





Return of the Desert Rats

THE deployment of the 7th Armoured Brigade from West Germany to the Gulf represents a huge escalation of British Army involvement in the crisis.

Now a massive logistics operation is underway to move up to 8,000 troops, 120 Challenger main battle tanks, light armour, artillery, air support, sappers, signals and other elements of 1 Armoured Division to the desert.

Until Defence Secretary Tom King's announcement on September 14, Britain's main commitment to the multi-national Operation Desert Shield force had been provided by the Royal Navy and the Royal Air Force. British Army participation had been limited to provision of communications by men of 30 Signal Regiment from Blandford, Dorset; Royal Artillery Javelin teams on board warships; medical teams and specialist Royal Engineer units.

The 7th Armoured Brigade, under the command of Brig Patrick Cordingley, late 5th Royal Inniskilling Dragoon Guards comprises the Challenger-equipped The Royal Scots Dragoon Guards (Carabiniers and Greys) and The Queen's Royal Irish Hussars from Fallingbostel; the

1st Battalion, The Staffordshire Regiment (The Prince of Wales's) equipped with Warrior, also from Fallingbostel; Hohne-based 40 Field Regiment, Royal Artillery with its M109 self-propelled 155mm howitzers; a reconnaissance squadron of Wolfenbüttel-based 1st The Queen's Dragoon Guards with Scimitar and Spartan; 10 Air Defence Battery RA; 664 Squadron, Army Air Corps; a squadron from 25 Engineer Regiment RE; plus Royal Signals, RCT, REME and RAOC elements.

The brigade's armoured infantry battalion, 1 Staffords, has not long returned from live-firing battle group exercises at Suffield in Alberta, Canada, with armour and artillery from Scots DG and 40 Fd Regt.

The 7th Armoured Brigade carries with it the traditions of the famous Desert Rats of the Second World War, who fought their way from El Alemain to Berlin.

The original 7th Armoured Brigade became the core of the 7th Armoured Division which fought Rommel's Afrika Corps. Based at Soltau since 1945, the brigade wears the jerboa – the Desert Rat – adopted in 1940.

Gallantry Stamps Competition


Many and glorious are the deeds of gallantry done during these perilous but famous days. In order that they should be worthily and promptly recognised, I have decided to create at once a new mark of honour for men and women of all walks of life'

These words, spoken by King George VI and broadcast to the nation on 23 September 1940 announced the institution of the George Cross, which, taking precedence over all other decorations with the exception of the Victoria Cross, is made of silver. The GC depicts St George slaying the dragon, with the motto 'For Gallantry', whilst the reverse is inscribed with the recipient's name. To mark the fiftieth anniversary of the GC, and as a tribute to the valour shown by both military and civilian personnel during the Second World War Royal Mail Stamps has issued a special Gallantry set of stamps (on sale from September 11th). The set contains five stamps designed by John Gibbs and show the following decorations: The Victoria Cross (VC); The George Cross (GC); Distinguished Service Cross (DSC) and Distinguished Service Medal (DSM); The Military Cross (MC) and Military Medal (MM); The Distinguished Flying Cross (DFC) and Distinguished Flying Medal (DFM). There are three ways of collecting the sets – the presentation pack which features all five stamps together with background on each – five new stamp cards, each featuring one of the new stamps – and a first day cover. If you wish to purchase any of these they are available from most Post Offices or you can order them by post from the British Philatelic Bureau at 20 Brandon Street, Edinburgh EH3 5TT (tel: 031-556 8661).

Masterly retreat to Dunkirk

WITH regard to the retreat "gap" in the Dunkirk Exhibition at Dover (Letters, September 3) it is unfortunate that most attention has always been focused on the Dunkirk evacuation episode of the BEF's retreat in 1940.

The real achievement of the BEF was in reaching the coast at all – and as a cohesive force.

After the war Field Marshal Viscount Alanbrooke (Commander 11 Corps in the BEF, later to become CIGS) wrote:

"Had it not been for those priceless qualities of the British soldier to which I have previously referred, I am convinced that such a flank march in the face of the enemy could never have been accomplished.

"I should be the very last ever to belittle the wonderful

performance of the Navy in extricating the BEF from Dunkirk. But whereas the Navy has received all the credit that was due to it, the BEF's part in the retreat from Brussels to Dunkirk has been somewhat put in the shade.

"I sincerely hope that at some future date historians will give the BEF, and the British soldiers before all others, the credit that is due to them for having brought off a masterly retreat under the most adverse conditions." (Reproduced in *The Turn of the Tide 1939-1943*, by Arthur Bryant).

