



I have a photograph of a New Year's card posted by my grandfather QSGt Fred Drew when he was on his way to India in 1891. The envelope shows that the card was posted in Suez on March 26 1891 to an address near Ross on Wye.

It appears the mail was routed overland through France and the envelope is dated April 3 -91 Ross. Even 100 years ago Army mail was dealt with speedily.

May we congratulate your record reviewer for having a side of a record devoted to his marches.

It is almost impossible nowadays to write a march which will enter and stay in the repertoire of a majority of bands; perhaps the most recent one being Alford's *Army of the Nile* written during the Second World War. However, Rodney Bashford's marches are becoming increasingly popular with bands and one is confident that his music will be played well into the next century.

There are many good British marches which are sadly neglected probably because bands keep very often to the safe 20 or so favourites. (It seems like 20, but it is in fact more).

Bashford's marches deserve to live because each has its own character carefully scored into the music. The 11 marches illustrate this as do those others not included.



At the gates of Jerusalem - December 1917

Mandate was result of political failure

From the Rt Hon the Viscount Allenby

As a regular reader of SOLDIER, I was naturally interested in your article *A Bitter Mandate* in the November 16 edition.

Sadly the "bitter mandate" was the result of failure to find an acceptable political decision then and indeed now.

Let us not forget the great gallantry and devotion of our forces on the battlefields of the Middle East prior to the capture of Jerusalem at 11am on December 9, 1917. My great uncle entered and left Jeru-

salem two days later on foot.

I enclose what I believe to be an unpublished photograph of the event taken by our ADC. Though taken 70 years ago, it is not too bad even by today's standards.

I believe the significance is that Jerusalem had been occupied prior to December 1917 for 2,082 years, almost to the day. Certainly if one is to believe the press cuttings of the day, the event had considerable historical significance at that time made possible by the forces of several countries. - Allenby, House of Lords.

KEPT IN TOUCH BY THE HONKY TONK GAZETTE

As a result of the hurricane in October I had to inspect my loft and to my delight came across a batch of papers from my Army days which I thought had been lost many years ago.

They included copies of our locally produced squadron newspaper, the Honky Tonk Gazette. We were settled in the small town of Hermannsburg on Luneburg Heath and had built for ourselves a pub, called the Green Diamond Honky Tonk, the Green Diamond being the tactical sign painted on the vehicles of HQ Squadron, 43rd (Wessex) Reconnaissance Regiment.

We began weekly issues in November 1945, producing four pages. The Christmas number was double sized and it may have been the last one. The corps began disbanding as from January 1, 1946 and around that time I was away on

QUICK thinking when a nervous recruit fumbled a live hand grenade has earned Cpl Carl Evans a commendation - and saved the two men from serious injury.



In the moment of throwing his grenade, the recruit struck the throwing bay

With seconds to spare before the grenade exploded, Cpl Evans pulled the recruit to his feet, grabbed his arm, ordered him to throw and pulled him into cover.

Storm foils China climb

WHEN Colonel John Blashford-Snell, explorer extraordinary, says a journey is not one he would like to repeat you can take it that it was rough.

In fact, Jade Venture, an expedition to climb Xixabangma (26,400ft), China's highest mountain, cost most participants about two stones in weight.

The worst Himalayan weather for 20 years (which trapped hundreds of tourists who had to be rescued) tested Jade Venture's climbers' and scientists' powers of endurance to the full. They included ten Army personnel.

Base camp tents were buried under nine feet of snow, another was destroyed and a third camp marooned for three days.

Nevertheless, though Xixabangma's unclimbed east face remained unconquered, a new route was established to 25,000 feet and Capt John Williams, R Hamps, and Lt John Vlasto, R Sigs, reached the summit of Pungpa Ri (24,000ft) another important objective.

The withdrawal from the mountains was a nightmare trek to Kathmandu, Nepal, through deep snow along a route blocked by landslides, fallen trees and tangled telephone lines.

Safely home, Lt Col Henry Day RE, the expedition's climbing leader, and Messrs Williams and Vlasto are preparing for the spring 1988 Joint British Services Everest Expedition which will include 16 soldiers.


The Welsh 160 Brigade exercise, was primarily to practise the two home defence battalions in their job of defending key targets in the Principality. The 3rd Bn The Royal Welch Fusiliers from north Wales joined their south Wales colleagues, 4th Bn The Royal Regiment of Wales at Castlemartin, near Pembroke, more used to German tank activity than Welsh infantry.

Enemy on the exercise came from the Nato-committed 3rd Bn RRW, based on Cardiff, Newport and the Valleys. During the days and nights of the exercise, the "enemy" constantly probed and attacked defences making sleep impossible for weary volunteers.

