl Derek Wood and Cpl David Howes as "two fine junior NCOs who loved the Army and its life".

Both men were radio telegraphists with about seven years service.

Cpl Wood, 24, also known to his friends as Del, had previously served in Northern Ireland attached to EOD squads. He was a keen rugby player.

Cpl Howes, 23, had captained the Royal Signals hockey team at Harrogate.

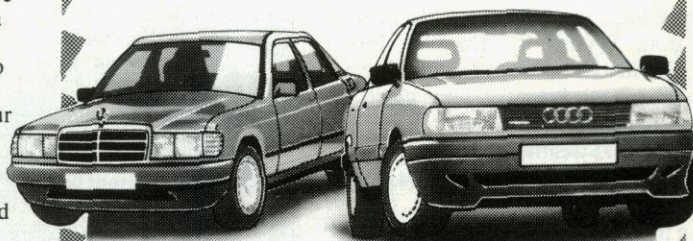

# Rare Sherman Priest tanks found

A CHANCE discovery in Germany of derelict Sherman "Priest" tanks has caused a stir among tank buffs for not one but three of the rare and valuable vehicles have been found lying derelict on a German training area, writes Laurie Manton.

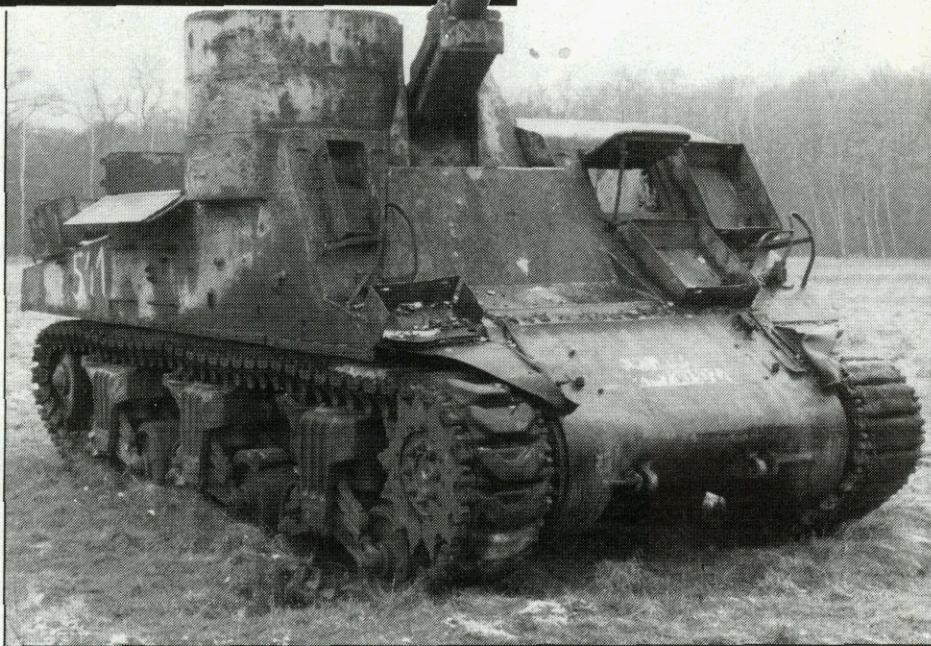
Members of 7 Armd Workshop and 16 Tank Transporter Sqn, based at Fallingbommel have recovered two of the Priests from the Cremlingen range near Wolfenbittel, and a third is to be recovered later.

The tanks, described by Lt Col George Forty, curator of the Royal Armoured Corps Museum in Bovington, Dorset as rare, are at present stored at 1st Armoured Division HQ in Verden.

Two are destined to be exchanged for a Sherman tank from a US Army collection while another will be shipped to the Bovington Museum which does not have an example of the tank.

The Sherman variants, officially known as Howitzer Motor Carriages M7, first came into service with the British Army in 1942, playing an important part in the crucial Battle of Alamein.

When in British service, they were designated as the 105mm SP, Priest and remained in service with the 8th Army throughout the Italy campaign. The "Priest" tag came about because the large machine gun mounting on the right of the tank looked like a pulpit.

## Danger site cleared

BOMB disposal experts of 33 Engineer Regiment (EOD) RE have cleared one of the most dangerous sites on which they have had to operate.

Men of 49 Squadron based at Chattenden, Kent were called in after an explosion killed a workman during bulldozing operations behind the town hall at Normanton near Wakefield, Yorks.

The land formerly belonged to a company

which made detonators from 1913 to 1972 and clumps of these fused together were detected beneath the surface. Over the years the explosive had become more sensitive than TNT.

In Operation Nobel the sappers used radio controlled diggers, earth crushers and a pulverising roller before the contaminated soil was removed in dumper trucks driven by soldiers.

THIRTY-SIX businessmen from the South West paid £25 each to take part in Exercise Executive Stretch on Bodmin Moor in which they submitted themselves to a leadership test prepared by 6th (Volunteer) Battalion, The Light Infantry.