Modesty, no doubt, prevented Alanbrooke from mentioning the vital part played by himself and other commanders – Alexander, Montgomery and others – who were later to make their contributions to final victory.

And, of course, we should remember Lord Gort, C-in-C BEF, without whose timely and courageous decision, taken on his sole responsibility, to ignore other instructions of the French High Command and to set in motion the move to the coast for evacuation, it is unlikely that the BEF could have been saved at all. – **Patrick Barras, Chertsey.**


Fifteen years ago, while



Angus was wounded 40 times while rescuing an officer at Givenchy in France on June 12,

Former Kuwait staff set up wives' helpline

A 24-HOUR Army helpline is keeping families of soldiers caught up in the Iraqi invasion of Kuwait up to date with the latest facts. About 35 British Servicemen were held in Baghdad following the invasion.

It was the initiative of Maj Rick Stocks, administrative officer to the military team in Kuwait, and his wife, Judy, who were out of Kuwait on leave at the time of the invasion.

Hospital moves to the Gulf

LT Helen Owen, QARANC, was taking no chances when she left for the Gulf with other members of Aldershot-based 22 Field Hospital RAMC. She packed her bucket and spade.

The departure of the unit from RAF Lyneham was the first ever move by air of an entire British Army field hospital.

The unit has been reinforced by medical staff drawn from military hospitals throughout the United Kingdom and will be housed in a former maternity hospital in Bahrain, cleared specially to allow the medics to move in.

Among supporting troops was the RAOC Mobile Bath and Laundry unit. Other members of the party included members drawn from REME, RADC, the Royal Engineers, and a solitary pay sergeant from the RAFC.

Also accompanying the military medics was Mrs Barbara Russell of the British Red Cross Society, looking very smart in her tropical combat kit and blue beret bearing the Red Cross cap badge.

A complete field surgical team from 22 Field Hospital is already in Dhahran, Saudi Arabia. The 29-strong team, including surgeons, anaesthetists, theatre sisters, combat medical technicians and other medical support staff, is there to provide surgical facilities for British Forces in the region.

Last time 22 Field Hospital was mobilised was a part deployment to Dharan in Nepal following the earthquake disaster in 1988.

Staff from the Army Blood Supply Depot at Aldershot are supporting 22 Field Hospital. An ABSO spokesman said: "The ability to provide this cover has involved a great deal of research into methods of transporting and storing blood in different climatic conditions."

ABSO also has a blood supply section attached to 84 Field Medical Equipment Depot, which co-ordinates the supply of blood for tri-Service demand.

They are being helped by WO1 John Muirhead and his wife, Agnes, and WO1 Harry MacFayden, also on leave at the time. Their great advantage is that they know personally all the British Army families involved.

Maj Stocks said that families had become distressed after reading conflicting Press reports and the Whitehall helpline office

offered the latest accurate information.

The helpline team meets wives and children at the airport to help ease their return before their welfare is looked after at district level.

The team has been inundated with thank you cards from grateful families. Contact with the helpline office is through the usual Army welfare channels.

Sea gunners



Olpherts gunners go their own special way

SENNELAGER-based 56 (Olpherts) Special Weapons Battery has gained its independence from 39 Heavy Regiment, Royal Artillery. For the past eight years Olpherts Battery has been the senior battery of 39 Heavy.

It has been due to move to Munster to share accommodation with 8 Regiment RCT, but this was delayed until next year. In anticipation, the granting of independent minor unit status went ahead although the battery will remain under the administrative

command of 39 Hy Regt until 8 Regt RCT assumes this responsibility.

Until November 1987 Olpherts Battery was equipped with the M110 self-propelled 8in howitzer. It was then that moves were made towards "independence" when the battery received its special weapons designation and acquired its current role of providing nuclear support to 1 (BR) Corps' M109 155mm artillery regiments.

The granting of the new status was marked by a ceremony in Dempsey Barrack,

Sennelager at which the battery, under the command of Maj Alan Collett, paraded before Lt Col Brian Wheelwright, commanding officer of 39 Hy Regt. Gifts were exchanged between the new minor unit and its former parent.

The battery was awarded its honour title to commemorate the heroic action of Capt Olpherts (later Gen Sir William Olpherts) in the Indian Mutiny of 1857 when, during the first relief of Lucknow, he won the Victoria Cross for capturing two rebel guns.

Terrier division in field

THREE Territorial Army brigades of the 2nd Infantry Division have been training in Germany during their annual Exercise Fall Tide. The exercise was originally planned as a major field test involving about 18,000 troops.

However, in line with recent developments in Allied exercise philosophy, fewer than 9,000 troops took part and were confined to three designated permanent military training areas. No training was carried out on privately-owned land.

