## PIONEERS REBADGED IN GERMANY

A RE-BADGING parade for the Royal Pioneer Corps was held in Bielefeld in the presence of the Commander 1st (British) Corps, to 'Honour the Old' and 'Welcome the New'.

On parade, commanded by Major John F J Allen were Royal Pioneers from Defence Company 1st (British) Corps and Defence Platoon 4th Armoured Division.

Although a small element of the Army as a whole, the Corps plays a vital role in 1 (BR) Corps, in the defence of Headquarters Installations and Operational assets; and in addition to Civil Labour Support in BAOR, provides world-wide skilled and unskilled labour to the services.

To the honour the past, the old badge was slow marched with nostalgia and tears, into history, to the haunting skirl of pipes, and its passing was marked to the

assembled parade and spectators in the special address of Lieutenant General Sir Martin Farndale.

## Three killed

POLICE are investigating the deaths of three men shot dead by an Army patrol in Northern Ireland.

Armed with rifles and rocket launchers the suspected terrorists met up with the soldiers just outside the border town of Strabane, County Tyrone, at 5 am on 23 February.

The incident happened in the Foundation Street district, only a few hundred yards from the local police station.

THE SULTAN of Brunei has presented a cheque for £350,000 to the National Army Museum and another one for £250,000 to the Imperial War Museum.

The Sultan, well known for his fondness of British military traditions and himself trained at Sandhurst, made the donations during a visit to Britain.

Field Marshal Sir Edwin Bramall, Chief of the Defence Staff, said: "These gifts are an act of outstanding generosity by a good friend of Britain's Armed Forces. They will be of very substantial benefit to two of our great national military institutions."

£100,000 of the donation to the National Army Museum will be used for a computer-based information retrieval system. This will greatly improve access to the collection and archive — a development which will be of immense importance, to the connoisseurs of military objects and, most importantly, the growing number of historians poised to reinterpret key periods.

The remaining £250,000 of the

gift to the National Army Museum will go towards new storage and display accommodation.

The Museum describes the donation as 'a magnificent 25th anniversary gift to a young museum whose holdings continue to grow dramatically'.

The Imperial War Museum, funded by the Office of Arts and Libraries, is a unique institution devoted to the acquisition and display of material illustrating all aspects of the two World Wars and other military operations of the 20th Century involving Britain.

The Sultan's gift will go the IWM Redevelopment Appeal which was launched recently (SOLDIER 25 February).

## VC IS TO RETIRE

THE ONLY holder of the VC still serving in the British Army retires this month when Captain Rambahadur Limbu, 45, finishes 28 years service.

He will leave the 10th Princess Mary's Own Gurkha Rifles at their Church Crookham, Hampshire, base and return to Nepal.

Captain Rambahadur Limbu was a lance corporal serving in Sarawak in 1965 when he won his VC, rescuing two men who had been wounded attacking a machine-gun post.



# Multi-million worry for Naafi's future

**NAAFI INCOME from corporals' clubs tops £29 million a year. This sum represents about 40 per cent of their total 'troop trade' and they are worried that one day they might lose it all. For if the corporals were to buy their bulk supplies from sources other than Naafi the lost revenue would create big problems for the Institute.**

But Naafi is safe for the time being since their Charter — drawn up in 1921 — gives them exclusive trading rights with all corporals' and junior ranks clubs.

Delegates to the 15th all ranks meeting at Naafi HQ, arranged by the Army General Institute Committee, heard the corporals' clubs are necessary and will continue.

But club members claim that, if they could place their bulk orders similarly to the officers' and sergeants' messes they could give more favourable prices.

"This is a cause of strong feelings ... corporals form a large part of the Naafi customer base and their independence presents a significant financial threat to Naafi.

"Are there any measures which could overcome this problem? Should purchases by officers' and sergeants' messes be similarly restricted to Naafi?"

These and a score of similar questions are included in a paper going to all commands and districts at home and overseas from Major General J N S Arthur, Director of Army Personal Services.

The General wants answers to all his questions since they form the basis for the Naafi of the future. 'Aired' at the meeting the paper

said: "If Naafi is to continue to fulfil its role in support of Service personnel and their families in a changing Service and commercial environment, it is necessary for the Services to advise Naafi of what its needs are likely to be and what changes and developments are seen as being necessary for Naafi's trading concepts and practices to meet our needs ..."

This alone gave weight to delegates' charges that Naafi's Charter — shaped 64 years ago — is behind the times.

But they were reminded by Managing Director Brian Whitaker that the Charter was still very much in force, stipulating the provision of welfare for the Services and not the creation of a commercial enterprise.

Mr Whitaker emphasised this after being urged to 'go commercial' by one delegate and being asked to put up £1 million towards a leisure centre by another.

Summarising the state of 'your business' — Mr Whitaker justified this by describing customers as shareholders — he said the Institute paid out £9 million to customers, and kept £5 million in the business.

And while Mr Whitaker finished his report on an upward note saying

that the trading result for the current year, which ends in April, is 'reasonably optimistic,' he uttered a few warnings.

## 'Unit entrepreneurs a threat'

He spoke of 'threats' to Naafi's viability as a trading organisation by 'unit entrepreneurs.'

"In this undertaking there are profitable and unprofitable areas. Unfortunately, the profitable areas often pose an irresistible temptation — despite the rules — to specific groups in the Service to seek their own short-term advantage.

"The result is that your own trading organisation (Naafi) often finds itself in competition with its own shareholders.

"If you extend this to its logical conclusion, eventually all profitable areas of business will be run by unit entrepreneurs while Naafi will be left to provide the unprofitable services ..."

Threat number two, he said, came with the "reduced spending power of our customers, particularly of family customers who are responsible for the lion's share of our turnover, but for who, at the same time, we run so many unprofitable establishments.

"When we become aware that some of our customers are subsisting at a level where State help becomes necessary, and when we assess the £44 million plus has been lost to spending through reductions in LOA, it becomes obvious there must be an effect on our shop trade."

Added to this, he claimed that "increasing numbers of better-off customers are moving out of quarters and out of range of our shops as they buy their own homes."

Threat number three, he said, was "potentially devastating" in that it came "indirectly from the Government's policy of privatisation."

Naafi currently provides about half the value of UK messing supplies, worth about £40 million.

But if catering for the Services was taken on by outside firms,

contractors would want to do their own buying.

Referring to Naafi's wholesale supply of bar goods to messes, Mr Whitaker said this, too, was "likely to be affected by the progress of privatisation," he said.

He went on to tell how the Navy could buy groceries under Naafi's budget account scheme, but the Army and RAF could not.

"Naafi is not always free to change a service or introduce a new one in the way it would like. We have just not been allowed to do it," he said. "But the authorities have said they will review the position in the light of our experience with the Royal Navy."

His remarks on the budget account scheme prompted one lady delegate to ask why wives were not allowed to open credit accounts. Mr Whitaker replied that it was a question of debt collecting.

If a man goes into debt, he explained, then the money can be recovered from his pay, but that can't be done in the case of a wife.

## 'Don't forget ... think big'

Dismissing this as 'old fashioned', she said: "Working wives are in danger of being treated as second class citizens.

They should be allowed their own Naafi credit cards and take the risks involved."

The Army rules and laws forbidding wives this facility she described as "out of date."

Other delegates had equally strong words, especially when a wife required a husband's permission to sign binding agreements. One said: "Some wives can't even blow their noses without their husband's permission."

Whither the Naafi of the nineties? That is the basic question set out in the paper from Major General Arthur, who requires answers by 12 April.

If you possess a crystal ball, star chart or any other bit of kit that will help with this task, the advice is dig 'em out and polish 'em up.

For even if you personally will be long gone from the Army, there are a lot of people who are in now and who will still be in if and when your suggestions come to fruition.

Last word for the departing delegates came from Major General Davis: "When thinking of the future: Don't forget, think big."

## SBC's NEW HOME

A GLEAMING brass finger plate off a door is the sole reminder staff of the Service Booking Centre (SBC) have of the years at their old Westminster HQ in Kings Buildings.

For 14 years they shared the building with BFBS and several military organisations processing flights for Servicemen and women and their families to every part of the world.

Until about a year ago bookings and confirmations were all by post, but today the tri-Service unit is fully computerised with instant seat confirmation and airline-style ticket issues.

Now with their move into the 80s and high technology they have impressive new premises from which to operate.

The new offices were formally declared open by Air Commodore G R Pengelly, Director of Movements, RAF, who unveiled the mounted brass finger plate in the unit's bar.

Suitably inscribed it records the event even though the unit has been in the Thameside building since last November.

Included on the tri-Service and civilian staff are six soldiers under the command of Major 'Bev' Stevens, RCT. In overall command is Wing Commander John Lambert, RAF.

With speed and efficiency their object, SBC conduct their business by using the Movements Management and Air Reservations System (MMARS), arranging flights through more than 50 computer terminals located worldwide.

## Terry and 'Doc' cook up a winner

It's not true that too many cooks spoil the broth... not when you're working in a snow covered field with orders to prepare a three-course meal for 30 in three and a half hours.

You need all the help you can get. But assistance for the two-man Army Catering Corps cooks taking part in the London and Eastern District cooking competition, was limited to themselves plus some basic ingredients.

## Niddle noddle noo — it's Segoon!

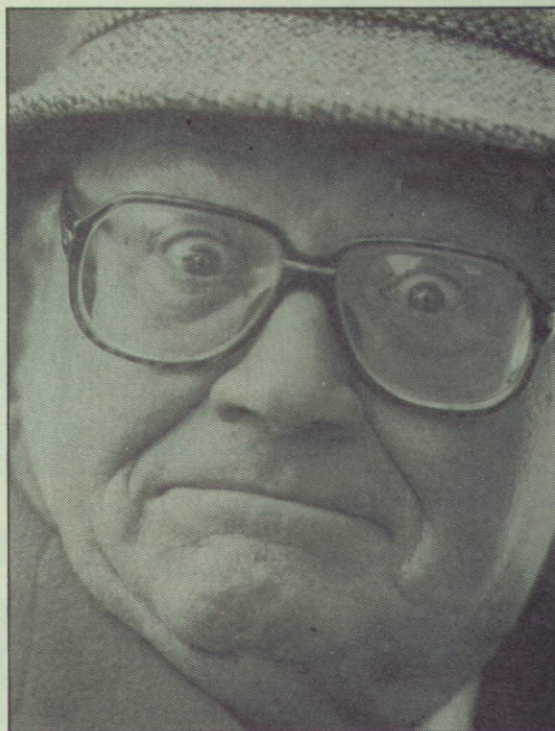

Princess Anne handed

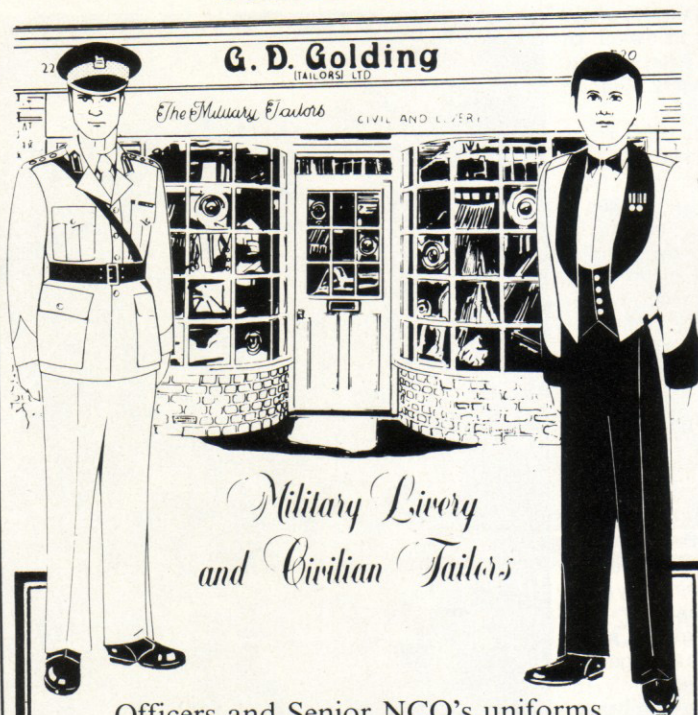

# TWICE A CITIZEN — THAT'S GRAHAM

THE Concise Oxford Dictionary defines veteran as 'a person with long experience of an occupation; especially military'. This description can certainly be applied to WO2 Graham Patterson of 203 (Welsh) General Hospital RAMC(V), whose military career spans 31 years of National Service and Territorial Army service; but in itself it is inadequate to describe the Patterson character.

Graham was called up into the Royal Army Medical Corps in February 1953, when the late Colonel Tenucci was Depot RSM, and took part in the Aldershot Coronation Parade.

His RAMC training took him to Netley on Southampton Water, to learn the basics of mental nursing. On qualifying Graham was posted to Trieste in Northern Italy where he spent just under a year until our forces withdrew.

From Trieste, Graham went to the 3rd Bn The Parachute Regiment, for a month, then via The Cambridge Military Hospital to finish his National Service at Tidworth Military Hospital.

On completion of National Service in 1955 Graham went to 3rd (W) General Hospital (TA) in Fairwater, Cardiff where he was later joined by his brother.

Graham was made sergeant in 1959 and each year for the following ten years was the snco in the unit's Challenge Shield Team, winning the Thomas Splint Rose Bowl one year, which probably explains his everlasting enthusiasm for this piece of equipment.

During the same period he changed trades from mental to general nursing with the aid of courses run by the unit and with practical training in hospitals in the Cardiff area.

1967 saw the great reorganisation and reduction in strength of the Territorial Army when 3rd (W) General Hospital was amalgamated with 158, 160, 170 Field Ambulance to form 203 (Welsh) General Hospital RAMC(V).

Graham stayed with the unit

through these very traumatic times, retaining his rank, until in 1974 he went to the RAMC Depot in Aldershot to take his warrant officers course.

Successful, he returned to 203 to become a lecturer in first aid and basic nursing.

In 1980 Graham was tasked by Colonel Thompson, then CO of 203, to assist in the formation of a detachment of the unit in Newport. With the aid of the Royal Monmouthshire Engineers and using his skills as an 'acquirer' the top floor of the TA Centre at Malpas was turned into a very useful set of Detachment Offices.

The Malpas Detachment has grown well since its inception with Graham serving as its CSM.

When 203 (W) General Hospital trains as a complete unit Graham carries out his role as WO in charge of reception. This is a job which at times requires all his strength both physical and mental to ensure that the 'casualties' are unloaded into reception, checked, sorted and dispatched to wards and departments of the hospital quickly.

He is also active with youth organisations in his home town of Caldicot, teaching the scouts, guides, Air Training Corps and Army Cadet Force first aid and field-craft.

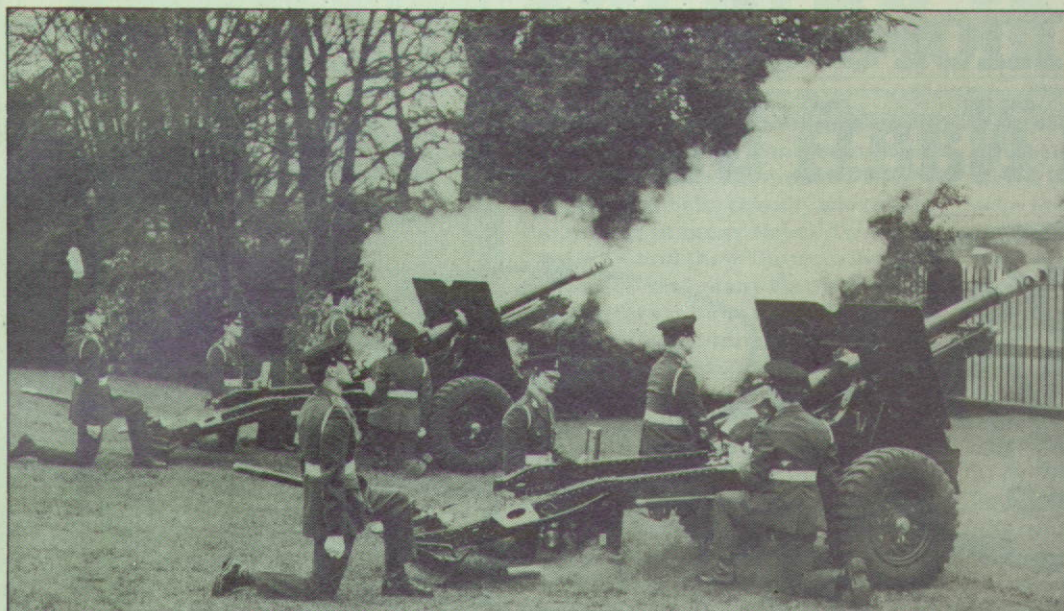
He is a long time member of the St Johns Ambulance Brigade.