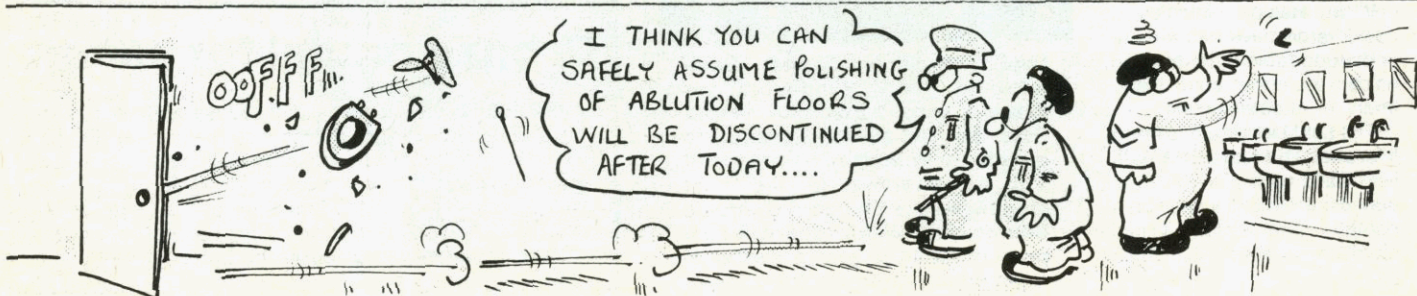
Six-men teams with an Army instructor

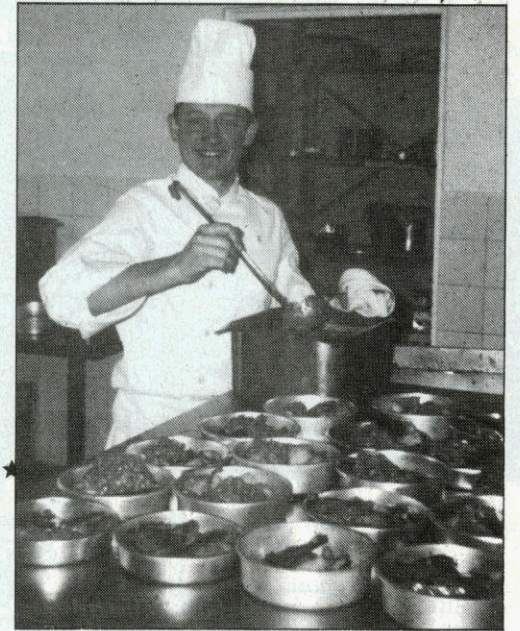

# SOLDIER to Soldier

## Wait 'til you see the whites of their tyres

Look out for 16-tonne vehicles with white walled tyres. No 8 Squadron, Royal Corps of Transport, has been given authority from the beginning of April to revive an old tradition dating back to the Opium Wars in which 8 Company Royal Engineers played an important part.

The sappers painted the wheels of commandeered local wagons white to identify them as the French, our allies, were in the habit of trying to appropriate them – transport being scarce.

"Apparently the company continued the practice up to 1882 when it became 8 Railway Company, the first unit of its kind in the Army," said Capt

John Colley, OC 8 Squadron, which numbers 8 Company among its predecessors, having been transferred from the RE when the RCT was formed.

The squadron is now stationed at Buller Barracks, Aldershot where the white-walled 16-tonne vehicles have been on parade.

## Erskine expands

Two new wards are to be built at Erskine Hospital at Bishopton, near Glasgow, because of the increasing demand for places in Britain's largest hospital for disabled ex-Servicemen and women.

"Most of the patients we are now asked to take are older and require a higher level of medical and nursing care than previously," says Admiral Sir Thomas Baird, chairman of the hospital.

Plans are being made for 48 more bed spaces. Erskine already cares for 350 disabled ex-Service personnel, 28 of whom served in the First World War.

# SECRET OF THE SIXTH FLOOR

## Monty's caravan in MoD shocker

THE replica of Field Marshal Montgomery's caravan built on the sixth floor of the Ministry of Defence is to be registered again as an Army vehicle and given its own number plate, writes **Bill Moore**.

**SOLDIER** can reveal exclusively that its construction was part of a highly classified security exercise.

The aftermath of "Ex Top Tiffin" has led to a stringent review of security arrangements at the Ministry where a spokesman said: "We never give details of our arrangements for obvious reasons."

However, it is believed that some 150lbs of nuts, bolts and rivets were smuggled into the closely guarded building by poker-faced Brasshats and that the sheet metal involved was carried in blatantly by two retired officers (ex-Eighth Army) wearing dungarees. They said they were there to mend a hole in the roof over the ladies' lavatory.

"Biggest problem," said a member of the Army Board with a twinkle in his eye, "were the tyres.

Amazing how many secretaries became six months pregnant for an afternoon without anyone noticing."

The caravan itself is a replica not of the famous Normandy model but the pre-Alamein vehicle in which a little Egyptian sand has been scattered to lend atmosphere.

The minute attention to detail in the replica astonished ex-Pte Dominic O'Hegerty who, as an RASC driver, was once responsible for the caravan.