The changes were made with particular regard for German concerns about the social and environmental impact of military manoeuvres across private land.

Three separate brigade concentrations were undertaken. Lion Rock involved about 1,000 men of 29 Engineer Brigade training at Sennelager and Hameln in an infantry role, range maintenance, road building, and combat and amphibious engineer training.

Nearly 3,000 Terriers of 15 Infantry Brigade took part in Merlin Rock on Vogelsang training area near Liege, where the five TA battalions from the North East of England exercised with tanks and helicopters to practise their operational role of reinforcing BAOR.

Similar training was carried out by 49 Infantry Brigade, with five TA battalions involving about 3,000 men from the Midlands working with helicopters and tanks.

Skins 'star' in Soviet TV film

ON A visit to units within 1 (BR) Corps last week, the Minister of State for the Armed Forces, Archie Hamilton, was interviewed by a TV team from Novosti, a Soviet news agency. It was the first time a Soviet film crew had been given the opportunity to film inside a British barracks in Germany.

It was a routine visit by the Armed Forces

He completed the journey in a 50-year-old hand-powered invalid carriage overhauled by BAe apprentices.

Corridor changes

THE re-unification of Germany, bringing the closure this month of Allied Checkpoint Alpha at Helmstedt, means an uncertain future for 246 Provost Company, Royal Military Police based there.

As the special status of Berlin eases, so will the Russian checkpoints at either end of the road Corridor that runs from Helmstedt through East Germany to West Berlin.

In the short term the company will be re-roled and its patrol area increased to include all routes to Berlin through the present DDR.

It is reported that the Soviet officers and men at Marienborn who have worked alongside the RMP for 45 years are sad to see the end in sight. The next issue of SOLDIER tells of the special Anglo-Soviet rapport that has grown through the meetings of the two Armies at this outpost.

SSgt Ford's mini-outfit does a king-size job in the Gulf

THE SMALLEST unit in the Gulf consists of just two soldiers. But their job is regarded as vital by the Servicemen in their area of operations. They are the staff of the local Postal and Courier Service run by the Royal Engineers.

There are, in fact, five such teams operating in the theatre.

Typical of them is the double act involving SSgt Stephen Ford and junior partner Spr Andrew Dunlop. SSgt Ford is proud of the fact that within an hour of his 24-hour journey to the Gulf he was handing over to

British Airways his first sack of home-bound post.

It is not his first experience of providing a mail service for soldiers far from home. While acting as postman to the 2nd King Edward VII's Own Gurkha Rifles on the Thai border with Laos he became one of the first British soldiers to visit the area since 1945. He has also worked in Zimbabwe and Hong Kong.

Army technicians form part of a British task force dominated so far by the Royal

Navy and Royal Air Force. Equally important are the men of 30 Signal Regiment from Blandford. An RAF spokesman said: "In some areas we don't have landlines on which we can rely. Satellite communication is our major outlet and is provided by 30 Signals. It is a significant contribution."

LCpl Michael Hill describes his rapid departure from Blandford Camp in Dorset: "We were on a 72-hour notice to move on Operation Granby

It takes 68 different maps to build up a clear picture of the area involved in Operation Granby. That's official, for the map-makers at 42 Survey Engineer Group based at Hermitage, near Newbury, should know, for they have counted them - about 250,000 at the latest tally. The maps are continually updated and need to include such

details as power lines and oil wells because the sappers current production is aimed at meeting the demands of the Royal Air Force.

Sapper posties at full stretch

LETTERS from home are playing an important part in the life of British Servicemen in the Gulf, writes Laurie Manton.

Hence the popularity of 12 sappers who have established five Forces Post Offices to serve the needs of British Forces stationed in the area.

Deployed at the very start of Operation Granby, the "posties" are responsible for dealing with official and private correspondence, classified and diplomatic mails and the movement of freight. Newspapers, too, are distributed by the Royal Engineer postmen.

Mail for the Gulf travels a circuitous route. From local post offices, it is rushed to the Postal and Courier Depot RE at Mill Hill in London where it is sorted into bags destined for five separate BFPO numbers.

It is then loaded at RAF Lyneham aboard Hercules C130 aircraft which makes daily flights to the region. After a short stopover at RAF Akrotiri in Cyprus, it is escorted

in-flight by a military courier from 23 Postal and Courier (Cyprus) Squadron RE to its Gulf destination.

"Average time for a letter to reach the Gulf is 30 hours once it has been received at Mill Hill," said Capt Jamie Field of the Directorate Defence Postal and Courier Services.