There are two final parts to the character; that of employee at BSC Llanwern and finally but by no means at the bottom of the list of his priorities that of husband and father.

Considering his range of military and civilian activities he is certainly twice a citizen and perhaps is best described as a true Citizen Soldier.

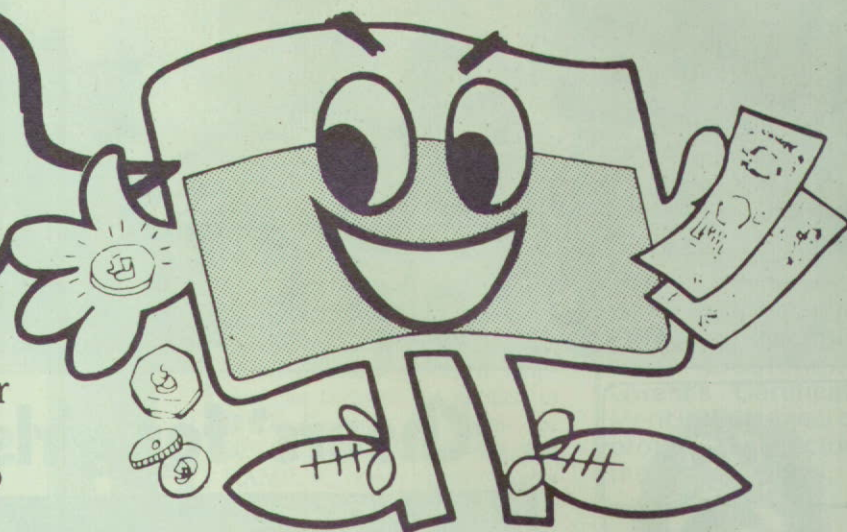

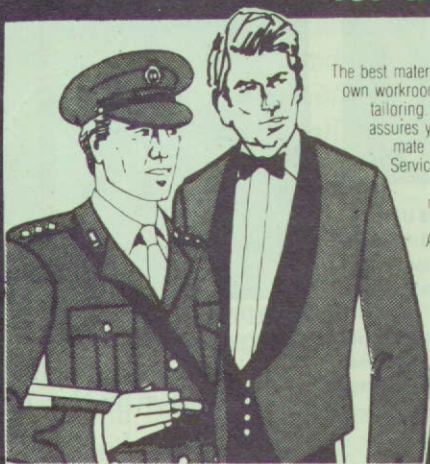

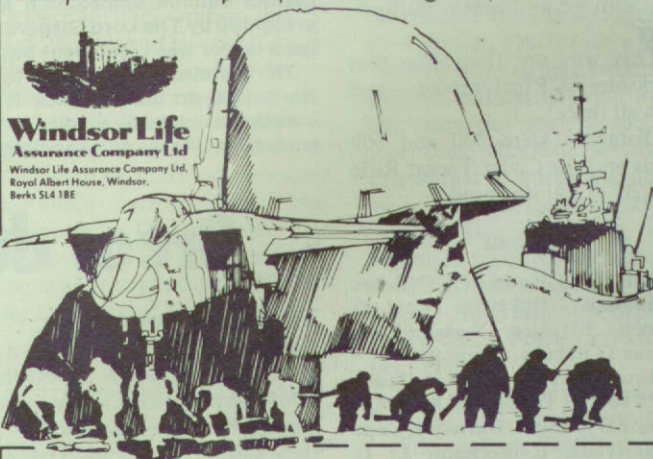

**B**ECAUSE needy veterans and their dependants of Commonwealth units which fought in the 1939-45 war are ineligible for help from the Army Benevolent Fund, a one-off appeal for £5 million is to be launched next month.

Called the Prince Philip Appeal for Commonwealth Veterans, it will be sponsored by the British Commonwealth Ex-Services League (BCEL) which has a membership of 53 countries throughout the Commonwealth and the old Empire.

But despite this world-wide link, thousands of old soldiers who fought beside British troops in Europe, Africa and the Middle East, and their dependants, are in desperate need of help.

"We expect the numbers unable to fend for themselves to increase by 20 per cent per year from now till the mid-90s," said Appeal Director Brigadier Robin Middleton.

"The BCEL still has many 1914-18 veterans in its care, and the number of Commonwealth ex-servicemen, widows and dependants now reaching their 60s, 70s and 80s is increasing dramatically.

"Many member countries lack the resources to provide the assistance required," said the Brigadier, and suggested that some countries lacked the "understanding or predisposition to do so."

"So they must rely exclusively on the support stemming from the League's London headquarters.

"But the League is no longer able to meet this demand from within its own resources which have provided money for both administration and benevolence in the past.

"Now, for the first time in its 64-year history, the League is compelled to seek outside financial support to honour its commitments, both now and in the future."

To help with this 'first and only appeal', units throughout the Army will be officially asked to "help in any way they can."

# SOLDIER to Soldier

**IT WILL** be a long time before the sense of shock eases memory of the German autobahn tragedy which cost the lives of so many Royal Air Force personnel and their German driver.

The loss of so many fine musicians is a shattering blow to the Royal Air Force and the families involved.

For many years the Band of RAF Germany has been synonymous with fine music and, perhaps more than any other RAF band, has been very much appreciated by Army units, especially in the area of Rheindahlen.

There is another reason for Army sympathy. In July 1982 the Band of 1st Battalion The Royal Green Jackets was decimated by a terrorist bomb in Regent's Park. Vastly differing circumstances, but no less tragic for the loved ones of seven bandmen killed on that dreadful day.

Yet within a matter of months, 19 survivors were back playing with the reconstituted band. There is little doubt that, in time, the Band of RAFG will again be delighting audiences, military and civilian.

When the first notes sound this will be the best possible tribute to the men who lost their lives.

The Royal Air Force has already expressed its gratitude for the sympathy shown by everyone in Germany and the United Kingdom. German individuals and organisations were quick, in their concern for the needs of the bereaved, to send donations — as have those serving in British Forces Germany.

A specific appeal is not being launched, but attention is drawn to the continuing need for donations for the Royal Air Force Benevolent Fund — which exists to help personnel and their families in such cases. The widows are, of course, entitled to pensions and other benefits from public funds.

His accounts left such an indelible memory with the youngster that now, David, aged 35, Head of Art and Design at the 750-pupil Arnold School in Blackpool put brush to canvas to produce a Diamond 'T' tank transporter engaged in typical operations during that campaign.

It took the artist three weeks to complete and he has just presented his work to a grateful RCT Museum at Buller Barracks, Aldershot. Needless to say, father George, formerly RASC, is very proud of his son's achievement some 40 years on.

David worked from reference work and pictures supplied by the Museum of Army Transport near Beverley, East Yorkshire. He was initially encouraged by the CO of the Arnold School's 128-strong CCF in which he is a commissioned officer.

The spur to further daubs on canvas resulted from a creation David had made of Col Jones's former unit which was involved in the D-Day landings in Normandy of 1944.

"From a small boy my dad, who is a committee member for the El Alamein reunion in Blackpool this October, always told me about the North African campaign,"

said David. "My initial D-Day painting had been done from verbal descriptions.

"Some of my work was seen by one or two museums throughout the country. That is the reason I have submitted this work to the RCT Museum in Aldershot.

"My dad was amazed on just how I managed to capture the atmosphere of the time. I have since been approached again by the Beverley Museum to do a piece on the military railway used in the Boer War."

That the 'Sussex Gunners' were more than pleased to be 'back home' in West Sussex — the Hampshire-Sussex border runs to

one side of the island — was evident when Commanding Officer Lieutenant Colonel Hugh Welby-Everard said: "We are delighted to be here. The accommodation for everyone is first-class, as are the facilities.

"There is boating, fishing, swimming, beaching, tennis, wild-life galore, Roman remains to search for and the 12th-century church of St Nicholas to attend and admire.

"We have our own primary school on the island and plans are in hand for a kindergarten, parascending and diving clubs and new squash courts.

to the normal facilities such as a Naafi club and community centre. But above all we have space.

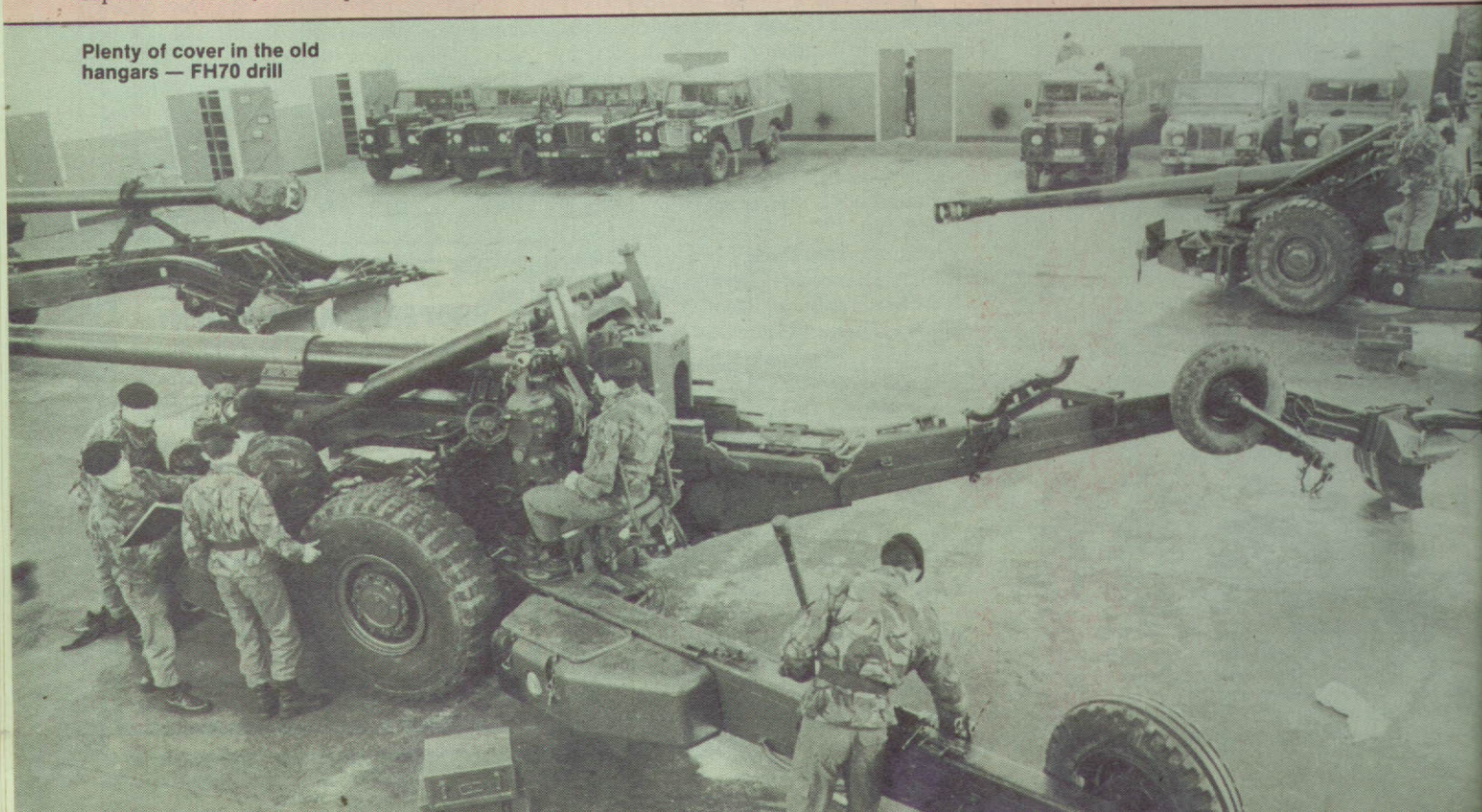
"In Dortmund, where we based for the past ten years, we were tight for space to work on our FH70 guns.

welcoming and have bent over backwards to be of help.

"Between the RAF leaving and our arrival last November the place was empty except for the billeting of Vietnamese 'Boat People'.

"Now we're in occupation and we're delighted to be here."

But even 'paradise' is not without its problems and the fact that this particular difficulty is not man-made does not detract from its nuisance value.

"It seems Thorney is the happy hunting ground of mosquitoes," said Colonel Welby-Everard, don-

ning his hat as chairman of the local nature conservation group.

Past reports indicate the island gets more than its share of the blood-sucking gnats and 26 Regiment have taken 'controlled measures' to limit the insects breeding.

"We are doing this under the control of MoD scientists to preserve other wildlife and plants," said the Colonel.

"The conservation group in this area is extremely active and takes a great interest in the island.

"But because we can't have

people wandering around restricted areas, they are permitted to use Pilsey Island — a small sandy island on the north side of Thorney — as a bird sanctuary."

As CO of Thorney, now known as and soon to be officially named as Baker Barracks, the Colonel automatically assumes the chairmanship of the conservation group since he controls the area they seek to study.

And if there ever was a Lord of the Manor, then, judging by the size and position of his house, he could readily take on that role as

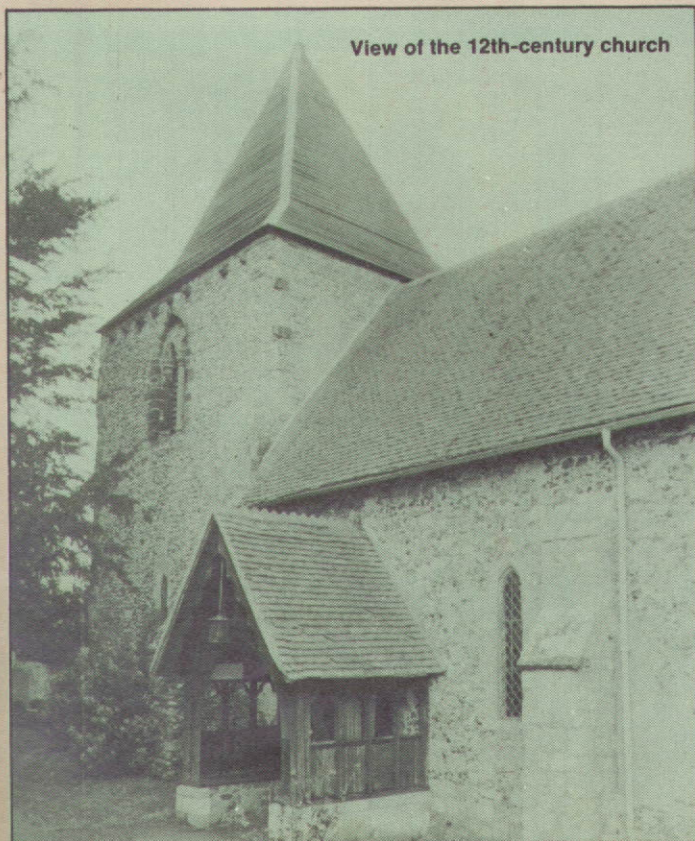
well.

Situated close by the old village of Thorney by the water's edge, it is a large, imposing house typical of those built for RAF station commanders of the 30s.