Mr O'Hegerty, now of Shepton Mallet, Somerset, which he got to know well

while waiting for D-Day, was specially cleared to accompany **SOLDIER** to the sixth floor.

"I've never seen the like," he said. "Didn't I spend a couple of hours right there?"

He pointed to a simple cane chair.

"It happened the day I accidentally drove off with himself - he was only a general

then - still inside.

"I was bowling down the road to Matruh (or was it Alex?) when I noticed in my big wing mirror this head out of the window and someone waving.

"At first I just waved back and then I realised something was wrong. The truth was I was a bit lost.

"The general was very good

about it when I stopped and let him out. He said he would drive and I could sit in the caravan bit... as long as I didn't smoke mind you. He couldn't abide that.

"Well, we stopped at the first MPs we came to and I was posted to bomb disposal soon afterwards."

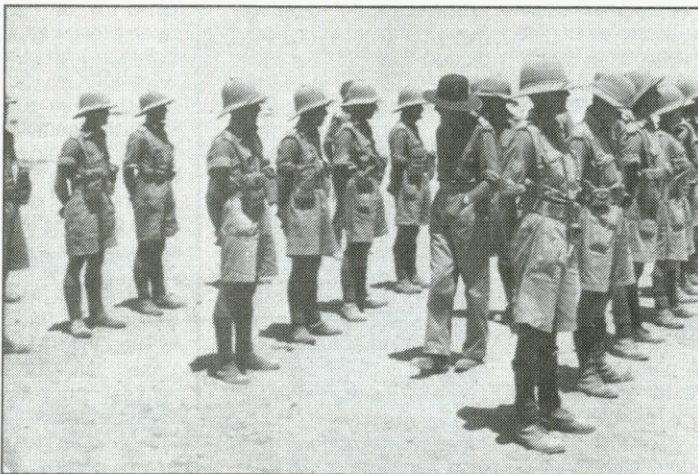
In deference to Monty, smoking is still forbidden in the sixth floor caravan.

A slightly discordant note might have been struck by the cocktail cabinet (not in the original) but this has been cunningly concealed behind the photo of Rommel and is opened only for "visiting heads of state and generals of three star rank and above."

According to reports the Prime Minister has paid a private visit, sat in Monty's chair and scored a direct hit on Rommel's ear with one of the darts Monty used to throw at it. They had been intended by Monty to be his farewell present to Pte O'Hegerty - but other events intervened.

# BEWARE THE HOME

## SWEET HOME TALK...

**DON'T rush into the private housing market until you are aware of the pitfalls?**

Service families can let themselves in for all sorts of problems – especially when they are posted overseas.

New legislation to release more houses on to the private market and to encourage local authority tenants to take advantage of the Right to Buy scheme could make it increasingly difficult for Service families to find rented accommodation in the future.

I have been warning for some years now that local authority housing is drying up fast.

If you are homeless the unhappy choice facing you could be bed and breakfast accommodation or sub standard housing (see SOLDIER November 2, 1987).

It is not surprising that more and more Servicemen are turning to the private sector – or that a stream of tempting housing schemes are coming on to the market.

But before you fall for the glossy brochures and smooth sales talk please take stock of your options. It is so easy to fall into a trap which you will later regret. Once you are posted overseas there are a host of potential problems. For example, are you UK Ordinarily Resident or not? This could have Capital Gains Tax implications for you.

Your tax position could change if you buy the house as an investment

rather than your main residence.

Will you occupy the house before you let it, or re-occupy it before you sell? If in doubt consult the Inland Revenue. Your status could have a bearing on education grants, tax liability and DHSS benefits.

Evicting tenants can be painful – and expensive! Who pays for the court case, you or your agency? Will you be insured against loss of income at a time when you are still paying rent for your quarter?

To be fair, most people do not have problems when they opt to go private. But a house is likely to be the largest financial outlay you make during your lifetime so do read the small print and find a scheme which suits you.

It is not unheard of for mortgages to be called in and the house sold off because payments could not be maintained. The Serviceman who has a steady income must remember that his wife may not always be in work. The temptation to overreach the family income should be avoided.

# WITH FAMILIES IN MIND Anne Armstrong

## THOSE BENEFIT CHANGES AND YOU

**THIS month is the deadline for the introduction of the remaining changes to the new Social Security Act which could affect Service families overseas.**

From now on the Unemployment Benefit disqualification period has been increased from 13 weeks to 26 weeks, while Family Income Supplement (FIS) has been replaced by Family Credit.

This new benefit is for employed people with children who do not have enough to live on. A major change is that it has to be applied for every six months, unlike the old FIS which was done on an annual basis. Some Service families may well be eligible.

Housing Benefit also changes under new measures to assist those on low incomes. Service families who have been or are claiming rent and rate rebates may be affected.

It also applies to full time students during their summer vacation and those not living in halls of residence.

Benefit can cover some or all rent and up to 80 per cent of the rates.

Then there is the Social Fund to help people with exceptional expenses which they cannot meet out of their regular income.