A free Forces air letter (bluey) service is now available to all troops in the Gulf. First month of operation saw more

than 10,000 blueys sent home to wives and girlfriends. About 4,000 were received by the Servicemen.

Similar levels of mail reached the Royal Navy from the PCD RE via a military courier on a scheduled British Airways flight to the Gulf and the posties hope soon to open up a further Forces Post Office to offer a full service to the Royal Navy.

Currently the FPOs serving

RAF and Army personnel are able to provide a full counter service to the troops, including the sale of stamps, postal orders and the cashing of Giro cheques.

Said Capt Field: "Total mail carried to date is some 4,000kg. That's equivalent to around 800 sacks of mail."

Forces Post Offices have been established at Dhahran, Thumrayt, Seeb, Riyadh and Bahrain.

● The RAF will operate a parcel service to and from the Gulf from October 12. The Directorate Defence Postal and Courier Services says that people using the service should ask at the Post Office for the Forces concessionary rate.

Parcels should be properly packed and clearly marked with addresses to and from. The posties advise using the compensation service if the contents are valuable.

It sounds better in French



RADC provides service that's second to none

SOLDIERS who receive free dental care – irrespective of how complicated and costly the treatment is – are the envy of their peers employed outside the Services.

Capt Frank Walker, Senior Dental Technician, Royal Army Dental Corps Headquarters and Central Group in Aldershot, explained that generally NHS patients pay half the cost.

"But if you go privately, and undergo complicated bridging and crowning, for instance, then it becomes really expensive. In some cases laboratory fees alone – and that's before you take into consideration the dentist's time – sound like you are reeling off telephone numbers!"

"Our commitment is to ensure a soldier is dentally fit to do his job. That means whatever is needed – regardless of the cost – is provided free."

Nowadays, because of advanced techniques, soldiers are having fewer teeth extracted. This has brought increased demand for crowns and bridges, ensuring RADC laboratories at Aldershot and Dusseldorf, where they are made, are kept busy.

This work is costly because of precious metals, such as gold and platinum, used. Gold is brought from bullion companies and stored in a safe. Its use is carefully monitored as it is booked out of the Quartermaster's Account into a special register, weighed and credited to individual patients.

The RADC has 205 officers and 405 other ranks worldwide, centred on Army concentrations. The unit at Aldershot, for instance, looks after the dental care of 5,500 soldiers and between 2,000 and 3,000 recruits. Dental checks are mandatory.

But in areas where there are only a few soldiers posted, there is a special dispensation for them to be treated by an NHS dentist at the Army's expense.


Dependants of soldiers posted outside the UK use Army dental facilities which are free except for certain complex items for which they are charged NHS rates. In the UK they make their own arrangements for dental care.

Capt Walker says his work is a combination of art, science and craft.

"Every case is an individual, unlike say making a part for a car, which is always the same."

"Although you will be making the same item for patients, the shape and colour of a crown is always different."

"I am happy to say that I have not recognised my work outside the centre. I

would hope not to because the whole idea is that you can not recognise a crown from a natural tooth. If the patient is happy, then we are successful."

Regular dental screening is playing an important part in helping save soldiers' lives, for as well as identifying teeth and gum problems, Army dentists look for

symptoms of more serious conditions.

Lt Col Stuart Miller, Deputy


Commandant RADC Aldershot, explained: "It is not widely recognised that the annual death rate from oral cancer is much higher than that of cervical cancer."

"Cervical cancer is a much-higher profile disease in terms of publicity and government efforts to create a screening programme."


"Oral cancer is often fatal if allowed to go beyond the first stages. Regular checks mean we can recognise the signs of cancer and advise the patient to seek treatment



early on," explained Col Miller.

Dentists join the Army as university graduates and complete a Professionally Qualified Officer Course at the Royal Military Academy Sandhurst. Though non-combatant, they are trained in military skills, including learning about life in the field.

During field conditions, there is a great tendency for minor infections to surface because of fatigue, irregular meals and reduced hygiene.

In the Falklands war this brought complications with soldiers' wisdom teeth, and earlier training stood dentists in good stead to cope with the problems.

Col Miller said: "It is important dentists understand and sympathise with the problems and way of life of the soldiers they will be living and working with and serving. That is why the course is so valuable."

Aldershot is the training centre for the Army's dental surgery assistants (known as dental clerk assistants) and dental hygienists.

Royal Navy students are accepted on the hygienists' course and spare places are offered to civilians, for qualifications for the General Dental Council Certificate in Proficiency in Dental Hygiene.

Because of the high pass rate there are far more applications for places than vacancies. There are also refresher courses for dentists.

There is an Advisory Wing which helps Army dentists worldwide on difficult cases. They simply send X-rays or an impression of the patients' teeth, describing the problem, and expert advice is on tap.