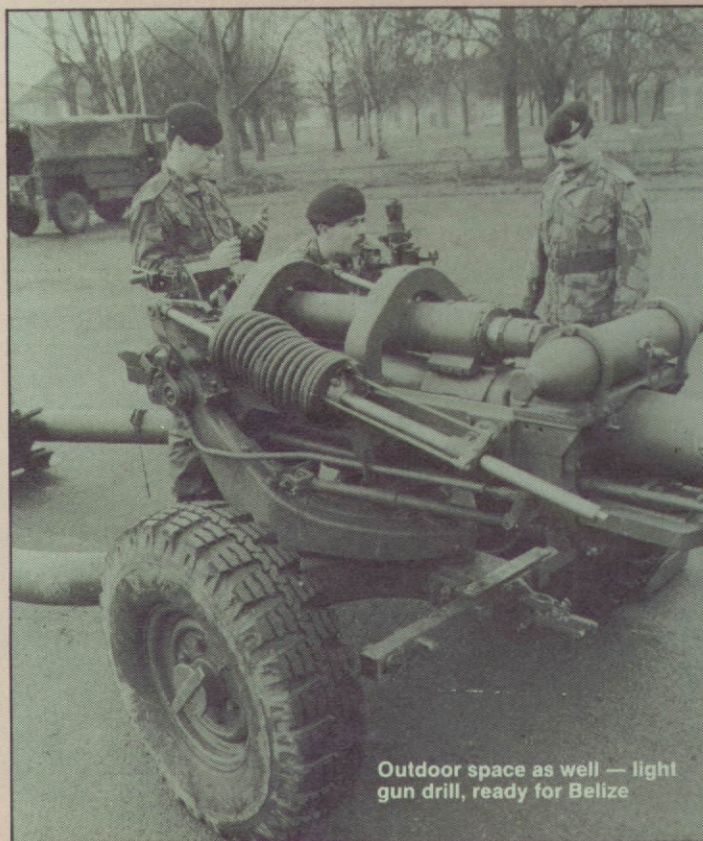
Nearby are several Victorian houses listed as unsafe and destined to be flattened.

"There are about 30 buildings on the island which the authorities say must go," said the Colonel. "But I've managed to get a stay of execution on one — building No. 13.

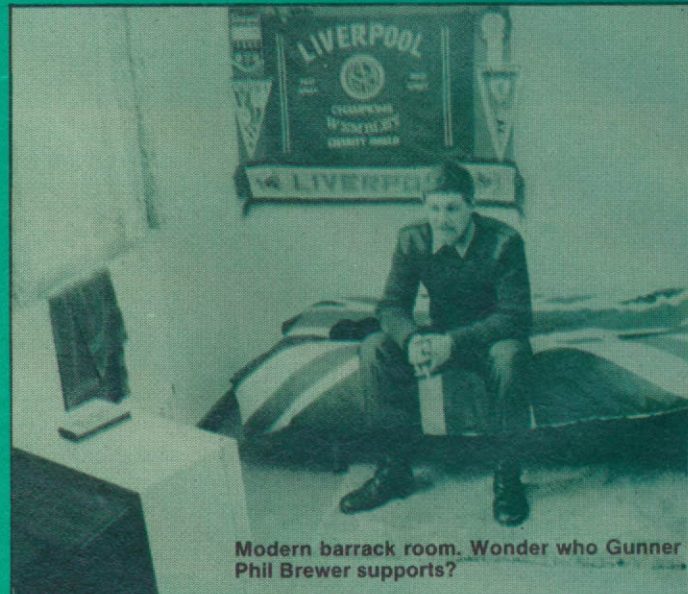
In addition to troop visits to Kenya this month and several officers acting as umpires in exercises in various parts of the world. Sandham's leaves for Belize

# Royal Pioneers get their new badge

THERE is a distinct advantage in having a designer and architect as the Colonel-in-Chief of a Corps.

For when Brigadier Freddie Lucas, Director of the Royal Pioneer Corps, submitted designs for a new Corps badge to the Duke of Gloucester — their Colonel-in-Chief and a qualified architect — he was able to get some expert advice.

In addition, the Duke suggested alterations which were incorporated in the new badge, which he formally presented to the Corps at their rebadging ceremony at Simpson Barracks, Northampton.

In bright, but biting-cold weather, the Duke inspected the three guards, each of 60 men, commanded by Lieutenant Colonel Mike Le Masurier, while the Band and Corps of Drums of The Staffordshire Regiment, under the direction of Warrant Officer J W Bains played a selection of light music.

In a short speech in which he referred to Pioneers past and present, the Duke said despite the success of the recent RAF Molesworth exercise in which miles of wire were erected in a single night, it could well have gone wrong without the help of the Royal Pioneers.

"The new badge will symbolise something very special to those who get to wear it," he said. "May it be worn with pride."

The last act in this rare event came with the lowering of the old flag and the raising of the new to the bugle strains of the Last Post and Reveille.

The rebadging was followed by another little ceremony when the Duke, himself a railway enthusiast, received on behalf of the Corps museum the nameplate from the BR locomotive The Royal Pioneer Corps.

A 22-year-old diesel with 2,500,000 miles on the clock, the plaque was handed over by the aptly-named Mr Colin Driver, BR's freight director.

"It was a totally appropriate name for an engine which was totally reliable, being able to work anywhere at anytime," he said.

But although the rebadging has given the Corps a new look and brought it more in



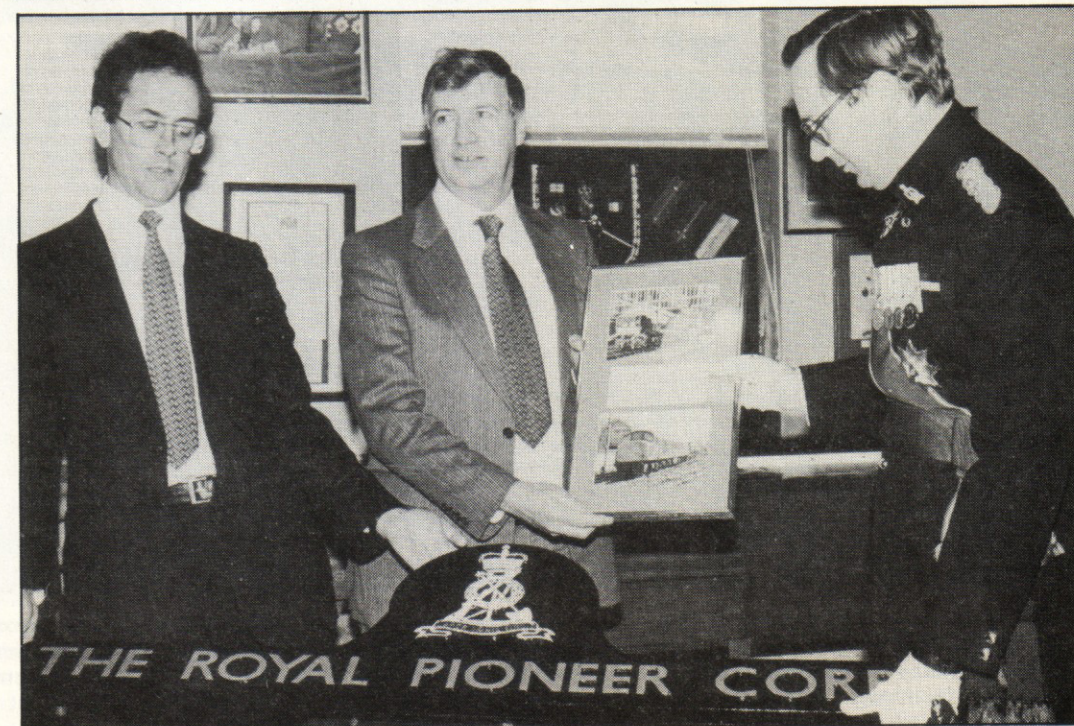

"So what?" asked another officer, as elated at the prospect at sporting new insignia as the other was

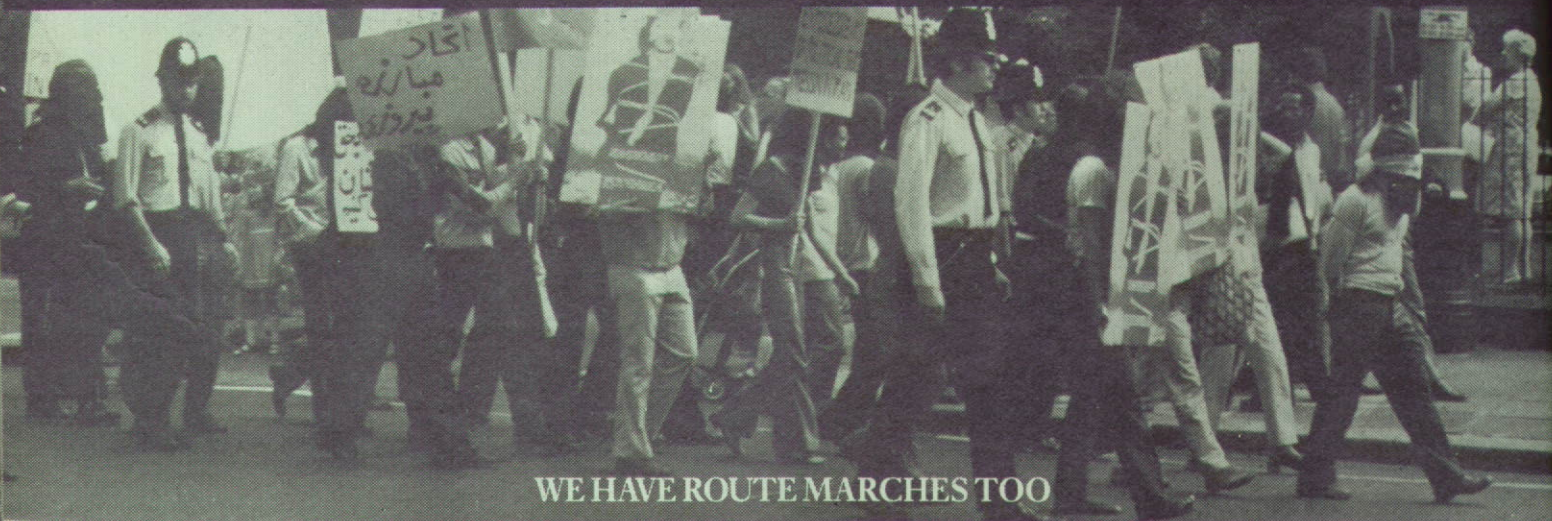
dejected at having to pay out.

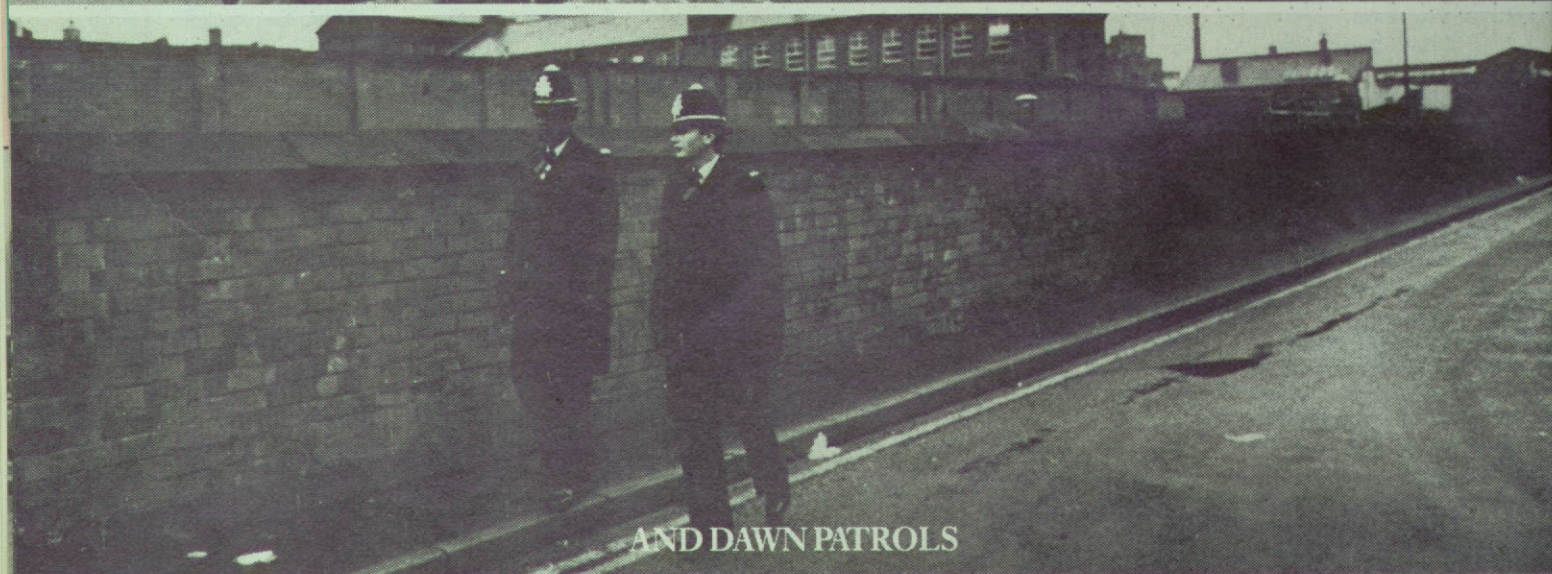

**S**ir Harry Secombe giggled with Goonish glee as he recalled his first meeting with that other well-known gunner — Spike Milligan. "I'll never forget it," he said. "It was in North Africa and my unit, 132 Field Regiment, Royal Artillery, had been trying to wrinkle out the enemy with 25 pounders.

"But we couldn't shift 'em and Milligan's lot were called in to batter them with 7.2 howitzers.

"We were given the job of digging emplacements for the bigger guns, but it seems we didn't dig Spike's deep enough for as soon as they fired it the recoil sent it toppling over a nearby cliff edge.

"We were at the bottom of the cliff in a 15-hundredweight truck when the gun crashed to the ground beside us. "The next thing we knew was Spike sticking his head through the canopy asking: 'Anybody seen a gun?' And that's how we met."

The story of that eventful meeting, which was to lead to greater things, Harry told during breaks while filming *Highway*, the 30-minute Sunday evening show networked by Southern Television.

It was the arch-Goon's third official visit to Aldershot, 'Home of the British Army'.

"My first time here was in 1941 when I was posted to Waterloo Barracks with the Royal Artillery.

"The second time was a few years ago when I gave some blood."

He kicked off his filming schedule by talking to Jo Deaper, secretary of the Hampshire Association for the Care of the Blind, who told Harry how her organisation helped blind people to learn to ski on the slopes of the Staines Ski School, Aldershot.

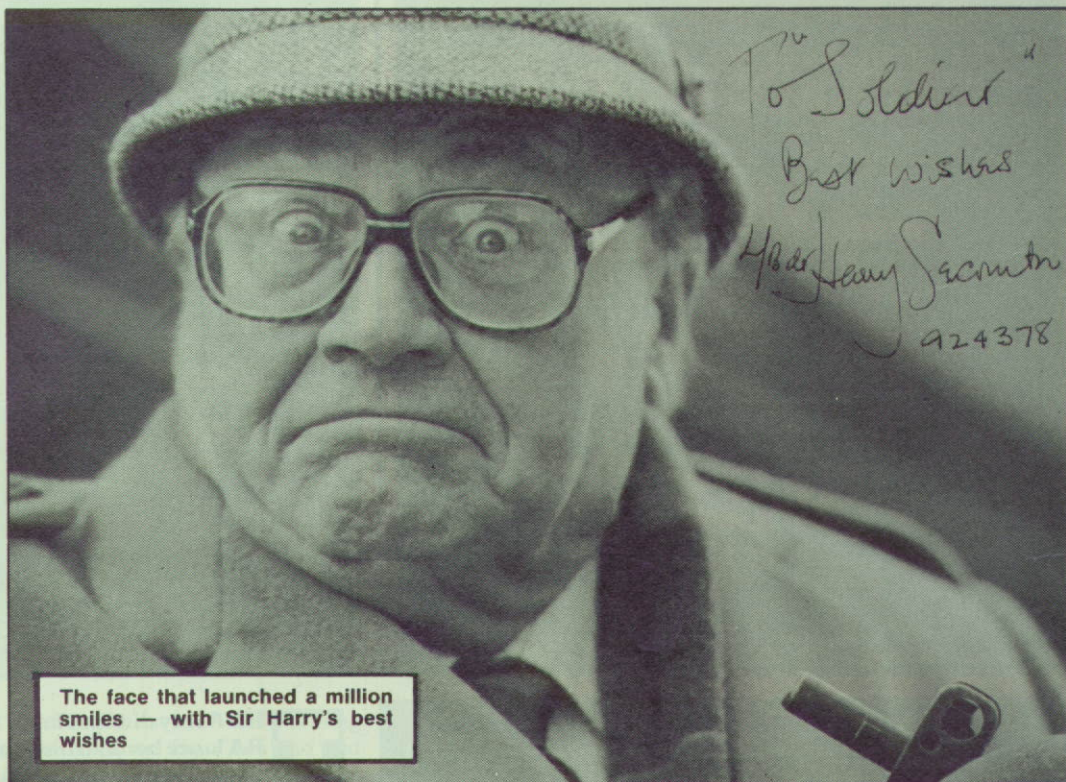
He followed this up with interviews at the military cemetery, then later putting on an ENSA-style show — the wartime forerunner of CSE — and other visits.