Three types of discretionary payment are available under the following categories:

- Budgeting loans
- Crisis loans
- Community care

I'm still waiting for information on just how Service families will fare with the new Social Security Act and I will pass it on as soon as I can.

There is a new freephone advice service for employers and the self-employed wanting to know how to operate National Security Insurance Statutory Sick and Maternity Pay – it is 0800 393539.

Please check with BFPOs to make sure they have the new DHSS leaflets\*.

## No need to feel down in the mouth

HERE's a toothy problem you may have to grin and bear!

If you are serving overseas and you request dental or ophthalmic treatment in excess of UK standards laid down by the NHS you may have to pay the difference out of your own pocket.

Full details of what you can expect are to be found in AGAI Chapter 66 Issue 17 para 66291-66302.

On the other hand, I have just come across a case where Service parents posted abroad were unaware of the help MoD can give when there are no Service facilities available.

They can obtain treatment from accredited embassy or high commission panels of medical and dental specialists unless other arrangements have been made.

Families needing orthodontist treatment should

seek advice from the consultant in dental surgery based at the RAMC College, Millbank, London. Parents of children already undergoing such treatment should register with the consultant to avoid delays if a course of treatment is interrupted by a posting.

The reason is that dental surgeons and orthodontists treat patients under the NHS. Each course of treatment is an entirely separate contract between the practitioner and the Dental Estimates Board of the DHSS.

The orthodontist/dental surgeon does not have a panel, list or register of patients for whom he is paid a capitation fee by the DHSS.

Once a course of treatment is completed patients and consultants are free from any further commitment to each other.

FOR the past 13 years the Guild of St Helena has been providing marvellous holidays at Shorncliffe, Kent for Service children (aged seven to 13) with special needs. Many of those children, however, are now too old to take advantage of the scheme.

So the guild is extending its programme to cater for boys and girls of 16 or more who would enjoy a challenge.

The Guild of St Helena, based at Chelsea Barracks, London SW1W 8RF (telephone 01-930 4466 ext 4258), is looking for up to six Service youngsters for a sailing holiday on the Jubilee Sailing Trust's specially equipped square rigged *Lord Nelson*.

The three masted sailing ship was designed to accommodate both the handicapped and the able bodied, and to give disabled people an opportunity to put to sea.

There is a modern sick bay on board, complete with a resident doctor.

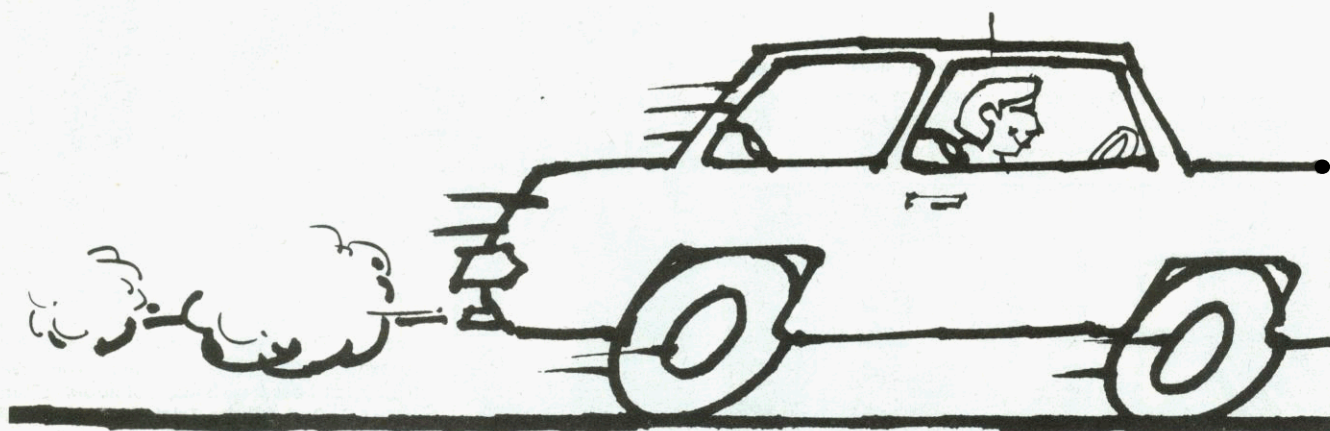

# Miracles take a bit longer!

WHEN the REME tradesmen of 48 Cyprus Workshops boast that they can turn their hand to anything, they mean it.

Be it the base overhaul of Ferrets and Saladins – stripped down to the last rivet and rebuilt – or the precise calibration of electronic and mechanical test equipment, they will tackle it.

One of their more unusual

undertakings recently was the building of an elaborate frame to enable children at a local Red Cross home suffering from muscular dystrophy to stand upright by themselves.

Links between the local

community and the REME workshops at Akrotiri and Dhekelia are strong.

Both employ Cypriots and almost a quarter of those working at Akrotiri – the larger of the two workshops – travel daily from Larnaca, a round trip of 120 miles.

Many used to work at the workshop when it was based at Larnaca. It moved after the Turkish invasion of 1974 and was split into two, leaving a smaller workshop at Dhekelia.