Col Miller said: "In civvy street there is not an exact equivalent. A lot of dentists outside wish there was."

In the unit, between 15 and 20 technicians (there are 50 worldwide) work on dentures, crowns and bridges.

The relatively new technique of adhesive bridging – in which the false tooth is fixed by sticking the bridge to the back of the neighbouring teeth instead of

Musket men bit bullet

THE Army Dental Corps was authorised by Royal Warrant in 1921 with 107 dental officers, 107 dental clerk assistants and 25 dental technicians.

But their museum in Aldershot, which is open to the public, traces Army dentistry back to the 1660s.

There is a flintlock musket, a reminder that regimental surgeons were required to preserve a soldier's teeth so that he could bite through the paper cartridge when loading.

Instruments to scale teeth were issued for this in the time of Charles II. The victories of the British soldiers under Wellington are remembered – a direct link with this period is an ivory-handled tooth extracting key, once the property of Napoleon.

It was during the South African War that British troops first received dental treatment in the field, with reminders of the frailty of vulcanite dentures when confronted with a diet of treacle ox and Army biscuits!

Recognition of the soldier's need for treatment came from

the First World War when hundreds of dentists served in uniform. There are examples of splints used in the treatment of jaw injuries.

War service brought honour for dentists and their medals are on display.

The royal prefix was granted in 1946 and bringing the corps up to date with modern conflict is a captured Argentine dental chair from the Falkland Islands.

Of special interest are the unique Tonks drawing of facial

injuries, on loan from the Royal College of Surgeons. Henry Tonks was among other things a Slade professor of fine art, and was commissioned into the Royal Army Medical Corps in the First World War.

He worked with Sir Harold Gillier and Sir William Kelsey Fry, eminent maxillo-facial surgeons, at the Cambridge Military Hospital, Aldershot.

His drawings of the then new surgical specialities of plastic and maxillo-facial surgery are a fascinating record.

No Yorkshire puddings?

PART-TIME soldiering has come a long way since Dad's Army - the Home Guard of the Second World War - and men and women of today's Territorial Army are training with Nato troops around the world.

Yorkshire's own Terriers, the 4th Battalion, Yorkshire Volunteers, based in Sheffield, have just spent two weeks with American troops in the shadow of the Blue Ridge mountains of Virginia.

This picture feature comes from the Wilton-based Army Mobile News Team who caught up with the lads and lasses from Sheffield (and Rotherham, Doncaster and Barnsley) during the exchange exercise Mulberry Tree.



Saracen's still going strong



FORMATION of the Royal Corps of Transport 25 years ago led to the Gurkha Army Service Corps being retitled the Gurkha Transport Regiment.

Its composition then included a pack transport squadron consisting of 72 mules and 136 men. This archaic but efficient mode of transport, used to move ammunition and stores across difficult ground, was to survive for a few more years before the increased use of helicopters led to its disbandment.

One particular troop of today's regiment has maintained its link with another old form of transport - a 40-year-old armoured personnel carrier.

Design of the Saracen APC began shortly after the end of the Second World War. Alvis of Coventry delivered the first production vehicles in late 1952.

Through the 1950s and early

1960s the Saracen was the standard APC of the British Army until it was replaced from 1963 onwards by the FV432 tracked vehicle.

Based at the imposing Gun Club Hill barracks, 28 Squadron GTR provides transport support in Kowloon and maintains 48 Brigade's armoured personnel carriers.

The ageing vehicles would be used to get infantry on to the streets while offering protection from gunfire and bricks or anything else thrown at them.

The outmoded Saracens have survived in Hong Kong where they remain effective for Internal Security operations. The

modus operandi has not really changed over the years and is unlikely to do so between now and 1997 so there are no plans to replace them, especially as the Army operates in support of the Police, who themselves have Saracen.

More than 200 Saracens were originally in use in the Colony, but C Troop remains the last major user of the type. The troop was formed in 1976 following the withdrawal of the Hong Kong armoured reconnaissance squadron. Initially established for nine vehicles, its current establishment of 30 Saracens was introduced in 1982.

Various types are

held. Mark 1 and 2 vehicles are still used but have undergone many modifications over the years. Mark 5s and 6s are also used by the troop. These are up-armoured versions that saw service in Northern Ireland, and are all fitted with general purpose machine guns and smoke dischargers which make them ideal protection platforms for IS operations.