All good stuff for the Sunday evening TV programme and its 10,000,000 viewers.

Quickly reminiscing he told how he was called up into the TA the day he made a 'cock-up' with the men's wages at Newlands Colliery in Glamorgan, as a wages clerk.

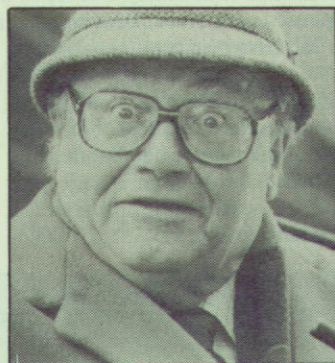
"I don't know what went wrong, but the wrong people got the wrong money. I was glad when I went home to find my call-up papers waiting for me. I left the next day, 30 September 1939. It was the day I went to war and with that mess-up behind me I wasn't sorry."

From there Gunner Secombe joined 132 Fd Regt serving in North Africa, Tunisia, Sicily, Italy and Austria, finishing up with a string of campaign medals which, with his Defence and Victory medals, plus his latter-day decorations, create an impressive sight.

"But it was the Army that started it all for me," said Sir Harry, a modest and affable man, anxious to give the Army due credit for its help in his success.

"I was never part of ENSA. I was a regimental comic. Always larking about like tap-dancing on the Naafi table-tops, taking off the sergeant major, which always led to trouble with the RSM but nothing ever serious.

"We were a fighting unit and it was only when I went sick in Italy, after spending some time in a mountain OP and was convalescing, that I became involved in the business proper.

"With the end of the war I joined

a company of soldier entertainers called the Central Pool of Artists. Among them were comedians Norman Vaughan and Ken Platt."

Since those days of 40 years ago Harry Secombe has become a household name — as have fellow Goons Milligan, Sellers and Bentine.

But it wasn't just the radio Goon Show that made his name, for he is an accomplished actor with many stage and film roles to his credit; he has written several books and countless articles.

Now, in his 65th year, he is a TV personality with a weekly show audience numbering millions.

Why did he think he was selected to present *Highway* with its religious overtones?

He wasn't sure, as he was not a devout churchgoer — although his brother was a Canon before retirement and he had a fairly strict religious upbringing as a youngster in Wales. C of E, he said, which

came as a bit of a surprise.

But he was certain when asked how the soldiers of today compared with those of his time. "They're marvellous," he said. "They are always polite and I don't think they like their jokes too blue. It embarrasses them.

"And one thing that comes over to me is that the attitude between officers and men is far more relaxed than it ever was in my day."

With one visit to the Falklands behind him — he went there two years ago — he said how much he enjoyed his visit and would like to go again.

"It was great," he said, "meeting all the lads. I just hope that living conditions for them have improved since I was there.

"But that journey down is something else. That is something anyone can do without."

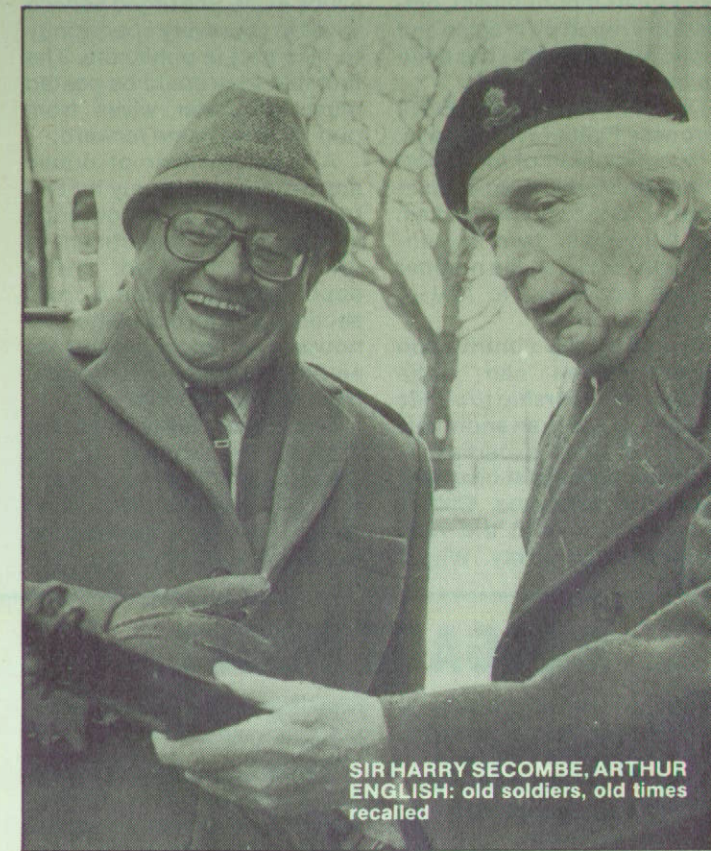
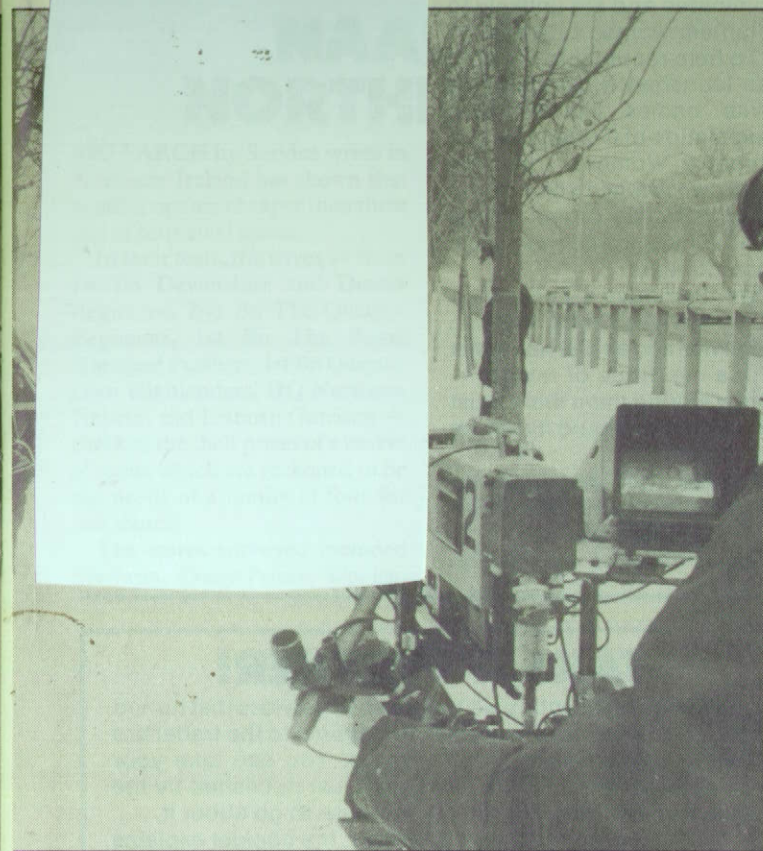

THE Equal Opportunities Commission's report on Women and Public Appointments has been published.

The chairman of the EOC, Baroness Platt of Writtle, says: "The conclusion of the report is that Ministers should appoint more women to public bodies. The findings show a tremendous gap between the number of men appointed to that of women."

To ignore the contribution which women can make through membership to public bodies is to waste an enormous amount of latent expertise.

Interestingly this subject was raised by Baroness Philips when she spoke at the 1984 Federation of Army Wives'

Clubs AGM. She urged Service wives to take every opportunity to take part in public life. The fact that they could be posted must not deter wives from putting their name forward.

A great number of public appointments are only for two to three years, and knowledge of a particular department is often not required. Many appointments require a cross section of the population — housewives employed and unemployed, young and old, and from all walks of life.

The report says that the reason why women do not participate is they do not use the 'old boy' network, also many of the organisations making nominations are male-

dominated and are unlikely to volunteer women's names.

To help rectify this the EOC has launched a campaign to invite bodies like National Association of Citizens Advice Bureaux, Women's Institutes and Townswomen's Guilds and other voluntary organisations to nominate women to public appointments.

We now have a Federation of Army Wives' Clubs, a wealth of Service and ex-Service wives with a multitude of talents — surely among them there must be wives who would like to be nominated.

I know from personal experience the tremendous fulfilment of such service.

## BAGGAGE BOOST

SINCE the partial descaling of married quarters in North West Europe and UK in 1982, an extra unaccompanied baggage allowance of 2.12 cum for officers and 1.70 cum for soldiers has been added to the wife's entitlement when personnel are posted to BAOR. It has been a condition that the additional allowance may only be sent to UK.

The Ministry of Defence has now formally confirmed that

descaling of MQs has taken place in Cyprus and Gibraltar.

With immediate effect therefore, BAOR personnel who are posted to Cyprus or Gibraltar and whose families will join them there, may forward the additional entitlement to those commands at public expense.

The paper which sets out unaccompanied baggage entitlements is being amended.

## TIP

HEADMASTERS in the UK have been informed by SCEA of the M3c(A) telephone number (01-381 2781/2782) and instructed to use it in the event that schoolchildren in their care, whose Service parents are serving abroad, are seriously injured, ill or have died.

To facilitate M3c(A) action, it is most important that headmasters can give the Service number, name, rank, initials and unit of the serving parent. Parents should satisfy themselves that the headmaster is

aware of the M3c(A) telephone number.

Headmasters have been informed that the compassionate cell cannot be used for the passage of routine and non-urgent messages, or in those cases where parents are stationed in the UK.

Officers, soldiers and accompanying wives who are stationed overseas, or warned for service overseas, are each to be given a card for them to pass on to their respective next of kin or in the case of children at boarding school to the headmaster of the school concerned. This includes regular TA and reserve personnel attending exercises overseas.

## MATTRESS CHARGES

To help families clarify the position when charges over mattresses are raised on their AFs P1956 and AFs G8183, so that families know the exact reason for the charge and can accept or query, the following explanation must be written beside the mattress concerned. There is a great difference between a re-make charge of approximately £17-£20 or a full charge of over £50.

(a) "Beyond Economic Repair (BER)" — where mattresses are damaged and a full charge is made.

(b) "Soiled — destroy" — where mattresses are too unhygienic to handle and transport and a full charge is made.

(c) "Soiled — remake" — where mattresses are soiled and can be recovered and where a remaking charge applies.

These categories do not of course preclude the change of an old type of mattress, which has been in a married quarter for some considerable time, for a new one without a charge being raised.

## TAKE IT FURTHER!

IF YOU have recently paid for goods or services that turned out to be faulty and find your complaints to the trader are falling on deaf ears, don't give up. You can take your complaint further and a new guide just published by the Office of Fair Trading will tell you how to go about it.

Called 'I'm going to take it further', the booklet explains how, if the trader is a member of a trade association which has an arbitration scheme as part of its code of practice, you can use arbitration to resolve your dispute instead of taking the trader to court.

'I'm going to take it further' is available free from Trading Standards or Consumer Protection Departments, Citizens Advice Bureaux and Consumer Advice Centres. Alternatively, contact the Office of Fair Trading, Room 310C, Field House, 15-25 Bream's Buildings, London, EC4A 1PR.

# NAAFI DOES WELL IN NORTHERN IRELAND TESTS

RESEARCH by Service wives in Northern Ireland has shown that Naafi shops are cheaper than three out of four rival stores.

In their tests, the wives — from 1st Bn Devonshire and Dorset Regiment, 2nd Bn The Queen's Regiment, 1st Bn The Royal Highland Fusiliers, 1st Bn Queen's Own Highlanders, HQ Northern Ireland, and Lisburn Garrison — checked the shelf prices of a basket of items which are reckoned to be the needs of a family of four for one month.

The stores surveyed included Stewarts, Crazy Prices, Woolco, Greens, Spar, and the Naafi shops at Holywood, Ballykinler, Lisburn, Aldergrove, and Ballykelly.

At the Lisburn Naafi shop, the bill for the entire 'basket' was £129.08 compared to £127.85, £131.41 and £131.54½ at Stewarts, Crazy Prices, and Greens respec-

tively. The net price at Naafi, after discount, was £125.21.

"We compared like for like products — for instance, 'N' symbol goods with rival 'own brands' of a similar size" said Mrs Betty Stamp, a UK Federation of Army Wives Clubs representative.

"Out of twelve stores tested, only three could better Naafi's shelf prices; after discount, none were

cheaper.

"We had to go to the larger stores because cornershops — to which many Naafi shops are comparable — refused to take part. Even so, the test showed that a lot of criticism of Naafi's prices is unjustified."

Hopefully I will be able to join him there, when we will have married quarters.

He has been to Germany before, but I've never been abroad so therefore I'm not very 'with it' on the way other countries work, where the shops are, and so on.

I was wondering if there is any information which you would be able to send which might enlighten me on the situation I'm going to have to face. There must be other wives who are thinking on the same lines. — Ms A, Brentford.

Ask your fiancé to ask at his unit for an Army Wives Guide 1982. This will give you a lot of information and advice. I wrote it specially for those about to marry or newly-married into the Services.

When you join your husband in Germany the Army will send you all the necessary information etc.

My friend who has just been posted said she had difficulty in getting her personal baggage to UK and that the form she used was returned.

I have forms which I used last time so I should have no problems — Name and address supplied. Your friend most probably used the out of date Form C3 (Forces) to move her unaccompanied baggage to UK from overseas under official arrangements.

This form was replaced in January 1984 and became obsolete on 1 June 84, being replaced by a new form C3 TRIAL.

This is the new declaration form and the ONLY one. So throw away your old form if it is not a Form C3 TRIAL.