The Akrotiri workshop now occupies two large aircraft hangars and a number of smaller buildings belonging to the Royal Air Force.

It is tasked with the maintenance of virtually all Army equipment in the Western Sovereign Base Area (WSBA) and the intermediate repair of vehicles and other technical equipment held by the RAF and the United Nations British contingent.

Its aircraft servicing detachment is responsible for major servicing of Army helicopters in Cyprus but this will cease when the Alouette is replaced by Gazelle later this year.

It is also responsible for the recovery of vehicles throughout the WSBA and Troodos.

Almost 150,000 man hours are expended each year at the Akrotiri workshop in support of some 70 units, including those visiting the island.

About half of the repair



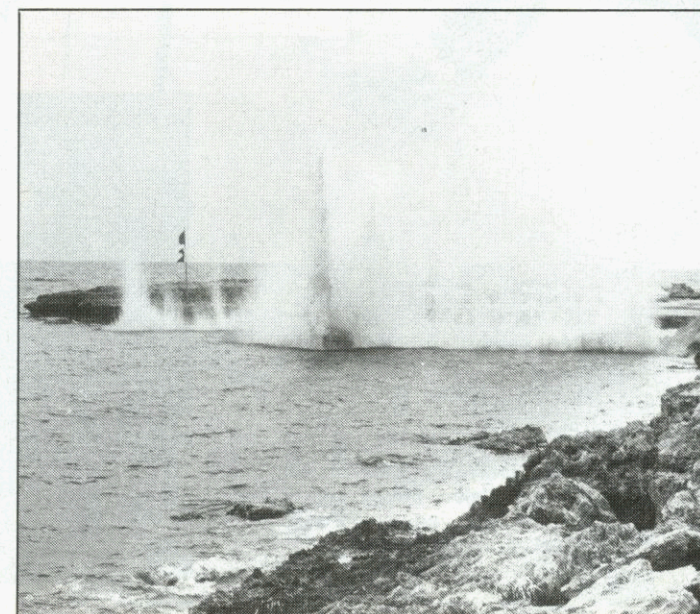

effort is spent on vehicles ranging from armoured cars to motor cycles. A high proportion of work goes into general engineering such as sheet metalwork, welding, machining, paint spraying and carpentry.

The provision of spare parts to the main workshop is co-ordinated and controlled by the RAOC Stores Section, a small department that is very much part and parcel of the workshop.

"We get job requests from almost every agency working in Cyprus," said Maj Bill Pickford, OC 48 Cyprus Workshop (Akrotiri).

"The wide variety of skills we have at our disposal means that we can make or refurbish virtually anything."

## Sappers dive to sailors' rescue

A DULL thud and a geyser of water signalled the destruction of an underwater hazard beneath moorings belonging to Dhekelia Sailing Club.

Several yachts had been damaged by a ridge of rock below the waterline and a plea for help was answered by the diving team of 62 Cyprus Support Squadron RE.

Delighted at an opportunity to put their skills to good use, the seven strong team drilled holes into the rock, filled them with explosives and then stepped back to witness the result.

It was another job well done at the end of a winter that has seen members of the squadron engaged in a wide variety of tasks – not least the clearance of snow in the Troodos Mountains.

Assignments range from the building of sangars at vehicle check points around the Sovereign Base Areas to the construction of patrol and access tracks among the mineral-rich – and often precipitous – mountains along the UN ceasefire line.

Sappers are currently engaged in the building of six tower-type observation posts on the perimeter of RAF Akrotiri, each 20-foot structure taking some six to eight weeks to erect.

## Parachuting packs 'em in

PACKING the parachute used on one's first jump is all part of the confidence-building training programme tailored for beginners at the Cyprus Joint Service Adventurous Training Centre.

Free fall sport parachuting courses draw more students to the Pergamos centre near Dhekelia than any of the other disciplines taught there.

About 700 students pass through the centre each year and, of these, more than 300 tackle sport parachuting.

Students, drawn from British

Forces Cyprus (BFC) units and those serving with the UN British contingent can also take to the air using the centre's new GROB 109B powered glider which can take off under power and then revert to gliding.

"The purists might raise an eyebrow about its having an engine," said Pergamos centre OC Capt Kelvin Pickering APTC, "but it is great fun."

Cyprus lends itself immediately to the other disciplines taught at the centre: sub-aqua diving and sea canoeing.

## Kart racing takes off in a big way

MOTOR rallying and kart racing are becoming increasingly popular among Servicemen in Cyprus and many devote much spare time and expense to both sports.

There are kart racing clubs at Akrotiri, Episkopi and Nicosia – each with about 40 members – and race meetings are held on each club circuit once a month.

Powered by highly tuned 100cc engines, much effort goes into maintaining the karts. A difference of just one tenth of a second per lap can mean losing

a race by 30 metres or more in this closely contested sport.

Motor rallying also draws its enthusiasts and the use of Service vehicles – currently two Army Metros – is authorised under the rules of the British Army Motoring Association.

A REME crew, Maj Derek Hunter and Cpl Adam Davies of 48 Cyprus Workshop (Akrotiri), run their own privately owned Suzuki and came a creditable 20th in the highly competitive Rothmans Cyprus International Rally.