The end of Dragon's Dragoon also marked the end of Maj Gen Peter de la Billiere's tour as GOC Wales. Addressing troops at Manorbier Royal Artillery Camp, he thanked them for the time and commitment they gave to the TA.

"Please realise that Regular soldiers – and I represent them here – are proud to serve alongside you," he told them.

A MAN OF COURAGE

ARMY air dispatcher Dvr Jeremy Colligan is back in the air with the rest of his team from 47 Air Despatch Squadron, RCT, based at RAF Lyneham – and that makes him unique, for Jeremy is the only Serviceman to carry on serving after a heart and lung transplant.

In recognition of his courage, Jeremy was acknowledged as one of nine Men of the Year at a special luncheon in London.

Two years ago the young air dispatcher was diagnosed as having a medical problem which was ageing his lungs at an alarming rate. Lung and heart transplants were his only hope. He had to wait until last summer before a suitable donor could be found.

Jeremy was rushed from RAF Lyneham to Papworth Hospital, Cambridge for his operation and within 24 hours was out of bed and walking about the ward. By October he was back with 47 AD Sqn. A month later he had started a rigorous training programme.

Now he is back with the squadron as a flying member of the unit. He plans to walk from Land's End to Papworth next summer to raise money for the hospital.





Army Museum bags NZ Cross at last

A New Zealand Cross, one of the rarest of gallantry awards, has been bought at auction by the National Army Museum.

Only 23 New Zealand Crosses were awarded and the museum has been trying to purchase one for 25 years. That ambition was finally achieved at Christie's when the National Army Museum's bid of £16,000 was successful.

Going on display shortly will be the cross - unique to New

Zealand where it ranks with the Victoria Cross - awarded to Maori constable Henare Kepa Te Ahururu for gallantry at Moturoa on November 7 1868 during the second Maori War.

At the time locally raised forces were not eligible to receive gallantry awards from the British Government. But the then British Governor of the islands instituted the award without the sovereign's knowledge to encourage local troops. Constable Kepa's was the first to be awarded.

Royal consent was finally given in 1870.

The National Army Museum's medal interest extends to awards made to Imperial and Commonwealth Servicemen and sanctioned by the Crown. The price, £17,840 after the buyer's premium and tax had been added, was reckoned to be a very fair one for a very rare medal.

Also on the subject of museums, a major exhibition telling the story of Army commandos during the Second World War has transferred from the National to the Museum of Army Transport in Beverley, North Humberside.



BOMBARDED - BY CHRISTMAS PUDS!

CHRISTMAS morning, 1899, began in besieged Ladysmith with the customary salvo of artillery fire from the Boers.

Two shells landed on a piece of ground where church parades were usually held but no one was injured because neither was live.

Both were painted in Free State colours and engraved with the compliments of the season. One was empty and the other was full of plum pudding!

Tales of Christmas goodwill breaching barriers between enemies are not uncommon.

Perhaps the best

known is the famous truce of Christmas 1914 when quiet descended on much of the Western Front as British and German troops climbed out of their trenches to greet each other.

Less well known is the impromptu truce of December 1658 when, at

the Battle of Dunkirk, Cromwell's troops and their French allies struck up an unusual friendship with the Spanish.

The English overshot their mark and came

within range of the Spanish.


They halted but, as the battle was not officially joined, nobody committed the ungentlemanly act of firing a shot and both sides were soon openly fraternising.

In the "good old days" armies usually spent Christmas in winter quarters, breaking off campaigns to fight the common enemy - the bitter weather. Even so there were exceptions.

In the 15th century the Turks were routed at Kunobitzia when the Christian Hungarians unexpectedly attacked on Christmas Eve.

Napoleon defeated the Austrians in Northern Italy, chased Sir John Moore to Corunna and retreated from Moscow - but on each occasion returned to Paris at Christmas to deal with home affairs leaving his troops to die of cold and hunger.

During the Second World War the winters brought little respite. Hong Kong was surrendered to the Japanese on Christmas Day 1941, there were major operations in the Middle East in 1941 and von Rundstedt's desperate attack in the Ardennes covered Christmas of 1944.

Then there was even more variety in diet between locally recruited units. While the Connaught Rangers demanded bacon and cabbage, English regiments had ham, pork, mutton, geese and even turkeys and pheasants.

people helping me who helped me in 1985. My service manager is ASM Richard Magnay of RARDE. Our entry has been eight months in the planning.


"My wife has been a tower of strength providing meals and looking after our welfare. We entered the race to finish the race. That's the name of this rallying game."

Simple road to au pair disaster

Dear Anne,

RECENTLY a soldier wrote to you regarding his wife's treatment at the hands of the PLSUs and I would like to endorse everything he said.