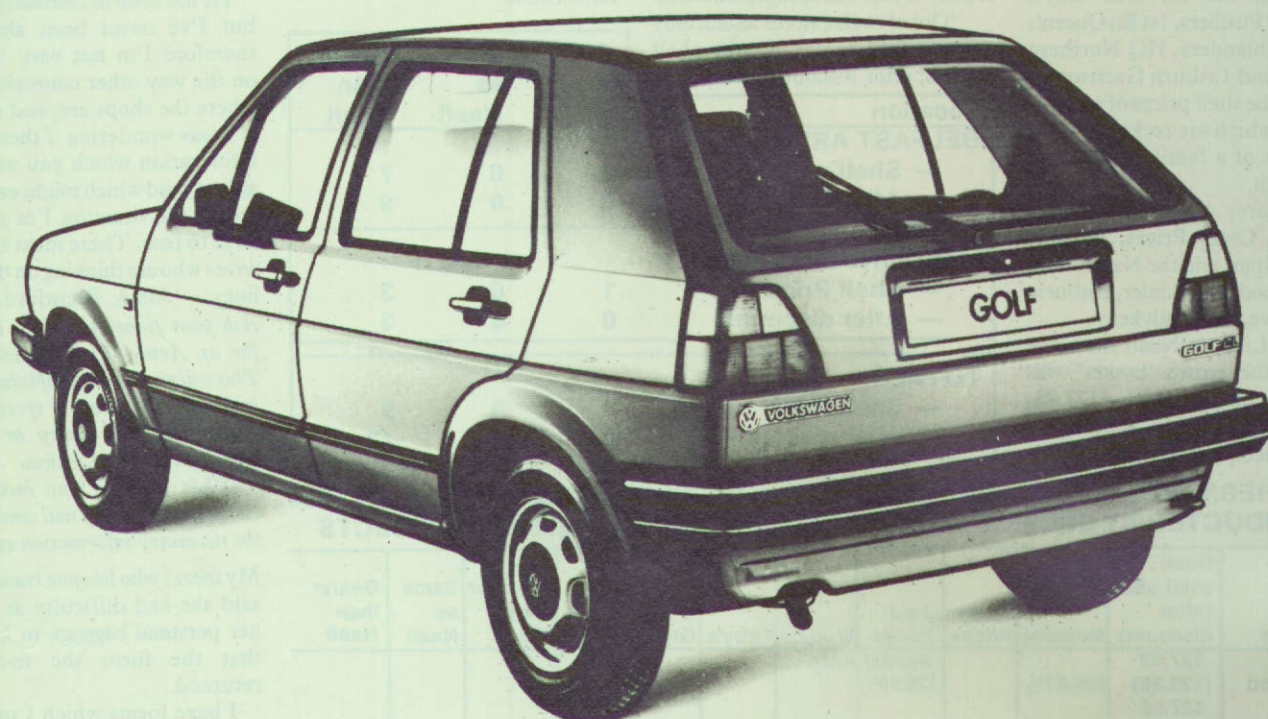

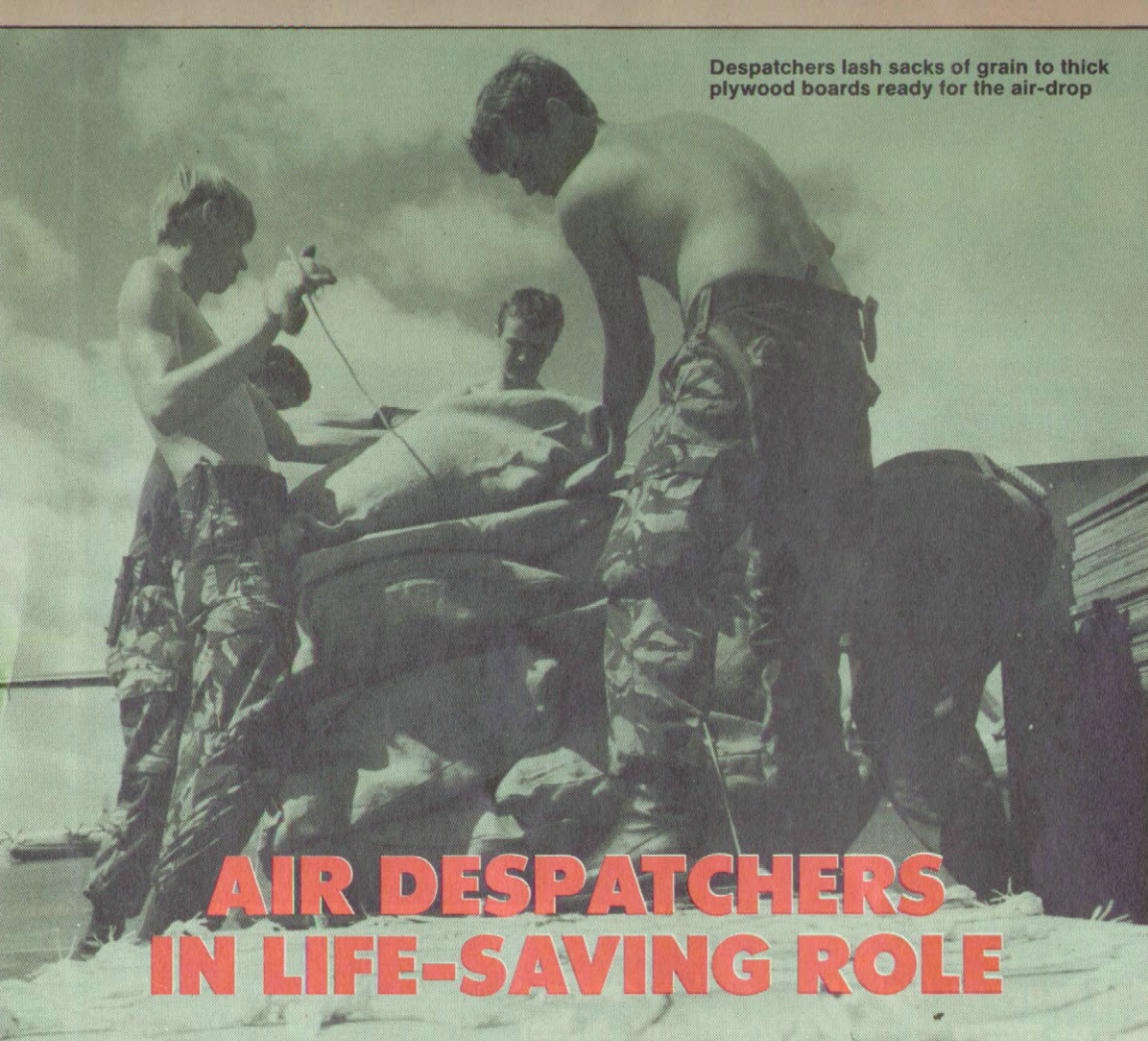

# 'ONE CANNOT PRAISE THEM TOO HIGHLY'

## AIR DESPATCHERS IN LIFE-SAVING ROLE

**T**HEY are hard men — one cannot praise them too highly." This was how Flight Lieutenant Jim Norfolk described the soldiers of 47 Air Despatch Squadron, Royal Corps of Transport, after the first and highly successful air drop of grain by the RAF in Ethiopia.

Jim Norfolk was the captain of the Hercules C130, or 'Fat Albert' as the transports are affectionately called, from which the drop had been carried out in the mountainous region of the country some 100 miles north east of Addis Ababa.

The drop zone was on top of a plateau some 7,500 feet above sea level and surrounded by deep gorges with sheer sides and at such altitudes the performance of the four Allison turboprops which power the Hercules is greatly degraded. This fact, together with the unforgiving nature of the topography, means that there is very little room for anything to go wrong.

Jim and his aircrew had every reason to be thankful that the team responsible for despatching the grain out the back of the aircraft as it flew at just 50 feet above the ground at 140 mph knew exactly what they were about.

And if the high altitudes degrade aircraft performance, they also have a similar effect on humans, the thinner air depriving the body of oxygen just when it could do with it most.

For the air despatch crew on this mission, comprising Warrant Officer 2 Paul Foley, Sergeant Geordie Alderson and Corporals Graham Ewen and Alf Darkes, had to push some 10,000 lbs at a time out the back of a non too gently

manoeuvring aeroplane.

Although they are attached to the aircraft by straps which will prevent them from actually following the load out, there is still a danger of injury from falling or getting a foot caught in the roller conveyers on which the loads are pushed.

At the start of Operation Bushel, the code name for the British Military relief effort in the famine stricken country, it was envisaged that most of the supplying would be carried out by air drops; so two members of the squadron went out to Ethiopia to advise the RAF Detachment Commander and to prepare the way for the arrival of the rest of the air despatchers who would be required for the operation.

In the event, the RAF found that the requirement was for air landings to deliver the grain and it was not until the end of January that it looked as though the drops would go ahead and the rest of the RAF Lyneham-based 47 Air Despatch Squadron detachment arrived at Addis Ababa on 22

January. Their ranks were swelled to 14, which represents three despatch crews.

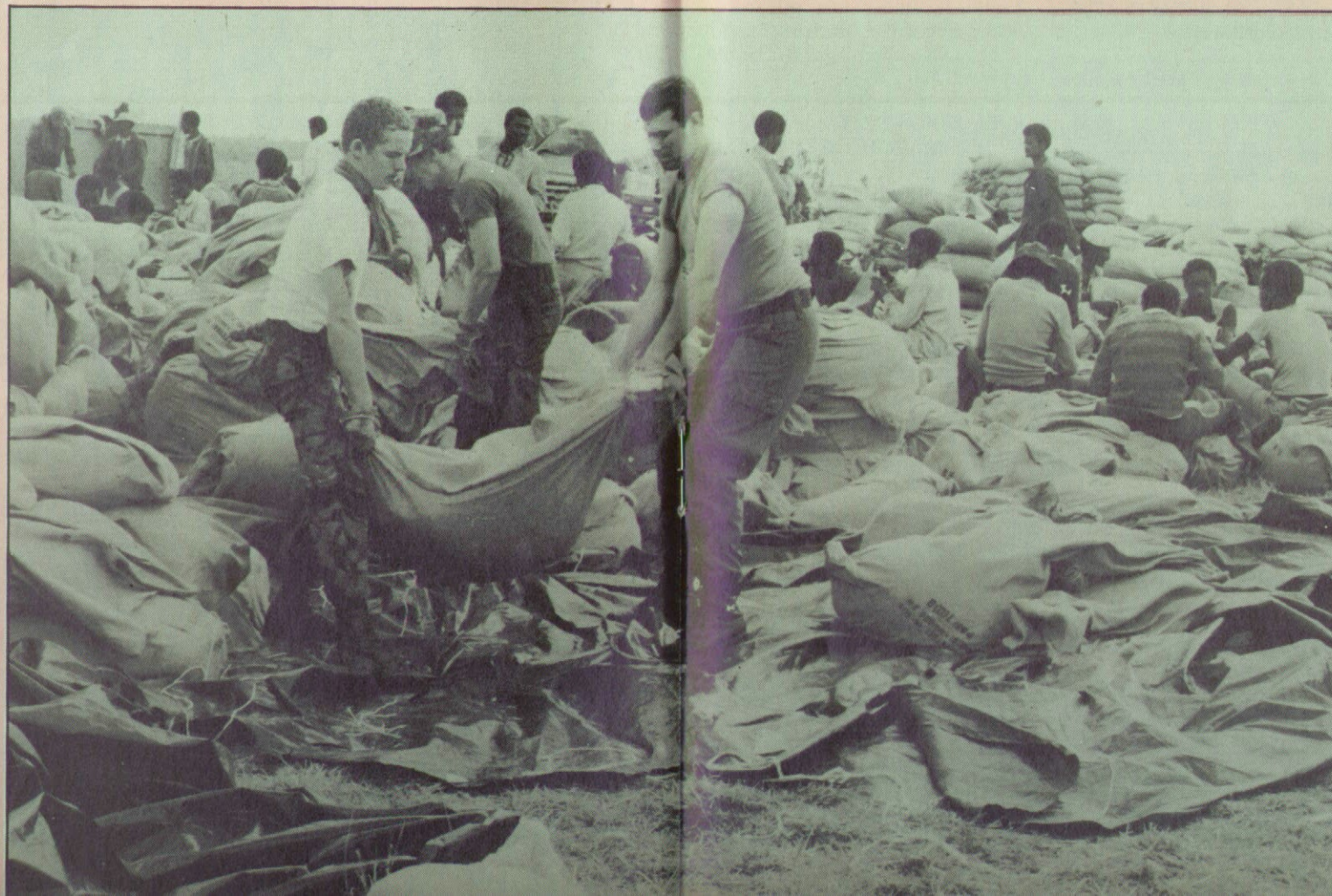
The vision of these soldiers humping and pushing heavy loads

around belies the skill, and scientific approach, that air despatchers need to bring to their work.

Many careful calculations have

to be made if the grain is to reach the ground without the bags splitting and spilling their life-saving contents.

Fortunately, this type of air drop

was not new to the squadron as they had carried out similar operations in Nepal in 1980 and in Rhodesia a couple of years before that. Indeed, the method of dropping selected in Ethiopia is known as the 'Nepal Free Drop'.

Up to 20 sacks are attached to thick plywood boards, referred to as containers, using nylon cord. The optimum amount of the grain contained in each sack has to be determined.

Too little and it is wasteful of materials and effort; too much and the bag will simply 'explode' on impact with the ground.

The strength and tightness of the cords can be critical. Too loose or not strong enough and the load could fall apart too soon, such as inside the aircraft during flight. But if the lashings are too tight or don't break at the right time, then they will cut into the sacks causing the grain to be scattered all over the countryside.

The type of sacks used is also important, and the best combin-

ation is a nylon one inside a jute bag. Unfortunately, the nylon sacks are in fairly short supply and if air drops become a regular feature of Bushel, then hopefully, more will be manufactured.

To help prepare the loads, the air despatchers have some local labour at their disposal. Here, previous experience on similar operations proved useful.

Officer Commanding the detachment, Captain Steve Govan said: "Lots of smiles, lots of character and a bit of showmanship work wonders." No doubt it was the showmanship which came to the fore when the locals were given a break from sewing up the grain sacks only to go on parade and be put through the rudiments of square bashing. They loved it.

Getting the apparent leader of the group on your side is also useful, and WO2 Foley wasted little time in picking his man.

## The art of acquiring an ally!

for his newly appointed charge-hand ensured Paul had a staunch ally when it came to keeping up the quotas of grain sacks being prepared!

The grain having been received, and prepared in the sacks, it then has to be built into the loads before it is rigged — that is tied onto the boards. The next step is to load it into the aeroplane.

Then there is the final check to ensure that the load is safe and won't shift during the flight. As far as possible, one crew, usually comprising a corporal, lance corporal and two drivers will see a given load right the way through the preparation, the loading and the final despatch at the DZ.

There is also one other problem that faces the squadron on this

particular detachment, although happily, at the time of writing, its manifestation has not been too drastic among the despatchers.

Despite all precautions and the administration of the detachment medical officer, there is an inevitability that one will sooner or later become somewhat pre-occupied by one of the more basic bodily functions.

At the best of times, the facilities onboard 'Fat Albert' are not exactly designed to provide maximum comfort in such moments of distress. When the aircraft is in the air drop role, they simply do not exist, for the 'honey bucket' is stowed up out of the way.

"There is nothing they can do about it," said Capt Govan. "It would jeopardise the whole mission.

They just carry a spare pair of pants."

But altitude could still be the biggest problem. "At 10,000 feet with lots of heavy work, it can lead to air starvation," he explained. They could well need a whiff of oxygen."

During the air drop, it fell to Captain Govan to accompany some of the aircrew in a Russian-built Hip helicopter of the Ethiopian Air Force to go and recce the DZ. He remained there to provide the radio link between the Hercules and the ground.

Such a link is vital, for the aircrew need to know that the DZ is clear of people and animals. Thousands flocked to watch the air drop and understandably were very eager to get to the food.

So gracefully do the grain sacks seem to exit from the aircraft that it was not beyond the realms of possibility that some may have attempted to catch them. The grain might be a life-saver, but not 110 lbs of it travelling at some 140 mph.

As well as being the first operational air drop — two practice drops having been carried out alongside the runway at Addis Ababa beforehand — it was by way of a demonstration that this method of getting food to the starving would work.

Officials from the Ethiopian Government, the United Nations and the Embassies of other involved nations were there to watch the exercise which has been dubbed Operation Saint Bernard by the UN.

Another drop took place the next day at the same DZ. The two drops by the RAF Hercules of 47 Squadron with its air despatch crew from 47 Air Despatch Squadron — the squadron numbers are a coincidence — were more than 95 per cent successful, and even then, much of the grain which was spilled was recoverable.

### The only way?

At the time of writing, the future of air drops is uncertain. There can be no question that air drops are an effective way of getting food to those areas which are inaccessible by roads and which are not served by airstrips. It might also be the only way if the rains come and wash out the airstrips.