## The POD programme

Students are required to

- read a 'quality' newspaper every day;
- listen to lectures on current events;
- prepare for presentation (groups of three) a briefing for their course on a topic under discussion;
- prepare individually a 3,000 word project of their own choice to be presented in a 15-minute lecture.

SANDHURST Development Block, Wilton Park, Bucks, rings with the word "Mister". Soldiers with blue shoulder tabs may be lance corporals or sergeants in their own units but at the Royal Army Educational Corps Centre, Beaconsfield, Bucks they wear no stripes and are misters to a man.

In a matter of months they may be back in the ranks – or on the way to becoming subalterns (when they will not only be called Mr but a lot of other things!).

Their POD days will be behind them. POD?

Two years ago the Director of Army Recruiting decided that one way to tackle the growing problem of meeting officer targets was to set up a Potential Officer Development Course.

COs were asked to look for likely candidates. At that time the proportion of serving soldiers in the intake at the Royal Military Academy, Sandhurst was very low.

Other ranks had not done well at the Regular Commissions Board. A study showed that in general, apart from a lack of education and, as a natural consequence, narrow interests, men tended to have difficulties in communicating and a lack of confidence once outside their own sphere.

Yet they had already given evidence of some extra quality or they would not have been nominated by their COs.

Could better use be made of this pool of valuable material? Would extra training give candidates a more reasonable chance at the Regular Commissions Board? The Army School of Education under Lt Col Willie Coupar was given the job of finding out.

The first 14 week course for a maximum of 18 students was set up in April 1986. They came from all arms, recommended by their COs and with at least a year's service.

Lack of formal education was no bar as at the end of the course the Army School of Education could award a certificate of competence.

The course is run alongside the older pre-Sandhurst course for cadets sent to Beaconsfield for "sharpening up" after attending the RCB.

To an onlooker the staffing seems to be particular rather than generous. A major and four captains (all RAEC) have to run both courses.

The current teaching team for the POD course is Capt Duncan James and Capt Sue Lambert WRAC.

Potential officers, minus all signs of rank, live in single study rooms within the centre and do guard and other duties just like private soldiers.

The nature of the course comes as a surprise to many of them. One NCO from an armoured regiment formed up during the first course and told Capt Lambert that he just couldn't work for a woman.

That's insubordination. You're under arrest," she replied.

### How they narrow the culture gap

NO records exist of the number of private soldiers injured in the crush to get into the Old Vic during an Ibsen season or in the queue for a Mahler "prom" at the Albert Hall.

To narrow the culture gap POD course students are encouraged to arrange their own activities –

with the minimum of advice from the staff. Discussions follow visits to museums, theatres and art galleries.

Social events are also left to the students to organise and may range from a buffet evening in a local pub to wine tasting or a trip on the Thames.

And the offender was marched off to the cells . . . and returned to the course on his release.

There has been no sexist trouble since. Sue Lambert is tall, slim and fit and her colleagues are all tall, lean and tough.

All the men have served with the Gurkhas and all members of staff are qualified instructors in one or more recreational pursuits.

Though teaching adventurous skills is not a priority, living cheek by jowl with the cadets on open air exercises is an

essential part of the curriculum.

"There are few better ways of checking on the personal development of individuals," said Maj Stuart Thornborough, OC of Sandhurst Development Wing, whose own expertise lies in skiing, sailing and mountaineering.

As a study in human relationship, the POD course is worth a book in itself.

Students who start by sitting to attention and speaking only when spoken to have to be brought out of their shell.

"When they start draping one leg over

the end of an armchair and pressing their point during free discussion we reckon we're getting somewhere," said Duncan James.

Sometimes striking personality changes occur. Potential officers from the ranks are often married and their wives don't always take to the idea of having an officer as a husband. Some are secretly pleased if it doesn't work out. Others are heartbroken.

And the possibility of failure is a shadow over every course. A student may do well in the classroom and on outdoor exercises but still not convince the RCB that he has got what it takes.

The hardest bit is going back to be what they were which, in many ways, is virtually impossible. As one of them put it:

"We know we can't all get through but you've got to have a try haven't you . . ."

A remarkable number do make it.

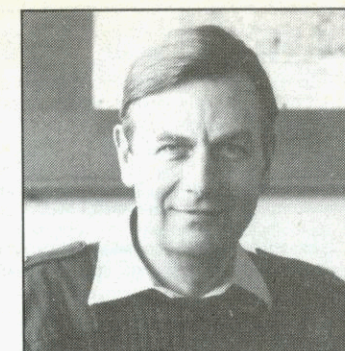

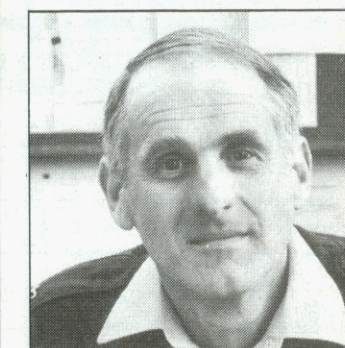
## CO led a merry dance!