I found that unless you pushed yourself forward all the time you would get nowhere. I have been a typist with the Civil Service for ten years and have audio experience but because of a mix up in my application at a German station, they failed to give me the required test and I was listed as being a typist with only 20 words per minute.

If I had not pushed them time and time again, I would never have got a job.

Officers' wives don't seem to have to wait very long for jobs - most of them are employed within four or five weeks of arriving in the garrison. This is fact, not sour grapes on my part.

The PLSUs are staffed mainly by Germans who are often quite rude and generally unhelpful and heaven help you if you do not like your job because they won't entertain a transfer.

They don't even reply to any letters on this subject.

I hope someone, somewhere, listens and does something about it. - Mrs P. Catterick Garrison.

A WORD OF WARNING TO WOULD-BE AU PAIRS, MOTHER'S HELPERS AND NANNIES - AND TO THOSE WHO ADVERTISE FOR THEM. THERE ARE RULES AND REGULATIONS TO FOLLOW AND GREAT STRESS CAN BE THE RESULT IF YOU IGNORE THEM.

That advertisement for a young girl to help with a family in Germany makes it look so simple. Just jump on the next train, coach or ferry and you are there.

But hold on a second - you've only got a visitor's pass. Where is your visa to work, your contract, your health insurance? You haven't even got a form E111, no DHSS contributions are going to be paid, you have no return ticket and no job specification.

Never mind, it will all work out - until your precious job falls through.

What then? Are you legally in the married quarter, or are you listed as a friend helping out or having a holiday? Both employer and employee are breaking the rules, sometimes with disastrous consequences.

One 20 year old found herself illegally in the country in which she had been "working". She had no job, no roof over her head and no return fare.

Insist on a contract and the return fare (in advance). Insist on proper medical and public liability insurance, DHSS contributions and proper payment.

You can get advice by writing to Nannies Help Line, 7 Arundel Place, London N1.

Car insurance by instalment

SOLDIERS have written to me complaining about not being able to pay car insurance on an instalment plan. This is, however, the entitlement of the company concerned.

Some companies, Naafi included, offer insurance by instalments.

Also check that a broker or company is a member of

the British Insurance Brokers' Committee and the Armed Forces Insurance Brokers' Committee. Every Pay Office has a list.

As far as Northern Ireland premiums are concerned, if the sum is higher than a comparable Central London premium the difference can be reclaimed.

From 50 wives at the first annual meeting, attendance last month had grown to 200 to hear guest speaker Peggy Fenner MP set the scene for a stimulating day.

Progress was highlighted by the advance of projects such as the Federation's Register for Employment Database (FRED for short!) and FOCUS - Federation Office and Computer Upgrading skills.

Neighbours magazine now reaches 50,000 wives around the world, although it does not yet circulate in West Germany.

And there has been an increase in the number of

It will be an offence to supply kit form bunk beds which, if assembled according to the manufacturers' instructions, do not meet the regulations.

As a result of a recent incident in which an infant was trapped between a mattress and the side of a cot, occupants of married quarters are asked to check that there is no more than a 5cm gap overall between the edge of the mattress and the inside of the cot.

Gaps in the sleeping surface must not exceed 75mm and any other gap in the structure of the bunk bed, eg in guard rails, must be not less than 60mm nor more than 75mm.

A DAY IN THE LIFE OF... THE MUSGRAVE

AN ARTIST should have captured the homely features of Pte Clive Alderson as he lay in his hospital bed mulling over the question.

"Need any books? Well, I got a couple about terrorism 'n that before I came out here, but I don't think I'll be into that stuff much in the future," he replied.

A lot could be read into his expression - a touch of cynicism, a whiff of regret, and a dollop of worldly wisdom.

Pte Alderson, of 2 LI, learned the hard way about terrorism on the streets of Northern Ireland only a few weeks after he began his first tour.

He was on duty during a protest march in West Belfast when a sniper opened fire.

"I was covering my mate as he crossed the street when I was hit," said the 6ft 2in soldier. "I didn't know for certain what it was until they got me into a vehicle."

Did the patrol manage to fire

back at the attacker?

"Yes . . . I don't know whether we hit anyone but we must have been close because one of them jumped through a window without opening it."

When SOLDIER spoke to him Pte Alderson (24) was in bed in the military wing of the Musgrave Park Hospital, Belfast, awaiting transfer to the Queen Elizabeth, Woolwich, for further treatment.

Today he is back with his unit. But he'll never forget "The Musgrave".

In the whole range of UK

hospitals it must be unique.

In the immediate post-war years, sick soldiers in Northern Ireland were cared for in a complex of nissen huts in the country at the village of Moira.

All changed in October 1963 when a new wing was built on to the civil Musgrave Park Hospital two miles from Belfast city centre.