In the meantime, the RAF continues with air land operations and the chances are that the air despatchers will return home pending a decision by the Ethiopians that they want Operation Saint Bernard to go ahead.

"If it does, we shall be ready," said Capt Govan.



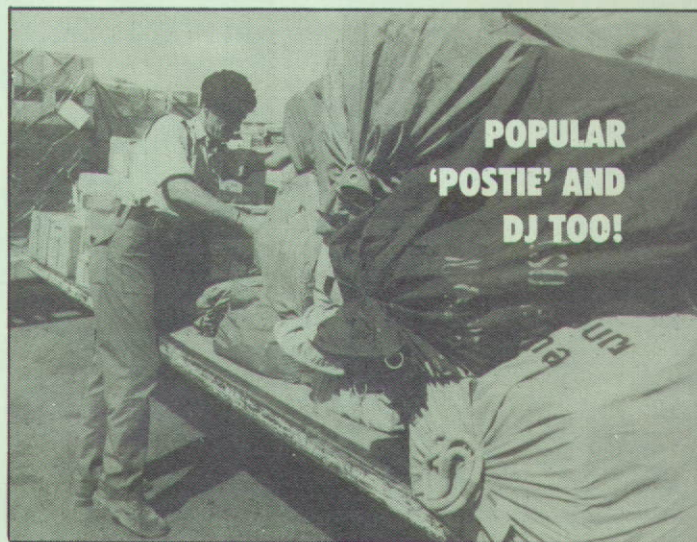
ON FOUR days of each week, Staff Sergeant Ray Jennings, Royal Engineers, became the most popular man on the British Military Detachment at Addis Ababa.

For Ray is a member of the Bulford-based 21 PC Squadron and that means he was the postman.

He has now returned home to the UK after an eight week tour, but no doubt his successor enjoys similar popularity as members of the 70-strong detachment serving in Ethiopia in support of Operation Bushel eagerly await home news.

Although the amount of incoming mail is not particularly large — between 100 and 150 letters per delivery — collecting it at Addis Ababa airport can be quite an art.

It usually starts its journey from the UK on British Airways, changing en-route at Nairobi, Athens or Frankfurt onto an aircraft of Ethiopian Airways. When it arrives three days later, the postie has the daunting task of searching through mountains of

mail sacks for the one marked BFPO 626.

Strictly speaking, soldiers and airmen on the detachment should come to Ray to collect their mail. But often as not, he sorted it out into units and then went round and delivered it personally.

"You have to be flexible in a situation like this," he said. "With

two crews flying each day, they don't have the chance to come after me, so I make it easier for them."

He also took mail for posting back to the UK at anytime. No post office for Ray.

He despatched mail six times a

week, those on detachment being able to use concessionary rates the same as inland first and second class post in the UK.

It was the uncertainty of how long Operation Bushel would continue which led to Ray's tour lasting a rather lengthy eight weeks which saw him in Ethiopia over Christmas and the New Year. "Now we know it is going on longer, I am being replaced," he said.

Being there over the holiday period gave Ray a pretty hectic time — "But any problems have been smoothed out now," he added.

The local British residents helped to make sure that Christmas was not too bleak for the detachment. "Everybody was sponsored out to a family," he explained. "We all had a very good time and were treated smashing by the British community."

A party on New Years Eve found Ray in a rather unaccustomed role — that of disc jockey. "I had to scrounge some tapes and I just tried to play the music that everybody wanted," he said.

## RADIO OPERATOR ON HIS SECOND MERCY TOUR

LANCE Corporal Robert Cook — 'Cookie' to his friends — sat engrossed in his book in the operations tent of the British Military Detachment at Addis Ababa.

At his elbow was a radio which

emitted, at least to the untrained ear, a continuous stream of unintelligible chatter punctuated by crackles and hisses that defied any form of interpretation.

Suddenly, amid the cacophonous babble, Cookie put down his

book and picked up the hand set of the radio — "Hello, this is Bushel, go ahead Ascot..."

There followed what seemed to be a one sided conversation — one sided in the sense that only Cookie's responses to the squawks on the radio could be understood — notes were made on a pad and then the detachment's radio operator reported to the operations officer precisely what the message had been from one of the RAF's Hercules transports engaged in the famine relief operation several hundred miles to the north of the Ethiopian capital.

He then returned to his book, having effectively demonstrated the art of being able to concentrate on two things at the same time.

"I've been an operator for nine years," he explained. "I always keep a space in my mind for the call sign."

Cookie, who is from 29 Transport and Movement Regiment, RCT, based at South Cerney, was on his second tour in Ethiopia in support of Operation Bushel.

He came out at the start, returning to the UK at the beginning of December, and then came out again on 17 January.

There are only six operators in his troop which had a heavy commitment in Norway. "So I volunteered to come again."

"I enjoy it — it makes a change and is one of the only times I'm detached to work for the RAF.

There are a lot of differences. Because of my unit's commitment in Norway, I shall probably be here until the end of March."

At the start of the operation, Cookie used to fly with the aircraft to provide the radio link with operations at Addis while on the ground.

"I've operated from Assab and Alamata. As there is no ground station there, I took a man pack and used a bit of wire for an aerial."

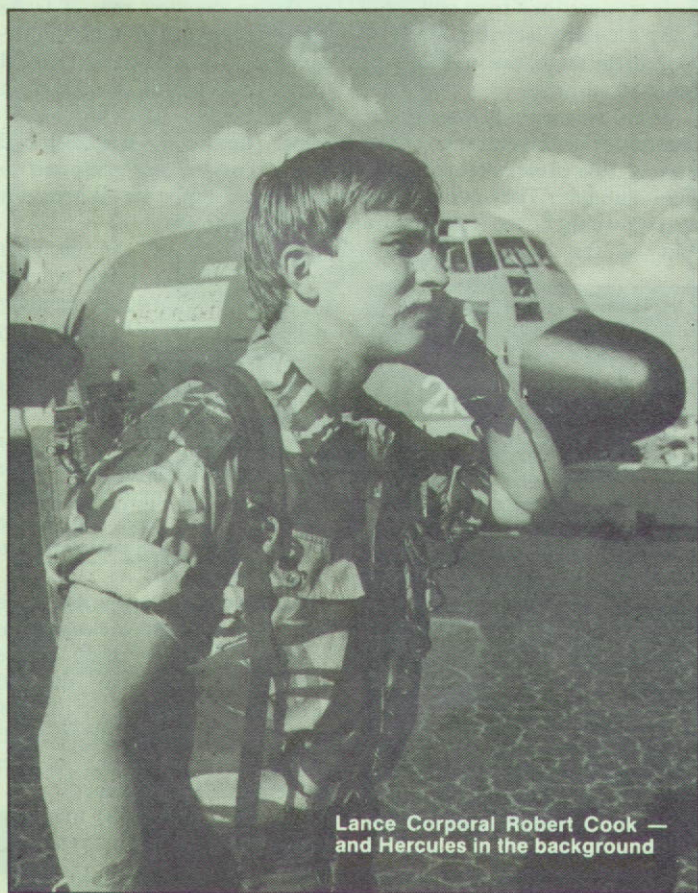
Now the aircraft keep their auxiliary power units running while on the ground so the onboard radio can be used. Accordingly, there is no need for Cookie to fly up country with the Hercules.

But his working day is still long and like most people on this detachment, he turns his hand to all sorts of jobs. "I often come in at 0445 hours," he said.

"I collect the weather from the met office and get the flight sheets signed. I also deal with the transport and if necessary, stand in for the officer of the watch. I generally work until the last flight returns back to Addis, which is usually between 1700 and 1800 hours.

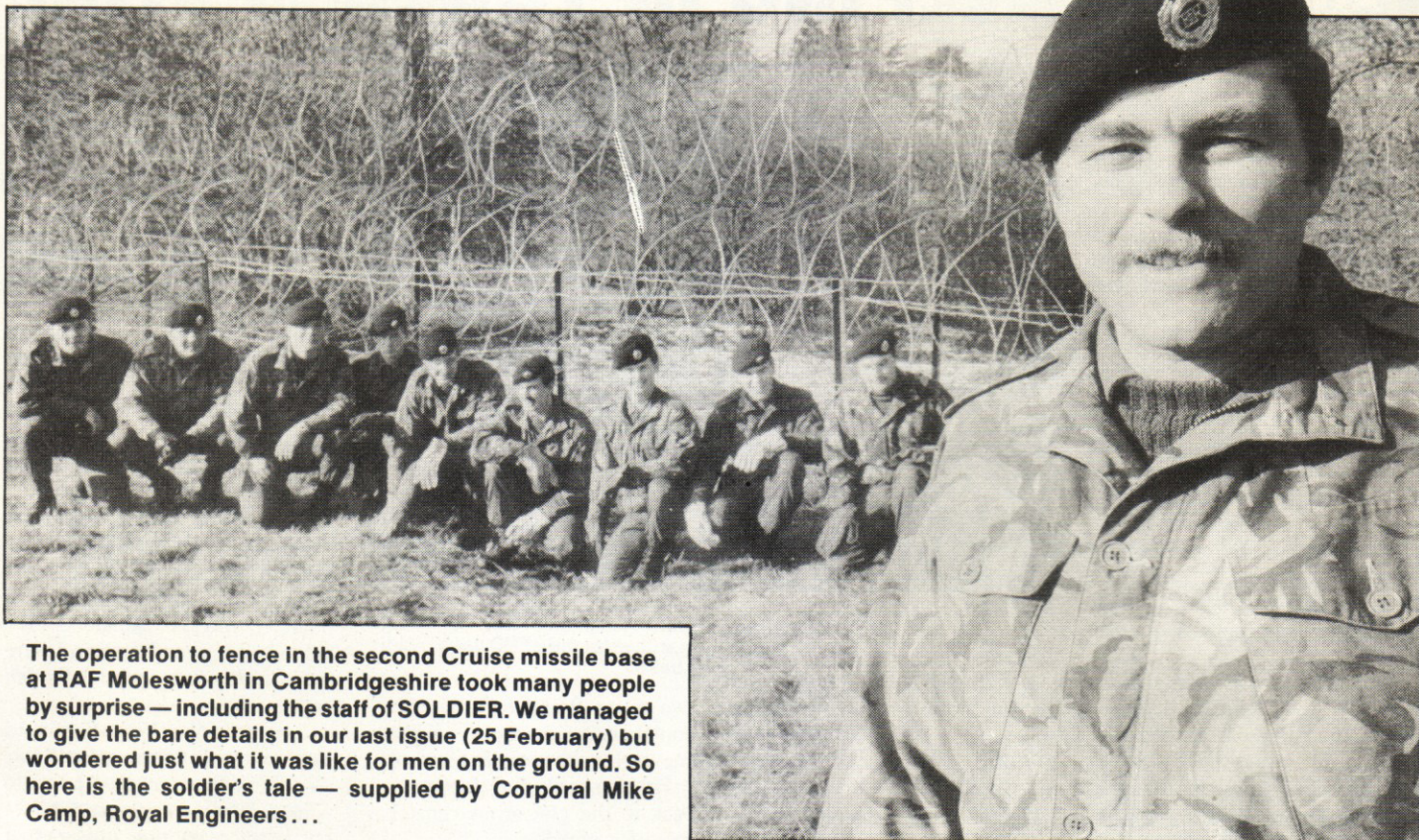
"It can be a long day — especially when it's hot."

The operation to fence in the second Cruise missile base at RAF Molesworth in Cambridgeshire took many people by surprise — including the staff of **SOLDIER**. We managed to give the bare details in our last issue (25 February) but wondered just what it was like for men on the ground. So here is the soldier's tale — supplied by Corporal Mike Camp, Royal Engineers...

**MONDAY** 4 February saw 36 Engineer Regiment assembled on the main square of Invicta Park, Maidstone fitted up and ready to move to an unknown destination.

The past three to four weeks the Regiment has been involved in a lot of wiring exercises by day and night and rumour control was running high.

As the light was fading the Commanding Officer, Lieutenant Colonel Richard Oliver, RE, put us all in the picture up to lunchtime the following day.

We would be staying overnight in Colchester Garrison and picking up some additional men and stores.

Questions were not permitted; all would be revealed in good time. The Regiment mounted up and moved to sunny Essex.

The first elements arrived in Colchester late Monday night and 20 Squadron were among the first in. After a mad dash for the accommodation to secure one of few mattresses available it was down to the cookhouse for a cup of soup then a good night's sleep ready for the following activities.

Reveille at 0600 hrs revealed a dramatic increase in men and transport that had been moving in all night and it was a free for all in the washrooms and down to breakfast before first parade.

I must at this point congratulate the chefs from 36 Engineer Regiment for a magnificent effort in feeding this mini army.

The morning started with a CO's briefing to all ranks of our final destination and individual tasks.

Due to the sensitive nature of

the operation there was still a need for secrecy. The rest of the morning was taken up with the checking of stores and final preparations so that by lunchtime everyone was ready.

The afternoon was spent catching some 'shut-eye' prior to the move out during the early evening.

The first to go were the main party of men and stores who moved to their form up point at Waterbeach home of 39 Engineer Regiment and from there onto

RAF Molesworth.

By 2359 the recce had barely found their 'bits' when the main body appeared as if from nowhere.

By accounts later the move in took all the locals 'not in the know' quite by surprise.

There was a small welcoming committee at the entrance of the base of two protestors and their mini clubman. They pointed out that we would be the 'cause of the end of the world' and then

proceeded to park their car across the road we went around.

By 0600 Wednesday and in quite thick fog the first row of fence was complete, not without complications; some sections encountered buried concrete, thick scrub and a few ditches.

By lunch time our section had the final row of wire 'accrowed' in and over a cuppa we all agreed it looked a fine job.

Alas, four of the resident protestors didn't think so and industriously set about dismantling it, but the fences 'bit back' and they retreated with sore and cut hands. A few minor repairs restored the fence to its former glory.

Towards the end of the day a few protestors took a little more interest in the operation but as sightseers only and the whole perimeter of 7.5 km was complete by last light.

All remaining stores and tools were handed back. As we made tracks for home we could see the fence and some of the 16 observation towers lit by 132 sets of security lights which were still being erected by one of the Waterbeach Squadrons.

We were all a little 'wire weary' but had a long weekend to look forward to for a job well done.

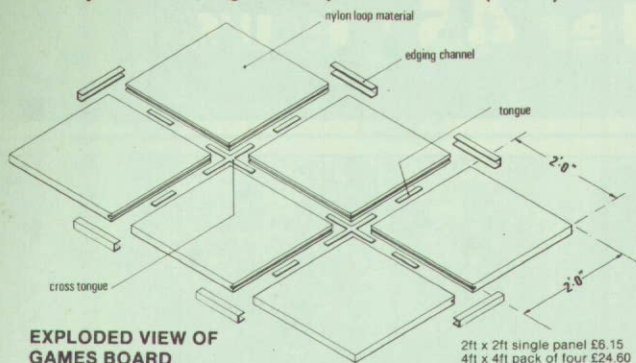

AJOR Alistair Craib, second in command of 33 Engineer Regiment (Explosive Ordnance Disposal) cannot afford to be frightened by unexploded bombs ... but he is concerned about becoming 'something of a killjoy'!

In a matter of months, duty calls have meant that he and his men have been involved in cancellation of a Bob Hope show in Portsmouth and, more recently (SOLDIER 25 February) the postponement of a Second Division football match.

The more recent event, in Sheffield produced the biggest bomb Major Craib has had to worry about in his time — a 1,000 kilogram German World War 2 specimen, affectionately known as a Herman.

"It is the first time I have ever dealt with one, and by comparison the Portsmouth bomb (250 kg) was small," said Major Craib, who was alerted by 2 pm on the day in question and who was probably more disconcerted by the weather ('an appalling drive in snow and traffic jams') than by the task in hand.

They reached Sheffield at 7 pm after their drive from Kent and within two hours the Royal Engineers knew they had got a Herman, and problems.