The troop comes under the operational control of 48 Gurkha Infantry Brigade. Should the battalions be dispatched to an operation which requires Saracen, they would send their vehicle commanders to the hangars at Gun Club Hill barracks where



They're in their element at sea

THE Gurkha Transport Regiment is the most junior regiment in the Brigade of Gurkhas. Commanded by Lt Col Paul Gilham, RCT, it takes charge of all second line road and maritime transport assets in the Colony. Its area of responsibility includes 48 Gurkha Infantry Brigade and Headquarters British Forces Hong Kong.

The regiment has four squadrons. Its Headquarters Squadron, which also administers 415 Maritime Troop RCT and a troop in Brunei, shares the facilities of Gun Club Hill Barracks in Kowloon with 28 Squadron GTR.

HMS Tamar is home to the regiment's Chinese element, 29 Squadron RCT. Its drivers, all Hong Kong Military Service Corps personnel but RCT cap-badged, are responsible for administrative transport support for the whole of Hong Kong Island.

At steamy Sek Kong in the New Territories, 31 Squadron GTR supports all units based

without excitement. On one occasion the police were forced off an island by rioting boat people and 415 Troop was responsible for landing reinforcements so that order could be restored. "This was the first opposed landing since the Falklands," Capt Mence proclaimed proudly.

At the height of the boat people sailing season, the landing craft were making two runs a day. Each one carried a police squad on board to prevent trouble and was escorted by a marine police launch.

"It can be quite tiring, but all the crew feel they were contributing something to the well-being of the whole Colony. It's not just exercising, it's helping out the Hong Kong Government," said Capt Mence.

"It can be quite a dirty job at times, but it is also heartbreaking at times to see these people. They bring the whole family including aged relatives, babes-in-arms and the disabled."

Whatever the task presented to them, the men of 415 Maritime Troop take things as they come with calm efficiency.

Small wonder the troop has no shortage of volunteers wishing to have a go at working on those ageing wonders – the Gurkha Saracens.







A RATHER EXOTIC PRACTICE

NOT FAR north of Kowloon lies a green Shangri-La - an oriental cocktail of tropical forest, paddy fields and traditional Chinese duck and fish farms. Monkeys, snakes and wild pigs abound.

It is also home to 48 Gurkha Infantry Brigade and RAF Sek Kong - and the area covered by the New Territories Group Practice, described as the most exotic general practice on British territory.


More than 10,000 patients are spread over 200 square miles and administered by six medical centres and eight doctors who serve a population of British, Gurkha and Chinese patients.

It is an independently commanded primary care unit co-ordinated from the Central Training group practice at Borneo Lines in the lushness of Sek Kong.

A joint Army-RAF unit in all but establishment, it has an operational and military training role, the Army element in support of 48 Brigade and the RAF in aeromedical evacuation.

Morning sick parade is held with a difference. There are separate parades for each of the three racial groups that comprise British Services in Hong Kong and the Gurkha dependants are treated in separate Gurkha family hospitals, of which there are five in the New Territories.

Staff at the practice are responsible for pest control and have been particularly successful in keeping down the malarial parasite during the breeding seasons. Said the commanding officer, Lt Col Bob Jones: "There hasn't been a case of the disease in the New Territories for three years."



Time ran out on them when they over-stayed their welcome in a Ministry of Defence married quarter, and the subsequent court proceedings landed them where they are now.

According to the NAO report more than 300,000 people were homeless in England last year, putting ever more pressure on temporary accommodation or unsatisfactory bed and breakfast arrangements.

The Ministry of Defence has told me it hopes, by the end of the year, to reveal a number of schemes to help Service personnel with their future housing needs.

I do hope so, for with more and more local authorities stating that they cannot house Service personnel because of the number of empty MoD properties, the Serviceman appears to be a pawn in the housing game.

New FB5 published

GREAT news! The revamped Department of Social Security guide for Service families going abroad has been published.

It has taken eight long and frustrating years for it to appear, but the new 46-page leaflet* is now available from a number of sources, including Army units, SSAFA offices, BFPOs and Hives. If you can't get one, write to me.

It is an excellent leaflet and I hope all Service families will use it for guidance.

The man we have to thank for the new FB5 is Mr Ernie Pinnell of the DSS, who put in a year of hard work to sift, sort, research and rewrite several years' worth of drafts in order to

At last a draft was

get the copy ready for printing in mid-August.

The first FB5 for Service families going abroad was published in 1982 after I had asked the then Minister, Mrs Lynda Chalker, if her department could produce such a leaflet. It took just a year.

The second edition was a different story. With so much legislation changing, the first version was well and truly out of date within a few years but repeated requests to the DSS bore no fruit.

Make sure you get a copy.

produced, but it contained at least 100 errors and was promptly cancelled.