# A cut above the rest!

"AN Army marches on its stomach," said Napoleon and his words still ring true today for food remains a priority topic for barrack room discussion, writes Laurie Manton.

When meat is served up in the cookhouse, have you ever wondered how it got there? Probably not, but working behind the scenes there is a specialist group of tradesmen known as Butchers RAOC.

SOLDIER visited the RAOC victualler training school at Aldershot to see its abattoir in operation.

This purpose built slaughterhouse, the only training abattoir in Britain, is designed to teach victuallers the skills of slaughtering cattle, sheep and pigs.

Master Butcher (WO1) Charlie Potts who runs the VTS explained that the establishment for Butchers RAOC was 36.

They are employed in peacetime roles at supply depots worldwide and for operational tasks would be employed with Ace Mobile Force (Land), UKMF and for emergency roles in Belize and the Falkland Islands.

Today's Army buys pre-joined meat but in time of war those neatly packaged joints might not be available. Live-stock would need to be butchered in the field - hence the need for the skills employed by the Butchers RAOC.

There are two specialised 13 week courses for victualler trained butchers each year.

Much of the course is "hands

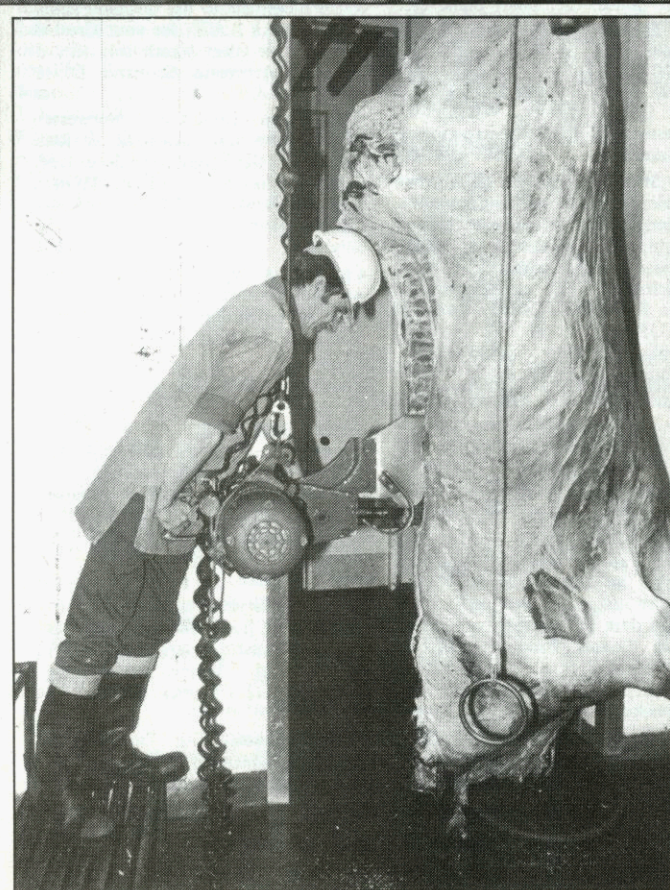

on" and the students are assessed daily on their practical work. In the final week they have to take two practical exams on slaughtering and practical butchery.

Four written papers are taken - a general paper, diseases, systems and meat inspection - and there is no

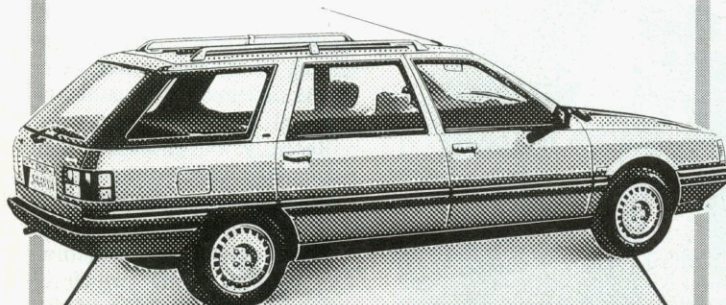
room for error. Which explains why of the 12 students who sat the course last year only a third passed.

Care shown for animals before slaughter and the hygienic conditions maintained in the abattoir does much to dismiss the ghastly Victorian image evoked by the word "slaughterhouse". It's still unpleasant work, so when you next have meat upon your table, spare a thought for the dedicated butchers of the RAOC.

**FOUNDED** by the Ulster Unionist Party in 1913 in response to Westminster's Third Home Rule Bill, the Ulster Volunteer Force, an illegal para-military organisation, also included the Young Citizen Volunteers, a force that had been raised a year earlier from boys leaving the Church Lads and Boys Brigades.

Despite the illegality, it was a force that prompted Lord Roberts, the Ulsterman who had commanded the British Army in the Boer War, to say after the UVF's clandestine gun-running operation: "Magnificent! Magnificent! Nothing could have been better done. It was a piece of organisation that any army in Europe might be proud of."

On the outbreak of the First World War and Kitchener's *Your Country Needs You* call, the Ulster Volunteer Force answered the appeal on condition that the word Ulster would be included in the titles of any new units to be formed.