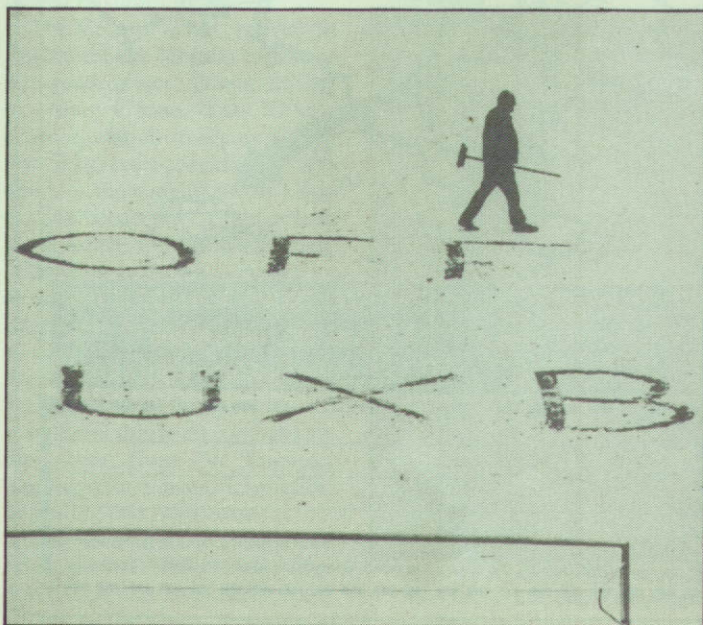
The fuse was awkwardly placed, and covered by an extension cap to hide the markings. Once they had cut off the cap they drilled into the fuse to inject neutralising liquid and the bomb was lifted from the trench to ground level for the next task — steaming out the explosive.

Even here the weather took a hand — the steaming equipment froze!

In all, from time of arrival to burning off explosive and packing up for home at the end of a dramatic weekend, 46 hours work were involved.

Yet the bomb was made safe. All the nearby residents were safe.

# NOW FOR THE SOLOMONS!

**T**EN DAYS after defusing Herman of Sheffield in the sub-zero cold of English winter, Captain Paddy Bowen led his team off to the sweltering jungles of the Solomon Islands to look for similarly old bombs and shells left behind by World War 2.

They had no doubt they would find them, probably in their thousands.

On a previous clearance sorties, more than 12,000 explosive objects ranging from mortars to 1,000 lb bombs were picked up in a 200 acre site.

Some of the fiercest fighting of the Pacific campaign took place in the Melanesian islands, the bloodiest of all probably on Guadalcanal in the Solomons, a name which has now passed into American military history.

At the peak of the conflict some 43,000 Japanese and 60,000 American Servicemen battered each other for control of the island.

Thousands of them died. Millions of bombs, shells and bullets were expended.

Some 40 years later, there are probably still millions of unex-

ploded objects lying, rusting, in the dense jungle which covers most of the island.

The sprawling, rugged island of Guadalcanal, the most southerly in the Solomons group, had been chosen as the place for a new American initiative to follow up the defeat of the Japanese navy at Midway.

It was to be the battleground which would check the Japanese southerly invasion, and the beginning of an American amphibious island-hopping counter-attack which would end in Japan itself.

But the Japanese had also chosen Guadalcanal as their next major objective, and the scene was set for one of the most fateful battles of the whole war.

The jungle airstrip, to become known as Henderson Field in memory of a marine major flying hero killed over Midway, was probably the most vital piece of land on the whole island.

The airfield has been extended several times since then, and now serves the capital, Honiara. On each occasion it has been necessary to sweep the land and for unexploded ammunition and other

objects before work could begin. The Americans have sent EOD teams there, so have the Australians and New Zealanders.

Now the Solomon Islands government plans to extend the runway again to take bigger aircraft, and an area about 1,200 metres long by 300 metres wide will be cleared by the 24-man team from 33 Engineer Regiment (Explosive Ordnance Disposal) from Chattenden, who flew out from Heathrow in mid-February.

"It's impossible to estimate how many explosives are still left on the island, but there definitely is a lot," said Capt Bowen. "Every time there are bush fires the local people hear random explosions in the distance. They find a lot of unexploded stuff and are told to put up notices marking the unexploded bombs.

"One of the locals has set up a small museum with various bits and pieces, including a couple of unexploded shells — we are a little

concerned about that!"

"It's difficult to know how many casualties there have been, but the Solomon islanders believe they have lost quite a few in bush fires and also because they like collecting brass scrap from shells by banging them against a tree."

The team expect to find mostly mortars shells and hand grenades, with perhaps the occasional Japanese 50 lb bomb and probably more likely the 100 lb United States general purpose bomb. "We hope to meet up with a whole lot of stuff", said Capt Bowen.

Before they start their clearance operation, the local people will have bulldozed away the vegetation, and the EOD men will then search with metal detectors which can locate objects buried up to two metres deep.

When they find objects they will have two alternatives — if they are unsafe to move they will be blown up in situ, and if they are safe they will be loaded on to barges and taken out to sea for disposal.

Eight weeks after arriving, the EOD men hope to have finished the job and be wondering what the next job will entail...

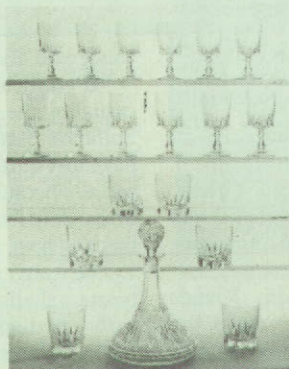

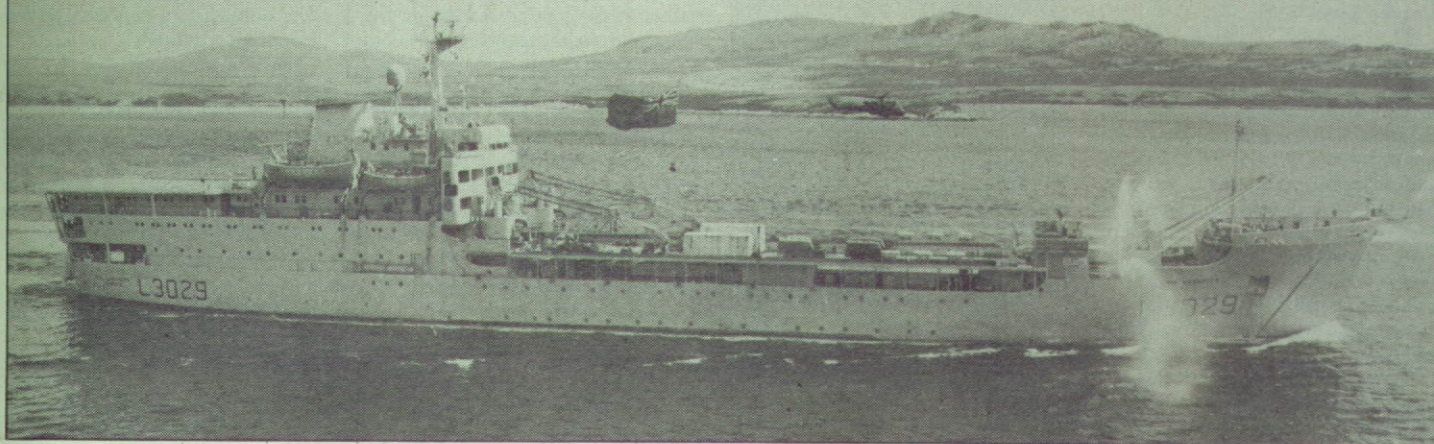

# DIFFERENT VIEW FOR 652!



652 SQUADRON, 1 Regiment Army Air Corps have been seeing a part of the world very different from their base at Hildesheim, West Germany, over the past few months ... on detachment to the Falklands Islands.

The Squadron has been in the South Atlantic since September, tasked to support the garrison with Scout and Gazelle helicopters.

As for every Service unit on Falklands duty, life has been hectic, with long hours of work.

The Squadron's job has been the movement of stores to remote parts of the islands, much of the time direct from ships anchored in the bay. They have also been heavily committed to re-supplying Rapier sites.

Other work has seen them flying in close liaison with the Royal Air Force during forward air control duties.

Coastal reconnaissance work has provided a dramatic change of scenery from the fields and forests of North Germany. This is a vital task in the Falklands with miles of coastlines requiring regular patrols by sea, land and air to check for signs of unauthorised landings and suspicious objects.

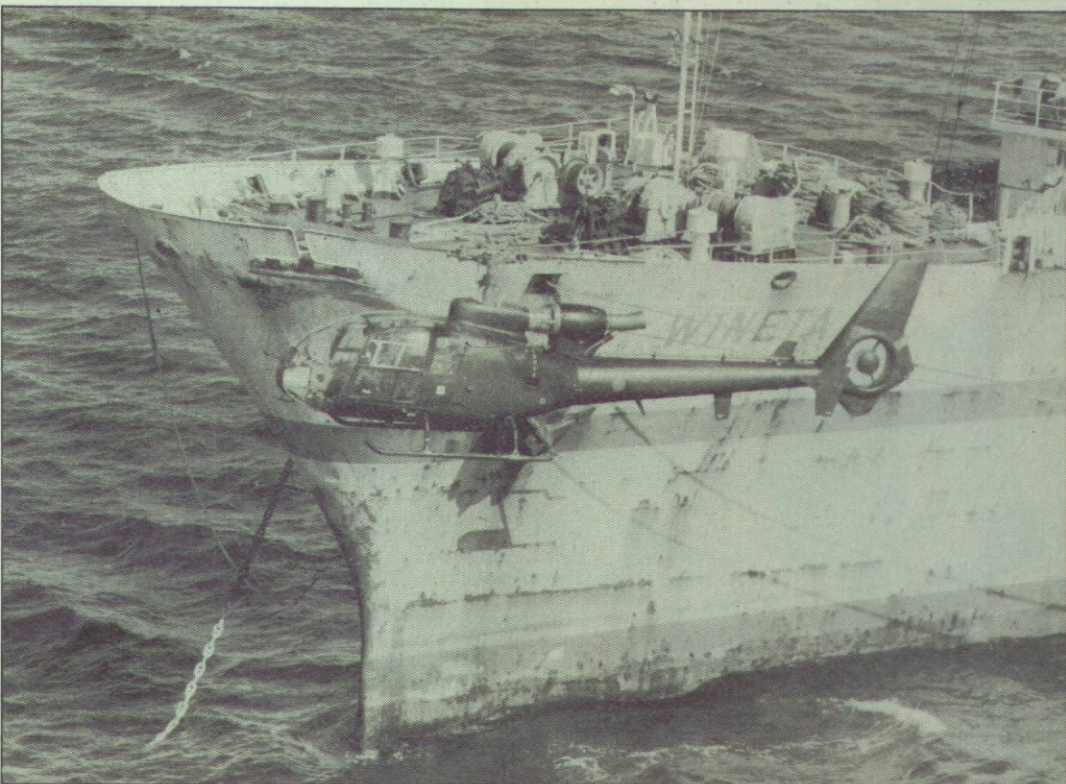
These sorties have given the squadron an ideal opportunity to get a bird's eye view of the breathtaking shoreline.

Meanwhile life on the ground has kept the Squadron equally busy. One of their achievements has been to win the Garrison March and Shoot Competition.

But without a doubt, the highlight of 652 Squadron's tour has been a trip to South Georgia, when they were able to video the route taken by Sir Ernest Shackleton across the island in the early 1900s.

Shackleton led three Antarctic expeditions, during one of which the south magnetic pole was located in 1909.

# COLLECTING MILITARIA? SEEK ADVICE!

## BOOK REVIEW

**MILITARY COLLECTABLES.** An international directory of 20th Century militaria. Chief Consultant Joe Lyndhurst.

"The point is", says Joe Lyndhurst, "that in militaria collecting one item inevitably seems to lead to another; acquire a jacket and you will want a hat to go with it and a badge to put on the hat and spare buttons for the jacket and a 'button-stick' and a webbing belt and so on. A collection grows."

If you have the magpie's instinct of hoarding, as most of us have, then you will find this guide to twentieth-century militaria fascinating reading and containing, in general, accurate information.

There are, however, the usual lapses one finds in this type of publication, such as medal ribbons being reversed (eg Nos 14, 18 and 27 on p74), incorrect medal ribbon (No 31, p77) wrong name (No 4, p76 is *Karltruppenkreuz*), inaccurate identification (No 46, p113 is not 21 Army Group sign, which is correctly shown at 34), captions reversed (nos 35 and 36 on p77) and duplication of items (The 1914-18 Memorial Plaque incorrectly called 'Death Plaque', is shown on p73 and 195).

These types of inaccuracy apart, this is a beautifully produced book with over 3,000 excellent photographs and sensible advice on collecting, including



cleaning and conservation, covering edged weapons, metal insignia, medals, headgear cloth insignia, firearms, ammunition, printed militaria and miscellaneous items, such as compasses, signal equipment, medical, foodstuffs, gas masks and 'trench art' of British, European and USA Armies.

The authors suggest that 20th century militaria items should be collected as 'they lie within the scope of the average collector' presumably meaning financial scope, with which one cannot disagree.

Salamandar Books London. Price £8.95. PSN

A RECORD for any set of toy soldiers was set in London recently when a group of Royal Horse Artillery made by Britains fetched £7,200.

Which just goes to show how fascination can quickly turn into costly valuation, as anyone who collects any form of militaria knows.

Cap badges could be bought by boys during World War 2 for a few old pence — now they cost some new pounds! The more rare badges, particularly of Victorian vintage, will cost much more.

For some years now genuine collectors have been worried by the almost inevitable follow-on to a boom — the sale of non-genuine items; "re-strikes" as they are known.

Sometimes it is hard to detect the difference and for the new collectors, especially youngsters, it can prove disheartening trying. The subject is a veritable mental minefield, even more so when some badges which look cheap and non-issue might well be genuine

because sometimes units overseas had them produced locally.

The best advice we can give any newcomer to the interesting hobby and others involving militaria is to spend a few pounds initially by joining one of the organisations where specialist advice and assistance can be obtained from fellow-members. ## ROYAL ARMY VETERINARY CORPS

IN 1975, as an experimental measure, a young graduate of the recently established London Veterinary College, William Stockley, was attached to the 1st Fencible Cavalry and quickly proved the value of veterinary skills to a mounted unit.

The following year Professor Edward Colman, the head of the London Veterinary College was appointed Principal Veterinary Surgeon to the Cavalry and Veterinary Surgeon to the Board of Ordnance.

For the greater part of the 19th century veterinary care in the British Army was organised on a regimental basis, with little or no central organisation.

Various campaigns and wars, notably the Crimean war and the Indian mutiny, demonstrated the inadequacy of veterinary care based entirely on the regimental system.

### Your Cap Badge: 74

Individual veterinary officers contributed greatly to the advance of veterinary science and animal care.

The Army Veterinary Department was formed in 1881 — which abolished the regimental system except for the Household Cavalry; for the first time, veterinary officers were on the same list and wore one uniform.

The re-organisation, while bringing a number of improvements, did not provide

for sufficient veterinary officers, particularly during the South African war when poor organisation, insufficient numbers of veterinary officers, and a separate and incomplete remount system resulted in tragic waste of animal life.

To improve the care of military animals the Army Veterinary Corps was formed in 1903 consisting of soldiers and ncos who had been attached to the Army Veterinary Services. It was not until 1906 that the Army Veterinary Department was amalgamated with the AVC.

The period preceeding World War 1 was one of intense re-organisation and re-equipping so that by the onset of war the AVC was able to cope with the enormous demands placed on it.

It expanded from an organisation of 372 officers and men to one of nearly 25,000 by the end of the war.

In recognition of the work of the Army Veterinary Corps during World War 1 King George V conferred upon it the title of 'Royal' on 27 November 1918.

There was an immediate and dramatic reduction in both officers and men in the years that followed. It continued throughout the 1930s as the Army was progressively mechanised.

The RAVC expanded greatly during World War 2 although nowhere near the scale of World War 1.