In October 1987 Minister Michael Portillo wrote to tell me a new edition would be available early in the New Year. It wasn't. Some 20 Government branches had to agree the draft copy, rules and regulations changed, and the delay dragged on.

SERVING and ex-Service personnel are being offered up to 15 places on two "build-it-yourself" schemes near Southampton.

The sites are among 71 units at Totton and 38 at Weston, and the scheme offers one-bedroom flats and houses and two and three-bedroom houses at prices ranging from £35,000 to £53,000.

Those sums reflect a 70 per cent saving on current market values, and 100 per cent mortgages (on the self-build price) are available irrespective of income.

Cyprus wives' pension worry

MY postbag suggests that there is a growing number of Service wives who are giving up trying to trace the National Insurance contributions they have paid into the Cypriot system.

How many of these contributions are ever credited to the records of Service wives is a mystery, and the time it takes to trace an individual case means few are ever resolved.

Lost contributions must run into thousands of pounds a year.

I wrote to Gillian Shephard, Parliamentary Under Secretary of State for Social Security, asking how Service wives could transfer their Cypriot National Insurance contributions to their United Kingdom record.

Her answer shows the difficulties our wives encounter and why so many contributions are lost.

... Cypriot contributions are never transferred to this country. There is therefore no special action to take before leaving. If the insured person later wishes to claim benefit from either country, he or she should give details of his or her insurance under both schemes.

The Social Security authorities of the country in which the claim was made will then liaise with the other country.

Obviously, those who know they cannot satisfy the conditions for a particular benefit in one country because, for example, they have not paid any contributions since their last arrival there, should send their claim direct to the other country.

Who is going to help those wives who, 20 or 30 years from now, find that on turning 60 they are still a few years' worth of National Insurance contributions short of qualifying for a UK state pension?

MAGNIFICENT photographs characterise *Red On ... Go!* by Jon Davison, one of many publications marking the 50th year of the formation of the Parachute Regiment.

The book – a “visual celebration” of the anniversary – is dedicated to the RAF Parachute Jumping Instructors, past and present, of No 1 Parachute Training School. Part of the proceeds will benefit the PJI Welfare Fund, which provides support to instructors and the families of instructors who have been injured or have died during their work.

Complementing the photography are the individual experiences of present-day despatchers, loadmasters, pilots, parachute packers, free-fallers and manufacturers, the last being Irvin Great Britain, who sponsored this publication.

Irvin also made parachutes when it all started 50 years ago and I still have the badge they gave me in 1944 when I did a conversion course at Ringway.

I found the short historical introduction disappointing, having done my initial training at Ramat David, Palestine, in 1943, where we learnt “ground rolls” by jumping off the back of a moving 15cwt.

There is no mention of this, or the infamous Whitley bomber, from which you exited through a hole in the floor of the fuselage and got a broken nose – “ringing the bell” – or a broken back.

Nor is there any mention of the famous Tatton Park, where a memorial exists to all those who did their drops from balloons – including the fearful night descent and aircraft from Ringway.

Apart from this the excellent photographs do achieve the object of letting the reader experience something of this exciting world, aided by the feelings and emotions of the people who operate in it. I am glad to see they have still got the dreaded fan! – PSN

Brute force is crucial factor

MOST of us like to believe in the David and Goliath principle under which a good little 'un can beat a big 'un – especially if the big un' is a bully – but, in most case histories of war, evidence confirms the opposite.

In the words of Erwin Rommel: “The battle is fought and decided by the Quartermaster before the shooting begins.”

This quotation is used by John Ellis in his *Brute Force: Allied Strategy and Tactics in the Second World War* to reinforce his argument that Allied victory rested upon great matériel and manpower reserves and the chronic weaknesses of the German war economy.

Additionally, in the author's words, “... my contention is that American, Russian and British commanders made considerably less than optimum use of the resources at their disposal and in almost every

theatre serious mistakes were made.”

It must be said that mistakes creep into even this well-organised book; on page 426 we are informed that Montgomery's set-piece crossing of the Rhine took place on March 2!

In chapters entitled “Blitzkrieg Founders” and “The Long Retreat”, Ellis argues that brute force is the main factor in war, cataloguing the swing of advantage from the Germans to the Russians in terms of ordnance and manpower.

Of the war in the air, the author sets out to prove that the “few” of 1940 were not as under-strength as the Luftwaffe was at the time.

At sea, we are told, “... victory in the Atlantic depended on German industrial weakness, on the simple fact that the Allies could build merchant ships faster than the Germans could sink them.”

QUOTES TO END ALL QUOTES

“TO be prepared for war is one of the most effectual means of preserving peace,” said George Washington in a speech to Congress in 1790 – a comment that remains true 200 years later.