In consequence, recruits from the UVF formed service battalions of The Royal Inniskilling Fusiliers, The Royal Ulster Rifles, The Royal Irish Fusiliers, Royal Engineer Field Companies, and Divisional Troops in the specially raised 36th (Ulster) Division.

In a similar way, men from the equally illegal Nationalist Volunteers found their way into the 16th Division.

Philip Orr's latest book, *The Road to the Somme*, tells the story of the Ulster soldiers, from the time when they were irregulars through their service in the battalions of the 36th Division.

It is told in the words of the veterans interviewed by the author against a historical background of events, both political and military, and is illustrated with contemporary photographs and line drawings.

As the title of the book indicates, Philip Orr builds up his story to the horrendous climax of July 1, 1916, the day

of the Big Push on the Somme.

"Of all the divisions taking part, the Ulster Division ranks fourth in the table of losses. Martin Middlebrook notes 5,104 casualties, of which at least 2,000 probably died." These figures are from Middlebrook's *The First Day on the Somme* (1971).

The slaughter of the Somme left the 36th Division badly and sadly depleted but it was not disbanded; "holding the line" roles were to follow, as were the Battle of Messines (June 1917), The Third Battle of Ypres (August), Battle of Cambrai (November), and the final advance of 1918.

It was, however, the Somme that gave the Ulstermen their most prominent place in First World War history. - BJ

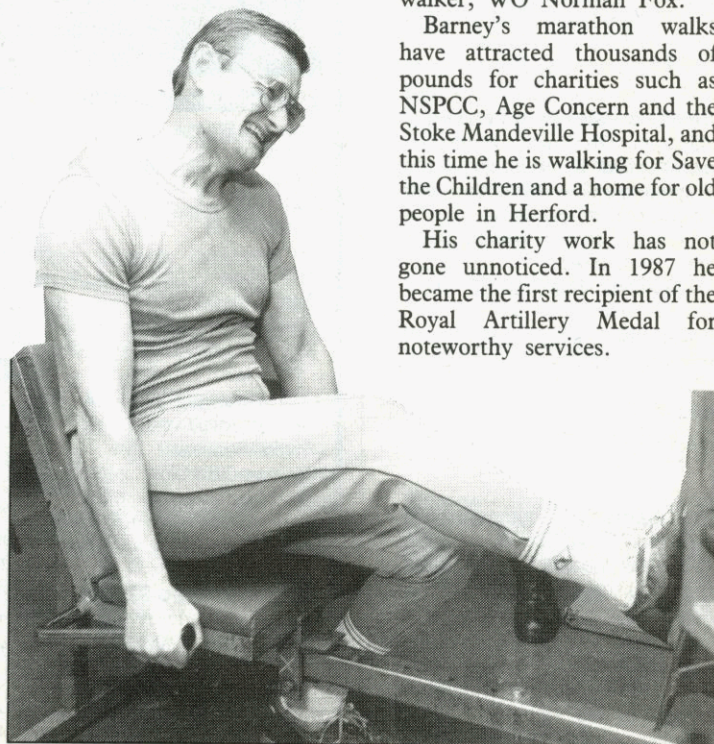
Barney, whose previous world best of 412.08 miles in six days and ten hours around an Army football pitch in Dortmund was bettered by

# Colts on rampage

THE Army colts rugby team continued their successful run by defeating the Royal Navy at Aldershot in the morning before travelling to Twickenham to watch the senior team triumph in the afternoon, writes Peter Salisbury.

After an initial assault by the Navy, the Army youngsters settled down and dominated play in the 20 minutes up to half time. The Navy scored first with a penalty by S(O) Paul Morgan (HMS Dolphin), their full back.

ASgt Paul Browning (AAC Harrogate) levelled the score with a penalty before his partner in the centre, Cfn Nick Gould (39 Engr Regt) gave the Army the lead with a try which Browning converted.

The Army went further ahead in the second half with a try by winger AT Neil Willcoxson (PMC Arborfield), again converted by Browning.

After that the Army seemed to relax and allowed the Navy to get on top. But desperate Army defence kept the sailors out and all they could manage was a drop goal by outside half MEM Stuart Williams (HMS

# Toast of Twickenham

ANY member of the Army - interested in rugby or not - would have been extremely pleased and proud of the lads in red at Twickenham, writes John Quin.

The Army senior side not only won the Willis Faber Trophy but in doing so beat the Royal Navy by the largest margin ever in the history of the Army-Navy game, which goes back to 1887. It is a fixture usually decided by just a few points, although in 1909 the Royal Navy did win 25-0. For the Army to win in 1988 by 35 points to three was truly magnificent.

I mentioned in SOLDIER (March 7) that after the Hampshire defeat, one observer wrote "the Army chemistry was clearly not yet right". At Twickenham it clearly was right and what a drubbing the matelots took.

The lads from the Scottish and King's Divisions swept into a 5-0 lead and although the young guardsmen came back strongly to win the next three contests, there was no denying the home team.


Bantamweight JLDr Taffe of