The planners cannot have foreseen the form unrest would take when it broke out in 1969, but as violence intensified the wing became the lynchpin of medical cover and nursing for the hard pressed Security Forces.

At one time in the '70s the Musgrave even had a ward for injured terrorists.

Then it was common for bullets to smack into the walls. Today things are much quieter though only a few weeks ago two high velocity shots from the Andersonstown direction ripped through brickwork in the sisters' accommodation and ended up in a corridor.

"We had to replace the venetian blind in a bedroom . . . the bullets made a right mess of it," said RQMS John Zaremba (whose father fought with the Polish airborne brigade at Arnhem).

RQMS Zaremba is pleased with the conversion of some former married quarters into three neat units for nurses.

"They should be able to sunbathe on the patio," he added.

There are 12 SRNs and 12 state enrolled nurses on the Musgrave's staff, which totals 65.

Though the QARANC personnel have to live behind the walls of the "echelon", a secure area they share with troops occupying a Security Forces base, more than half the girls ask to extend their year-long tour (male nurses serve two years).

"The fact that we are not a teaching hospital and our cases are likely to be interesting adds



to the attraction," Matron Maggie Sloman explained. "The nurses like being able to shop in Belfast. The city centre has excellent shops."

Matron came to the Musgrave from BMH Hong Kong. She is a cheerful, unfussy soul who would clearly be at home in any hospital environment.

Though the social life is appealing for nurses, there is no shortage of work.

Musgrave military wing, at present under command of Col Mike Mummery, is the Army hospital of Northern Ireland, though it is curiously described in official documents as "parasitic", being dependent on the civil hospital next door

for certain services covered under a cost-sharing agreement.

These include radiology, physiotherapy, laundry and back-up operating theatre facilities.

The wing does not normally treat the dependents of resident battalions who can attend local civil hospitals.

It does provide in-patient and out-patient facilities for all Servicemen and women including soldiers of the Ulster Defence Regiment injured or ill while on operations or training and also for Territorials.

When casualties occur in terrorist incidents, riots or in traffic accidents, victims are normally taken to the nearest civil hospital.

The military wing of the

in other hospitals.

Musgrave is unstinting in its appreciation of the job done by its counterparts.

"In particular, I cannot speak too highly of the debt we owe to the Royal Victoria Hospital," said Maj Barry Hives, the administrative officer. "Many soldiers owe their lives to the staff there."

Casualties are transferred to the Musgrave when they are considered well enough to be moved.

If necessary they can be flown to hospitals on the mainland in a specially equipped "medevac" Hercules operating between Aldergrove and Lyneham.

When soldiers are very seriously ill relatives can be

flown into Belfast. Pte Alderson's parents were accommodated in a special flat in the hospital so they could be near him when his life seemed in danger.

They were looked after by a social worker from the Red Cross and St John Welfare Service (the DILFOR system).

When the Aldersons left the Musgrave they were content that their son was recovering fast in good hands.

There is nothing stuffy about the corridors of the military wing (from which the terrorist patients have long since gone to a heavily guarded complex).

The impersonal Ward 1 and Ward 2 designations of former days have been replaced by the

names of men who won the VC.

One of them commemorates Hospital Apprentice Andrew Fitzgibbon, of the Indian Medical Services, who was only 15 years old when he won his medal (and was wounded himself) at the storming of the Taku Forts in China. His family came from Tipperary.

The other bears the name of Capt John Sinton, also of the Indian Medical Service, who won his decoration in Mesopotamia in 1916. He later became High Sheriff of Tyrone.

Leave the wards, at this moment about half full, and round a corner you will find yourself face to face with a bright canteen area which has been refurbished by Lloyds of

London Branch of the Royal British Legion.

Turn another corner and you may come face to face with Arthur Daley . . . well, not exactly your George Cole, more your Sgt Jim Wilkinson whose storeroom ("it's more like a big cupboard, really") is a legend in Northern Ireland medical circles.

From it go supplies, drugs and dressings for some 20 or so medical centres which need constant replenishment.

Sgt Wilkinson sees to it that from Crossmaglen to Carrickfergus his clients get what they want, no matter how difficult the request may be.

Round yet another corner we came across a rare sight . . .


one sergeant major giving another a cup of tea in bed.

CSM Bill MacGregor, sitting up with his arm in bandages after a minor operation, was being pampered by WO1 Paul Crosthwaite, the Staff Assistant, concerned in the day-to-day running of the hospital . . . a nice little leg pull for the benefit of the SOLDIER photographer.

Even if you're not among the long list of people grateful for treatment received you leave the military wing feeling better for it, and appreciative of a remarkable blend of duty, service and good humour which does credit to the traditions of the Royal Army Medical Corps.