The subject of warfare and the military has for centuries provided a rich and fertile breeding ground for the

historian and compiler of quotations. Now three separate hardback compilations have been published that should wet the appetites of those who appreciate the humour and pathos to be found in the words of soldiers and statesmen.

Popular in victory and tolerated in peace, the bitterness of the common soldier

towards the fickle attitude of public and media was never more sharply captured than by Rudyard Kipling's poem *Tommy* a century ago:

“It's *Tommy* this, an' *Tommy* that, an'
‘Chuck Him out, the brute!’
But it's 'Saviour of 'is country'
when the guns began to shoot.” – LM

Tide turned on miracle of Dunkirk

BRITAIN faced the greatest military disaster in its history in May 1940. The British Expeditionary Force – which included virtually all of the country's combat-ready troops, cadre and officers – had been sent across the English Channel to help the French halt the advancing Nazi armies.

But the French army collapsed under the impact of the German onslaught and the BEF, driven back, found itself trapped against the sea at Dunkirk.

It appeared to be faced with a choice of slaughter or surrender.

A plan was hastily devised to dispatch ships and boats of all kinds and sizes to Dunkirk to save at least some of the troops crowding the beaches. It was an act of desperation.

The Germans were closing in and the area was under ferocious air attack by the Luftwaffe. Winston Churchill warned the Commons to brace itself for “hard and heavy tidings”.

Dunkirk: The Incredible Escape by American journalist Norman Gelb is a day-to-day reconstruction of events and includes first-hand accounts from the men on the beaches and those responsible for the rescue operation.

Gelb reveals that in Washington, in the light of Britain's hopeless prospects, plans were

made to annex British colonies including the West Indies to prevent them falling into German hands. The dispatch of troops to Latin America, which was believed to be Hitler's next target, was also discussed.

Finally, Gelb considers the enormous significance of Dunkirk for Britain, France, the Soviet Union and the United States – “the escape from Dunkirk was one of those rare events when, in a matter of only a few days, accident and design conspired to check and ultimately turn the tide of history.”

Also published is *The Ships That Saved An Army*, which claims to be a comprehensive record of the 1,300 “Little Ships” of Dunkirk. It records the individual vessels involved and their contribution to the evacuation. More than 100 are still afloat today.

As well as a wealth of previously unpublished photographs there are comments from survivors of Dunkirk who explain what it was really like to be a part of history. – LM



Channel swim bid success

LCpl Sharon Millen from 10 Company WRAC has become the first woman soldier to swim the English Channel. Her time was 12 hours 51 minutes.

She stepped into the English Channel at Shakespeare Beach Dover at 4.31am and reached her destination, Cap Griz Nez on the French coast without any problems.

Sharon (22), based at the Duchess of Kent Barracks, Aldershot, has been in serious training for the Channel attempt since last September. Had this venture failed she was determined to try again.

The crossing is just 21 miles as the crow flies but nearer 40 for a swimmer contending with tidal movements.

Her platoon commander, Lt Alison Chaters, said: "She had no problems. She swam very strongly all the time and her spirits were exceptionally high. Her performance was magnificent and we are very proud of her."

An ankle-injury thwarted Sharon's ambition to become a physical training instructor, and she turned to swimming as a personal challenge.

Pyatt holds off dinghy fleet

FIFTY of the Army's best dinghy sailors gathered at the Army Sailing Association's Netley Sailing Club on Southampton Water for the 1990 Army dinghy championships.

Sapper Soling sailor Capt Steve Pyatt, crewed by Maj Pat Clarke, emerged from the qualifying races with two firsts and a second, and the Royal Engineer pairing went on to clinch the championship, ousting Capt Stuart Hudson (crewed by Lt Stuart Speer), who has won for the past two years.

Hudson, fresh from the Laser world championships in America, also qualified with two firsts but was over the line in his third race so could not afford another poor race.

Also showing good form were Maj John Baird and the evergreen Capt Dave Ellis who had his eye on the veterans' prize.

The silver fleet was won by Cpl Phil Hawkins (Pyatt's Soling middleman), from Lt Julian Cramp and LCpl Jason Wright.

The final gold fleet race was the decider. Pyatt had to win the race or keep Hudson worse than fourth overall to win. There was much discussion whether he should go for gold or try to sail Hudson to the back of the fleet.

In the event he rounded the windward mark second, took the lead on the spinnaker reach, and seemed to have the title wrapped up.

However, Ellis, showing rather more speed than in previous races, wriggled through on the shifts to first. On the last beat of a shortened course Pyatt in second sat on a rapidly-closing Hudson and sailed him back to fifth, so