Pack transport was used in most theatres and dogs were used in a number of roles. In the post war years the RAVC has become involved in all aspects of military dog procurement, training, veterinary care and employment while

still retaining its involvement with horses.

The head-dress badge is a Chiron surrounded by a laurel wreath surmounted by the St Edward's crown, and below a scroll inscribed with the title of the Corps.

The Chiron, a creature of Greek mythology, is a man with the body and legs of a horse which symbolises the role of the RAVC in providing the Army with horses under the direction of man.

Until 1918 the head-dress badge consisted of the initials of the Corps (AVC) within a wreath surrounded by Tudor crown.

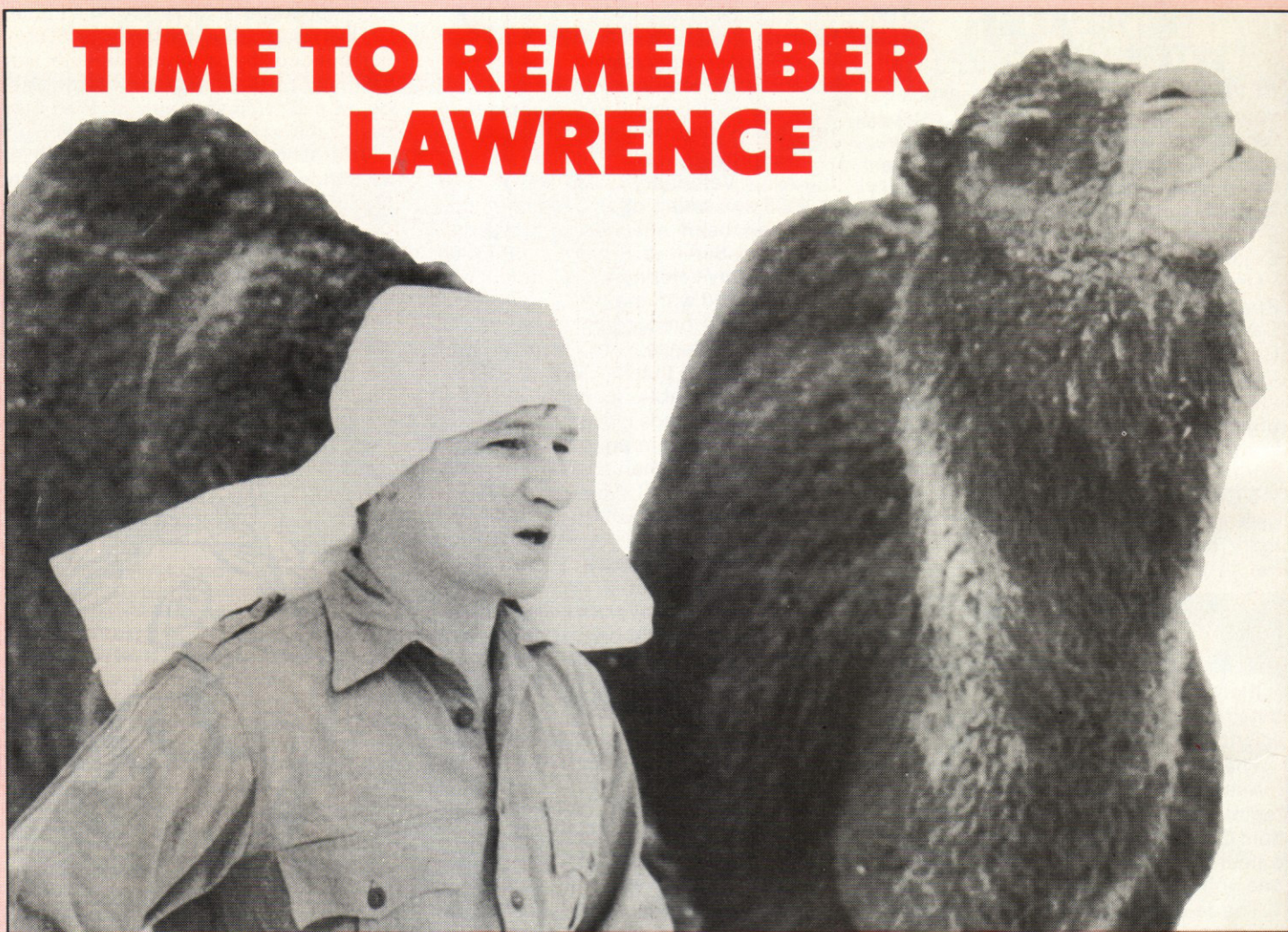

# TIME TO REMEMBER LAWRENCE



**Captain Charles Blackmore — and a friendly camel**

**A** FOUR-man team from The Royal Green Jackets is due back in the United Kingdom this month after tackling a 1,000 mile camel ride to recreate a similar journey undertaken in 1917 by Lawrence of Arabia.

The expedition was planned as a way of marking the 50th anniversary of the death of Colonel Lawrence, who led the Arab revolt against the Turks in World War I.

The four Green Jackets currently testing their stamina and camel riding ability in some of the most inhospitable desert terrain are:

Captain Charles Blackmore, Captain Jamie Bowden, Bandsman Chris Selley and Rifleman Mark West.

## TRAIN WRECK

They left aiming to cover 30 miles a day in the Jordanian desert, starting from Aqaba and then heading east to Al Mudawwarah, where Lawrence blew up a troop train — the wreck of which can still be seen.

The journey then takes them north to the capital of Jordan, Amman, and then south again for Aqaba.

The party was aiming to live in the desert on a diet similar to that of the Bedouins — dates, goats milk and cheese ... and whatever the desert might provide.

Help was provided by the Jordanian Armed Forces, who

provided a camel handler and escort.

Captain Bowden is the only one of the quartet to have any real experience of camels.

He owned one when he was in the UN peacekeeping force on the Israeli-Egyptian border.

Captain Blackmore, the expedition leader, rode camels in-

frequently when he was attached to the Jordan Defence Force, and Bandsman Selley and Rifleman West have never been close enough to touch a camel before, let alone ride one!

Remarkably, when the four men went to Whipsnade Zoo before leaving the UK to get a few tips from the camel keeper, it was Chris

Selley and Mark West who got on best with the haughty animals!

The idea of the commemorative journey was thought up by Captain Blackmore who has always been fascinated by the life of T E Lawrence.

The adventure follows that which Captain Blackmore and a group of Green Jackets undertook in 1983/4 when they re-enacted the retreat from Corunna in Spain with a five week march at Christmas time.

## FIRST TASK

First task on arrival in Jordan was to contact the Jordanian Army for help in buying four camels for the journey.

"We really don't know anything about buying camels," said the leader before departure, "so we shall be relying on them. It is thanks to Rothmans, the major sponsors of the expedition, that we will be able to buy the creatures, as the money we have been able to put in would not go far."

Once having bought the camels the next task was to teach the men how to ride.

Once again the Jordanians were scheduled to give four days instruction so that they could perch on the humps of the 10-foot tall quadrupeds.

The RAF, wooden spoonists in the championships for several years, put up a spirited resistance and provided an interesting night for the crowd at Aldershot.

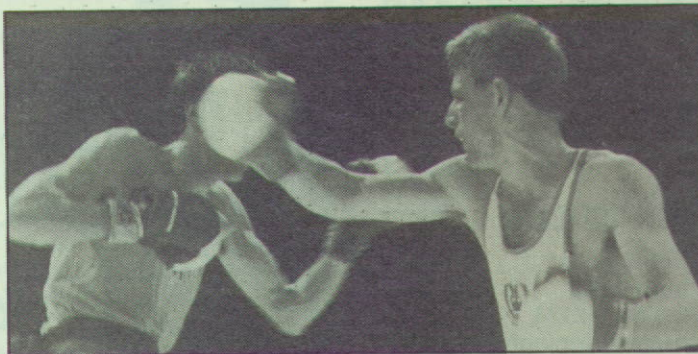
Now all eyes turn on the Services' Individual championships, also in Aldershot, in which the Army has high hopes of taking 10 of the 12 titles at stake.

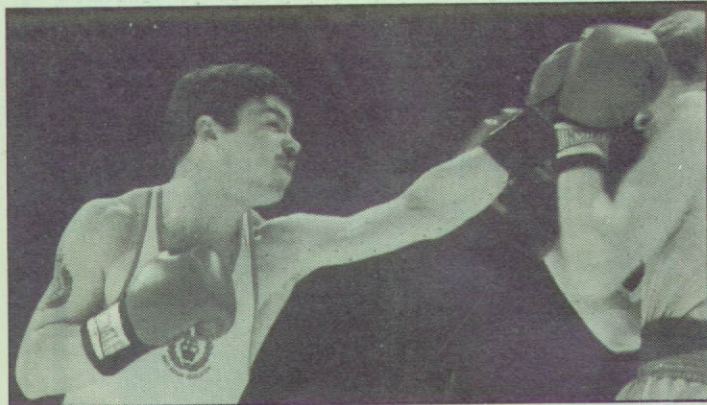

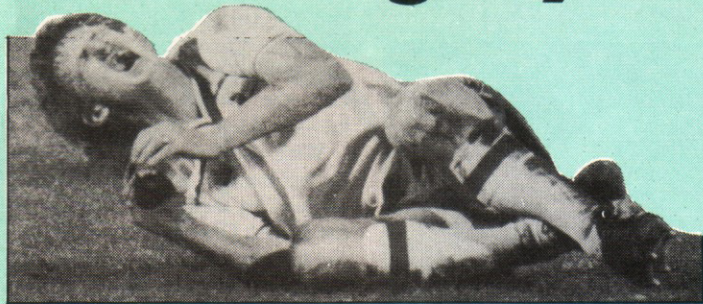

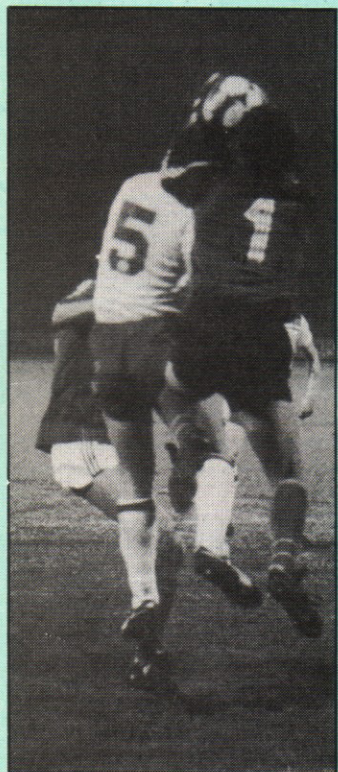
The REME men, representing Wales, now meet the North-West District representatives.

# RCT SKIING TRIUMPH

WITH 14 teams in contention for the coveted Champion Skiing Team title of the British Army, the decider rested on Nordic events run within the British National, BAOR & Army Nordic Skiing Meeting at Zwiesel in Bavaria.

And with results of the Alpine events from Fulpmes still reaching Zwiesel, the result was in doubt until almost the last races.

1st Armoured Division Transport Regiment RCT improved on their consistent third places in the Alpine events — giant slalom, downhill and slalom to get into gear with a 1-2, 1-2 in the four Nordic events to outpoint their rivals — 35 Engineer Regiment and 22 Signal Regiment.

The men from Bunde took the 15 kilometres cross country race — run in that awful condition known as 'snow rain', and with this first race under their belts, managed a second place (in the Army lists) in the Biathlon relay, a first in the 4 x 10 kilometres relay and with only five points between themselves, 35 Engineers and 22 Signals, the clincher was to be the Military Patrol Race for a team of four, carrying 20 lbs.

Although 35 Engineers beat the RCT into second Army place, there were just too many points to catch up, so the Engineers from Hamelin had to be content with second place and the 22 Signals team from Lippstadt the third.

The good news from this meeting was that entry levels were up with a wider representation, especially from the BAOR Infantry — The Green Howards and The Black Watch, who adding a Scottish flavour with their distinctive bonnets worn informally with ski gear on the range, and from UK, 1st Battalion, The Light Infantry and 1st Battalion, The King's Own Scottish Borderers.

"There's no doubt that there is a greater interest in this sport," Major General Guy Watkins, MGRA and Chairman of the BAOR Ski Association told me.

After conditions before the

meeting had been reported as nearly perfect, the weather factor threw in its own complications, with above freezing temperatures and rain spoiling the snow conditions.

"We've in fact had to do some repairs — with 14 loads of snow re-positioned from the invaluable Skidoos in part of the forest course" General Watkins confided.

In the event, all turned out for

the best — because with the arrival of the guest of honour for the meeting — Princess Anne — the rain stopped, the skies cleared, and the beautiful blue Bavarian skies brought not only the needed sharp frosts in the evenings, but also the bright sunshine and happier skiers.

With the Princess dressed for the occasion in her new Olympic ski suit (for she is the President of the British Olympic Association), she saw the races started, fired on the range with Major (Retd) Arthur Harvey, Chief Range Officer giving expert tuition (he is, after all, the Olympic trainer), followed the course of the Military Patrol Race with her skidoo party, and finally fired the pistol to start the 30 kilometres British National Race.

Among the experts at the meeting, the great debate was whether the new technique of 'skating', described by Captain Glen Grant of 19 Field Regiment RA — and an international athlete in his own right — as "a quantum leap in Army Skiing", would require modifications to the rules for the cross country 'langlauf' events, with it being claimed that the skiers could be 10 per cent faster.

On the other hand, Major John Leaning RA, Chairman of the British Biathlon Committee felt that its destructive action on the 'tracks' could destroy the sport.

But as controversy raged on the techniques involved, the unanimous decision was that the work of 50 Missile Regiment RA in running the event was worthy of the highest praise.

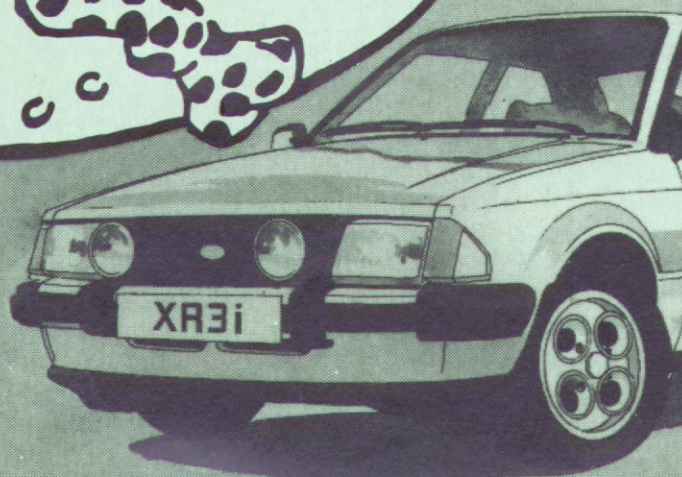
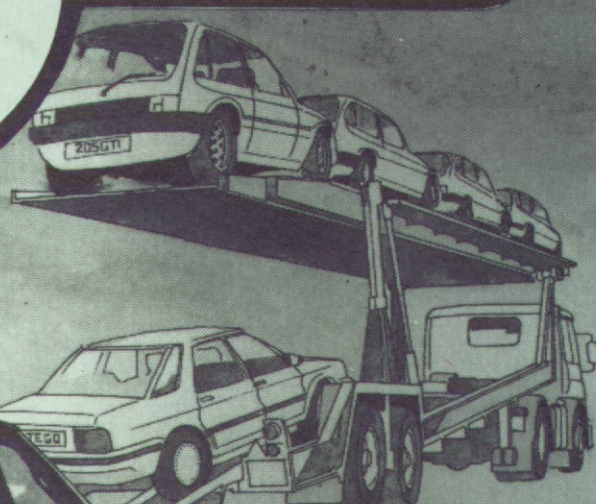

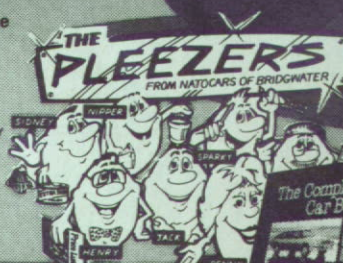