ROYAL WELCH ‘BACK’ IN COUNTY DOWN

NO strangers to the troubles of Northern Ireland, the 1st Battalion, The Royal Welch Fusiliers, are back in County Down not far from where the regiment first served almost 300 years ago.

Raised in 1689 by William III – William of Orange – the regiment helped him defeat James II and his French allies at the Battle of the Boyne.


The regiment spent its first Christmas just a few miles from its present headquarters at Ballykinler and will still be in the province when it celebrates its tercentenary in 1989.

Supporting the Royal Ulster Constabulary (RUC) in their

fight against terrorism, the regiment works closely with the police and the Ulster Defence Regiment.

After spending two years as a home defence battalion at Clive Barracks near Market Drayton, Shropshire, the regiment now finds itself fully operational with a daily regime of counter terrorism activities – in most of which they were already well versed following a four months emergency roulement tour in the province last year.

A four months tour and a two year posting are two very different things, as Maj Robert Ross, OC B Coy, explained: “When you are on a short tour

you tend to see something lurking behind every bush but on a longer posting you have time to relax and to realise how normal life here can be.”

On average, two companies are operational while the others are training or perhaps on leave. The companies rotate through a cycle of operational duties followed by two weeks leave and a training and standby period.

Based at Ballykinler, the battalion supports the RUC along a stretch of South Down and South Armagh which, lying as it does in the shadow of

the Mourne Mountains, is a natural corridor for cross border travellers.

Much of the battalion's activity involves patrolling rural areas and such tasks as manning vehicle check points (VCPs) and scanning the countryside from observation posts.

Capt Simon Gillett said: “Everyone has a role to play, especially while on patrol. Looking for the car that drives past twice or remembering the face that is spotted twice, this is where the fusilier earns his money.”

“That element of risk, and of an enemy attack is what keeps

you switched on."

WO2 Richard Irvine, B Coy CSM, said: "It is what we are paid to do and it is interesting work. We know why we are here and this is one of the few places where you can actually be a soldier."

Sgt Lance Edmunds added: "You are always aware that something could happen but you just push it to the back of your mind. Everyone matures a lot during a period in Northern

Ireland and you can see the outlook of the younger ones changing almost week by week."

This was a comment echoed by Lt Col David Ross, CO 1 RWF, who told SOLDIER: "Our job here is undoubtedly challenging, bringing the best out of our younger soldiers and developing leadership at all levels."

"We are aware of the threat and do our best to counter it. There is the constant satisfac-


tion here of doing something worthwhile and the soldiers are happiest when they are out of barracks and on operations."

Initially some soldiers may be apprehensive about duty in Northern Ireland but most undoubtedly seem to enjoy it. It is an operational theatre and involves a lot of straightforward soldiering and many seem glad of the chance to flex the skills they were taught on joining the Army.

Fus Mark Holmes, a

member of 6 Platoon on patrol near Warrenpoint, said: "I hate being stuck in camp and would far rather be out here. I enjoy urban patrolling especially because then the adrenalin is really going. You know you are in someone else's patch and that you cannot afford to switch off."

Bessbrook Mill, which produced flax until the 1950s, is the nerve centre of Army operations in Armagh and is currently home to the 2nd

Battalion, Scots Guards, and elements of the 1st Battalion, The Duke of Wellington's Regiment, the 3rd Battalion, The Royal Green Jackets and 1 RWF.

The command and control structure centred at Bessbrook

Mill means that one platoon of 1 RWF is under the command of a company of 1 DWR who are in turn under the umbrella of 2 SG.

Sgt Wayne Watkins of 6 Platoon, the Royal Welch platoon operating from Bess-

brook at the time of the SOLDIER visit, said: "Working flat out every day for several weeks can be quite draining but at least you know you have got some leave at the end of it."


There is also the chance for some adventurous training and offshore water sports in the province. Fishing is popular and the area is well known for its sea trout.

Lt Col Ross said: "Having our families this time makes all the difference. Isolation is a

problem but it suits us better as a Welsh unit, perhaps, than another which draws its recruits from large towns and cities."

Maj Ross added: "The Welsh, I think, have a natural gift of the gab. One of our biggest problems is trying to do the job dressed as we are. The more approachable we can make ourselves the better and this is very much in the Welsh character."







Writer Mervyn Wynne Jones and photographer Mike Weston visited the Army Air Corps in Northern Ireland to meet the men and the machines who give the soldiers...

TOP COVER

DEEP in the heart of South Armagh lies Europe's busiest heliport, a heliport catering for more than 600 flights a week and as many as 15,000 passengers a month.

Helicopters of the Army Air Corps and Royal Air Force ply to and fro across the province at all times of the day and night from Bessbrook Mill, focal point for Security Force operations along the border.

The border country is strictly a no-go area for green vehicles and consequently the task of inserting and extracting patrols and replenishing security posts and observation positions lies firmly with the crews of these helicopters.

Providing much of the round-the-clock cover are 665 and 655 Squadrons of the Northern Ireland Regiment Army Air Corps based, respectively, at Aldergrove and Ballykelly which together offer regimental support to both 39 and 8 Brigades.

Their's is a hectic programme of shifts and duties with pilots and crewmen flying the maximum number of hours regarded as safely permissible and ground crew and technicians burning the midnight oil to keep all aircraft flying.

"People are always coming off or going on duty and consequently the regiment is in a state of perpetual motion," said Capt Nick Caplin. "Work continues 365 days a year and no part of the regiment is ever stood down." Capt Caplin, the

adjutant, was due to take up another posting soon after SOLDIER's visit.

The role of the Army aviators is to back up the Army in support of police operations across the province.

It is a role that takes many different forms, from the movement of men and materials to observation, reconnaissance and casevac.


Crews may find themselves, for example, providing 24 hour Lynx cover at Bessbrook with all that that involves in terms of movement of patrols and supplies, or flying a "heli-tele" operation and video recording parades, marches and anything of interest to the Security Forces.

The regiment's city flight, part of 665 Squadron and based at Palace Barracks outside Belfast, use Gazelle aircraft and provide top cover for men on ground patrol.

Lt Iain King, on a four month rota stint from 1 Regt AAC at Hildesheim, West Germany, said: "This is very different work from that in south Armagh because here we are doing a lot of high hover flying and slow orbits.

"We follow up incidents and can often be there in minutes. Navigation round the city is easy and when flying at night we can tell where we are by the pattern of the street lights - some of the guys know Belfast better than their own home town."

Cpl Campbell Brand, Para-

chute Regiment on attachment to the corps, added: "It is more intensive and demanding than BAOR but there is a lot of satisfaction in working here."

The variety of cap badges flying with the Northern Ireland Regiment is typical of the Air Corps as a whole and


includes a former Royal Scot as CO and a Grenadier Guard as second in command.

Commando Brigade, told SOLDIER: "Northern Ireland seems to be held together by wires but apart from that its not too bad!"

Wires are just one of the hazards of flying in the province and crews have to be wary of small arms ground fire as well.

Precautions hammered into all crews passing through the regiment include the importance of varying routes and not setting patterns, keeping a sharp eye open at all times, not providing an easy target in border areas and not spending too much time on the ground where the threat of mortar fire exists.

Flying in such conditions is demanding, not least for the members of 665 Squadron on four month roulement tours who frequently fly up to the 70 hour limit per 28 days. Each 24 hour period of duty is followed by 24 hours on standby and then a day off.

The regiment also has, in addition to its two squadrons, a Beaver flight based at Aldergrove whose aircraft, robust and agile as they are, have been in service since 1961 and are soon to be replaced.

Lt Col Peter McQueen, CO, said: "It is fascinating being in command of such a diverse and interesting unit. We are involved in a minor way with most operations throughout the province so we get a fairly good picture of the situation at any time."









LOCAL boys, girls, men and women, mums and dads all made good when the Hong Kong garrison staged a military tattoo at the Coliseum, Kowloon.



The title is justified by the inclusion of great examples of the genre from the middle of the 19th century to the 1980s, with several which some of us (me included) missed out on during our years with the baton.

Someone has really explored the archives and other peoples' libraries to find such as R B Hall's *Kennebec*, his *Red Men's March*, and *Independentia*, though the latter has had a couple of airings in the past. Unlike Hall's best known marches these are not in 6/8 time, and show the composer in an altogether more militant mood.

The famous marches included are *Children of the Regiment*, *Washington Grays*, *Army and Marine*, and Frank Panella's *On the Square*, with two film excerpts in *A Bride Too Far* by John Addison, doyen of film composers, and *Raiders of the Lost Ark* by John Williams, he of *Jaws* fame.

From then on it is discovery all the way, with dear old Blankenburg providing a staggeringly original *Admiral of the Air*,



though the title is probably not his. *True Comrades-in-Arms* sounds like him though, and is also a winner.

Derek Kimberley's own *Man o' Brass* is dedicated to Harry Mortimer, *Birdcage Walk* is Leslie Statham's tribute to that bit of macadam we all trudged so often, and the title of the disc is further justified by a little medley of tunes ranging from *Garry Owen*, *The Girl I Left Behind Me*, to *Goodbye Dolly Gray*, all dating from campaigns the Grenadiers were involved in.

Wonderful virile and exciting stuff by what I shall always believe to be THE band where marches are concerned.

THIS newish band was one of two formed in 1985 from the three bands of The Royal Green Jackets, the other being the Peninsula Band. So it's a case of three battalions into two bands now, a wise decision from the musical if not the work load point of view.

Ex-bandmasters and the present one provide much of the music. Mr McElligott has a band and bugle flourish named after the regimental motto *Celer et Audax*, a concert march dedicated to *Sir John Moore*, and a quick march called *Quick Silver* for reasons of which he may not be aware, apart from the obvious reference to the Speedy Rifle approach to life.

A famous bugle major of the 1930s,

Reuben Silver, was known by that name to members of the 2nd/60th band on occasions when he encouraged paces of up to 160 and more.

Maj Jerry McColl provides an arrangement of Debussy's lovely *Girl With The Flaxen Hair*, and Maj Roger Swift (who should have been known as "Celer" but probably wasn't) a band and bugle fanfare called *St Mary's*.

A very sluggish interpretation of Grainger's *Irish Tune from County Derry* is enlivened by yet another offering from the prolific Sammy Nestico, a saxophone sole *Dream Catcher*.

All in all an attractive programme with a bit of something for everybody.

SHARP END DIARY OF A STAFF OFFICER

LORD Moyne, born in Dublin as Walter Edward Guinness, is generally remembered as a politician. He entered Parliament in 1907 as Member for Bury St Edmunds and later held various ministerial offices.

During the Second World War he served as Resident Minister in the Middle East and was assassinated in Cairo in 1944 by emissaries of the Stern Gang from Israel.

A lesser known aspect of

Moyne's life is his military experience in the First World War. His diaries covering this period are now the subject of a new book, *Staff Officer: The Diaries of Lord Moyne 1914-1918*, compiled and edited by the military historians Brian Bond and Simon Robbins.

Walter Guinness served as a regimental officer with the Suffolk Yeomanry, 10th London and 11th Cheshire Regi-

ments, taking part in some of the dramatic events of 1915-16.


His positions of brigade and divisional staff officer in the second half of the war presented an opportunity to provide rare descriptions of military organisation "at the sharp end", both in defence and attack.

His diaries comprise personal accounts of a number of campaigns: the final phase of Gallipoli, the close of the

Somme fighting, Passchendaele, the German breakthrough of March 1918 and the subsequent Allied advance.

The book will probably be more appreciated by serious students of the First World War than by readers seeking an adventure story. — BJ

The greatest tank battle of them all

THE greatest tank battle in history was instigated by Hitler in 1943 on the Kursk-Orel salient of the Eastern Front, a front which stretched from Stalingrad southward to the Sea of Azov.

The Germans attacked and at first made some slow progress, prevented by the Soviet forces from using their usual blitzkrieg tactics. In fact they were defeated by the very methods they had used so successfully in the past. The Germans did not know that the Russians had been about to launch their own offensive.

The best German troops took the brunt of the clash and when they needed their reserves they were not of the same calibre. The Russian reserves were massed effectively to counter-attack.

These were mighty armies in opposition, with the Russians fielding the greater numbers. In combat were 2,237,000 men, 30,220 guns, 6,000 tanks and 5,150 aircraft. The Russian troops were now well trained, their armament no longer inferior, and their commanders fully in control and effective in operations.

The big tank battle started on the morning of July 12, 1943 in the Prokhorovka area. As the great mass of Soviet tanks advanced in groups "the gunfire became one mighty continuous noise."

There was dogfight after fierce dogfight, the T-34s taking out the Tigers at close range. No longer was the length of muzzle of any significance and the rounds went through the armour at any angle.

"Soon the firmament was covered by heavy smoke" from the innumerable fires.

The battle lasted four days and it was a decisive turning point in the war. After the great conflict the Russians fought the Germans with equality of ferocity and ability and eventually fought their way through to Berlin.

This newly published record of the greatest tank battle is translated from the German and is based on daily accounts published by both sides. There are photographs on almost every page and maps with which to follow the contest. — GRH



for the continuity drill (without verbal orders) display by the Junior Leaders Corps of the Royal Hong Kong Regiment (The Volunteers), all between 14 and 18 years old.

More fast-developing talent was shown by the all-Chinese motor cycle display team of 29 Squadron RCT which is expected to take part in the Royal Tournament, London, next year.

From veteran pageant master, Maj (Retd) Aubrey Jackman there was high praise for the Army dogs demonstration put on by the Hong Kong Animal Defence Support Unit, Royal Army Veterinary Corps.

The dogs came from the Border Detachment and have helped to capture 11,000 illegal immigrants since 1979.

Two combat scenarios proved popular. In "On Guard" the 1st Bn Coldstream Guards, the resident British battalion, contrasted their ceremonial and active service roles. The Corps of Drums in scarlet and bearskins made a big impression.

In "Counter Action" RAMC and QARANC personnel of the BMH set up a clinic in a difficult environment under the protection of 3 Raiding Squadron Royal Marines.

The Tattoo was produced to raise funds for Hong Kong charities and for SSAFA.

Return to Cambrai



SIX British veterans – now all in their nineties – have returned to the battlefields of Cambrai, exactly 70 years after the start of the first great tank battle in history.

They were joined by 50 members of the Royal Tank Regiment Old Comrades Association and by many more for a service held at the Victory Memorial, Cambrai.

Pte George Brown, now 91, was with H Battalion Heavy Branch the Tank Corps from 1917-19, and the sight of those vast French fields served only to remind him of the dreadful carnage on both sides. Nearly 42,000 British soldiers were killed or wounded at Cambrai.

Pte George Judkin was on the HQ staff of H battalion and was responsible for taking down the confidential orders for the battle. He remembers days of secret preparation when the tanks (code named "tadpoles") were taken overnight into Dessel Wood to be hidden from the Germans.

Pte Val Field, while serving with E Battalion, was just plain lucky when he and other members of the battalion were transferred to G Battalion. Two thirds of the remaining E Battalion were consequently wiped out, and a visit to the British Cemetery at Flesquieres enabled him to remember lost comrades and to search the

grave stones for familiar names.

Pte Frank Siddaway, now 90, served with D Battalion. He too remembered preparations for Cambrai, in particular the use of dummy tanks a few weeks before the battle, and the low flying aeroplanes of the Royal Flying Corps which covered the noise of rumbling tanks taking up their positions. Also with D Battalion was Pte Thomas Geoffrey Rooker. He remembers being holed up in Havrincourt Wood. During the night of the 19th they moved to their starting posi-

tions and waited for dawn.

It was a lovely morning and as they looked down over the slopes they could see the sun glinting on the German wires. Thomas Rooker had a close encounter when, clanking forward Flesquieres, he was stopped by an officer from going around the corner ahead. Had he continued he would almost certainly have met the fate of the three previous tanks, all of which had been disabled by a German gun.

Pte Robert Alfred Barber served as a "runner" with B



THE visit to Cambrai provided an opportunity for many friends and relatives who had fought at the battle, as it was for the daughter of the late 2nd Lt T W Deeves of the 16th Middlesex, 29th Division.

Of particular interest was the Graincourt gun, which disabled two tanks and held up the infantry until it was captured by Pte Phillips of G Battalion. It was on loan from the Tank Museum at Bovington, Dorset.

Lt Deeves was wounded and taken to hospital behind enemy lines. He left during the night and walked back to rejoin his men, arriving

just in time for the German counter attack on November 30, during which he was seriously wounded.

Having lain in no man's land for 48 hours he was brought back as dead. A medical officer, looking under Deeves's blanket as he awaited burial, noticed a

movement and the lieutenant was taken to hospital. Though he was put in "No Hope" ward, Deeves recovered.

It was the end of the war for Lt Deeves, but his memories and injuries were to remain with him for the next 60 years.

World champ: that's our Bill



MASTER TRIATHLETE: Bill Pegler from AAC Chepstow

PT Instructor Bill Pegler from the Army Apprentices College at Chepstow became Britain's first triathlon world champion when he won the veteran's title at the world championships in Nice, France.

Bill, an ex-QMSI, and Sgt Mike Williams of 23 Para Fd Ambl were among the 905 competitors who set out on the gruelling two mile sea swim, 75 mile mountain cycle ride and 20 mile run.


Temperatures were high at the South of France venue and many athletes dropped out suffering from heat exhaustion.

Mike Williams finished in the top half of the field to his great relief. Last year he was hit by a motor car during the cycling event and spent eight days in hospital.

Pegler beat many full time

professionals and top amateurs from 23 countries on his way to the world title. His time of 6hrs 48min secured 67th place overall. He was the second British competitor to finish.

"It was the experience of a lifetime for us," said Bill. "Quite unlike any race we do in the UK. Next year we hope to enter a full Army team."

Sgt Green, 28, Royal Army Dental Corps, took up triathlon eventing four years ago - swimming 1500 metres, cycling 40kms and running 10kms. In 1985 he became the sixth Briton to finish in the World Triathlon Championships in Nice, France.

This year he won the Asian

championship in Singapore against a huge entry. His next target is the Japanese championship.

SSgt Minden, 31, a Royal Army Medical Corps physiotherapist, took up the same sport only a year ago.

Toughening up by taking part in a two-week trekking expedition in the Himalayas he managed to come in third in the Singapore competition won by Sgt Green.

The gunners were delighted. Capt Jim Baxter said after the game: "I had 15 men out there who were proud to wear the


gunner shirt and that pride came through today."
